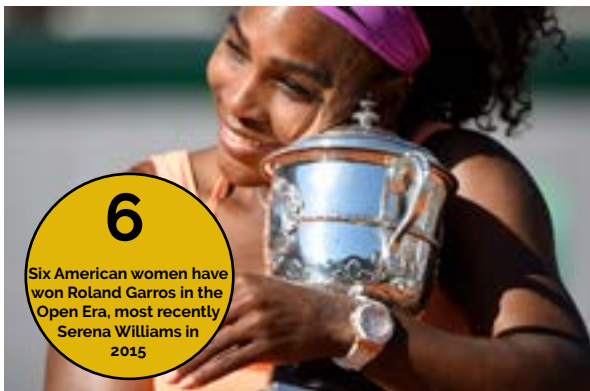


WOMEN'S TENNIS ASSOCIATION MATCH NOTES

PATRIOT GAMES

Petra Kvitova is the third Czech in the past four years to make the last eight in Paris, while **Laura Siegemund** is just the third German woman since 2013 to reach this stage.

By advancing to the quarterfinals, **Danielle Collins** and **Sofia Kenin** have ensured that the United States will be represented in the final four at Roland Garros for the fifth time in six years.

AGE IS JUST A NUMBER

At 32, **Laura Siegemund** is the second-oldest player to make their Grand Slam quarterfinal debut, behind Norma Marsh at the 1971 Australian Open.

The winner of her encounter with **Petra Kvitova** will be the first player over 30 to reach the last four in Paris since 2016, when Serena Williams, 34, and Samantha Stosur, 32, made it through to this stage.

CONTRASTING PATHS

Along with Iga Swiatek, **Petra Kvitova** is one of two players yet to drop a set at this year's tournament.

However, her fellow quarterfinalists in the top half have all had to endure a bumpier path to this stage, with **Danielle Collins, Sofia Kenin** and **Laura Siegemund** conceding eight sets between them.

SURPRISE PACKAGES

The average ranking of the quarterfinalists this year is 61 - the lowest this figure has been in any staging of the tournament in the 21st century.

It is also the first time since 32 seeds were introduced at Wimbledon in 2001, that five unseeded players have made the quarterfinals at a Slam.

Roland Garros, however, is more accustomed to surprises than most majors - this is ninth year in a row the women's draw in Paris has featured one or more unseeded players:

RANKING WATCH

By virtue of reaching the last eight, **Petra Kvitova** is projected to return to the Top 10.

Sofia Kenin could go as high as No.3 by lifting the title this fortnight.

Danielle Collins and **Laura Siegemund** are both projected to return to the Top 50.

SLAM SUCCESS

Sofia Kenin is bidding for her 15th Grand Slam match win of the season today - the most of any player on tour. Her progress this fortnight means she has made the round of 16 at every major in 2020, a feat matched only by her fellow quarterfinalist **Petra Kvitova**.

ROLAND GARROS

- Making third consecutive main draw appearance in Paris, where she is through to first QF
- Previous best result was last year's 2r showing (d. Maria, l. eventual champion Barty)
- Also fell 1r in 2018 (l. Wozniacki) - her first direct acceptance into a Grand Slam main draw
- One of two Americans left from a tournament-leading 19 in the starting field; up on 17 in 2019 draw
- Won 12 of the final 14 games to recover from a set and break down against qualifier Niculescu in 1r
- Struck 25 winners to just 10 unforced errors to end the run of another qualifier, Tauson, in 2r
- During her win over Tauson she struck a 122mph serve - the fastest of the tournament so far
- Overcame a 4-2 final set deficit to upset former champion and World No.15 Muguruza in 3r
- Withstood 42 winners from Jabeur to triumph in their see-saw R16 encounter under the roof on Philippe Chatrier on Tuesday
- In her four matches so far, she has hit 140 winners, the second most in the tournament behind Podoroska (145)
- Overall Grand Slam win-loss record now stands at 14-11
- Prior to 2020, only back-to-back tour-level wins on clay came during QF showing at 2019 Charleston
- Faces No.6 Kenin in today's QF; owns two Top 10 wins, over No.5 Svitolina (2020 Brisbane) and No.7 Bencic (2020 Adelaide)
- Only previous meeting with a fellow American at Slam level was a 6-3 7-5 win over Vickery en route to 2019 Australian Open SF
- It is the fifth time in the past six years an American has made QF at Roland Garros, going on to reach the final on three of these occasions
- By reaching QF is projected to return to Top 50 and will be just outside Top 30 should she advance to SF
- Playing first tournament with her new coach, former World No.9 and three-time Roland Garros quarterfinalist Nicolás Almagro

ROLAND GARROS

- Making third main draw appearance at Roland Garros (fourth overall)
- Last year in Paris, advanced to R16 for the first time at a major (l. eventual champion Barty)
- In 3r during 2019 run became first American to defeat S.Williams at the majors since Stephens at 2013 Australian Open QF
- One of two Grand Slam champions left in the draw (also Kvitova) out of 11 to begin fortnight
- Recovered from 2-0 down in the final set to beat Samsonova in 1r
- Won nine of the final 11 games to complete another three-set comeback in 2r against Bogdan
- Struck 34 winners and reeled off 12 unanswered games to beat qualifier Bara in 3r
- One of two players (along with Kvitova) to reach R16 at the three Slams this year (WON Australian Open, R16 US Open)
- Was again taken the distance once again in R16, though, defeating Ferro under the roof on Philippe-Chatrier to end French hopes in this year's tournament
- Outside of US Open, this was only the second time facing an opponent playing on home soil at a Slam, having also beaten then-No.1 Barty en route to Australian Open title this January
- Overall win-loss record across the four majors now stands at 25-12 (14-1 in 2020)
- Has struck a tournament-leading 74 backhand winners across her four matches en route to QF
- Faces compatriot Collins in today's QF - owns 7-1 record against fellow Americans at the majors with her sole defeat coming at the hands of Keys at 2019 US Open
- Prior to 2020 Roland Garros, had never reached a WTA QF on clay, with her best result on the surface last year's R16 run here
- Including results in Paris, owns 22-8 record in 2020 - only Rybakina (29), Mertens (28), Halep (23) and Muguruza (23) have posted more main draw wins
- Has won two titles this season (Australian Open and Lyon) - only other woman to win more than one is Halep (Dubai, Prague and Rome)
- Reached doubles QF this fortnight w/Mattek-Sands (l. No.4 seeds and 2018 champions Krejčíková/Siniakova on Tuesday)

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- Best Grand Slam result is SF run at 2019 Australian Open (d. No.2 Kerber in R16, l. Kvitova)
- Became the first collegiate major quarterfinalist since Raymond at the 2004 Australian Open
- Reached QF at 2020 Roland Garros
- Has also made 3r at 2019 Wimbledon (l. Martic) and 2r at 2019 Roland Garros (l. eventual champion Barty) and 2019 US Open (l. Wozniacki)
- Fell 1r on first five major appearances: as a WC at US Open in 2014 (l. Halep) and 2016 (l. Rodina), then in 2018 at Roland Garros (l. Wozniacki), Wimbledon (l. Mertens) and US Open (l. Sabalenka)
- Gained first Grand Slam main draw direct acceptance at 2018 Roland Garros

SEASON

- Made 1r exits at Western & Southern Open (l. Teichmann) and US Open (l. Kontaveit)
- In May and June played a series of exhibitions, including the UTR Pro Match Series in West Palm Beach, FL (faced Anisimova, Riske and Tomljanovic)
- Prior to the tour's hiatus, fell 2r at Australian Open (l. Putintseva)
- Began 2020 in fine style, making SF at Adelaide (l. eventual champion Barty) and QF at Brisbane (l. Keys)
- Scored Top 10 wins at both events, over No.5 Svitolina (Brisbane) and No.7 Bencic (Adelaide)

CAREER MILESTONES

- Ended 2019 at No.31 for career-best year-end finish
- Produced Slam breakthrough at Australian Open, advancing to SF (l. Kvitova); had never previously won a match in five previous Grand Slam appearances
- Scored first Top 5 win of her career against No.2 Kerber in R16 at Australian Open
- Rose to career-high No.23 following Melbourne run (January 28, 2019)

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- Won maiden Grand Slam in Melbourne, defeating two-time major champion Muguruza to become the youngest champion (21y, 80d) at Australian Open since Sharapova (20y, 283d) in 2008
- Before 2020 Australian Open, best Slam result was R16 run at 2019 Roland Garros (l. eventual champion Barty); in 3r became first American to beat S.Williams at a majors since Stephens at 2013 AO QF
- Made Slam main draw debut at 2015 US Open as a wildcard – received for being crowned USTA Girls' 18s National Champion. Fell 1r to Duque Mariño
- Reached 3r at 2017 US Open as a wildcard (l. Sharapova), in what was only fourth tour-level main draw outing. Has since posted best US Open result with R16 run in 2020
- Made 2r at Wimbledon in 2018-19
- Was R-Up in girls' singles at 2015 US Open (l. Galfi)

SEASON

- Fell 2r at Rome (after 1r bye, l. Azarenka 6-0 6-0 - the only time she has lost by that scoreline in her career)
- Advanced to R16 at 2020 US Open (l. Mertens)
- Suffered 2r exit at Western & Southern Open (after 1r bye, l. Cornet)
- Before hiatus, lifted fifth WTA singles title at Lyon (d. Friedsam in F); now 5-1 in WTA singles finals
- Suffered 1r exit at Dubai (l. Rybakina) before falling 2r at Doha (l. Yastremska)
- Won deciding doubles rubber w/Mattek-Sands to help USA beat Latvia 3-2 and qualify for next year's Fed Cup finals in Budapest; also went 1-1 in singles
- Made her Top 10 debut at No.7 and US No.1 on February 3
- Won maiden major at Australian Open (d. Muguruza in F) to become the youngest champion (21y, 80d) in Melbourne since Sharapova (20y, 283d) in 2008
- Kicked off season with 2r showings at Brisbane (l. Osaka) and Adelaide (l. Collins)

CAREER MILESTONES

- Produced incredible 2019 campaign, winning three singles titles, a career-best Grand Slam performance, qualification into both WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai and WTA Finals (as alternate, played one match), and breaking into the Top 20
- Finished the year as US No.2 (behind No.9 S.Williams) and leader in hard court wins (38-tied w/Barty)

CAREER CONT.

- Earned around \$655,000 USD by reaching Australian Open SF, taking career earnings past \$1 million
- Posted five Top 20 wins in 2019, over No.13 Goerges, No.19 Garcia and No.2 Kerber (all at Australian Open), No.12 Wozniacki (Rome) and No.12 Sevastova (Wimbledon)
- Ended 2018 at No.36, in what was second season as a professional (finished 2017 at No.167). All 17 of her career WTA main draw wins were posted in 2018 (prior to 2018 Indian Wells, had played only three tour-level matches, losing all three)
- Season highlight in 2018 was at Miami where she became first qualifier to reach SF (l. Ostapenko), scoring first Top 10 win over V.Williams en route
- Earned USD\$327,965 by reaching the last four at Key Biscayne, more than doubling her career earnings at the time
- Posted first tour-level wins during R16 run at Indian Wells (l. Suárez Navarro), where she scored her first Top 50 win over No.15 Keys in 2r. Also in 2018, reached SF at San Jose and QF at Monterrey
- Contested one tour-level main draw during 2017 season, at Indian Wells (as WC, l. Puig in 1r). Fell in qualifying five times, at Monterrey, Wimbledon, US Open, Tokyo [Japan Open] and Tokyo [PPO]
- Won two singles titles on ITF Circuit in 2017, at \$25k ITF/Bethany Beach, DE-USA and \$25k ITF/Norman, OK-USA, taking tally to four

PERSONAL

- Currently coached by former top ATP pro Nicolas Almagro, formerly with Jay Gooding and Chip Brooks
- Played collegiate tennis at the University of Virginia (transferred from the University of Florida after her freshman year) winning the NCAA singles title twice in 2014 and 2016
- 2016 Honda Sport Award winner for tennis and candidate for Collegiate Woman Athlete of the Year
- Parents are Walter and Cathy; older brother is Joel
- Started playing tennis at age 3; introduced to the sport by her dad (who played recreationally and used to coach her)
- Enjoys going to the beach, fishing and running.
- Started her own jewelry line during 2018 off-season

CAREER CONT.

- Registered back-to-back SF runs at Cincinnati and Toronto, subsequently leading to Top 20 debut
- During this run, defeated No.1 Barty (Toronto) and No.1 Osaka (Cincinnati), to become first player since October 2001 to defeat reigning No.1s in consecutive weeks (Davenport); also became youngest American to defeat reigning No.1 in eight years (after McHale)
- Advanced to R16 for first time at a Slam at Roland Garros (d. S.Williams), becoming first American to defeat Serena at the majors since Stephens at 2013 Australian Open QF
- Broke into the Top 100 on March 19, 2018, Top 50 on October 8, 2018 and Top 20 on August 19, 2019
- Advanced to first WTA level SF in 2018 at Mallorca as a qualifier, also reaching this stage later in the season at Québec City
- Represented the USA in the Fed Cup final vs. the Czech Republic in November 2018
- In 2017, won the US Open Wild Card Challenge, reaching the third round (l. Sharapova) and posting career first Top 50 win over No.34 Davis
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2015 US Open as a wildcard (l. Duque-Mariño in 1r)
- Owns four ITF singles titles and two doubles titles
- Played first matches of career on ITF Circuit in 2013, climbing to No.2 in ITF World Junior Rankings
- Represented the USA at the 2014 Youth Olympic Games and competed at the 2016 ITF Junior Masters, both held in China

- Born in Moscow, moved to New York as a baby before family settled in Florida. Now resides in Pembroke Pines, Florida, where she was home-schooled
- Known as 'Sonya'

ROLAND GARROS

- Making 11th main draw appearance in Paris
- Best result here was SF finish in 2012 (l. eventual champion Sharapova)
- Also made R16 on three occasions, including on Grand Slam main draw debut in 2008 (l. Kanepi)
- In 2019, withdrew on eve of 1r match against Cirstea due to left forearm injury
- Appearance here in 2017, when she fell in 2r (l. Mattek-Sands), marked the first tournament of her comeback after a knife attack in her home in Czech Republic
- Did not compete in any lead-up clay events following this year's US Open, withdrawing from Rome
- Made a fine start to this year's tournament, striking a total 61 winners across wins over Dodin in 1r and Paolini in 2r
- Fended off two set points as she won nine games in a row to recover from 5-1 down in the opening set in 3r victory over Fernandez
- One of two players (along with Kenin) to reach R16 at the three Slams this year (QF at Australian Open, R16 US Open)
- Made a faster start against Zhang in R16, taking the first four games of the match in another straight sets win
- Is one of two players yet to drop a set in this year's draw (also Swiatek)
- Is now 113-44 at Slams, including 27-10 here in Paris; sits in sixth place among active players for Grand Slam match wins
- Faces No.66 Siegemund in QF today; owns 8-1 record against players outside Top 50 in 2020, with sole loss coming to No.93 Rogers in R16 at US Open
- Win-loss record in Grand Slam QF matches stands at 6-6
- By reaching the last eight is projected to return to the Top 10 in the rankings
- Leads the tournament in aces hit (18 - tied with Badosa), while has won 77% of her service games (the highest percentage of any player left in the draw)
- Sole Czech woman left in the draw out of nine to begin fortnight
- Is one of 10 Czech players to reach SF at Roland Garros in Open Era. Mandlikova (1981) is the only one of them to go on and lift the title, while more recently Safarova (2015) and Vondrousova (2019) finished R-Up
- Has been among the Top 16 seeds on every visit to Paris since 2011
- Owns five clay titles in her career, winning Madrid (2011, 2015 and 2018), Prague (2018) and Stuttgart (2019) - level with Svitolina as the sixth most successful active player on the surface
- Holds 27 titles overall, sitting in fourth place among active players list for titles won

ROLAND GARROS

- Making her fourth main draw appearance at Roland Garros (and seventh overall), where she is through to her maiden Grand Slam QF
- Previous best result here was 2r showing in 2019 (d. Zhuk, l. Bencic)
- Fell 1r in 2016 (l. Bouchard) and 2018 (l. Vandeweghe) and made qualifying exits in 2011 and 2014-15
- Saved seven set points as she recovered from 5-1 down to close out a straight sets win over Mladenovic in 1r
- Broke Goerges six times to close out a comeback win in 2r, then fired 41 winners to beat No.17 Martic and advance to the second week of a major for the first time on her 16th major appearance
- Upset of Martic was second Top 20 win of the season (also No.18 Vondrousova at Western & Southern Open) and first of her career at a Grand Slam
- Rallied from 5-3 down in the opening set to beat Badosa in R16
- Win loss record at majors now stands at 13-15
- Has now won four consecutive main draw matches for first time since title run at 2017 Stuttgart where she scored three consecutive Top 10 wins en route to the biggest title of her career
- At 32, is the second oldest player to make her Grand Slam QF debut behind only Norma Marsh (1971 Australian Open, QF)
- Has won an impressive 76% of service points during run to QF - second only behind Kvitova among the players remaining
- Faces Kvitova in QF today; won only other match with a left-hander in 2020, against Vondrousova at Western & Southern Open
- Should she win and join Podoroska and Swiatek in SF, then there will be three Slam semifinal debutantes in Paris for the second year in a row (also Anisimova, Barty and Vondrousova in 2019)
- Is one of five unseeded players to make QF, the most at a Slam since the increase to 32 seeds at 2001 Wimbledon; previously four made it to this juncture at 2009 US Open, 2016 Roland Garros and 2019 Wimbledon
- Multiple unseeded players have now reached the QF at all three Slams in 2020: Jabeur and Muguruza at Australian Open, and Azarenka, Pironkova and Rogers at US Open
- Since Graf's title run at 1999 Roland Garros, Siegemund is the fourth German to reach the QF here - also Groenefeld (QF - 2006), Petkovic (QF - 2011, SF - 2014) and Kerber (QF - 2012, 2018)
- By reaching QF is projected to return to Top in the new rankings
- Won both her WTA titles on clay, at 2016 Bastad and 2017 Stuttgart. Was also R-Up at Stuttgart in 2016 and has reached three further SFs on the surface

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- Winner of two major singles titles: 2011 Wimbledon (d. Sharapova) and 2014 Wimbledon (d. Bouchard)
- Was first player born in 1990s to win a Grand Slam title (since joined by Muguruza, Ostapenko, Stephens, Wozniacki, Halep, Osaka, Barty and Kenin)
- Best result at Australian Open came with runner-up finish in 2019 (l. Osaka) – becoming first Czech woman to reach the final there since Novotna in 1991 (l. Seles)
- Other Grand Slam highlights include reaching SF at 2012 Australian Open (l. Sharapova) and 2012 Roland Garros (l. eventual champion Sharapova), and QF runs at 2017 US Open (l. V.Williams) and 2015 US Open (l. eventual champion Pennetta)

- Defeat of Barty in Doha SF was sixth career win over a reigning World No.1

- Opened season at Brisbane, reaching SF (l. R-Up Keys) before withdrawing from Adelaide w/fatigue

CAREER MILESTONES

- Ended 2019 ranked No.7 for second consecutive year ending in Top 10 and seventh time in her career
- Captured 26th and 27th career titles in 2019 at Sydney (d. Barty) and Stuttgart (d. Kontaveit). With 27 titles, is currently tied with Mandlikova and Sabatini in 20th place (Open Era)
- Reached title match at 2019 Australian Open for third career Grand Slam final appearance – result moved her to World No.2, matching her career high ranking
- Also in 2019, qualified for WTA Finals in Shenzhen for seventh time (went 0-3 in group play)

- Won 2020 US Open doubles title w/Zvonareva and 2016 US Open mixed doubles title w/Pavic

- In last event contested, played doubles at Rome (w/ Kalashnikova, l. Paolini/Gatto-Monticone in 1r)

- Made pro debut on ITF Circuit in Czech Republic in 2006
