First meeting

Swiatek beat **Kenin** in girls' singles at Roland Garros in 2016... **Kenin** bidding to become the first woman to win multiple majors in a single season since 2016... **Swiatek** is yet to drop a set and has broken serve 32 times in her six matches... **Kenin** meanwhile has dropped four sets en route to the final... **Swiatek** has spent five hours less on court than **Kenin** this fortnight

PATRIOT GAMES

On Saturday, **Iga Swiatek** is bidding to become the first Polish player - man or woman - to win a Grand Slam singles title. She is the second Polish woman ever to reach the final in Paris, following in the footsteps of 1939 runner-up Jadwiga Jedrzejowska.

Sofia Kenin has ensured that the United States will have a representative in the Roland Garros championship match for a 22nd time. The last American to reach the final here was 2018 runner-up Sloane Stephens.



NICE LITTLE EARNER

Iga Swiatek entered the Roland Garros fortnight with career earnings of \$1,106,808. By advancing to the final she will nearly double her career earnings, with a cheque for around \$950,000.

With the winner taking home almost \$1,900,000, **Sofia Kenin** can take her annual earnings past \$5 million by lifting the title.

SMOOTH SAILING

Iga Swiatek is yet to drop a set at this year's tournament, conceding a mere 23 games in her six matches.

The last woman to lift the title in Paris without losing a set was Justine Henin in 2007. Meanwhile, the fewest games dropped en route to the final was by Mary Pierce in 1994:

FOR THE FIRST TIME

Should **Iga Swiatek** lift the title, she will become the 54th Grand Slam champion of the Open Era. The past 13 majors have crowned eight first-time champions.



RANKING WATCH

Iga Swiatek is guaranteed to jump to a career-high ranking of No.24 and will break into the Top 20 at No.17 should she lift the title.

By reaching the final, **Sofia Kenin** will match her career-high ranking of No.4 and move to No.3 with the title.

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ROLAND GARROS

- Making second main draw appearance in Paris, where she is through to her maiden Slam final
- On Roland Garros debut in 2019 and only her second major overall - produced breakthrough run to R16 (d. No.16 Q.Wang, I. Halep)
- At 2019 Roland Garros was one of three teenagers to reach R16, along with Anisimova and Vondrousova - the most to have reached this stage at a major since 2009 US Open: Oudin (17), Kvitova (18), Wickmayer (19) and Wozniacki (19)
- Contesting seventh Grand Slam main draw, and she has now reached the 3r or better at over half of them: 2019 Roland Garros (R16, I. Halep), 2020 Australian Open (R16, I. Kontaveit), 2020 US Open (3r, I. Azarenka) and now 2020 Roland Garros (F)
- Is just the third player since 2000 to reach a major final after seven of fewer appearances, joining Sharapova (seven 2004 Wimbledon) and Andreescu (four 2019 US Open). The all-time record for the fewest Grand Slam main draw appearances before reaching a Slam final in the Open Era is two Pam Shriver was runner-up at 1978 US Open, having only contested Wimbledon two months prior
- Opened 2020 campaign with upset of last year's R-Up Vondrousova. Result was also second Top 20 win of season (also No.20 Vekic at Australian Open)
- Won the final five games of the match to close out a straight sets win over Hsieh in 2r
- Struck 30 winners and just 15 unforced errors to ease past 2014 semifinalist Bouchard in 3r
- Exacted revenge on her 2019 conqueror here, Halep, by striking 30 winners to beat the World No.2 in R16
 in terms of ranking, previous best career win was over No.16 Q.Wang in 2r at 2019 Roland Garros
- Broke serve a total of 11 times across wins over qualifiers Trevisan in QF and Podoroska in SF; has won 32 of 46 (.696) return games this fortnight
- Record across the Slams now stands at 16-6
- Has hit 150 winners and only 110 unforced errors this fortnight
- Faces No.6 Kenin today in final; owns five Top 20 wins in her career, over and No.16 Q.Wang (2019 Roland Garros), No.18 Wozniacki (2019 Toronto), No.20 Vekic (2020 Australian Open), No.19 Vondrousova (2020 Roland Garros) and No.2 Halep (2020 Roland Garros)
- Is yet to drop a set; the last woman to win the title in Paris without dropping a set was Henin in 2007
- Has spent exactly seven hours on court so far this tournament, conceding 23 games; by contrast, Kenin has been on court five and a half hours longer, surrendering 54 games and four sets
- At No.54, is the lowest-ranked Roland Garros finalist since No.56 Mihai in 1977

ROLAND GARROS

- Making third main draw appearance at Roland Garros (fourth overall)
- Last year in Paris, advanced to R16 for the first time at a major (I. eventual champion Barty)
- In 3r during 2019 run became first American to defeat S.Williams at the majors since Stephens at 2013 Australian Open QF
- Last remaining of 11 Grand Slam champions in the starting field at this year's Roland Garros
- Began 2020 campaign by recovering from 2-0 down in the final set to defeat Samsonova in 1r
- Won nine of the final 11 games to complete another three-set comeback in 2r against Bogdan
- Struck 34 winners and reeled off 12 unanswered games to beat qualifier Bara in 3r
- One of two players (along with Kvitova) to reach R16 at all three Slams this year (Australian Open - WON, US Open - R16)
- Was taken the distance once again in R16, defeating Ferro under the roof on Philippe-Chatrier to end French hopes in this year's tournament
- Outside of US Open, this was only the second time facing an opponent playing on home soil at a Slam, having also beaten then-No.1 Barty en route to Australian Open title this January
- In QF, saw off Collins in 3s is now 8-1 against fellow Americans at the majors
- Victory over Collins improved her record in three-set matches this year to 10-3; Muguruza (10-5) is the only other player to have won this many 3s matches
- Beat No.11 Kvitova in SF; her only other Top 20 win in 2020 was over No.1 Barty in Australian Open SF
- Overall win-loss record across the four majors now stands at 27-12
- Should she win the final, her major record for the year would improve to 17-1 (.944) - this would be the best Slam winning percentage in a calendar year since S.Williams in 2015: 26-1 (.963)
- Including results in Paris, owns 24 main draw wins in 2020, the third most on tour, behind only Rybakina (29) and Mertens (28)
- Has struck a tournament-leading 99 backhand winners across her six matches en route to final
- Dropped four sets this fortnight; the last woman to concede four or more sets en route to the title in Paris was Ostapenko in 2017 (five)
- Faces No.54 Swiatek in today's final; has lost once to a player ranked outside Top 50 in 2020, falling to No.60 Cornet at Western & Southern Open - her first match following the Tour's resumption in August
- Has never faced the Pole in the professional ranks but did lose to her 6-4 7-5 in the third round of the girls' singles here in Paris in 2016
- The last time two players met for first time in a major final was at 2019 Australian Open (Osaka d. Kvitova)

- In the Open Era, is the seventh unseeded finalist in Paris and 16th across all Slams. The other six were Helen Gourlay (1971 - R-Up), Renata Tomanova (1976 - R-Up), Florenta Mihai (1977 - R-Up), Mima Jausovec (1983 - R-Up), Jelena Ostapenko (2017 -Champion) and Marketa Vondrousova (2019 - R-Up)
- The two other majors in 2020 also featured an unseeded finalist: Australian Open (Muguruza), US Open (Azarenka)
- Is bidding to become Poland's first Grand Slam singles champion of either sex. Jedrzejowska was runner-up in three Grand Slam finals in the 1930s, including Roland Garros in 1939. In the Open Era, A.Radwanska had been the only previous Polish woman to make it past R16 in Paris (2013 - QF)
- Across all Slams is the first Polish woman to reach a final since A.Radwanska at 2012 Wimbledon
- Is the fourth teenager since 2000 to reach the Roland Garros final also Clijsters (2001 R-Up; 2003 R-Up), Ivanovic (2007 R-Up) and Vondrousova (2019 R-Up)
- At 19y 132d would be the youngest Roland Garros champion since Seles (18y 187d) in 1992 and first teenager since Majoli 19y 300d) in 1997
- Last teenager to win a Grand Slam title was Andreescu at 2019 US Open
- Contesting Paris this year ranked No.54, six spots off career-high ranking of No.48 (posted February 3, 2020); projected to rise to No.24 and No.17 should she lift the title
- Also through to SF in doubles w/Melichar (face Guarachi/Krawczyk on Friday); bidding to become first player to make singles and doubles final here since Safarova in 2015
- Won junior doubles here in Paris in 2018 (w/McNally)
- Only previous tour-level final was R-Up finish on clay at 2019 Lugano (I. Hercog). Ostapenko was the last woman to win her debut tour-level title at a Grand Slam, when she triumphed here in 2017

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- Contesting seventh career Grand Slam at 2020 Roland Garros. Previous best results were R16 at 2019 Roland Garros (I. Halep) and 2020 Australian Open (I. Kontaveit)
- Made 3r at US Open in 2020 (I. Azarenka) and fell 1r on sole Wimbledon appearance in 2019 (I. Golubic)
- Made Grand Slam debut (main draw and qualifying) at 2019 Australian Open, coming through qualifying to reach 2r (d. Bogdan, I. Giorgi)
- As a junior, won the girls' singles at 2018 Wimbledon (d. Kung in F) and doubles at 2018 Roland Garros (w/McNally)

ROLAND GARROS CONT.

- This is the first Roland Garros final to feature two players 21 or younger since 2003 (Henin d. Clijsters) and across all Slams since 2008 Australian Open (Sharapova d. Ivanovic)
- Progress to final ensures that America has at least one representative in the Roland Garros final for the 22nd time in the Open Era
- Six American women have won the title here: Richey (1968), King (1972), Evert (1974-75, 79-80, 1983, 1985-86), Navratilova (1982, 1984), Capriati (2001) and S.Williams (2002, 2013, 2015)
- Prior to 2020 Roland Garros, had never reached a WTA QF on clay, with her best result on the surface last year's R16 run here. In last year's championship match, Barty was also appearing in the first clay court final of her career
- Bidding to become the first woman to win two major titles in the same year since Kerber in 2016 (Australian Open and US Open)
- Last time a player won two Slams in the same year aged 21 or younger was 2003 - S.Williams (Australian Open and Wimbledon) and Henin (Roland Garros and US Open)
- The winner of today's final will be the seventh major winner aged 23 or younger at the past eight majors. The average age of the champions in this time span will be either 21.50 (if Swiatek wins) or 21.75 (if Kenin wins) - by comparison, the average age of the eight previous major champions was 27.40
- Bidding to become the seventh active player to hold Slam titles on different surfaces. At present only Halep, Kerber, Kuznetsova, Muguruza, S.Williams and V.Williams have achieved this
- By reaching the final will rise to No.4 in the rankings and a career-high No.3 by lifting the title
- Has two titles in 2020 (Australian Open and Lyon) –
 only other multiple winners are Halep (Dubai, Prague
 and Rome) and Svitolina (Monterrey and Strasbourg)
- Reached doubles QF this fortnight w/Mattek-Sands (I. No.4 seeds and 2018 champions Krejcikova/Sinia-kova on Tuesday)

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- Won maiden Grand Slam in Melbourne, defeating two-time major champion Muguruza to become the youngest champion (21y, 80d) at Australian Open since Sharapova (20y, 283d) in 2008
- Before 2020 Australian Open, best Slam result was R16 run at 2019 Roland Garros (I. eventual champion Barty)
- Fell 1r on Slam main draw debut at 2015 US Open (as WC, I. Duque Mariño)
- Best US Open result was R16 run in 2020, while at Wimbledon has made 2r in 2018-19
- Was R-Up in girls' singles at 2015 US Open (I. Galfi)

- Coming off 1r exit at Rome (I. Rus)
- Made 3r at US Open (I. Azarenka), her best result in New York
- Suffered 1r exit at Western & Southern Open (I. McHale); reached SF in doubles (w/Kuzmova, I. Melichar/Xu)

- Posted career-high ranking of No.48 on February 3, 2020
- Posted 3-0 record as Poland saw off Slovenia, Turkey and Sweden to set up a Fed Cup playoff with Brazil in 2021
- Opened her 2020 season with R16 run at Australian Open (I. Kontaveit)

- On ITF Circuit, owns seven singles titles
- Member of Poland's Fed Cup team 2018-20

- As a junior, she was part of the Polish team which won the Junior Fed Cup in 2016 and won girls' single at 2018 Wimbledon and 2018 Summer Youth Olympics in Buenos Aires
