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AUSTRALIAN OPEN - DAY 6 MATCH-UPS

[30] ANASTASIA PAVLYUCHENKOVA (RUS #30) vs. [2] KAROLINA PLISKOVA (CZE #2)

Pliskova leads 6-0

Pavlyuchenkova has only won one set against the Czech in their past six meetings... Pliskova currently on a six match win streak... The two players are the only former Australian Open juniors champions left in the draw

YULIA PUTINTSEVA (KAZ #38) vs. [4] SIMONA HALEP (ROU #3)

First career meeting

Putintseva notched three Top 5 wins last year bringing her career total to four... Halep has only fallen at this stage of a Slam on three occasions

[5] ELINA SVITOLINA (UKR #5) vs. GARBINE MUGURUZA (ESP #32)

Svitolina leads 6-4

Svitolina has won five six of her victories over the Spaniard on hardcourts... Muguruza has won the last three meetings between the two at Slams

CAMILA GIORGI (ITA #102) vs. [17] ANGELIQUE KERBER (GER #18)

First career meeting

Giorgi has not made it past the 3r at a Slam outside of Wimbledon... Kerber has not lost to a player outside the Top 100 at a Slam since 2011 Wimbledon

[6] BELINDA BENCIC (SUI #7) vs. [28] ANETT KONTAVEIT (EST #31)

First career meeting

Bencic notched 100th career main draw hard-court victory with win in second round... Kontaveit withdrew before third round match-up with the Swiss at 2019 US Open

ZARINA DIYAS (KAZ #73) vs. [9] KIKI BERTENS (NED #10)

Diyas leads 1-0

Diyas came from a break down in the deciding set to win her second round match... Bertens's last five defeats at a Slam have come at the hands of a player outside the Top 20

[16] ELISE MERTENS (BEL #17) vs. CICI BELLIS (USA #600)

Bellis leads 1-0

Mertens has only lost five games en route to the third round... Bellis playing her first Grand Slam since 2018 Australian Open due to injuries... This is will be their second meeting here this year after Mertens (w/ Sabalenka) defeated Bellis (w/Vondrousova) in doubles first round action

[19] DONNA VEKIC (CRO #20) vs. IGA SWIATEK (POL #56)

First career meeting

Vekic owns 1-1 record against teenagers at Grand Slams... Swiatek recorded two wins over Top 20 ranked opponents last season



RANKING PREDICTIONS

Ashleigh Barty will extend her stay at No.1 to 21 consecutive weeks atop the WTA Rankings making her 28 total weeks at the top spot the 14th most in WTA history and the 4th most of active players (not including Wozniacki). She will hold onto that spot after this fortnight regardless of results.

Bianca Andreescu will drop out of the Top 5 giving **Bencic**, **Bertens** (needs final) and **Kvitova** (needs title) a chance to move into the top group.

An additional ten players have a chance to break into the Top 10 - **Kenin** needs to reach SF; **Riske**, **Mertens** and **Kerber** need to reach the final; and **Sakkari**, **Vekic**, **Wang**, **Kontaveit**, **Putintseva** and **Muguruza** would need to win the title.

With R16, **Coco Gauff** will near the Top 50 depending on other results.

KAZAKH HOPEFULS

Should **Yulia Putintseva** and **Zarina Diyas** win their third round matches today, it would be only the second time Kazakhstan has had two players in the final 16 - also at 2014 Wimbledon when Diyas and Yaroslava Shvedova reached the fourth round where they both lost. **No one** from the country has made it to the R16 at the Australian Open.

The country has only had a player reach the QF at a Slam on five occasions but has never had a representative in the final four: **Putintseva** at 2016 and 2018 Roland Garros; and Shvedova at 2010, 2012 Roland Garros and 2016 Wimbledon.

Shvedova is the only player representing Kazakhstan to make it to the QF of a hard-court slam at 2016 US Open.

ON THIS DAY...

On this day in tennis history, at 16 years, 105 days, **Martina Hingis** becomes the youngest player to win a major singles title at the 1997 Australian Open - a record that holds to this day.

Coco Gauff now has a chance to make history and beat that record by becoming the first 15-year-old to win a Grand Slam title.

COCO MANIA

Youngest player to beat a defending champion at the Australian Open in the Open Era.

Youngest player to beat a defending champion at a Grand Slam since Capriati (15y163d) beat No.3 Sabatini in QF of 1991 US Open

Youngest player to beat a Top 5 ranked opponent since the 1991 match between Capriati and Sabatini.

Youngest player to reach the last sixteen at the Australian Open since Hingis (15y120d) reached the QF in 1996.

First American woman in 30 years to reach the third round in each of her first three Grand Slam main draw appearances, a feat accomplished by neither Williams sister.

The **third player in the last 30 years** to earn at least eight Grand Slam match wins before her 16th birthday.

Should she reach the QF, would become **youngest player** to reach the QF of a Slam since Karatantcheva (15y301d) reached QF at 2005 Roland Garros and the 8th player to make final eight at a Slam (128 player draw) before their 16th birthday.

AUSTRALIAN OPEN

- Making 12th main draw appearance at Australian Open (14th overall)
- Best run at Melbourne Park was reaching the QF in 2017 (l. V.Williams) and 2019 (l. Collins)
- 2017 Australian Open result meant she had officially reached the QF stage at all four majors (one of five players left in the draw who have accomplished the same - 2011 Roland Garros (l. Schiavone) and US Open (l. S.Williams), 2016 Wimbledon (l. eventual champion S.Williams), 2017 and 2019 Australian Open)
- Won girls' singles title here in 2006 and 2007. One of four junior champions to start the women's draw this year - also Strycova, Ka.Pliskova and Townsend
- Defeated Stojanovic in 1r on Tuesday before firing 45 winners in 2r victory over Townsend
- Bidding for her first win over today's opponent, No.2 Ka.Pliskova, in their seventh career meeting
- Her best win-by-ranking was over then-No.1 Kerber en route to fourth Monterrey title in 2017. Record vs. Top 5 ranked opponents is 13-35, most recently falling to No.1 Barty last week at Adelaide. Her most recent win over such players came over No.5 Stephens last year here at Melbourne Park in R16
- Holds 6-10 record in 3r at the majors; overall Slam record stands at 62-48
- Coming off opening match loss at Brisbane (l. No.7 Kvitova in 3s) before a 2r run at Adelaide (d. Kontaveit, l. No.1 Barty in 3s)

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- Has reached QFs at all four majors; 2011 Roland Garros (l. Schiavone) and US Open (l. S.Williams), 2016 Wimbledon (l. eventual champion S.Williams), 2017 Australian Open (l. eventual R-Up V.Williams), and 2019 Australian Open (l. Collins)
- One of just five active players to reach QF or better at all four majors in both singles and doubles (also Williams sisters, Kuznetsova and Zvonareva) and is the only player to do so since 2011
- Made Grand Slam debut as 15-year-old wildcard at 2007 Wimbledon (l. Hantuchova 6-0 6-1)
- In doubles, is a three-time semifinalist, at Australian Open (2015 w/Groenefeld and 2016 w/Ka.Pliskova) and Wimbledon (2016 w/Ka.Pliskova)
- Reached first Grand Slam final of any kind at 2014 Roland Garros, finishing runner-up in mixed doubles (w/Zimonjic; l. Groenefeld/Rojer)
- As well as twice winning the girls' singles at the Australian Open (2006, 2007), won 2006 US Open junior title)

AUSTRALIAN OPEN

- Making eighth main draw appearance (and 10th overall) in Melbourne
- Achieved best result at Melbourne Park in 2019 by reaching SF (l. eventual champion Osaka) - saved four match points to beat S.Williams in QF
- Also made QF stage in 2017 (l. Lucic-Baroni) and 2018 (l. Halep)
- Has matched or improved best result here year-on-year since debut - 1r in 2013, 2r in 2014, 3r in 2015-16, QF in 2017-18 and SF in 2019
- Won girls' singles title here in 2010, one of four junior champions to start the women's draw this year - also Strycova, Pavlyuchenkova and Townsend
- Is seeded No.2 this fortnight – has now been seeded at 21 consecutive majors
- Opened 2020 Australian Open campaign with straight sets win over Mladenovic. Was more straightforward than their last encounter, which ended in nail biting third set during the 2016 Fed Cup final, winning 16-14 to help seal the victory for the Czech Republic
- Defeated Siegemund in 2r, having fallen to the German in their only previous meeting on the clay of Stuttgart in 2017 in 3s
- Faces Pavlyuchenkova today for a spot in her fourth consecutive R16 at Melbourne Park
- Has dropped one set against the Russian in their six previous meetings, during their most recent encounter at 2018 Eastbourne
- Record in 3r at the majors is 10-5, including 3-2 here in Melbourne; overall Slam record stands at 61-30
- Including first two wins this week, is on a six-match winning streak (four en route to Brisbane title, two here at the Australian Open)
- Began 2020 by winning 16th career title at Brisbane International (d. Keys in F), defending her title from 2019 – has now won at least one WTA title for eight consecutive seasons. It was also first time successfully defending one of her previous 15 titles
- No woman has won Brisbane and gone on to win the Australian Open. Maria Sharapova came close in 2015, triumphing at Brisbane but finishing R-Up in Melbourne (l. S.Williams)
- Brisbane marked first event working with new coach Daniel Vallverdu

CAREER MILESTONES

- Ended 2019 ranked No.30, up from No.42 in 2018 – marking her 12th consecutive Top 50 finish
- Advanced to two finals in 2019 – both at the Premier-level – at Osaka (l. Osaka in F) and Moscow (l. Bencic in F)
- Fell in qualifying at Cincinnati (l. Diyas) - first time contesting WTA qualifying since 2011 Dubai
- Matched best Grand Slam result in 2019 at Melbourne Park by reaching QF (l. Collins); defeating No.9 Bertens and No.5 Stephens en route
- 2018 season highlight was claiming her 12th WTA singles title at Strasbourg (d. Cibulkova in F). Other highlights were QF runs at Stuttgart (l. Kontaveit), Wuhan (d. No.11 Bertens in 2r and No.5 Kvitova in R16, l. Barty), Linz (l. Alexandrova) and Moscow [Kremlin Cup] (l. Kasatkina)
- Owns 12 WTA singles titles, including a career-best three titles in a single season in 2017 at Monterrey, Rabat and Hong Kong
- Notched only win over a reigning World No.1 against Kerber en route to fourth Monterrey title in 2017
- Is a winner of five doubles titles from eight finals, most recently at 2017 Sydney (w/Babos)
- In addition to reaching last eight at 2016 Wimbledon, reached a further six quarterfinals in 2016: Brisbane (l. Kerber), St. Petersburg (l. Bencic), Acapulco (l. Wickmayer), Montréal (l. Keys), Linz (l. Cibulkova) and Moscow (l. Gavrilova)
- Owns 32 Top 10 victories (32-63 record), most recently No.8 Bertens at 2019 Osaka
- Represented Russia at Rio Olympics, losing to eventual gold medalist Puig in 2r
- Broke into Top 100 in singles on July 7, 2009 and entered Top 50 on November 3, 2008
- Made Top 20 debut on September 13, 2010 and rose as high as No.13 (July 4, 2011)
- Played first WTA main draw as a wildcard at 2006 Moscow
- Named 2006 ITF Junior World Champion

PERSONAL

- Began new coaching partnership with Sam Sumyk in September 2019. Occasionally works with father, Sergey and brother, Aleks
- Introduced to tennis at age six by family
- Grandmother played basketball for USSR and grandfather was high-level basketball referee; father was Olympic-level canoeist (missed Games due to boycott) and mother a swimmer

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- Contesting 31st career Grand Slam main draw at 2020 Australian Open
- Advanced to career first Grand Slam final at 2016 US Open (l. Kerber), simultaneously making debuts in R16, QF, SF and title match at the majors. Became first Czech to reach US Open final since Helena Sukova in 1993 (l. Graf in F)
- At Australian Open, best result was SF run in 2019 (l. Osaka), also reached last four at 2017 Roland Garros (l. Halep)
- Reached R16 at Wimbledon in 2018 (l. Bertens) and 2019 (l. Muchova)
- Made Grand Slam main draw debut at 2012 Roland Garros (as qualifier, l. Bartoli in 1r)

CAREER MILESTONES

- Finished 2019 ranked No.2 for career-best year-end finish
- Lifted a Tour-leading four title across the season (tied with Barty), taking tally to 15 – triumphed at Brisbane, Rome, Eastbourne and Zhengzhou
- Dropped 19 games across five matches during Eastbourne title win (d. Kerber in F) – most economic title run in 2019
- Also reached first Premier Mandatory final at Miami, losing to Barty in straight sets
- Produced best Australian Open performance of career, reaching SF (l. eventual champion Osaka in 3s); saved four match points to beat S. Williams in QF
- Lost to twin sister Kr. Pliskova in R16 at Birmingham, in what was their first career main draw encounter
- Made fourth straight appearance at the WTA Finals in 2019, reaching SF for the third year in a row
- Won two titles in 2018 from three finals contested, triumphing at Stuttgart (d. Vandeweghe in F) and Tokyo [PPO] (d. Osaka in F). Posted R-Up finish in Tianjin (l. Garcia in F)
- At Grand Slam level in 2018 season, made QF run at Australian Open (l. eventual R-Up Halep), reached 3r at Roland Garros (l. Sharapova), made R16 for first time at Wimbledon (l. Bertens) and had QF showing at US Open (d. No.17 Barty in R16, l. S. Williams)
- Also in 2018, made the SF at Brisbane (as defending champion, l. eventual champion Svitolina), Madrid (l. eventual champion Kvitova) and WTA Finals (l. Stephens). Enjoyed QF runs at four other tournaments
- Claimed No.1 ranking on July 17, 2017 despite making 2r exit at Wimbledon (l. Rybarikova). Was the first Czech woman to achieve the No.1 ranking since the computer rankings were introduced in 1975 (Martina Navratilova became No.1 on July 10, 1978 while representing USA)

CAREER CONT.

- Won three titles in 2017, at Brisbane (d. Cornet in F), Doha (d. Wozniacki in F) and Eastbourne (d. Wozniacki in F)
- Owns 15-12 record in singles finals, having won having titles on all three surfaces
- Captured fifth WTA doubles title of career at 2016 Birmingham (w/Strycova). Is now 5-2 in doubles finals. At 2013 Linz, with sister Kristyna, became first set of twins to ever win a tour-level doubles title
- Made Top 10 debut after 2015 Stanford R-Up finish; was first time in WTA history that three Czech women ranked inside Top 10 at the same time (also Kvitova and Safarova)
- Won first career WTA title at 2013 Kuala Lumpur (d. Mattek-Sands) and followed it up with two more in 2014 Seoul (d. Lepchenko) and 2014 Linz (d. Giorgi)
- Made professional debut on ITF circuit in 2006

PERSONAL

- Born in Louny, north of Prague, but now trains at Sparta Praha tennis club
- Has a twin sister – Kristyna. In 2013, became the first set of twins to capture a WTA doubles title
- Married Michal Hrdlicka after 2018 Wimbledon
- Currently coached by Daniel Vallverdu, and previously coached by Conchita Martinez, Rennae Stubbs, Tomas Krupa and David Kotyza
- Away from the court, enjoys fresh-water fishing, as well as contributing to her foundation which benefits various causes, including pediatric oncology and children battling cancer in her native Czech Republic

- One of three Kazakh women competing in this year's field - also Diyas and Rybakina, who are also through to the 3r. This marks the first time in history three Kazakh women have reached this stage at a major

- Coming off 2r run at Brisbane (as qualifier, l. Collins) before a 1r exit at Adelaide (as qualifier, l. Tomljanovic)

- 2020 Australian Open marks her milestone 25th Grand Slam main draw

AUSTRALIAN OPEN

- Making eighth main draw appearance at Australian Open. Best showing to date was QF run in 2017 (l. Vandeweghe)
- Victory over Konta in 2019 2r holds the record for the latest-ever start time at the Australian Open, beginning at 12.30am
- This year, is unseeded for the first time at a Slam since 2014 Roland Garros, when she was ranked No.35 and made QF
- Recovered from winning just nine points in the opening set to beat Rogers in 1r prior to taking out hometown hope Tomljanovic in 3s
- Two-time major champion with 68-26 win-loss record at this level - one of 14 Grand Slam champions to start this year's main draw (also Barty, Halep, Kerber, Kuznetsova, Kvitova, Osaka, Ostapenko, Sharapova, Stephens, Stosur, S.Williams, V.Williams and Wozniacki)
- Takes on No.5 Svitolina in today's 3r matchup - has won all three previous Slam encounters, most recently at last year's Roland Garros. Also won two qualifying meetings at 2012 Roland Garros and Wimbledon
- Compiled a 32-33 career mark vs. Top 10 opponents, with last such victory coming against today's opponent No.9 Svitolina at Roland Garros last year
- Owns an impressive 13-1 strike rate in the 3r of Slams, with lone loss coming here in Melbourne in 2016 to Strycova

- Tied best Grand Slam result by reaching 2019 US Open SF (l. S.Williams), also made this stage at 2019 Wimbledon (l. eventual champion Halep) - previous QF record at Slams was 0-4
- Became the first woman from Ukraine to reach a major SF; on the men's, Medvedev made that stage at Roland Garros in 1993 (SF) and 1999 (R-Up)

- 2020 Australian Open marks seventh Grand Slam main draw appearance - debut at 2014 US Open (d. No. 13 Cibulkova in 1r, l. Dijas in 2r).
