RANKINGS UPDATE

The Top 10 will remain the same when the new rankings are released on Monday.

By reaching the final, **Caroline Wozniacki** is projected to rise to No.12, and could reach No.11 by lifting the trophy.

Madison Keys will move to No.16 having advanced to the final. She will go to No.14 by capturing the title.

SHARING THE SPOILS

For the first time in WTA history, the first 14 tournaments of the season have been won by different women. And with neither finalist in either Charleston or Monterrey having been in the winner's circle in 2019, this trend will continue into the European clay court season.



AROUND THE TOUR

Victoria Azarenka advanced to her first final in over three years with a 6-4 4-6 6-1 win over Angelique Kerber at the Abierto GNP Seguros in Monterrey on Saturday.

Meeting Azarenka in the final, will be defending champion **Garbiñe Muguruza**, a 6-2 6-3 victor over Magdalena Rybarikova earlier in the day.

HOME COOKING

Madison Keys is attempting today to become the ninth American woman to lift the Charleston title.

Since Rosemary Casals beat Nancy Richey in the inaugural final in 1973, Chris Evert (1974-78, 1981, 1984-85), Tracy Austin (1979-80), Martina Navratilova (1982-83, 1988, 1990), Jennifer Capriati (2001), Venus Williams (2004), Serena Williams (2008, 2012-13) and Sloane Stephens (2016) have all gone on to lift the famous trophy.

CLAY COURT CLASS

Caroline Wozniacki is bidding to win a WTA title for the 12th season in a row, however, it has been nearly nine years since the Dane last triumphed on clay.

Despite this wait, only seven active players have won more titles on the surface than Wozniacki: Serena Williams (13), Maria Sharapova (11), Venus Williams (nine), Sara Errani (seven), Simona Halep (seven), Jelena Janovic (six) and Kiki Bertens (five).

CHARLESTON

- Making seventh consecutive appearance at Charleston, where she is through to final for a second time
- Was R-Up in 2015 (l. Kerber in F), whilst made SF in 2018 (l. eventual champion Bertens after holding 1mp) and QF on debut in 2013 (l. V.Williams)
- After 1r bye, defeated No.59 Maria in 2r - her first win since R16 run at Australian Open (l. Svitolina), following opening match losses at Indian Wells (after 1r bye, l. Barthel) and Miami (after 1r bye, l. Stosur)
- Recovered from a slow start to beat Ostapenko in R16 and reach first QF since 2018 US Open (l. Osaka in SF)
- In QF, upset No.8 Stephens, whom she had never taken a set off in three previous career meetings
- Result also ensured first Top 10 win since beating No.10 Kasatkina at 2018 Zhuhai
- Overcame a 75-minute rain delay midway through the first set to win the final eight games against No.63 Puig in SF, hitting 29 winners and only 17 unforced errors
- Plays Wozniacki today in her first final since 2017 US Open
- Went 11-4 on clay in 2018, highlighted by SF run at Roland Garros (l. Stephens) and Charleston (l. Bertens)
- Last remaining of 14 US players to begin the main draw at 2019 Charleston - bidding to become the ninth American to win Charleston (also Casals, Evert, Austin, Navratilova, Capriati, V.Williams, S.Williams and Stephens)

SEASON

- Coming off 2r exits at Indian Wells (after 1r bye, l. No.97 Barthel, having led 3-1 in final set) and Miami (after 1r bye, l. Stosur, having led 4-2 in final set)
- In February, was part of US Fed Cup team which lost 3-2 to Australia in Asheville (d. Birrell, l. Barty)
- Began season with R16 showing at Australian Open (l. Svitolina in 3s). Has reached R16 or better at four of past five majors

CAREER MILESTONES

- Season highlights in 2018 were SFs at US Open (l. eventual champion Osaka) and Roland Garros (l. Stephens) and QF at Australian Open (l. Kerber)
- Also made SF stage in Charleston (l. eventual champion Bertens) and QF at Cincinnati (l. Sabalenka)
- 2017 season highlighted by reaching maiden Grand Slam final in New York, losing out to Stephens in 10th all-American US Open final in the Open Era. At 22, became the youngest Flushing Meadows finalist since 19-year-old Wozniacki lost to Clijsters in 2009



CHARLESTON

- Making sixth appearance at Volvo Car Open. Champion here in 2011 (d. Vesnina in F) and R-Up on event debut in 2009 (l. Lisicki in F)
- Also made SF in 2010 (l. Zvonareva), and QF in 2013 (l. Voegele) and 2017 (l. Ostapenko)
- Owns two Top 10 wins in Charleston, over No.3 Dementieva in 2009 and No.8 Jankovic in 2011
- After 1r bye, hit 19 winners and only nine unforced errors to beat Siegemund in 2r
- Saw off Buzarnescu in R16 to reach first QF since title run at 2018 Beijing
- Beat Sakkari - conqueror of two other former champions, Petkovic and Bertens, this week - in QF
- Ended the run of Martic in SF, her 21 winners offset by only 13 unforced errors; she has now won all six career meeting with Martic in straight sets
- Now owns impressive 19-4 record here at the Volvo Car Open - the most wins of any player in this year's field
- Faces No.18 Keys in today's final, bidding for first Top 20 win since beating No.5 Kvitova at 2018 WTA Finals in Singapore
- Enters Charleston ranked No.13 - lowest ranking since March 20, 2017 (No.14). By reaching final will rise to No.12 and could go to No.11 by lifting the title
- One of five former champions to begin 2019 Charleston main draw - also Lisicki (2009), Petkovic (2014), Stephens (2016) and Bertens (2018)
- Bidding to become the 10th player to win multiple Charleston titles (Evert - 8, Navratilova -4, Graf - 4, S.Williams - 3, Austin - 2, Sabatini -2, Martinez - 2, Hingis -2 and Henin - 2)
- Also looking to claim 31st career title and fifth on clay - most recent clay court title came at Brussels in 2011
- Charleston marks only fifth event of season, having been forced to miss both Doha and Dubai during Middle Eastern swing with a viral illness

- Coming off R16 showing at Miami (l. Hsieh)
- Made 2r exit at Indian Wells (after 1r bye, l. Alexandrova)
- Withdrew from Doha and Dubai due to viral illness
- As the defending champion, reached 3r at Australian Open (l. Sharapova)
- Opened 2019 season by reaching 2r at Auckland (l. eventual R-Up Andreescu)

CAREER CONT.

- Also in 2017, won third career tour-level singles title, and first on hard courts, at Stanford (d. Vandeweghe in F). Previous two titles were won on grass, at 2014 Eastbourne (d. Kerber in F; second youngest title winner of season) and 2016 Birmingham (d. Strycova in F); also a runner-up on four occasions
- Enjoyed first Top 10 year-end finish in 2016 (at No.8), as youngest player in the year-end Top 25
- Broke into Top 10 on June 20, 2016, becoming 118th player to reach the elite bracket since computer rankings were introduced. Became first American to make Top 10 debut since S.Williams in 1999
- Reached a career-high singles ranking of No.7 on October 10, 2016
- Made WTA Finals debut at Singapore in 2016, going 1-2 in round robin play
- Represented USA at 2016 Rio Olympics, reaching SF (lost Bronze medal match against Kvitova)
- Owns six career Top 5 victories: No.5 Li (2013 Madrid), No.4 Kvitova (2015 Australian Open), No.4 Muguruza (2016 Rome, 2017 Stanford), No.4 Svitolina (2017 US Open) and No.4 Kerber (2018 Cincinnati)
- Qualified for WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai in 2015 (went 1-1 in round robin stage)
- Cracked Top 20 on February 2, 2015
- Was second-youngest player to win a WTA title in 2014, at Eastbourne (after Vekic at Kuala Lumpur); also youngest American to win a title since Vania King in October 2006 (17 years, 254 days, Bangkok)
- Made tour-level debut at 2009 Ponte Vedra Beach at 14 years old (as WC, d. Kudryavtseva); was seventh youngest player to win a WTA main draw match at 14 years, 48 days, and youngest since Hingis in 1994

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- 2019 Australian Open marked 26th Grand Slam main draw appearance
- Best result at a major was 2017 US Open R-Up finish to Stephens. Best result prior to that was breakthrough SF run at Australian Open in 2015 (l. eventual champion S.Williams)
- Before 2015 Melbourne Park SF run, had never previously passed 3r at a major. Became just the third American teenager since 1995 to reach SF at the Australian Open – also Chanda Rubin (1996, SF) and Sloane Stephens (2013, SF)
- Achieved best result at Roland Garros to date with SF run in 2018 (l. Stephens) – means she has now reached at least QF at all four majors
- At Wimbledon, best result so far is QF in 2015 (l. A.Radwanska)
- Made Grand Slam main draw debut at 2011 US Open, advancing to 2r (was first 16-year-old to compete at Flushing Meadows since Kristie Ahn in 2008)

CAREER MILESTONES

- Posted a 41-17 record across 2018, finishing at No.3 for 11th consecutive Top 20 season and eighth Top 10 finish of career, including six in a row (2009-14) and back-to-back year-end No.1 finishes in 2010-11
- Won three titles last season from four finals, winning the debut Slam at the Australian Open, Eastbourne and Beijing. Finished R-Up at Auckland
- Owns 30 tour-level singles titles (30-24 record in finals) - sits fourth among active players, trailing S.Williams (72), V.Williams (49) and Sharapova (36)
- Won 2017 WTA Finals Singapore, passing \$25 million in career prize money
- Lifetime record stands at 4-6 vs. World No.1 players
- Has won at least one title in 11 straight seasons (since 2008), including career-best six titles in 2010 and 2011
- Won first WTA title at 2008 Stockholm, the first ever title won by a Danish woman
- Denmark's flag bearer at 2016 Rio Olympics
- Broke into Top 100 on July 9, 2007 and entered Top 50 on January 28, 2008. Debuted in Top 10 on May 18, 2009
- Rose to No.1 on October 11, 2010 and held No.1 ranking for total of 67 weeks; returned to No.1 on January 29, 2018 after Australian Open title for a further four weeks, taking career to 71 weeks
- Qualified for WTA Finals six times (2009-11, 2014, 2017, 2018)
- Made professional debut aged 15 as a wildcard at 2005 Cincinnati

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- Captured her first Grand Slam title at 2018 Australian Open (d. Halep in three sets)
- Also a two-time Grand Slam runner-up, at the US Open in 2009 (l. Clijsters) and 2014 (l. S.Williams). Became first Danish player to reach a Grand Slam final since Kurt Nielsen at 1955 Wimbledon
- Made major debut at 2007 Roland Garros (l. Dechy in 1r). Would go on to play 36 consecutive majors until streak was snapped by withdrawal from 2016 Roland Garros (w/right ankle injury)
- At Roland Garros she is a two-time quarterfinalist, in 2010 (l. eventual champion Schiavone) and 2017 (l. eventual champion Ostapenko) and has reached R16 at Wimbledon on six occasions, most recently in 2017
- In juniors, won girls' singles title at 2006 Wimbledon and was a finalist at 2006 Australian Open

Madison Keys will move to No.17 having advanced to the semifinals. She could go to No.16 by making the final and No.14 by capturing the title.

Thanks to her run this week, **Petra Martić** is guaranteed to be back in the Top 50, potentially going as high as No.38 by reaching the final and No.33 with the title. Her career-high ranking is No.31, set this January.

Monica Puig will close in on a Top 50 return by progressing to the final, climbing as high as No.39 with a title run.

ROAD TO THE TITLE

Monica Puig has enjoyed an impressive return to form this week, advancing to the last four without dropping a set. Should she maintain this flawless record through the weekend, the Puerto Rican would become the first Charleston champion not to cough up a set since Serena Williams achieved the feat in 2012.

However, an arduous road to the final in South Carolina is not necessarily a bad omen, bearing in mind two of the past three champions - Sloane Stephens and Kiki Bertens - have saved match points en route to the final.

RANKINGS UPDATE

Sloane Stephens will remain at No.8, unless she wins the title, whereby she can move to No.7. The rest of the Top 10 will remain the same when the new rankings are released.

By reaching the last eight, **Caroline Wozniacki** is projected to rise to No.12, and could reach No.11 by lifting the trophy.

Madison Keys will be No.17 or 18 having advanced to the quarterfinals. She could move to No.16 by making the final (so long as Belinda Bencic does not win the title) and No.14 by capturing the title.

Having made another quarterfinal, **Bencic** is guaranteed to return to the Top 20 (at either No.20 or No.19) and could start next week at No.14 should she depart with the trophy.

Danielle Collins needs to make the final to return to the Top 30, potentially going to No.25 should she lift a maiden career title.

Meanwhile, **Maria Sakkari** can re-enter the Top 40 by reaching the last four, and would be No.32 with the title.

Petra Martić is projected to return to the Top 50 by making the last eight and has a chance to enter the Top 40 again by advancing to the semifinals (depending on Sakkari's result).

Finally, **Monica Puig** needs to reach the last four to have a chance at moving into the Top 60 and would close in on the Top 50 by progressing to the final.

SHARING THE SPOILS

For the first time in WTA history, the first 14 tournaments of the season have been won by different women. **Belinda Bencic** is the only player left in Charleston to have won a title in 2019 (Dubai), leaving the possibility of this trend continuing into the European clay court season.

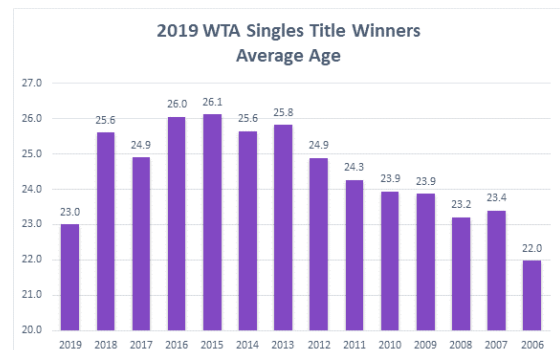

- Won both rubbers during Latvia's 4-0 Fed Cup World Group II win over Slovakia last weekend
- Posted first win of season during 2r showing at St. Petersburg (d. Mladenovic, I. Pavlyuchenkova)
- Made 1r exits at first three tournaments of the season Shenzhen (I. Niculescu), Sydney (I. Barty) and Australian Open (I. Sakkari)

CAREER MILESTONES

- Ended 2018 season at No.22, with season highlighted by R-Up finish at Miami (I. Stephens). Record in singles finals now stands at 2-4
- Saw off No.9 Kvitova and No.4 Svitolina during Miami run to register multiple Top 10 wins in the same tournament for the first time in her career
- Elsewhere in 2018, made SF at Wimbledon (I. Kerber) and reached four further QFs

- Faces No.31 Ostapenko in 2r today - bidding to register Top 50 win and back-to-back victories for the first time since 2017 US Open (d. Day and No.20 Gavrilova)

- Became ninth player ranked outside of the Top 100 (No.108) to make it to the last eight in Paris since 1983 (Pironkova, No.102, became the 10th at the same tournament); ranking rose from No.108 to No.59 following 2016 Roland Garros run
- Also reached 3r at US Open in 2015 and 2017, and Wimbledon in 2017. At the Australian Open best result is reaching 2r in 2017

ROGERS' RETURN

Shelby Rogers will play her first match since last March when she faces Evgeniya Rodina today.

A left knee injury, picked up when facing Caroline Dolehide at Indian Wells last year, forced the South Carolina native to undergo surgery last the summer.

"I just missed tennis so much," Rogers said in an interview with *The Post and Courier*. "I was going crazy sitting inside and laying around, so I had to get on the court just to remember what it was like."

CAREER CONT.

- Best wins of career came over No.1s S.Williams in semifinals at 2015 Toronto and Osaka in R16 at 2019 Indian Wells. At 18 years of age in Toronto became youngest player to defeat S.Williams in a completed match since 2004 WTA Finals, when 17-year-old Sharapova d. Serena in F (Serena also lost at 2007 Charleston to then 17-year-old Chan Yung-Jan via first set retirement at 5-3)
- Struggled with injury in 2016 – advanced to sixth career singles final at St Petersburg in February (as top seed for first time in career, I. Vinci) but after Charleston (April) was sidelined for more than two months – missed most of clay season, including Roland Garros
