Halep leads 1-0

Halep beat Swiatek in just 45 minutes at the same stage of last year's tournament... Swiatek is the only teenager to reach the fourth round... Halep in the midst of career-best 17-match winning streak

[3] ELINA SVITOLINA (UKR #5) vs. CAROLINE GARCIA (FRA #45)

Garcia leads 3-1

Garcia has come from a set and a break down to win their past three encounters... Svitolina enjoying her highest seeding at a Slam... Both players have reached QF in Paris before

[Q] MARTINA TREVISAN (ITA #159) vs. [5] KIKI BERTENS (NED #8)

Bertens leads 1-0

Bertens dropped just three games when they met at 2019 Charleston... Trevisan is the first Italian woman to reach this stage since 2015... Both players have saved a match point en route to the fourth round

First meeting

WE MEET AGAIN

On Friday, **Simona Halep** exacted swift revenge on her conqueror at last year's tournament, committing just seven unforced errors to race past Amanda Anisimova.

Next up she faces another familiar teenage foe, in the shape of **Iga Swiatek**. However, this time it will be her young opponent gunning for revenge. When the two clashed in last year's fourth round, Halep put an abrupt halt to Swiatek's charge through the draw, wrapping up victory in just 45 minutes and for the loss of a solitary game.



SURPRISE PACKAGE

With **Barbora Krejčíková** taking on **Nadia Podoroska** in the top half of the draw and **Laura Siegemund** facing **Paula Badosa** in the bottom, Roland Garros is guaranteed at least one unseeded quarterfinalist for the ninth year in a row:

QUALIFIED SUCCESS

Nadia Podoroska and **Martina Trevisan** did not have a Grand Slam main draw win between them heading into the Roland Garros fortnight.

However, the duo have successfully cleared the opening three hurdles to ensure that for the third time in the past four years a qualifier has reached the fourth round. Petra Martić (2017) and Aliona Bolsova (2019) were the qualifiers to make it this far, while the last to go all the way to the quarterfinals was Yaroslava Shvedova in 2012:

¡VAMOS ARGENTINA!

Nadia Podoroska is enjoying a year to remember. Having started the campaign ranked No.255, the 23-year-old is now guaranteed to break into the Top 100 for the first time after her run through qualifying to the fourth round.

Victory over Anna Karolina Schmiedlova in the third round was the 41st (including Fed Cup, ITF Circuit and qualifying matches) of a remarkable campaign. Should she continue her run on Sunday by beating fellow surprise package **Barbora Krejčíková** then she will become the first Argentinian woman to reach the last eight in Paris since Paola Suárez's semifinal showing in 2004.

NO TALL ORDER

At 5' 3" **Martina Trevisan** is certainly not the tallest player on tour. However, she is not the only player in this height bracket enjoying themselves in Paris this fortnight. In fact, seven of the players remaining in the draw stand 5' 7" or under - Fiona Ferro, Simona Halep, Ons Jabeur, Sofia Kenin, Nadia Podoroska, Laura Siegemund and Trevisan.

- Making her 11th main draw appearance at Roland Garros (12th overall)
- Was R-Up in 2014 (l. Sharapova) and 2017 (l. Ostapenko) before lifting title in 2018 (d. Stephens in F)
- In 2017 final, led Ostapenko 6-4 3-0 with game point before losing, however turned the tables in 2018, having been a set and a break down to Stephens
- Triumph here in 2018 made her the 49th woman in the Open Era to win a Slam, and second Romanian woman to win one (Ruzici, also here in Paris in 1978)
- Is one of three Romanian women to reach final in Paris, following in footsteps of Mihai (1977 - R-Up) and Ruzici (1978 - Champion, 1980 - R-Up)
- Made Grand Slam main draw debut in Paris as qualifier in 2010 (l. eventual R-Up Stosur in 1r)
- Roland Garros girls' singles champion in 2008, and is one of six players to go on to win the women's title in Paris, after Francoise Durr, Mima Jausovec, Hana Mandlikova, Jennifer Capritati and Justine Henin
- Sixth time contesting a Slam as top seed and second time at Roland Garros (also during title run in 2018)
- Won the final 10 games of the match to see off Sorribes Tormo in 1r on her 29th birthday last Sunday
- Saw off Begu in 2r - is now a perfect 13-0 in WTA tour-level matches against fellow Romanians
- In 3r, exacted revenge on Anisimova - her conqueror last year - committing just seven unforced errors
- Overall Slam win-loss record now stands at 96-37 - only seven active players have registered more wins
- Faces Swiatek in a rematch of last year's R16 - on that occasion won 73% of her return points
- Including win over Anisimova record against teenagers at majors stands at 8-3
- Owns 14-3 record in Grand Slam R16 matches
- Her 31-9 win-loss record gives her the third best win percentage in Paris (.775) among active players - behind only S.Williams (.835) and Muguruza (.806)
- Has made QF or better in all five events in 2020, posting 23-2 record - only Rybakina (29-8), Mertens (28-11) and Muguruza (23-7) have more victories
- Has now won 17 matches in a row, following title runs at Dubai (four wins), Prague (five) and Rome (five) - the longest streak (at any level) of her career, surpassing 2015's run of 14 when she lifted trophies at Dubai and Indian Wells, then made SF at Miami
- Owns nine clay court titles - the second-most among active players: V.Williams (9) and S.Williams (13)
- Since 2013, when she won her first of 22 titles, only S.Williams (27) has won more silverware
- Fortnight of Roland Garros will see her move to 325 consecutive weeks in the Top 10 - the longest active streak (ahead of Ka.Pliskova). Should she win the title here, she will overtake Barty and return to No.1 for the first time since January 27, 2019
- Since the start of 2016 season has scored 73 wins on clay, the second most on tour after Bertens (80)

ROLAND GARROS

- Making second main draw appearance at Roland Garros, where she is through to R16 for a second time
- Also made it this far on debut last year, posted R16 run (d. No.16 Q.Wang, l. Halep)
- Contesting seventh Grand Slam main draw, and she has now reached the 3r or better at over half of them: 2019 Roland Garros (R16, l. Halep), 2020 Australian Open (R16, l. Kontaveit), 2020 US Open (3r, l. Azarenka) and now 2020 Roland Garros
- At 2019 Roland Garros was one of three teenagers to reach R16, along with Anisimova and Vondrousova - the most to have reached this stage at a major since 2009 US Open: Oudin (17), Kvitova (18), Wickmayer (19) and Wozniacki (19)
- Opened 2020 Roland Garros campaign with upset of last year's R-Up Vondrousova. Result was also second Top 20 win of 2020 (also No.20 Vekic at Australian Open)
- Won the final five games of the match to close out a straight sets win over Hsieh in 2r
- Struck 30 winners and just 15 unforced errors to ease past 2014 semifinalist Bouchard in 3r
- Is one of two players in top half of draw yet to drop a set (also Halep)
- Record across the Slams now stands at 13-6
- Faces No.2 Halep today in R16; only previous meetings with Top 10 opposition were defeats to No.3 Halep here in 2019 and No.2 Osaka at 2019 Toronto
- In terms of ranking, best career win came over No.16 Q.Wang in 2r at 2019 Roland Garros
- Bidding to become the first Polish woman to reach a major QF since A.Radwanska's SF run at 2016 Australian Open
- Is the only teenager left in the draw after 3r defeats for Burel and Fernandez on Saturday
- Contesting Paris this year ranked No.54, six spots off career-high ranking of No.48 (posted February 3, 2020)
- Also through to R16 in doubles draw this fortnight w/ Melicar - next face No.6 seeds Peschke/Schuurs
- Won junior doubles here in Paris in 2018 (w/McNally)
- Has reached one WTA singles final on clay, falling to Hercog at 2019 Lugano

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- Contesting landmark 40th Grand Slam main draw of her career at 2020 Roland Garros
- Winner of two Grand Slam titles, lifting first at 2018 Roland Garros (d. Stephens in F) followed by an historic 2019 Wimbledon run (d. S.Williams in F)
- Became first Romanian to lift the singles title at the All England Club, defeating S.Williams in 56 minutes
- Posted three runner-up finishes in Paris in 2014 (l. Sharapova in 3s), 2017 (l. Ostapenko in 3s) and at Australian Open in 2018 (l. Wozniacki in 3s)
- Was the first Romanian woman to advance to final at Australian Open in 2018 (l. Wozniacki)
- Best result at US Open is SF run in 2015 (l. eventual champion Pennetta)
- Won girls' singles title at 2008 Roland Garros (d. E.Bogdan in F) to become the second Romanian girl to win a junior Grand Slam singles title after Mariana Simionescu at Roland Garros in 1974

SEASON

- In Rome, captured her 22nd career title (d. No.4 Ka.Pliskova in F) - now owns the fifth-most titles among active players, behind Serena (73), Venus (49), Clijsters (41) and Kvitova (27)
- On her return, won title at Prague (d. Mertens in F)
- Prior to tour's five-month hiatus, clinched her 20th career title at Dubai (d. Rybakina in F)
- Reached eighth career Grand Slam SF at Australian Open (l. Muguruza)
- Opened 2020 season with QF appearance at Adelaide (l. Sabalenka)

CAREER MILESTONES

- Ended 2019 ranked No.4 for sixth consecutive year in the Top 5. Season highlighted by winning second career Grand Slam title at Wimbledon (d. S.Williams)
- Also in 2019 finished R-Up at Madrid (l. Bertens) and QF at Roland Garros (as defending champion, l. Anisimova) and Toronto (ret. vs. Bouzova w/Achilles pain)
- Ended 2018 season as World No.1 for the second time in her career, with season highlighted by maiden Grand Slam title at Roland Garros (d. Stephens in F)

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- Contesting seventh career Grand Slam at 2020 Roland Garros
- Best result across the Slams is reaching R16 at 2019 Roland Garros (l. Halep), 2020 Australian Open (l. Kontaveit) and 2020 Roland Garros
- Made 3r at US Open in 2020 (l. Azarenka) and fell 1r on sole Wimbledon appearance in 2019 (l. Golubic)
- Made Grand Slam debut (main draw and qualifying) at 2019 Australian Open, coming through qualifying to reach 2r (d. Bogdan, l. Giorgi)
- At 2019 Roland Garros was one of three teenagers to reach R16, along with Anisimova and Vondrousova - the most to have reached this stage at a major since 2009 US Open: Oudin (17), Kvitova (18), Wickmayer (19) and Wozniacki (19)
- Enjoyed success at the junior Grand Slams, highlighted by winning the girls' singles at 2018 Wimbledon (d. Kung in F) and doubles at 2018 Roland Garros (w/McNally)

SEASON

- Coming off 1r exit at Rome (l. Rus)
- Made 3r at US Open (l. Azarenka), her best result in New York
- Suffered 1r exit at Western & Southern Open (l. McHale); reached SF in doubles (w/Kuzmova, l. Melichar/Xu)
- Reached 2r at Doha in February (d. Vekic, l. Kuznetsova)
- Posted career-high ranking of No.48 on February 3, 2020
- Posted 3-0 record as Poland saw off Slovenia, Turkey and Sweden to set up a Fed Cup playoff with Brazil in 2021
- Opened her 2020 season with R16 run at Australian Open (l. Kontaveit)

CAREER MILESTONES

- Posted career-high ranking of No.48 on February 3, 2020
- Ended 2019 season ranked No.61 after a campaign highlighted by R-Up finish at Lugano (l. Hercog) and R16 run at Roland Garros (l. Halep)
- Also in 2019, reached 3r at Toronto (l. Osaka) and made 2r five times (incl. Australian and US Open)
- Broke into Top 100 at No.88 after R-Up finish at 2019 Lugano
- In terms of ranking, best win of her career was over No.16 Q.Wang at 2019 Roland Garros

CAREER CONT.

- Also won titles in 2018 at Shenzhen (d. Siniakova in F) and Montréal (d. Stephens in F) and was R-Up at Australian Open (l. Wozniacki), Rome (l. Svitolina) and Cincinnati (l. Bertens)
- Won first career WTA doubles title at 2018 Shenzhen (w/Begu). Now 1-1 in career doubles finals
- Finished 2017 as the year-end World No.1, having ascended to the No.1 spot for first time in career on October 9, 2017 – became the 25th woman to reach the top spot, and the 13th to hold year-end No.1
- Defended Madrid title in 2017 (d. Mladenovic in F); reached four more finals in 2017: Rome, Roland Garros, Cincinnati and Beijing. 2016 season highlighted by three titles, at Madrid, Bucharest and Montréal
- Has spent 64 weeks as World No.1
- Made Top 10 debut on January 27, 2014 and has remained there ever since - the longest active streak
- She won her first six WTA titles in the same calendar year in 2013, and was the first to do so since Steffi Graf in 1986. This led to her being named the WTA Most Improved Player at the end of the year
- Between May 2013 and August 2014, improved ranking from No.64 to No.2, winning seven titles
- Broke into Top 100 on October 4, 2010, Top 50 on September 12, 2011 and Top 20 on August 26, 2013
- Has qualified six times for WTA Finals in Singapore (2014-19, although withdrew injured in 2018), reaching final in 2014 (l. S.Williams, having defeated the World No.1 in the round robin stage)
- Named 2013 WTA Most Improved Player, winning her first six WTA titles and ending year ranked No.11
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2010 Marbella as a qualifier, reaching quarterfinals
- Romanian Fed Cup Team, 2010, 2012, 2014-19; Romanian Olympic Team, 2012
- Made professional debut on ITF Circuit in Romania in 2006

PERSONAL

- Reunited with long-time coach, Darren Cahill during offseason after taking a 12-month break. Co-coach is Artemon Apostu-Efremov

- Making her eighth main draw appearance at Roland Garros (10th overall)
- Bidding to reach the QFs here in Paris for the third time; previously reached quarterfinals in 2015 (l. Ivanovic) and 2017 (l. Halep - led 6-3 5-1 and held 1MP)
- Falling in QF in 2017 snapped a nine-match winning streak, having won the title at Rome the week prior
- Also reached R16 in 2016 (l. S.Williams)
- Won the girls' singles title here in 2010, defeating Jabeur in the championship match - one of three/four/five remain from 10 that began the women's singles draw (also Halep, Jabeur, Badosa, Fernandez)
- Seeded No.3 this fortnight - her highest position at a major. Previous highest was No.4 at 2017 Wimbledon and US Open, and 2018 Australian Open and Roland Garros
- Dropped serve a total of 19 times across wins over Gracheva in 1r and qualifier Zarazua in 2r
- Defeated No.27 seed Alexandrova in 3r on Friday to extend her current winning streak to seven matches
- Overall Slam win-loss record now stands at 62-30
- With her three wins thus far, Roland Garros has now become Svitolina's happiest hunting ground amongst the Slams with an 19-7 win-loss record (ahead of Australian Open - 17-8)
- Has reached the second week of a major at least once in each of the last five seasons - 2015 (Roland Garros, R16), 2016 (Roland Garros, R16), 2017 (Roland Garros, QF, Wimbledon, R16, US Open, R16), 2018 (Australian Open, QF, US Open, R16), 2019 (Australian Open, QF, Wimbledon, SF, US Open, SF). In only Slam appearance this season, fell in 3r at Australian Open (l. Muguruza)
- Faces Garcia in R16 today; has lost her last three matches against the Frenchwoman, despite leading by a set and a break in each of them – closest encounter was in QF at 2017 Beijing when she held 1MP in final set tie-break
- Has reached the QF or better in four of eight tournaments contested this season: Hua Hin (QF), Monterrey (WON), Rome (QF) and Strasbourg (WON)
- Should she reach QF in Paris she will eclipse \$20m in career prize money - will become the 19th player ever to reach this mark

- Posted one win on clay in 2019, defeating V.Williams in 1r at Roland Garros. Received w/o into 3r due to withdrawal of Kozlova (l. Muguruza). Fell in opening rounds at Madrid (l. Parmentier) and Rome (after 1r bye, l. Azarenka)
- Is the last remaining of five Ukrainian women in starting field (Kostyuk, Kozlova, Yastremska and Zavatska all fell in 1r)

- Only second career Grand Slam main draw appearance, made debut at 2020 Australian Open falling to the eventual champion Kenin in 1r

- Win over Giorgi was first main draw victory of the year and second career win over a Top 100 opponent (d. No.68 Parmentier at \$100k ITF/Biarritz-FRA)
- Prior to this tournament, only tour-level win came over N.Kichenok in 1r at 2019 Charleston
- Went 17-for-24 in finishing points at the net to edge past No.51 Gauff in 2r; trailed by a break in both the second and third sets
- Saved two match points to upset No.24 Sakkari in 3r (converted seven of nine break points while Sakkari only won nine out of twenty); previous three matches with Top 50 opposition ended in straight sets defeats to No.32 Kontaveit (2017 Gstaad), No.6 Bertens (2019 Charleston) and No.15 Kenin (2020 Australian Open)
- After sixteen straight losses to Top 100 players across all level between 2017 and 2020, has now posted three consecutive wins over such opponents in one week
- Is the lowest ranked player to reach R16; by reaching the second week, will surpass her previous career high ranking No.144 achieved on August 21, 2017, one win away from breaking into Top 100
- Faces No.8 Bertens in R16 today; only previous match with Top 10 player was against the Dutchwoman at 2019 Charleston where lost in under an hour
- Bidding to become the first player outside Top 100 to make QF here since No.108 Rogers and No.102 Pironkova in 2016
- Last Italian woman to reach QF at Roland Garros is Errani in 2015; across all majors is Giorgi at 2018 Wimbledon (QF)
- All nine ITF Circuit singles titles have come on clay, most recently at \$25k ITF/Santa Margherita Di Pulia-ITA in 2019

ROLAND GARROS

- Making ninth main draw appearance at Roland Garros (10th overall), where she enjoyed her Slam breakthrough with SF run in 2016 (l. S.Williams)
- Was ranked No.58 during 2016 run, upset No.3 Kerber in 1r and No.9 Bacsinszky in QF; was the first Dutch woman to reach the last four in Paris since Marijke Schaar in 1971 (l. SF), and at any Slam, since Betty Stove at 1977 US Open (l. SF)
- Also made R16 at 2014 Roland Garros (as qualifier, l. Petkovic), which was the first time she had advanced past the 2r at a major in 15 appearances
- Last year, came in as No.4 seed and one of the favorites after winning first Premier Mandatory title at Madrid however had to retire in 2r match with Kuzmova due to illness
- Made Grand Slam main draw debut here in Paris in 2012 (as qualifier, l. McHale in 1r)
- Enters this tournament as No.5 seed - has now been seeded at a Slam 16 times and four times in Top 8
- The No.5 seed has won the title only once in Paris - Henin in 2006
- Came from a set down to defeat No.122 Zavatska in 1r on Monday - her first win since the tour's restart in August
- Followed that up with a marathon 3s win over Errani in 2r - saved 1MP and left the court in a wheelchair after suffering from cramp. At 3h 11m the match was the longest of the tournament so far (and third on tour for the entire 2020 season)
- Win over Errani was her 100th career main draw victory on clay
- Dispatched No.61 Siniakova in 3r in just 58 minutes (her fastest win on clay since defeating Goerges at 2018 Charleston final, also 58 minutes) - also beat the Czech en route to 2019 Madrid title
- Result improves record at the majors to 37-31
- Having made R16 at Australian Open in January, has now reached this stage at multiple majors for the first time in a calendar year
- Faces No.159 Trevisan in R16. Lowest-ranked player she has lost to in Paris is No.48 Bellis in 2017; a loss today will also be her worst-by-ranking in the main draw at a Grand Slam
- Owns a 2-2 mark in R16 Grand Slam matches, aiming to make the last eight at majors for the first time since 2018 Wimbledon QF run
- Since the start of 2016 season has scored 80 wins on clay, the most on Tour ahead of Halep at 73
- Owns six clay titles, fifth most among active players - only trails S.Williams (13), V.Williams (nine), Halep (nine) and Errani (seven)
- Posted a tour-leading 17-5 record on clay in 2019 including title at Madrid (d. Halep), a R-Up finish at Palermo (l. Teichmann) and SF at Rome (l. Konta)
- Last remaining of two Dutch players in starting field (also Rus - l. Burel in 1r)
