- Melbourne Park plays host to the Melbourne Summer Set this week, with two WTA 250 events staged at the home of the Australian Open
- Top seed at the Melbourne Summer Set 1 is two-time Australian Open champion Naomi Osaka, who opens
 the new season against Alizé Cornet in Tuesday's second match on the Rod Laver Arena
- The No.2 seed Simona Halep will begin on Wednesday, taking on a qualifier. The other seeds are Veronika Kudermetova, Liudmila Samsonova, Viktorija Golubic, Tereza Martincova, Katerina Siniakova and Alison Riske
- One to Watch After years of injury turmoil, Ana Konjuh made a welcome return to the WTA tour in 2021, rising nearly 500 places in the rankings. The Croatian, still only 24, achieved her first significant result since returning from a long-standing elbow injury when she reached the fourth round at Miami as a wildcard. A quarterfinal at Istanbul and a runner-up finish at Belgrade her first final in over four years continued this ascent during the clay court season, while a run through qualifying to the semifinals at San Jose helped her close the year at No.66 in the rankings
