Barty leads 2-0

Today's match marks the **youngest final at a Grand Slam** since 2008 Roland Garros when Ivanovic (20) d. Safina (22)...**Barty** is bidding to become the **first Aussie** to win Roland Garros since Court (1973)...**Vondrousova** is aiming to be the **first teenager** to win Roland Garros **without dropping a set** and the **third teen all-time** to win a Grand Slam in straight sets

RANKINGS WATCH

Three years ago (June 6, 2016), **Ashleigh Barty** reappeared on the WTA Tour Rankings at No.623.

Following Roland Garros, **Barty** will break into the Top 5 at No.3 by reaching the final. The last Australian to be ranked inside the Top 5 was Samantha Stosur on August 6, 2012.

Should she capture the title today, **Ash** would rise to No.2 in the world. The last Australian to be ranked as high as No.2 was Evonne Goolagong Cawley on December 6, 1976.

Marketa Vondrousova's Grand Slam breakthrough ensures she rises to a career-high ranking inside the Top 20 at No.16 as runner-up or a Top 15 finish at No.11 by winning the title.

A NEW QUEEN



Katerina Siniakova's 33-week stay at the top of the doubles rankings (the first 12 as co-No.1 with Barbora Krejčíková) will come to an end following Roland Garros.

The surprise first-round exit of Krejčíková and Siniakova, the defending champions in Paris, left the door ajar for one of six other players to claim top spot.

As the tournament entered the semifinal stage, the list of potential successors to Siniakova was whittled down to two: **Elise Mertens** and **Kristina Mladenovic**.

Mertens alongside partner Aryna Sabalenka faced off against Mladenovic and Tímea Babos in the semifinals - to claim the No.1 ranking. **Mladenovic** and Babos eventually prevailed making the **Frenchwoman** the **42nd WTA doubles No.1**.

ON THIS DAY: JUNE 8

Steffi Graf defeats **Arantxa Sánchez Vicario** 6-3 6-7(4) 10-8 to win the 1996 Roland Garros final. At three hours and three minutes, it is the longest women's final in the tournament's history.

TEENAGE KICKS

The progress of **Amanda Anisimova** (17) and **Marketa Vondrousova** (19) to the semifinals meant that for the first time in nearly 10 years, two teenagers made the last four at a major.

On that occasion, 19-year-olds Caroline Wozniacki and Yanina Wickmayer made it to this juncture at the 2009 US Open, with the former ultimately finishing runner-up to Kim Clijsters.

Meanwhile, the most recent instance of two teens advancing to the semifinals at Roland Garros was 2001, Justine Henin, 19, falling at that hurdle and her fellow Belgian Clijsters, 18, going on to finish runner-up to Jennifer Capriati.

At 19, **Marketa Vondrousova** is the first teenager to reach the final at Roland Garros since a 19-year-old Ana Ivanovic lost to Justine Henin in 2007. The last teen Slam finalist was Caroline Wozniacki, who finished runner-up to Kim Clijsters at the 2009 US Open

The most recent occasion a teenager won Roland Garros was 1997, when Iva Majoli, 19, beat Hingis, 16, while across all Slams the last champion was the 19-year-old Maria Sharapova at the 2006 US Open.

MARKETA'S CORNER

Marketa Vondrousova has now reached her first career Grand Slam final and advanced to the second week in two of her last three major appearances (also 2018 US Open, R16).

Since 2019 Australian Open, **Vondrousova** has posted a 27-5 record (including results this week).

Heading into 2019 Roland Garros, **Vondrousova** was ranked No.1 among the Top 100 for percentage of return games won (45.7%). Has upped this percentage in Paris, winning 51% (30/59) across her five matches.

QUEEN OF DIRT

Marketa Vondrousova kicked off her clay court season with two victories during the Czech Republic's comfortable Fed Cup play-off triumph over Canada. Since then she has not looked back, reaching her first career final on the dirt at Istanbul, a reputation-enhancing quarterfinal showing at Rome and now a Grand Slam breakthrough in Paris.

SMOOTH SAILING

Marketa Vondrousova recovered from 3-5 15-40 down against Johanna Konta to ensure she became the first woman since Lucie Safarova in 2015 to reach the final without dropping a set. However, not since Justine Henin in 2007 has a champion in Paris gone all the way without surrendering at least one set.

ONE FINAL SURPRISE

Ranked No.38, **Marketa Vondrousova** is the joint-third-lowest ranked woman to reach the final in Paris:

STRONG STARTERS

Today's finalists have proven to be strong starters throughout the course of their careers:

In fact, when winning the first set, **Ashleigh Barty** owns a 95-7 strike rate while **Marketa Vondrousova** is 46-10 when taking the first frame.

At the Slams, **Barty** dropped 11-straight matches when losing the first set but is 5-5 in such situations since then. The Aussie dropped her first set in the semifinals against Amanda Anisimova but came back to notch the win, improving her overall record to 5-16 when dropping the first.

TRUTH IN THE YOUTH

The average age of tournament champions this year is 23.6 years old - **the youngest since the 2008 season** (23.2).

The 2019 season started with **20 different players winning the first 20 tournaments** of the season, **the first time that ever happened in WTA history**.



With **Barty** and **Vondrousova** in the final, 5 of the WTA Tour's 7 biggest titles so far will have been won by 23-and-unders:

Dubai - Belinda Bencic
Indian Wells - Bianca Andreescu
Miami - Ashleigh Barty

PATRIOT GAMES

Both finalists are looking to end lengthy title droughts in Paris for their respective nations. **Australia** once reigned supreme at Roland Garros, with four different women reaching finals during the 1970s. However, the last Australian to win the women's singles here was Margaret Court back in 1973, while 2010 runner-up Samantha Stosur is the nation's only finalist in the past forty years.

Vondrousova, meanwhile, is the fifth **Czech** to reach the Roland Garros final, following in the footsteps of 1981 champion Hana Mandlikova and losing finalists Martina Navratilova (1975*), Renata Tomanova (1976), and Lucie Safarova (2015).

*Navratilova did not receive US citizenship until 1981

ROLAND GARROS

- Making sixth appearance at Roland Garros, where she is through to her maiden Grand Slam final
- Previous best results in Paris were 2r showings in 2013 (l. Kirilenko) and 2018 (l. S.Williams)
- Doubles R-Up here w/Dellacqua in 2017 (l. Mattek-Sands/Safarova in F); this year was No.11 seed w/Azarenka (l. No.5 seeds Stosur/Zhang in 3r)
- Began singles campaign with tidy 1r win over Pegula in which she made only 15 unforced errors
- Overcame another American, Collins, in 2r; the last time she faced multiple Americans in the same tournament was 2017 Cincinnati (d. Lepchenko in 1r and V.Williams in 2r)
- Defeated Petkovic in 3r to reach her third straight R16 at the Slams, having also done so at 2018 US Open (R16, l. Ka.Pliskova) and 2019 Australian Open (QF, l. Kvitova)
- Beat American trio Kenin in R16, Keys in QF and then recovered from 7-6 3-0 down to beat Anisimova in SF; has now won 10 consecutive matches against US opposition, last tasting defeat against S.Williams in 2r here in Paris 12 months ago
- Now has 30 wins in 2019 - the most on tour, ahead of Ka.Pliskova (29)
- Faces Vondrousova in today's final; has won two meetings with the Czech in straight sets, including en route to 2017 Birmingham final (l. Kvitova)
- Owns 3-4 record against Czech opponents at Slams, most recently losing to Kvitova at 2019 Australian Open
- Is the sixth different Australian to reach the Roland Garros final in the Open Era, following in the footsteps of Court (WON - 1969-70, 1973), Goolay (R-Up - 1971), Goolagong Cawley (WON - 1971, R-Up - 1972), Turnbull (R-Up - 1979) and Stosur (R-Up - 2010)
- Contesting this fortnight in Paris as the Australian No.1, at a career-high ranking of No.8 (achieved on May 20, 2019). By reaching final, will move to No.3 - becoming the highest-ranked Australian since the week of January 21, 1985 (Turnbull at No.3) - and could move to No.2 by winning the title - the highest ranking by an Australian since the week of December 6, 1976 (Goolagong Cawley at No.2)
- Is seeded at No.8 here in Paris - her highest seeding at a Grand Slam, bettering her No.15 status at 2019 Australian Open. The only other women seeded No.8 to reach the final in Paris were Ruzici in 1980 (l. Evert) and Kuznetsova in 2006 (l. Henin)
- Has won 65% of points on serve across her opening six matches, hitting 35 aces. Heading into the tournament, ranked third on tour this year for percentage of points won on serve (62.5%)
- Owns second-most wins against Top 10 opponents in 2019 - 6-4 record (Bencic ahead with 7-4)

ROLAND GARROS

- Making third appearance at Roland Garros, where she is through to her first major final
- Previously here, fell 2r on debut as qualifier in 2017 (d. Hesse, l. Kasatkina) and 1r in 2018 (l. Bogdan)
- In 1r this year, hit 22 winners and 16 unforced errors to defeat Y.Wang in straight sets
- Won 11 consecutive games to see off fellow teenager Potapova in 2r
- Recovered from a slow start to beat Suárez Navarro in 3r, then won the final nine games of the match to upset No.12 Sevastova in R16
- Has won at least three matches at past six events: Budapest (R-Up), Indian Wells (QF), Miami (QF), Istanbul (R-Up), Rome (QF), Roland Garros (SF)
- In QF, recovered from 3-5, 0-40 to see off Martić in straight sets; had lost twice to the Croatian in 2019, including in final at Istanbul
- Overcame 3-5 deficits in both sets to see off Konta in SF and become the first woman since Safarova in 2015 to reach the final without dropping a set
- Last player to win title here without conceding a set was Henin in 2007
- Results so far this fortnight have improved record to 27-5 since end of Australian Open; by contrast, posted 14 main draw wins during entire 2018 season
- Also owns 15-2 record on clay this season - the joint-most wins on tour (also Konta and Martić)
- Faces No.8 Barty in final. Owns 4-6 career record against Australian opposition, including straight-set defeats to Barty at 2018 Cincinnati and 2017 Birmingham
- Owns two Top 10 wins in her career, both over No.2 Halep at Indian Wells and Rome this year
- Is the first left-hander to reach the Roland Garros final since Safarova lost to S.Williams in 2015. The last leftie to win the title was Seles in 1992
- Is the fifth Czech to reach the Roland Garros final, joining Navratilova (1975 - N.B. did not become US citizen in 1981), Tomanova (1976), Mandlikova (1981) and Safarova (2015); Mandlikova was the only one to lift title (d. Hanika in F)
- At 19, is the first teenager to reach the final at Roland Garros since Ivanovic in 2007 (l. Henin). The last teen Slam finalist was Wozniacki at 2009 US Open
- The most recent occasion a teenager won Roland Garros was 1997, when Majoli beat Hingis, while across all Slams the last champion was Sharapova at 2006 US Open
- With a combined age of 42, this is the youngest final match-up at a Slam since Ivanovic (20) beat Safina at 2008 Roland Garros
- Is the sixth unseeded player to reach the final here in Paris in the Open Era, following Goolay (R-Up, 1971), Tomanova (R-Up, 1976), Mihai (R-Up, 1977), Jausovec (R-Up, 1983) and Ostapenko (WON, 2017)

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- 2019 Roland Garros marks 19th Grand Slam appearance and best career major result so far
- Prior best result to date was QF showing at 2019 Australian Open (l. Kvitova) and R16 at 2018 US Open (l. Ka.Pliskova) and 2019 Roland Garros
- Has advanced to 3r on four occasions, at Wimbledon in 2018 (l. Kasatkina), Australian Open in 2017 (l. Barthel), and 2018 (l. Osaka), and US Open in 2017 (l. eventual champion Stephens). Made 2r at Roland Garros in 2013 (l. Kirilenko) and 2018 (l. S.Williams)
- First Slam main draw (2012 Australian Open) came from winning Tennis Australia's WC Play-Off
- Lifted maiden Grand Slam doubles trophy at 2018 US Open (w/Vandeweghe), defeating No.1 seeds Krejickova/Siniakova in SF and No.2 seeds Mladenovic/Babos in F
- Advanced to three Grand Slam doubles finals in 2013 (Australian Open, Wimbledon, US Open) and was also R-Up at Roland Garros in 2017 (all w/Del-lacqua)
- Won 2011 Wimbledon girls' singles title

SEASON

- Made QF at Madrid (l. Halep), R16 at Rome (l Mladenovic) and last week withdrew from Strasbourg (w/ right arm injury)
- Won biggest title of career to date at 2019 Miami – run included three Top 10 wins, over No.8 Bertens (R16), No.2 Kvitova (QF) and No.7 Ka.Pliskova (F)
- Win over Kvitova at Miami was 200th of career (including ITF Circuit) and 100th at main draw level
- Made Top 10 rankings debut after Miami triumph (week of April 1) at No.9 (rose from No.11); became ninth Australian woman to crack the elite bracket
- Also became only player to currently rank in Top 10 in both singles and doubles – enters Roland Garros ranked No.8 in both disciplines
- Made R16 showing at Indian Wells (l. Svitolina in second longest match so far in 2019 – 3hr 12min)
- Led Australia to 3-2 away win over USA on Fed Cup duty in February, defeating Kenin and Keys in singles before teaming up with Hon to win decisive doubles rubber over Collins and Melichar
- Also won both singles rubbers in Fed Cup SF against Belarus in Brisbane (d. Sabalenka, Azarenka) as well as decisive doubles rubber (w/Stosur); Australia hosts France in November's final

A NEW QUEEN



France's **Kristina Mladenovic** is set to attain the WTA World No.1 doubles ranking on Monday, June 10 for the first time in her career.

The Frenchwoman, who is through to the final at Roland Garros with partner Timea Babos, will become the 42nd woman to reach the World No.1 spot since WTA rankings were introduced in 1975.

In bringing an end to Katerina Siniakova's 33-week reign, **Mladenovic** becomes the **second woman from France** to become the WTA World No.1, joining compatriot Julie Halard-Decugis who held the elite ranking spot for 14 weeks in 2000.

"I am delighted to become the WTA World No.1 in doubles," said Mladenovic. "It is a big achievement in my career and something that we can all be proud of. I'm very fortunate to have been able to share this journey with my amazing partner and my best friend Timea Babos."

Mladenovic has enjoyed an impressive 12 months alongside Babos, with the pair in 2018 winning the Nature Valley Classic (Birmingham) and lifting the Martina Navratilova Doubles Trophy at the WTA Finals, as well as finishing runners-up at the US Open. The team picked up where they left off in 2019, reaching the final at the Australian Open before lifting the TEB BNP Paribas Istanbul Cup – the **20th doubles title of Mladenovic's career**. **Mladenovic** also enjoyed success with Kazakhstan's Galina Voskoboeva during this time, the highlight of which was a semifinal run at the 2018 VTB Kremlin Cup in Moscow.

Mladenovic's doubles success has translated well into her singles play recently, defeating Naomi Osaka at the Dubai Duty Free Tennis Championships to earn her first win over a reigning singles World No.1.

RANKING WATCH

In addition to **Mladenovic** moving to World No.1, **Babos** will jump to No.2 right behind her teammate. Current World No.1 Siniakova will move to No.3 after her surprising first round exit after holding the top spot for 33 weeks.

At the start of the fortnight, six players had a chance of taking No.1: Strycova (l. 3r w/Hsieh), Mertens (l. SF, w/ Sabalenka), Schuurs (l.2r w/Groenefeld), Barty (l.r, w/ Azarenka) and Shuai (l. QF, w/Stosur).


SEED STOMPERS

The unseeded and untested team of **Duan** and **Zheng** have found quick success here at Roland Garros after having played only one non WTA-level tournament together in 2012: ITF 25K Pingguo (l.Liang/Tan in SF).

They have taken out three seeded teams on their way to the final. In the 2r, the duo took out No.9 Gronefeld/Schuurs in straight sets. In QF, it took three sets but eventually bested the powerhouse team and Madrid finalists No.4 Dabrowski/Xu. In SF, their straight set victory over No.15 Flipkens/Larsson secured their first ever Grand Slam final together and individually.

HOME COMING QUEEN

Mladenovic, the 2016 Roland Garros Doubles Champion (w/Garcia), is **bidding to become only the third French woman to win more than one title at her home Slam** in the Open Era. Since



1968, only Françoise Dürr and Gail Chanfreau have had repeated success as doubles champions at Roland Garros. Dürr won the first four in the Open Era first from 1968-69 (w/Haydon-James) and the next two with Chanfreau in 1970-71. Chanfreau went on to win one more in 1976 (w/Bonicelli).

QUICK-HITS

- Duan Yingying and Zheng Saisai are playing their first ever WTA-tour level tournament together both reaching their first-ever Grand Slam final

- In singles, Duan has a career-high ranking of No.60 (April 24, 2017) with one WTA title at 2016 Nanchang (d. King)
- This year, she has stuck mainly to the ITF level circuit coming off a final run at Luan 60K losing to her former doubles partner Han

QUICK-HITS

- Timea Babos and Kristina Mladenovic are bidding for their second Grand Slam doubles title together from their fourth final; previously as a team they won 2018 Australian Open (d. Makarova/Vesnina) and were runners-up at 2014 Wimbledon (l. Errani/Vinci), 2018 US Open (l. Barty/Vandeweghe) and 2019 Australian Open (l. Stosur/Shuai)
- Babos's only other major final appearance also came at Wimbledon, where she finished runner-up with Yaroslava Shvedova in 2016 (l. S/Williams/V. Williams). At Melbourne Park, the Hungarian's best result before her runs in 2018 and this year was 3r showings on two occasions and she also was runner-up in the girls' doubles in 2010 (w/Dabrowski)
- Mladenovic owns one other Grand Slam doubles title, won with fellow Frenchwoman Caroline Garcia at 2016 Roland Garros (d. Makarova/Vesnina in F). Alongside Garcia she was also a semifinalist at 2017 Australian Open (l. Hlavackova/Peng)
- In singles, Mladenovic made a 2r singles exit, losing to quarterfinalist Martic, while Babos fell to Hon in 1r after being awarded a lucky loser spot
- In mixed doubles, Mladenovic owns two Grand Slam titles – at 2013 Wimbledon and 2014 Australian Open and finished R-Up at 2013 Roland Garros and 2015 Australian Open (all w/Nestor)
- Babos finished R-Up in mixed doubles at 2015 Wimbledon (w/Peya) and 2018 Australian Open (w/Bopanna)

RANKINGS MOVERS

Ashleigh Barty will break into the Top 5 at No.4 in the new rankings. By making the final she would move to No.3 and No.2 by lifting the title. The last Australian to be ranked inside the Top 5 was Samantha Stosur on August 6, 2012. The last Australian to be ranked as high as No.2 was Evonne Goolagong Cawley on December 6, 1976.

By reaching the final four, **Johanna Konta** is guaranteed to return to the Top 20. Should she reach the final, the Briton would rise into the Top 15 and back into the Top 10 with the title.

Marketa Vondrousova's Grand Slam breakthrough ensures she rises to a career-high ranking inside the Top 25. Victory in today's semifinals will move her into the Top 20, going as high as No.11 by lifting the title.

For **Amanda Anisimova**, her run will see her break into the Top 30 for the first time. She will enter the Top 20 by reaching the final and up to No.13 with the title.

WORLD NO.1 DOUBLES



Katerina Siniakova's 33-week stay at the top of the doubles rankings (the first 12 as co-No.1 with Barbora Krejčíková) will come to an end following Roland Garros.

The surprise first-round exit of Krejčíková and Siniakova, the defending champions in Paris, left the door ajar for one of six other players to claim top spot.

As the tournament enters the semifinal stage, the list of potential successors to Siniakova has been whittled down to two: **Elise Mertens** and **Kristina Mladenovic**.

Mertens needs to win the title alongside partner Aryna Sabalenka - the pair face Mladenovic and Timea Babos in the semifinals - to claim the No.1 ranking. If she fails to do so Mladenovic will become the 42nd WTA doubles No.1.

ON THIS DAY: JUNE 7

Nineteen-year-old **Iva Majoli** springs one of the biggest upsets in Roland Garros history by inflicting a 6-4 6-2 defeat on World No.1 **Martina Hingis** in the 1997 final.

The result ended Hingis' 37-match winning streak stretching back to the start of the year and also saw Majoli become the first Croatian to lift a Grand Slam title.

TEENAGE KICKS

The progress of **Amanda Anisimova** (17) and **Marketa Vondrousova** (19) to the semifinals means that for the first time in nearly 10 years, two teenagers have made the last four at a major.

On that occasion, 19-year-olds Caroline Wozniacki and Yanina Wickmayer made it to this juncture at the 2009 US Open, with the former ultimately finishing runner-up to Kim Clijsters.

Meanwhile, the most recent instance of two teens advancing to the semifinals at Roland Garros was 2001, Justine Henin, 19, falling at that hurdle and her fellow Belgian Clijsters, 18, going on to finish runner-up to Jennifer Capriati.

Anisimova is also the youngest Grand Slam semifinalist since Nicole Pietrangeli at 2007 Australian Open, and the youngest in Paris since the same player made it this far in 2006.

Should the American make the final she would become the youngest woman to reach the Roland Garros final since Martina Hingis in 1997 and across all Slams since Maria Sharapova won Wimbledon in 2004.

MARKETA'S CORNER

Marketa Vondrousova has now reached her first career Grand Slam semifinal and advanced to the second week in two of her last three major appearances (also 2018 US Open, R16).

Since 2019 Australian Open, **Vondrousova** has posted a 26-5 record (including results this week).

However, the Briton has made a mockery of this statistic with a sequence of stellar showings on the dirt over the past few months, and after sweeping past Sloane Stephens in the quarterfinals here in Paris now sits atop the leaderboard for clay court wins in 2019.

- Making fifth main draw appearance at Roland Garros (seventh overall)
- After 1r exits 2015-18, recorded her first main draw win in Paris this year, seeing off qualifier Lottner in 1r
- Recovered from losing five straight games to win see-saw encounter with wildcard Davis in 2r
- By beating Davis, became the first British woman into 3r at Roland Garros since Jo Durie's run to the same stage in 1992
- Struck 20 winners and just 10 unforced errors to beat No.46 Kuzmova in 3r, improving to 6-0 record in Grand Slam 3r matches
- Delivered another accomplished performance against No.23 seed Vekic in R16, striking 33 winners and seven aces - her first win over a seed in a Slam since seeing off No.22 Garcia and No.2 Halep en route to 2017 Wimbledon SF
- Was the first British woman into R16 in Paris since 1983 - Anne Hobbs (R16) and Jo Durie (SF)
- Upset another seed and last year's R-Up Stephens in QF; is now 3-0 against the American in 2019, having also triumphed at Brisbane and Rome
- Including three wins over Stephens, now owns four Top 10 wins in 2019 (also No.4 Bertens at Rome)
- In today's SF, faces Vondrousova, whom she beat during last month's R-Up showing at Rome
- Owns 1-2 record against Czech opposition at Grand Slam level, losing to Allertova (2015 Roland Garros) and Kvitova (2015 US Open) and beating Allertova at 2016 Australian Open
- With Vondrousova sitting at No.38 in the WTA rankings, Roland Garros is guaranteed only its fourth finalist in the past 30 years to be ranked outside Top 20 (also No.47 Ostapenko in 2017, No.24 Errani in 2012 and No.23 Pierce in 2005)
- Bidding to become the first British woman to reach a Slam final since Virginia Wade won 1977 Wimbledon. The most recent British finalist at Roland Garros was 1976 champion Sue Barker
- Is the eighth active player to reach a Grand Slam SF on hard, grass and clay: also Azarenka, Bouchard, Halep, Kvitova, Sharapova, S.Williams and V.Williams
- Record in Grand Slam SF matches in 0-2, having fallen in straight sets at this stage at 2016 Australian Open (Kerber) and 2017 Wimbledon (V.Williams)
- Has posted 15-3 record so far on clay this season after R-Up finishes at Rabat (I. Sakkari) and Rome (I. Ka.Pliskova). Has joint-most wins on clay this season, along with Martic; entering 2019 season owned career 7-15 main draw record on the surface

WORLD NO.1 SINGLES

At the start of Roland Garros, four players had a chance to overtake **Naomi Osaka** atop the WTA Rankings. With a first round loss by **Angelique Kerber**, the withdrawal of **Petra Kvitova**, retirement of **Kiki Bertens** in the second round, and third round exit from **Karolina Pliskova**, **Osaka** will extend her stay at No.1 despite falling in the third round.

Osaka has held the No.1 ranking since January 28, 2019. Her stay at No.1 will increase to 19 weeks including the two weeks of Roland Garros.

WORLD NO.1 DOUBLES

Katerina Siniakova has held the No.1 position in the doubles rankings for 33 consecutive weeks (the first 12 as co-No.1 with **Barbora Krejcikova**).

Heading into Paris, six players had a chance to overtake **Siniakova**, who fell in 1r (w/Krejcikova), for the top doubles ranking. After Schuurs (2r), Strycova (R16) and Barty's (R16) exits, below are the scenarios for the three players left who still have a chance:

Kristina Mladenovic (w/Babos) can clinch the No.1 ranking with a win **today** (vs. Stosur/Zhang) as long as Mertens (w/Sabalenka) lose in their quarterfinal match today.

Elise Mertens needs to reach the final in order to have a chance at the top doubles ranking.

Zhang Shuai will need to lift the title to reach No.1.

TOP 10 WATCH

With **Anastasija Sevastova's** loss in the R16, her bid to crack the Top 10 has come to an end.

Due to this result, **Aryna Sabalenka** will return to the Top 10 and **Sloane Stephens** will remain in the elite bracket unless **Madison Keys** or **Johanna Konta** go on to hoist the title.


Keys has advanced to the second week of a major in six of her last seven appearances dating back to the 2017 US Open final which she lost to Stephens.

PETRA'S PEAKING

With Donna Vekic and **Petra Martić** reaching the R16, this marked the **first time EVER** that two Croatians advanced to this stage at RG and **first time** at a major since 2017 Wimbledon (Martić & Konjuh).

Martić ended up tallying her 15th clay victory of the season with her three-set victory over Kanepi in R16 (**leads the tour in clay wins**).

She has only lost one* match on clay since her defeat to Wozniacki at Charleston earlier this year.

With her advancement to the QF stage, she has now become **the first Croatian** to reach this round at RG since Iva Majoli did so in 1998.

- Making her eighth appearance in Paris, where last year she finished R-Up (l. Halep in 3s)
- Other standout results here were reaching the R16 from 2012-15 – lost to one of the eventual finalists on three of these occasions
- Hit 22 winners and 19 unforced errors in 1r win over Doi on Sunday
- Converted all seven break point opportunities during 2r win over Sorribes Tormo
- Was taken to a tie-break in the second set of both matches so far - has now won 11 tie-breaks this year (11-2 record), the most of any player on tour
- After letting a set and a break lead slip - and spurning 4mp in second set - eventually beat Hercog in 3r
- Fought back from an initial slow start to defeat 2016 Roland Garros champion Muguruza in straight sets in R16; in Grand Slam play now owns 6-11 career record against major winners
- Has dropped just one set on route to the QF this fortnight; has now won 10 of her last 11 matches at Roland Garros, a run dating back to her championship match appearance last year
- Faces No.26 Konta in QF today; has lost both previous encounters against the British No.1 this year, most recently during the 3r in Rome two weeks ago
- Record in Grand Slam QF matches stands at 3-2 (1-0 at Roland Garros); most recent defeat coming to Sevastova at 2018 US Open
- Entering Roland Garros, ranked No.3 on tour in first serve percentage with a 70% success rate
- One of three American women from 17 in the starting field to reach QF (also Anisimova and Keys)
- Last time three American women reached QF in Paris was 2004 (Capriati, S.Williams and V.Williams)

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- Enjoyed fairytale run at 2017 US Open, lifting maiden Grand Slam title at Flushing Meadows (d. Keys in F). At No.83, is second-lowest ranked Grand Slam champion (since inception of computer rankings in 1975) and 14th unseeded player to advance to a Grand Slam final in the Open Era, and only fifth unseeded champion
- Best result across other Slams was R-Up finish at 2018 Roland Garros (l. Halep)
- Prior to 2017 US Open triumph, best result across all majors was reaching SF at 2013 Australian Open (d. S.Williams in QF, l. eventual champion Azarenka)
- Also just the second American (after Davenport) to beat both Williams sisters in Grand Slam match play
- Advanced to SF at 2013 Australian Open (d. Halep, Mladenovic and S.Williams en route) and QF at 2013 Wimbledon (l. eventual champion Bartoli)



ROLAND GARROS

- Making fifth main draw appearance at Roland Garros (seventh overall)
- Recorded her first ever main draw win in Paris this year in 1r victory over qualifier Lottner
- Defeated No.111 Davis in 2r on Wednesday, needing four match points to seal the victory
- Win over Davis marked her 150th career main draw win (now holds 151-94 record)
- Became the first British woman into 3r at Roland Garros since 1992 (Jo Durie, 3r)
- Defeated No.46 Kuzmova in 3r, improving to 6-0 record in Grand Slam 3r matches, most recent of these during SF run at 2017 Wimbledon
- Hit 33 winners and seven aces to defeat No.23 seed Vekic in R16 on Sunday
- Was the first British woman into R16 in Paris since 1983 - Anne Hobbs (R16) and Jo Durie (SF)
- Now holds 12-7 record against Top 50 players in 2019, most recently notching four consecutive such wins last week en route to Rome final (d. No.8 Stephens, No.50 V.Williams, No.44 Vondrousova, No.4 Bertens before falling to No.7 Ka.Pliskova in F)
- Faces last year's R-Up Stephens in QF today for the pair's third meeting of 2019; has won both previous encounters against the 2017 US Open Champion, most recently in 3r at Rome
- Bidding to become the first British woman to reach the SF at Roland Garros since Jo Durie's run in 1983
- Has posted 14-3 record so far on clay this season after R-Up finishes at Rabat (l. Sakkari) and Rome (l. Ka.Pliskova). Has second-most wins on clay this season. Only Martic (16) owns more. Entering 2019 season owned career 7-15 main draw record on the surface
- Boasts a 84.6% win percentage in three-set matches this year having won 11 out of 13. Only Ka.Pliskova (14) and Bencic (12) have more three-set victories
- Tops the leaderboard of Break Points saved this season with 64.4%

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- 2019 Roland Garros marks 22nd main draw appearance at a Grand Slam
- Is a two-time Grand Slam semifinalist. Made Slam breakthrough with historic run to SF at 2016 Australian Open (l. eventual champion Kerber); first British woman to reach the last four at Melbourne Park since Sue Barker in December 1977, and at any Grand Slam since Jo Durie at 1983 US Open
- Has since reached SF at 2017 Wimbledon (l. R-Up V.Williams), becoming the first British woman to reach the last four since Wade in 1978 (l. Evert)

CAREER MILESTONES

- In 2018 posted best year-end finish of career to date, at No.6; reached career-high No.3 ranking on July 16, 2018
- Season highlights in 2018 included capturing first Premier Mandatory title at Miami – subsequently made Top 10 debut at No.9. Also reached her second Grand Slam final, at Roland Garros and posted R-Up finishes at Montréal and WTA Finals
- Won her maiden Grand Slam title at 2017 US Open, d. Keys 6-3 6-0 to become the fifth unseeded player to win a major in the Open Era
- Voted 2017 WTA Comeback Player of the Year. Returned to action at Wimbledon after 11 months on sidelines w/foot injury (had surgery in the January)
- After 1r loss at 2017 Washington DC, went 15-2 through US Open title run, including back-to-back SF at Toronto and Cincinnati
- Won three titles in 2016, at Auckland, Acapulco and Premier-level Charleston. Won maiden singles title in first final contested at 2015 Washington, DC
- At No.97 was youngest player in year-end Top 100 in 2011; and after a phenomenal sophomore season, reached No.38 and was the youngest player, and the only teenager, in the year-end Top 50 in 2012
- Made Top 20 debut on January 29, 2013

GRAND SLAM CONT.

- Also made QF at Australian Open in 2017 (l. eventual champion S.Williams), while at US Open has twice reached R16, in 2015 (l. Kvitova) and 2016 (l. Sevastova)
- Marked her first ever 1r win at Roland Garros this year, falling at the first hurdle in 2015-18

SEASON

- Coming off R-Up finish in Rome (l. Ka.Pliskova) for second clay final of the season
- Exited 2r at Madrid (l. Halep)
- Posted R-Up finish at Rabat (l. Sakkari, after leading by a set and a break) – marked first final in 10 months (2018 Nottingham) and first ever final on red clay (had never previously passed QF stage on the surface at tour level)
- Until Rabat, where she won four matches, had never won more than two consecutive main draw matches on red clay and had not won three matches in a row on the surface since qualifying for Roland Garros in 2015. Not since winning her first ITF Circuit title in Mostar in 2008 had she won four consecutive matches on red clay (all levels)
- Saved three match points in 1r at Rabat against Wang Yafan
- In Fed Cup action in London in April, posted three-set wins over Diyas and Putintseva to help Britain secure a place in the competition's World Group II in 2020 (Great Britain d. Kazakhstan, 3-1)
- During Sunshine Double, reached 3r at Indian Wells (l. Bertens) and 2r at Miami (l. Q.Wang)
- Reached first QF of year at Acapulco (l. Vekic)
- On February, won all four of her Fed Cup matches to help Great Britain progress from Europe/Africa Zone Group I to World Group II play-offs
- Lost to Muguruza in 2r at Australian Open in a three-set match which lasted two hours 42 minutes and finished at 03:12am – one of the latest finishes in the tournament's history
- Retired in final round of qualifying at Sydney vs. Alexandrova w/neck injury. Entered draw as Lucky Loser, however withdrew prior to 1r match vs. Bertens w/ same injury. Was first time contesting qualifying since 2015 Linz

- Finished 2018 at No.37, with season highlights a second consecutive R-Up finish at Nottingham (I. Barty) – overall record in WTA finals now stands at 3-4 – and SF showing at Moscow [Kremlin Cup] (I. eventual champion Kasatkina)
- Also in 2018, reached QF at Brisbane and San Jose, while best results at the Slams were 2r showings at Australian Open and Wimbledon
- Posted five Top 20 wins in 2018, over No.19 Keys (Brisbane), No.19 Rybarikova (Madrid and Rome), No.11 Ostapenko (Montréal) and No.16 Mertens (Moscow [Kremlin Cup])
- Enjoyed best season of career in 2017, posting career-high season finish of No.9 (second Top 10 season in a row). Peaked in rankings at No.4 on July 17, 2017
- Began 2017 season in great form by lifting title at Sydney (d. A.Radwanska in F), before landing biggest title of career at Premier-Mandatory Miami (d. Wozniacki in F)
- At 2017 Wimbledon became first British player since Virginia Wade in 1978 to reach Wimbledon SF (I. eventual R-Up V.Williams)
- Reached third final of 2017 season at Nottingham (I. Vekic). Also in 2017, reached SF for second year in a row at home event of Eastbourne – conceded walkover to eventual champion Ka.Pliskova, having sustained a thoracic spine injury during her QF defeat of World No.1 Kerber (fell heavily on match point, but won match after treatment). Match against Kerber was second of day, after she defeated Roland Garros champion Ostapenko in R16
- Win over Kerber was first by a British woman over a reigning No.1 since Barker d. Evert at 1979 Boston
- Owns six Top 5 wins, over No.2 Halep at 2015 Wuhan, No.3 A.Radwanska at 2017 Sydney, No.5 Halep at 2017 Miami, No.1 Kerber at 2017 Eastbourne, No.2 Halep at 2017 Wimbledon and No.4 Bertens at 2019 Rome
- Posted first Top 10 season in 2016, at No.10
- Ended 2016 season at WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai in November (went 2-0 in round-robin play), fell in SF (I. Svitolina)
- Reached first Premier Mandatory final of career at 2016 Beijing (I. A.Radwanska)
- Alternate for WTA Finals in Singapore in 2016, narrowly missing qualification in the Top 8; was not called upon to play
- By virtue of reaching 2016 Beijing final, made WTA Top 10 debut – first British woman to feature in the elite group since Durie in 1984, and the fourth British woman overall to do so (also Wade and Barker). Became 119th woman to break into the Top 10, and the fourth to do so in 2016 after Vinci, Bencic and Keys

- Won career-first singles title at 2016 Stanford in maiden final (d. V.Williams in F). First British woman to reach final of a Premier event since WTA Roadmap was introduced in 2009, and first British woman to win the tournament since Barker in 1977 (when it was held in San Francisco)
- Broke into Top 20 on June 6, 2016 (at No.18) – first British woman in Top 20 for nearly 30 years (the week of October 13, 1986, with Durie at No.20)
- Was voted WTA Most Improved Player in 2016 by international media and fans
- Played first events of career on ITF Circuit in 2006, making WTA main draw debut at 2011 Copenhagen

PERSONAL

- Born in Sydney, Australia; became a British citizen in May 2012. Parents are Gabor (hotelier) and Gabriella (dentist); older sister is Eva (works in fashion)
- Recently switched clothing sponsor from Asics to Ellesse
- Currently working with Dimitri Zavialoff, having parted ways with Michael Joyce at the end of 2018 season

- Making third appearance at Roland Garros, where she is through to QF for the first time
- Previously fell 2r on debut in 2017 as a qualifier (d. Hesse, I. Kasatkina) and in 1r in 2018 (I. Bogdan)
- In 1r this year, hit 22 winners and 16 unforced errors to defeat Y.Wang in straight sets
- Won 11 consecutive games to see off fellow teenager Potapova in 2r
- Recovered from a slow start to beat Suárez Navarro in 3r, then won the final nine games of the match to upset No.12 Sevastova in R16; has now won three or more matches at her past six tournaments: Budapest (R-Up), Indian Wells (QF), Miami (QF), Istanbul (R-Up), Rome (QF) and Roland Garros (QF)
- Results so far this fortnight have improved record to 25-5 since end of Australian Open; by contrast, posted 14 main draw wins during entire 2018 season
- Also owns 13-2 record on clay this season - only Martić (15) and Konta (14) have more
- Faces Croatian No.2 Martić in QF today; has lost all six tour-level matches against Croatian opposition including twice in 2019 (both vs. Martić at Istanbul and Australian Open)
- The highest ranked of two teenagers left in the draw (also No.51 Anisimova)
- The last time that a teenager reached QF at Roland Garros was Ostapenko in 2017. The Latvian went on to win the title, although had turned 20 by that point
- The last time two teenagers reached QF in Paris was 2009 (Azarenka and Cirstea) and at any Slam was 2009 US Open (Oudin, Wickmayer and Wozniacki)





COLLEGE KICKS

Spanish qualifier **Aliona Bolsova** enjoyed an incredible collegiate career across two universities, Oklahoma State (2016-17) and Florida Atlantic University (2017-18).

While competing at FAU, **Bolsova** produced a remarkable sophomore campaign, going 19-0 in singles without dropping a set, including 14 6-0 sets and 23 sets of 6-2 or better. Eight victories were over ranked opponents, and she eventually ascended to the No.4 overall seed in the NCAA Women's Tennis Championship tournament.

Bolsova is the lone collegiate player left in the women's singles field and is looking to become the **second collegiate** player (**Danielle Collins** - 2019 AO) to advance to the quarterfinal stage of a Slam since Lisa Raymond did so at the 2004 Australian Open.

THE FIRST TIME

2019 Roland Garros has been a breeding ground for historic runs, upsets and ground-breaking victories. Here's a look back at what has happened so far and what could still take place:

With **Kaia Kanepi's** 1r upset over No.18 Goerges, it marked her 16th win over a seed at a Slam and the seventh time defeating a seed in the opening round at a Slam - **the most victories** over a seed in the 1r of a Slam since 2001 Wimbledon (introduction of 32 seeds).

Diane Parry (16 yrs, 281 days) def. Vera Lapko in R128, becoming the **youngest player** to win a main draw match at RG since 2009 (Larcher de Brito, 16 yrs, 129 days, reached R32). **Parry** was also the **youngest Frenchwoman** to win a match at a Slam since Alize Cornet at 2006 RG.

With **Andrea Petkovic's** 2r victory, it ensured a German woman advancing to the 3r of a Slam for the **36th consecutive major** (since 2010 Wimbledon). Additionally, with all Frenchwomen falling prior to the 3r, marked **first time** this happened since 1986.

With Vekic and Martic reaching the R16, marked **first time ever** that two Croatians advanced to this stage at RG and **first time** at a major since 2017 Wimbledon (Martic & Konjuh).

With **Sofia Kenin** and **Amanda Anisimova** advancing to the R16, this marks the **first time** two Americans 20yr old or younger have reached the R16 at RG since 1998 - Venus (17, QF) & Serena (16, R16).

- **The last time** this took place at any Slam was 2001 Australian Open - Venus (20, SF) & Serena (19, QF).

Aliona Bolsova is making her Grand Slam main draw debut at this year's Roland Garros as a qualifier. With her advancement to the Sweet 16, this is the **first time** a GS debutante has reached this stage of a major since American Jennifer Brady did so at 2017 Australian Open (R16).

- **The last time** a qualifier advanced to the QF stage of RG was 2012 (Shvedova).

With **Johanna Konta's** R16 victory over Donna Vekic, she becomes the **first Brit** to reach the Elite Eight of RG since Jo Durie (SF) in 1983.



This modern artist created an abstract piece that is both technical and poetic. **He is the seventh Spanish artist to design the poster for Roland-Garros.**

BUILD IT & THEY WILL COME

In addition to Philippe-Chatrier court and Simonne-Mathieu court, for the 2019 tournament Roland-Garros stadium will officially open the courts in the **Fonds des Princes**, at the far west of the stadium: Courts 10, 11, 12, 13, 15 and 16. The court hierarchy is now as follows: Philippe-Chatrier court, Suzanne-Lenglen court, Simonne-Mathieu court, Court No.1 and Court 14.



The **last 12 editions of Roland Garros have seen 10 different champions** - Sharapova and S.Williams being the only repeat champions - this event is the **most diverse Grand Slam** during that time frame



NEW YEAR, NEW YOU

Following the conclusion of last year's men's final, **Philippe Chatrier** court went under immediate reconstruction.

Thanks to its new stands, the court will offer **improved comfort and better visibility for up to 15,000 spectators.**

Philippe-Chatrier court will be completely finished in time for the 2020 tournament, with the **installation of a retractable roof** so that play can continue when it is raining and, in the future, **night sessions** can be held.

The court hierarchy is now as follows: Philippe-Chatrier court, Suzanne-Lenglen court, Simonne-Mathieu court, Court No.1 and Court 14.



- Making third appearance at Roland Garros, where she is through to R16 for the first time
- Previously fell 2r on debut in 2017 as a qualifier (d. Hesse, I. Kasatkina) and in 1r in 2018 (I. Bogdan)
- In 1r this year, hit 22 winners and 16 unforced errors to see off Y.Wang in straight sets
- Won 11 consecutive games to see off fellow teenager Potapova in 2r
- Recovered from a slow start to beat Suárez Navarro in 3r; has now won three or more matches at her past six tournaments: Budapest (R-Up), Indian Wells (QF), Miami (QF), Istanbul (R-Up), Rome (QF) and Roland Garros (R16)
- Results so far this fortnight have improved record to 24-5 since end of Australian Open; by contrast, posted 14 main draw wins during entire 2018 season
- Also owns 12-2 record on clay this season - only Martić (14), Konta (13), Bertens (13) and Sakkari (13) have more

- The last time that a teenager reached R16 at Roland Garros was Ostapenko in 2017. The Latvian went on to win the title, although had turned 20 by that point
- The last time three teenagers reached R16 in Paris was 2008 - Azarenka, A.Radwanska, Kvitová and Suárez Navarro
- Entered Roland Garros, ranked No.1 on tour for percentage of return games won (45.7%), ahead of Y.Wang (44.5%), Mladenovic (44.2%) and Azarenka (43.3%). Has upped this percentage in Paris, winning 60% (15/25) across her three matches

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- 2019 Roland Garros marks ninth Grand Slam main draw appearance
- Achieved her best result at the majors by reaching R16 at 2018 US Open (I. Tsurenko). Was youngest Czech player to reach R16 at Flushing Meadows since 2005 (Nicola Pietrangeli, R16 at 16yrs, 140 days)
- Made Grand Slam debut at 2017 Roland Garros, where she advanced to 2r. Has also reached 2r at 2018 and 2019 Australian Opens
- Fell 1r on debut at Wimbledon and US Open in 2017
- Reached doubles QF at 2017 Wimbledon (w/Bellis, I. eventual finalists H.Chan/Niculescu)




Serena Williams is into her 17th appearance at Roland Garros in her quest to tie Margaret Court for the all-time Grand Slam record with 24.

Since the birth of Alexis Olympia (September 1, 2017), **Williams** has competed at four Grand Slams – 2018 Roland Garros (R16), 2018 Wimbledon (F), 2018 US Open (F) and 2019 Australian Open (QF).

She has reached the finals in three of her last five appearances in Paris, winning in 2013 and 2015, and finishing as runner-up in 2016.

In her last 14 Grand Slam appearances she has reached the SF or better 12 times, winning the title six times.

Williams owns the most titles (three) and match wins (65) at Roland Garros among active players.





In addition to Philippe-Chatrier court and Simonne-Mathieu court, for the 2019 tournament Roland-Garros stadium will officially open the courts in the **Fonds des Princes**, at the far west of the stadium: Courts 10, 11, 12, 13, 15 and 16. The court hierarchy is now as follows: Philippe-Chatrier court, Suzanne-Lenglen court, Simonne-Mathieu court, Court No.1 and Court 14.

Stosur), 2016 Australian Open (l. Kerber), 2016 Roland Garros (l. Muguruza), 2018 Wimbledon (l. Kerber) and 2018 US Open (l. Osaka)
- Aged 35y 125d at the end of 2017 Australian Open, is the oldest player to win a major in the Open Era
- Boasts the longest span of Grand Slam singles glory all-time. Pre-Open Era, Helen Wills Moody won her majors over the course of 15y 9.5m. Serena won her first Slam at 1999 US Open, 17y 6.5m before her 2017 Australian title. WTA legends Evert, Navratilova and Graf all won their Slams over a 12 year span
- The 2017 Australian Open final saw Serena and Venus have the oldest combined age of any Grand Slam final match-up in the Open Era (71 years, 351 days), beating the previous record set by Flavia Pennetta and Roberta Vinci (66 years, 19 days) at the 2015 US Open. - The No.1 seed has lifted the title here 18 times, including last year's champion, Halep

- Has achieved best Grand Slam result this week in Paris by advancing to 3r, bettering 2r efforts at 2017 Australian Open (her Grand Slam main draw debut, I. Ka.Pliskova) and 2018 Wimbledon (I. Bertens)
- Battled her way through qualifying to reach 2019 main draw, recovering from a break down in the final set against both Kalinina and then Glushko
- Staged an even more remarkable comeback during her 1r match in the main draw, recovering from 4-0 down in the decider to beat compatriot Gasparyan



- Entering Roland Garros, was seventh in both service points won (60.5%) and service games won (75.8%)

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- 2019 Roland Garros marks 22nd main draw appearance at a Grand Slam
- Is a two-time Grand Slam semifinalist. Made Slam breakthrough with historic run to SF at 2016 Australian Open (l. eventual champion Kerber); first British woman to reach the last four at Melbourne Park since Sue Barker in December 1977, and at any Grand Slam since Jo Durie at 1983 US Open
- Has since reached SF at 2017 Wimbledon (l. R-Up V.Williams), becoming the first British woman to reach the last four since Wade in 1978 (l. Evert)

- In 2r, advanced when World No.4 Bertens retired when trailing 1-3 in the opening set (w/GI illness)
- Now holds two career Top 10 wins, having previously defeated then-No.8 Bertens earlier this year in Dubai
- Faces No.26 Konta today - her first meeting against a Brit at tour-level. Also playing a 3r match at a Slam for the first time in her career
- Including 2r win over Bertens has won three of her last five matches vs. Top 30 players - also d. No.17 Goerges and No.27 Suarez Navarro (both at Madrid)
- Contesting tournament at No.46, three places off career-high ranking (set March 4, 2019). By contrast, this time last year was ranked No.87
- Including first two rounds in Paris, has struck 152 aces this season - the fifth-most on tour (Ka.Pliskova leads with 261)
- Currently Slovak No.2, behind Cibulkova (No.41), and ahead of Rybarikova (No.74) and Schmiedlova (No.90) in the Top 100. Should she win today, is projected to overtake Cibulkova as Slovak No.1
- Best tour-level result on clay was R16 run earlier this month at Madrid. Last year won titles on the surface on home soil at \$100k ITF/Trnava-SVK and \$100k/ Budapest-HUN

- Won the girls' singles title here in 2013 (d. Lottner in F); is one of eight former junior champions in this year's starting field (also Kanepi, Cornet, Halep, Mladenovic, Svitolina, Jabeur and Kasatkina)




- **Serena Williams** is into her 17th appearance at Roland Garros in her quest to tie Margaret Court for the all-time Grand Slam record with 24
- Since the birth of Alexis Olympia (September 1, 2017), **Williams** has competed at four Grand Slams – 2018 Roland Garros (R16), 2018 Wimbledon (F), 2018 US Open (F) and 2019 Australian Open (QF)
- She has reached the finals in three of her last five appearances in Paris, winning in 2013 and 2015, and finishing as runner-up in 2016
- In her last 14 Grand Slam appearances she has reached the SF or better 12 times, winning the title six times
- **Williams** owns the most titles (three) and match wins (64) at Roland Garros among active players



SLAM SHUFFLIN'

- **Osaka** broke the streak of eight different major champions when she picked up her second straight Slam in Melbourne Park this year

DEFENDING CHAMP

- **Simona Halep** returns to Roland Garros as defending champion and as the No.3 seed in the draw
- **Halep** has reached the finals at three of the last five appearances at Roland Garros, finishing as runner-up in 2014 and 2017 before winning her first Grand Slam singles title in 2018. The Romanian owns a 24-8 record at Roland Garros, more wins than any other Slam
- She currently sits atop the WTA Insider Clay Court Power Rankings, a breakdown of ranking points earned by surface over the past four seasons. Since 2016 Halep has earned 8,143 ranking points on clay, more than any other player on tour (next most is Kiki Bertens, 5,642)
- Throughout her career, Halep has posted a 72.5% match winning percentage on clay, her best mark on any surface
- Halep's continued success on clay has been relevant in 2019 as well. On clay (9 matches heading into Paris), Halep has seen a +10.2% improvement on return games won compared to matches on hard courts (22 matches). Additionally, Halep's service games won percentage has improved +6.8%

HISTORY REPEATS

- Thirty-one (31) of the Roland Garros women's titles have been won by one of the Top 2 seeds; the top seed has won the title 18 times and No.2 seed has won 13 times
- The Top 2 seeds have met in the final on 12 occasions, with the No.1 seed prevailing five times (most recently in 2015) and the No.2 seed victorious seven times (most recently 2018)
- The Roland Garros finals have been decided in three sets 21 times



- Her titles were won at Australian Open: 2003, 2005, 2007, 2009-10, 2015, 2017; Roland Garros: 2002, 2013, 2015; Wimbledon: 2002-03, 2009-10, 2012, 2015-16; US Open: 1999, 2002, 2008, 2012-14
- Owns a 23-8 record in Slam finals, with losses coming at 2001 US Open (l. V.Williams), 2004 Wimbledon (l. Sharapova), 2008 Wimbledon (l. V.Williams), 2011 US Open (l. Stosur), 2016 Australian Open (l. Kerber), 2016 Roland Garros (l. Muguruza), 2018 Wimbledon (l. Kerber) and 2018 US Open (l. Osaka)
- Aged 35y 125d at the end of 2017 Australian Open, is the oldest player to win a major in the Open Era
- Boasts the longest span of Grand Slam singles glory all-time. Pre-Open Era, Helen Wills Moody won her majors over the course of 15y 9.5m. Serena won her first Slam at 1999 US Open, 17y 6.5m before her 2017 Australian title. WTA legends Evert, Navratilova and Graf all won their Slams over a 12 year span
- The 2017 Australian Open final saw Serena and Venus have the oldest combined age of any Grand Slam final match-up in the Open Era (71 years, 351 days), beating the previous record set by Flavia Pennetta and Roberta Vinci (66 years, 19 days) at the 2015 US Open. Prior to that all-Italian final the record was held for nearly four decades by Virginia Wade and Betty Stove – who had a combined age of just over 63 years, 11 months at 1977 Wimbledon
- In 2015, came within two wins of completing the calendar year Grand Slam, having won the Australian Open, Roland Garros and Wimbledon; l. Vinci in SF at US Open. Two women in Open Era had previously achieved the feat: Court (1970) and Graf (1988)

- Reached QF at Australian Open (l. Ka.Pliskova after holding 4mp) on her 70th Grand Slam main draw appearance – third on the Open Era list, behind V.Williams (81) and Frazier (71)
- Overcame World No.1 Halep in R16 – was first time facing the reigning World No.1 since 2013 Doha (l. Azarenka in F) and was first win since 2013 Brisbane (d. Azarenka in SF). Aged 37, is the oldest player to defeat the reigning World No.1, bettering sister Venus's win vs. Kerber aged 36 at 2017 Miami
- Now owns a 17-12 win-loss record vs. World No.1s - only Navratilova has more wins with 18
- Began 2019 at Hopman Cup, posted singles wins over Bencic, Sakkarı and Boulter as USA made group-stage exit

- Making fourth appearance at Roland Garros, and enters Roland Garros as the No.1 seed – her first time being the top seed at a Grand Slam
- The No.1 seed has lifted the title here 18 times, including last year's champion, Halep
- Was seeded at a Slam for the first time at 2018 Roland Garros (No.21)
- This fortnight in Paris marks Osaka's 18th and 19th weeks as the WTA World No.1, overtaking Capriati (17) and Jankovic (18) on the all-time list
- However, her position at the summit is under threat this fortnight from Ka.Pliskova and Bertens
- Best result here in Paris is reaching 3r twice, in 2016 (l. Halep) and 2018 (l. Keys)
- The last time a Japanese woman reached R16 in Paris was 2004, when Shinobu Asagoe fell at this stage to S.Williams
- Having won 2018 US Open and 2019 Australian Open, bidding to be first player since S.Williams in 2014-15 to win US Open, Australian Open and Roland Garros in succession
- No player has won their third major in a row after winning their first two
- Following 2018 US Open and 2019 Australian Open wins, was the first player since Capriati in 2001 to win her second major in a row after winning her first since (Australian Open followed by Roland Garros)
- One of 12 reigning or former Grand Slam champions in the main draw
- Recovered from losing the opening set 6-0 to beat Schmiedlova in 1r - only the fourth love set she has surrendered in her career (in tour-level matches)
- Struck 10 aces against Schmiedlova, the sixth time she has achieved the feat this year and 15th across entire career (13-2 record in such matches)
- Has now struck 194 aces this season (third most on tour behind Bertens, 247, and Ka.Pliskova, 261)






- **Serena Williams** is making her 17th appearance at Roland Garros in her quest to tie Margaret Court for the all-time Grand Slam record with 24
- Since the birth of Alexis Olympia (September 1, 2017), **Williams** has competed at four Grand Slams – 2018 Roland Garros (R16), 2018 Wimbledon (F), 2018 US Open (F) and 2019 Australian Open (QF)
- She has reached the finals in three of her last five appearances in Paris, winning in 2013 and 2015, and finishing as runner-up in 2016
- In her last 14 Grand Slam appearances she has reached the SF or better 12 times, winning the title six times
- **Williams** owns the most titles (three) and match wins (64) at Roland Garros among active players



SLAM SHUFFLIN'

- **Osaka** broke the streak of eight different major champions when she picked up her second straight Slam in Melbourne Park this year
- Osaka is bidding to become the 12th player in the Open Era to win three majors in a row, and first since **S.Williams** in 2015 (Australian Open, Roland Garros and Wimbledon)
- Last year there were three first-time Grand Slam champions – **Wozniacki** (Australian Open), **Halep** (Roland Garros) and **Osaka** (US Open)
- 2018 marked the fourth time in the Open Era a season has produced three first-time Slam champions (also 1978, 2004 and 2011)



DEFENDING CHAMP

- **Simona Halep** returns to Roland Garros as defending champion and as the No.3 seed in the draw
- **Halep** has reached the finals at three of the last five appearances at Roland Garros, finishing as runner-up in 2014 and 2017 before winning her first Grand Slam singles title in 2018. The Romanian owns a 24-8 record at Roland Garros, more wins than any other Slam
- She currently sits atop the WTA Insider Clay Court Power Rankings, a breakdown of ranking points earned by surface over the past four seasons. Since 2016 Halep has earned 8,143 ranking points on clay, more than any other player on tour (next most is Kiki Bertens, 5,642)
- Throughout her career, Halep has posted a 72.5% match winning percentage on clay, her best mark on any surface
- Halep's continued success on clay has been relevant in 2019 as well. On clay (9 matches heading into Paris), Halep has seen a +10.2% improvement on return games won compared to matches on hard courts (22 matches). Additionally, Halep's service games won percentage has improved +6.8%





BUILD IT & THEY WILL COME

In addition to Philippe-Chatrier court and Simonne-Mathieu court, for the 2019 tournament Roland-Garros stadium will officially open the courts in the **Fonds des Princes**, at the far west of the stadium: Courts 10, 11, 12, 13, 15 and 16. The court hierarchy is now as follows: Philippe-Chatrier court, Suzanne-Lenglen court, Simonne-Mathieu court, Court No.1 and Court 14.



The **last 12 editions of Roland Garros have seen 10 different champions** - Sharapova and S.Williams being the only repeat champions - this event is the **most diverse Grand Slam** during that time frame



NEW YEAR, NEW YOU

Following the conclusion of last year's men's final, **Philippe Chatrier** court went under immediate reconstruction.

Thanks to its new stands, the court will offer **improved comfort and better visibility for up to 15,000 spectators.**

Philippe-Chatrier court will be completely finished in time for the 2020 tournament, with the **installation of a retractable roof** so that play can continue when it is raining and, in the future, **night sessions** can be held.

- Heading into Roland Garros, has struck 148 aces - the sixth-most on tour (Ka.Pliskova leads with 253)
- Currently Slovakia's No.2 player, behind Cibulkova (No.41), and ahead of Rybarikova (No.74) and Schmiedlova (No.90) in the Top 100
- Best tour-level result on clay was R16 run earlier this month at Madrid. Last year won titles on the surface on home soil at \$100k ITF/Trnava-SVK and \$100k/Budapest-HUN

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- 2019 Roland Garros marks seventh Grand Slam main draw appearance (ninth overall)
- Tied her best result across majors with 2r showing: also 2018 Roland Garros and 2019 Australian Open (l. Svitolina both times)
- Her four other outings were 1r exits at 2017 US Open (as qualifier, l. V.Williams), 2018 Australian Open (as qualifier, l. Mertens), 2018 Wimbledon (l. Peterson) and 2018 US Open (l. Azarenka)
- Fell in qualifying at 2017 Roland Garros and Wimbledon
- Was R-Up in girls' singles at 2016 US Open, and won the girls' doubles title (w/Pospelova) at 2015 US Open

ROLAND GARROS

- Making ninth appearance at Roland Garros, where she enjoyed her Grand Slam breakthrough with SF run in 2016 (l. S.Williams)
- Was ranked No.58 during 2016 run, upset No.3 Kerber in 1r and No.9 Bacsinszky in QF; was the first Dutch woman to reach the last four in Paris since Marijke Schaar in 1971 (l. SF), and at any Slam, since Betty Stove at 1977 US Open (l. SF)
- Also made R16 at 2014 Roland Garros (as qualifier, l. Petkovic), which was the only time she had advanced past the 2r at a major in 15 previous appearances
- This year, overcame Parmentier in 1r in straight sets
- Faces No.46 Kuzmova today in 2r. Owns 18-10 record against Top 50 this year
- Record in 2r matches at Slams stands at 7-6 (3-1 at Roland Garros); most recent loss at this stage came at 2019 Australian Open (l. Pavlyuchenkova)
- Seeded No.4 this fortnight - her highest at a Slam (improving upon No.9 position at 2019 Australian Open); the No.4 seed has won the title here five times, most recently Muguruza in 2016
- Arrives in Paris ranked at a career-high No.4. Broke into Top 5 at No.4 for first time after Madrid title run (May 13, 2019) to become the highest-ranking Dutchwoman of all time
- Could move to No.1 after Roland Garros fortnight, although needs to at least reach final and hope other results go her way
- Owns 13-3 record on clay in 2019; Sakkari is the only other player to record as many wins (13-4)
- Meanwhile, record on all surfaces this season is 27-10; Ka.Pliskova (28-7), Bencic (27-9) and Kvitova (28-8) are only others to reach 25-win mark
- Heading into Roland Garros has won 62.5% of points on serve this season, the joint-third most (also Barty) behind Ka.Pliskova (63.2%) and Kvitova (62.9%)
- Hit 20 aces in win over Bencic last month in Stuttgart, the most aces in a clay-court match in the Match Stats Era (since 2008). Has hit the second-most aces on tour this year (246 - behind Ka.Pliskova with 252)
- Went 15-5 on clay in 2018 highlighted by title run in Charleston (d. Goerges) and R-Up finish in Madrid (l. Kvitova). Has posted a WTA-leading 70 wins on clay since the start of 2016, the best on tour (followed by Halep on 57)
- Owns six clay court titles at Fés (2012), Nürnberg (2016-17), Gstaad (2017), Charleston (2018) and Madrid (2019); among active players, only S.Williams (13), Sharapova (11), V.Williams (nine), Errani (seven) and Halep (seven) have won more

- Of the Top 10 players, has reached the QF or better at six of the eight tournaments she has played (75%) - the highest success rate among the Top 10 this season







- **Simona Halep** returns to Roland Garros as defending champion and as the No.3 seed in the draw
- **Halep** has reached the finals at three of the last five appearances at Roland Garros, finishing as runner-up in 2014 and 2017 before winning her first Grand Slam singles title in 2018. The Romanian owns a 24-8 record at Roland Garros, more wins than any other Slam
- She currently sits atop the WTA Insider Clay Court Power Rankings, a breakdown of ranking points earned by surface over the past four seasons. Since 2016 Halep has earned 8,143 ranking points on clay, more than any other player on tour (next most is Kiki Bertens, 5,642)
- Throughout her career, Halep has posted a 72.5% match winning percentage on clay, her best mark on any surface
- Halep's continued success on clay has been relevant in 2019 as well. On clay (9 matches), Halep has seen a +10.2% improvement on return games won compared to matches on hard courts (22 matches). Additionally, Halep's service games won percentage has improved +6.8%





The court hierarchy is now as follows: Philippe-Chatrier court, Suzanne-Lenglen court, Simonne-Mathieu court, Court No.1 and Court 14.

- Making fourth main draw appearance (fifth overall) at Roland Garros, where was champion in 2017
- Defeated Stosur, Wozniacki and Bacsinszky en route to final two years ago, then overcame a 6-4 3-0 deficit to win the final against Halep
- 2017 Roland Garros was eighth Grand Slam main draw appearance. Previous best result at a major had been 3r run at 2017 Australian Open (l. Ka.Pliskova). This was the fewest number of Grand Slam main draw appearances before winning debut Slam title since Sharapova at 2004 Wimbledon (on what was seventh appearance)





The court hierarchy is now as follows: Philippe-Chatrier court, Suzanne-Lenglen court, Simonne-Mathieu court, Court No.1 and Court 14.

- Making 17th main draw appearance at Roland Garros, having missed 2017 tournament due to pregnancy
- A three-time champion in Paris, in 2002 (d. V. Williams in F), 2013 (d. Sharapova in F) and 2015 (d. Safarova in F)
- Bidding to win her fourth Roland Garros singles title, which would see her join Justine Henin and Helen Wills Moody in fourth place on the all-time titles leaderboard (after Evert-7; Graf-6; Court-5)
- Victory this fortnight would see her tie Australia's Margaret Court on 24 Grand Slam singles titles, the all-time record
- In the Open Era, Williams' 11-year gap between Roland Garros titles in 2002 and 2013 (without winning another Roland Garros title during that time) is the longest gap for a woman at any Grand Slam
- Williams also owns the record for the longest span between Roland Garros titles in the Open Era – including winning other Roland Garros title(s) during that time – at 13 years (2002-15)
- Holds a 69-1 record in Grand Slam 1r matches - Serena's lone opening round loss at a Grand Slam came here in 2012 (I. Razzano). She also has two 2r losses at Slams: at 1998 Australian Open (I. V. Williams) and 2014 Roland Garros (I. Muguruza)
- Is also making Grand Slam appearance number 71 – tied for second (w/Frazier) on the Open Era list, behind only her sister V. Williams (82)
- Owns 13 career clay court titles - the most among active players (followed by Sharapova on 11)
- Reached R16 on only outing of 2018 clay court season at Roland Garros (withdrew prior to match w/ Sharapova due to pectoral injury)
- Two-time Roland Garros doubles champion with sister Venus in 1999 (d. Hingis/Kournikova in F) and 2010 (d. Peschke/Srebotnik in F)
- A win today would elevate her to the 800-career main draw match win echelon:

- Additionally, is 23-4 on clay (last loss 2010 Madrid, Petrova) and 43-4 at Slams (last loss 2012 AO, Makarova) vs. Russians

- A 23-time Grand Slam singles winner, ahead of Stefanie Graf (22) on Open Era leaderboard, and behind only Margaret Court (24) all time
- Her titles were won at Australian Open: 2003, 2005, 2007, 2009-10, 2015, 2017; Roland Garros: 2002, 2013, 2015; Wimbledon: 2002-03, 2009-10, 2012, 2015-16; US Open: 1999, 2002, 2008, 2012-14
- Owns a 23-8 record in Slam finals, with losses coming at 2001 US Open (l. V.Williams), 2004 Wimbledon (l. Sharapova), 2008 Wimbledon (l. V.Williams), 2011 US Open (l. Stosur), 2016 Australian Open (l. Kerber), 2016 Roland Garros (l. Muguruza), 2018 Wimbledon (l. Kerber) and 2018 US Open (l. Osaka)
- Aged 35y 125d at the end of 2017 Australian Open, is the oldest player to win a major in the Open Era
- Boasts the longest span of Grand Slam singles glory all-time. Pre-Open Era, Helen Wills Moody won her majors over the course of 15y 9.5m. Serena won her first Slam at 1999 US Open, 17y 6.5m before her 2017 Australian title. WTA legends Evert, Navratilova and Graf all won their Slams over a 12 year span
- The 2017 Australian Open final saw Serena and Venus have the oldest combined age of any Grand Slam final match-up in the Open Era (71 years, 351 days), beating the previous record set by Flavia Pennetta and Roberta Vinci (66 years, 19 days) at the 2015 US Open. Prior to that all-Italian final the record was held for nearly four decades by Virginia Wade and Betty Stove – who had a combined age of just over 63 years, 11 months at 1977 Wimbledon
- In 2015, came within two wins of completing the calendar year Grand Slam, having won the Australian Open, Roland Garros and Wimbledon; l. Vinci in SF at US Open. Two women in Open Era had previously achieved the feat: Court (1970) and Graf (1988)





In addition to Philippe-Chatrier court and Simonne-Mathieu court, for the 2019 tournament Roland-Garros stadium will officially open the courts in the **Fonds des Princes**, at the far west of the stadium: Courts 10, 11, 12, 13, 15 and 16. The court hierarchy is now as follows: Philippe-Chatrier court, Suzanne-Lenglen court, Simonne-Mathieu court, Court No.1 and Court 14.



The **last 12 editions of Roland Garros have seen 10 different champions** - Sharapova and S.Williams being the only repeat champions - this event is the **most diverse Grand Slam** during that time frame



NEW YEAR, NEW YOU

Following the conclusion of last year's men's final, **Philippe Chatrier** court went under immediate reconstruction.

Philippe-Chatrier court will be completely finished in time for the 2020 tournament, with the **installation of a retractable roof** so that play can continue when it is raining and, in the future, **night sessions** can be held.



- Other top results were reaching the R16 from 2012-15 – lost to one of the eventual finalists on three of these occasions
- Owns 20-8 record in Grand Slam 1r matches; only defeat at this stage in Paris came on debut in 2011 (l. Baltacha)
- Six of eight losses in 2019 have been at the hands of players ranked outside Top 40

- Making seventh main draw appearance at Roland Garros (eighth overall). Champion in 2016, when she became the first Spanish woman to win Roland Garros since Sánchez Vicario in 1998
- Defeated S.Williams in 2016 title match – one of just six women to defeat S.Williams in a Grand Slam final (also V.Williams, Sharapova, Kerber, Stosur and Osaka)
- Reached SF stage here last year, falling to the eventual champion Halep

- Has fallen to players ranked lower than today's opponent twice this season - l. No.122 Bonaventure (Fed Cup) and No.138 Niculescu (Miami)

ROLAND GARROS

- Making fourth appearance at Roland Garros
- Best results were 2r showings in 2015 (d. Hantuchova, I. Keys) and 2018 (d. Chiesa, I. Rybarikova)
- Won the girl's singles title here in 2013 (d. Lottner in F); is one of eight former junior champions in this year's draw (also Kanepi, Cornet, Halep, Mladenovic, Svitolina, Jabeur and Kasatkina)
- Faces wildcard Ponchet in 1r; in only previous meeting with French opposition at a major, upset No.6 seed Garcia in 1r at 2018 Wimbledon
- Bidding for 27th main draw win of the season (only Kvitova, 28, and Ka.Pliskova, 27, have more); by contrast, posted a total of just 17 main draw wins combined across injury-ravaged 2016 and 2017 seasons
- Record in Grand Slam 1r matches stands at 13-4 (2-1 at Roland Garros), with most recent defeat at this stage coming to Sasnovich at 2018 US Open
- Best career results on clay are SF showings at Charleston in 2014 (as a qualifier, I. Cepelova) and at 2019 Madrid (I. Halep)
- Has been dominant when facing off against the leading players in 2019, compiling the best record vs. Top 10 players (7-3) and Top 5 (5-0)

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- 2019 Roland Garros marks 18th main draw Grand Slam appearance
- Achieved best Grand Slam singles result when she advanced to QF at 2014 US Open; defeated two Top 10 players en route (No.7 Kerber in 3r, No.10 Jankovic in R16). At 17 years of age, was youngest player through to last eight at Flushing Meadows since 1997 when Hingis won the title
- Best result at Australian Open was in 2016, advancing to R16 (I. Sharapova); at Wimbledon is R16 in 2015 (I. Azarenka) and 2018 (I. eventual champion Kerber), while best result at Roland Garros is 2r in 2015 and 2018

SEASON

- Fell 2r at Rome (I. Mladenovic)
- Posted SF run at Madrid (I. Halep); victory over Osaka in QF improved record over reigning No.1s to 3-1 (also S.Williams at 2015 Toronto and Osaka at 2019 Indian Wells), only loss came against S.Williams at 2014 Madrid
- Posted 2r exit at Stuttgart (I. Bertens)
- Fell in 1r at Lugano (I. Lottner). Reached SF in doubles (w/Kuzmova, I. Kudermetova/Voskoboeva)

ROLAND GARROS

- Making second main draw appearance at Roland Garros, having fallen 1r in 2018 (as WC, I. Safarova)
- Also contested qualifying in 2017
- One of eight wildcards in women's singles draw; best result by a wildcard here was Pierce's QF run in 2002
- Faces Bencic today in 1r; owns 0-2 record against Top 20 opponents, having lost to No.3 Muguruza at 2018 Australian Open and No.19 Garcia at 2019 Australian Open
- In terms of ranking, best career win came over No.98 Danilovic in qualifying at 2018 Luxembourg
- Playing Roland Garros at a career-high ranking of No.187 (posted May 20, 2019); this time last year, sat at No.228 in the rankings
- This fortnight, is contesting only fourth tour-level main draw. Other appearances at this level were 1r exits here in 2018 and at Australian Open in 2018 and 2019

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- Fell 1r on Grand Slam main draw debut at 2018 Australian Open (I. Muguruza); received wildcard via French Tennis Federation's reciprocal agreement with Tennis Australia
- Also fell 1r at 2018 Roland Garros (I. Safarova) and 2019 Australian Open (I. Garcia)
- Fell in second round of qualifying at 2017 Roland Garros and 2018 US Open

SEASON

- In previous outings on tour - all on ITF Circuit - made QF at \$25k Monzon-ESP and 1r exits at \$60k Saint Gaudens-FRA and \$60k Les Franqueses Del Valles-ESP
- Fell in qualifying at Stuttgart
- Returned from Australia for a stint on ITF Circuit, highlighted by fifth title at this level at \$25k Glasgow-GBR (d. Bolkvadze in F); played six other events at this level prior to clay court season, failing to make it past 2r
- Began season by coming through qualifying for the first time at a major, at Australian Open, before falling in 1r of main draw (I. Garcia)

SEASON CONT.

- Advanced to the QF stage of Charleston (l. Martić)
- Made 2r exit at Miami (after 1r bye, l. Putintseva)
- Also made SF at Indian Wells (d. No.1 Osaka, No.5 Ka.Pliskova, l. Kerber)
- Loss to Kerber ended 12-match winning streak - the longest on tour in 2019 - having won two Fed Cup singles rubbers (d. Errani, Giorgi), six wins en route to the Dubai title, four matches at Indian Wells
- Lifted third singles title of career at 2019 Dubai (d. Kvitová in F), her first since 2015 Toronto
- Defeated four Top 10 opponents en route to title, including No.3 Halep and No.4 Kvitová
- Inspired Switzerland to 3-1 World Group II win over Italy in Biel (d. Giorgi and Errani)
- Fell in qualifying at St. Petersburg
- Made SF at Hobart (l. R-Up Schmiedlova) and reached 3r at Australian Open (l. Kvitová)
- Opened 2019 season at Hopman Cup, partnering Roger Federer to help Switzerland retain the trophy

CAREER MILESTONES

- Finished 2018 ranked No.37 - fourth Top 100 finish
- Was R-Up at 2018 Luxembourg (as qualifier, l. Gorges)
- Underwent left wrist surgery in the Spring 2017, missing five months – ranking fell outside Top 300
- Closed out 2017 season by winning 28 of 31 matches and four titles, two on the ITF Circuit and two WTA 125K Series events at Hua Hin, Thailand and Taipei. By the end of the year she was back in the Top 75
- Best wins of career came over No.1s S.Williams in semifinals at 2015 Toronto and Osaka in R16 at 2019 Indian Wells and QF at 2019 Madrid. At 18 years of age in Toronto became youngest player to defeat S.Williams in a completed match since 2004 WTA Finals, when 17-year-old Sharapova d. Serena in F (Serena also lost at 2007 Charleston to then 17-year-old Chan Yung-Jan via first set retirement at 5-3)
- Struggled with injury in 2016 – advanced to sixth career singles final at St Petersburg in February (as top seed for first time in career, l. Vinci) but after Charleston (April) was sidelined for more than two months – missed most of clay season, including Roland Garros
- Run to St. Petersburg final saw her break into Top 10 (at No.9) for the first time in her career; became 116th player to break into the Top 10 since computerized rankings were introduced in 1975. In the last 20 years, 11 players have made their Top 10 debut before their 19th birthday
- Reached a career-high ranking of No.7 (February 22, 2016)

CAREER MILESTONES

- Ended 2018 season ranked No.239. Campaign was highlighted by fourth career ITF Circuit title at \$25k Figueira Da Foz-POR and making Grand Slam debut at Australian Open (l. Muguruza in 1r)
- Posted 42-24 record in 2017 and finished year at No.269, an improvement of over 250 places from the previous year
- Only appearances outside ITF Circuit in 2017 were 2r run at WTA 125K event in Limoges (d. Paquet, l. Kanepi) and qualifying exit at Roland Garros
- Posted career-best win over No.98 Danilovic in qualifying at 2018 Luxembourg
- Finished year strongly on ITF Circuit, reaching SFs at \$60k ITF/Saguenay-CAN and \$60k ITF/Toronto-CAN
- In 2016, rose from No.791 to No.523. Won first two ITF titles of career back-to-back at \$10k ITF/Getxo-ESP and \$10k ITF/Ei Espinar-ESP. Also won \$10k ITF/Benicarlos-ESP and finished runner-up at \$10k ITF/Monzon-ESP and \$10k ITF/Vinaros-ESP
- On ITF Circuit, owns five singles and four doubles titles
- Played first events of career on ITF Circuit in France in 2011, when she was 14, and didn't play junior events
- Suffered setback when torn knee ligaments forced her to sit out of most of the 2015 season

- Started playing tennis aged six; admires Federer's game
- Plays with single-handed backhand
- Coached by mother Olivia Ponchet; father is Yohan
- Trains in France at TC Capbreton; her brother, Matt, is one of her main practice partners
- Enjoys reading and cooking

CAREER CONT.

- Appeared in four finals in 2015, winning first two career titles at Premier-level Eastbourne (d. A.Radwanska in F) and Toronto (d. Halep in F via ret.). Owns 2-5 record in finals, finishing runner-up at 2014 Tianjin, 2015 's-Hertogenbosch, 2015 Tokyo [PPO], 2016 St Petersburg and 2018 Luxembourg
- At 2015 Eastbourne, aged 18 years, 109 days, became second-youngest player to win a WTA Premier-level final. Caroline Wozniacki won 2008 New Haven aged 18 years, 43 days
- With 2015 Toronto triumph, became first teenager to win an event at Premier 5 level or higher since Azarenka at 2009 Miami
- Won second WTA doubles title of career in 2015 at Washington, DC (w/Mladenovic), the first coming earlier in the year at Prague (w/Siniakova)
- Voted 2014 WTA Newcomer of the Year after rising 179 spots in the rankings to finish season at No.33
- Played first WTA qualifying event at Luxembourg in October 2011, and first WTA main draw 12 months later at same event as WC (l. V.Williams, 1r); only 15 years, 7 months at the time

PERSONAL

- Split from coach Vlado Platenik at the end of 2018; has worked extensively with Melanie Molitor and Martina Hingis, as well as her father, Ivan, in the past
- Also holds Slovak citizenship through her parents
- Includes Nike, Yonex and Rolex among her sponsors
