The two sets won by **Serena Williams** in her quarterfinal triumph over Alison Riske took her all-time total at the Championships to 198. The third-most sets won by any woman in the tournament's history, behind Martina Navratilova (249) and Chris Evert (200)

Serena Williams has hit the fastest serve of the tournament so far, clocking 122mph in her first-round match against Giulia Gatto-Monticone

Barbora Strycova has serve and volleyed on 65 occasions en route to the semifinals, while the other 127 players in the starting field have done so a combined total of 184 times

Serena Williams holds off a spirited late challenge from Garbiñe Muguruza to triumph 6-4 6-4 in the final at 2015 Wimbledon and lift her sixth title at the All England Club.

GRASS RECORDS

Serena Williams owns the most grass court match wins (106) and titles (eight) of any active player.

Heading into this year's Wimbledon, **Elina Svitolina** had struggled to match her hard and clay court accomplishments on grass, with her best results on the surface being quarterfinal showings at 's-Hertogenbosch in 2014 and Birmingham in 2018, and a fourth-round run at the All England Club in 2017.

PATRIOT GAMES

Elina Svitolina is the first woman representing Ukraine to reach a Grand Slam semifinal. The only other Ukrainian to go this deep into a major draw was Andrei Medvedev who reached the last four at Roland Garros in 1993 and then was runner-up in 1999.

Also looking to create a piece of history for her homeland is **Simona Halep**, who is bidding to become the first Romanian woman to reach a Wimbledon singles final.

RANKING MOVERS

Simona Halep and **Elina Svitolina** are both in contention to return to the Top 5, although to do so they must reach Saturday's final. The winner of their semifinal will jump to No.4, while the loser will be No.7 in Monday's new rankings.

In order to remain in the Top 10, **Serena Williams** needs to defend her runner-up points from last year by returning to the final. The American is projected to reach No.8 by lifting the trophy.

Barbora Strýcova's run guarantees she will improve her ranking to No.32. Should she reach the final, she will rise to No.22 and a career-high No.11 with the title.

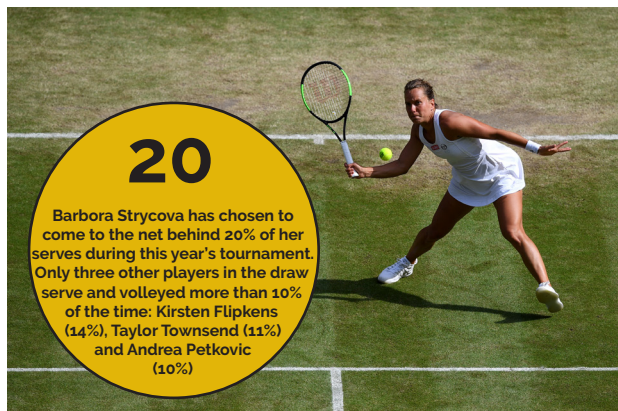
SERVING NOTICE

Serena Williams has struck a tournament-leading 41 aces across the opening five rounds here, more than **Barbora Strýcova** (12), **Elina Svitolina** (nine) and **Simona Halep** (eight) have managed between them.

While Strýcova trails the American in the ace count, her positive approach has seen her win the highest percentage of service games among the remaining players:

Strýcova has bucked the recent trend of baseline dominance at the All England Club, serve and volleying 65 times. By contrast, the other three semifinalists have done so just five times between them.

Barbora Strýcova, meanwhile is competing in her first Grand Slam semifinal. At the age of 33, she is the oldest first-time major semifinalist in the Open Era:

This fortnight marks Strýcova's 53rd appearance in a Grand Slam. Only five other players in the Open Era played more than 40 majors before reaching their maiden semifinal: Elena Likhovtseva (46), Roberta Vinci (44), Nathalie Tauziat (42), Elena Vesnina (42) and Flavia Pennetta (41).

FINAL RECKONING

Barbora Strýcova is the 30th unseeded player to advance to a Grand Slam semifinal since 2001 Wimbledon (the first Grand Slam with 32 seeds), and the seventh at Wimbledon, after Zheng Jie (2008) Petra Kvitová (2010), Tsvetana Pironkova (2010), Sabine Lisicki (2011), Elena Vesnina (2016) and Magdalena Rybáriková (2017).

Meanwhile, the winner of the match between World No.7 **Simona Halep** and No.8 **Elina Svitolina** will be the highest-ranked finalist at the All England Club since 2016, when then-No.1 Serena Williams took on No.4 Angelique Kerber.

WIMBLEDON

- Making seventh main draw appearance at Wimbledon (eighth overall), where she has advanced to SF for the first time
- Previous best showing was reaching the R16 in 2017 (I. Ostapenko)
- Has become the first woman representing Ukraine to reach a Grand Slam SF; on the men's side, Medvedev made that stage at Roland Garros in 1993 (SF) and 1999 (R-Up)
- As No.5 seed, last year fell in 1r (I. Maria) – was one of four Top 10 seeds to exit at this stage (also Stephens, Garcia and Kvitova)
- Is the No.8 seed this fortnight – her 10th consecutive Grand Slam as a Top 10 seed. The No.8 seed has reached the final on four occasions in the Open Era, most recently eventual champion Kvitova in 2011
- Was R-Up in girls' singles at All England Club in 2012 (I. Bouchard)
- Won last eight games of 1r match against Gavrilova, recording a 7-5 6-0 win
- In 2r, overcame her conqueror last month at Birmingham, Gasparyan, advancing when the Russian was forced to retire with left leg injury
- Withstood 35 winners, breaking serve seven times to beat No.32 Sakkari in 3r
- In R16, struck 31 winners and only 17 unforced errors to overcome the in-form Martic
- Defeated Muchova on Tuesday to record first Grand Slam QF win, having previously fallen at this stage at Australian Open (2018-19) and Roland Garros (2015, 2017)
- Overall Grand Slam win-loss record is now 52-27
- Faces No.7 Halep in SF; lost their only previous Grand Slam encounter, in QF at 2017 Roland Garros, in a match she led 6-3 5-1 and held 1MP
- The winner of today's match will rise to No.4 in the new rankings, while the loser will be No.7
- Best career results on grass were QF runs at 2014 's-Hertogenbosch and 2018 Birmingham, and R16 showing at 2017 Wimbledon

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- Prior to 2019 Wimbledon, best Grand Slam results were QF showings at 2015 Roland Garros (I. Ivaniovic), 2017 Roland Garros (I. eventual R-Up Halep), 2018 Australian Open (I. Mertens) and 2019 Australian Open (I. eventual champion Osaka)
- Reached R16 at Wimbledon in 2017 (I. Ostapenko) and 2019, and US Open in 2017 (I. eventual R-Up Keys) and 2018 (I. Sevastova)
- Joint-highest seeding at a Slam is No.4 (2017 Wimbledon and US Open, 2018 Australian Open and Roland Garros)



WIMBLEDON

- Making ninth main draw appearance at Wimbledon (10th overall); Has equalled previous best result here by reaching SF, having also advanced to this stage in 2014 (I. Bouchard)
- Recovered from injuring her left ankle in opening set of 1r match against Sasnovich
- Defeated compatriot Buzarnescu in 2r – the first time she had played a fellow Romanian at a major
- Dispatched fellow former No.1 Azarenka in straight sets in 3r, committing just nine unforced errors
- Ended the run of 15-year-old Gauff in R16 - has now reached at least QF at four of last seven majors contested
- Produced another tidy display to see off S.Zhang in QF, hitting 17 winners and only 13 unforced errors; across five matches, has committed only 71 unforced errors - the fewest of the four remaining players (followed by Strycova and Svitolina on 94)
- Has won 51% of her return games en route to the last four, the best percentage of the semifinalists and fourth best of the entire field; by contrast her season average heading into Wimbledon stood at 41.8%
- Results this fortnight have improved overall Grand Slam record to 85-35
- Owns 4-2 record in Grand Slam SF matches (0-1 at Wimbledon), most recently falling at this stage of 2015 US Open (I. Pennetta)
- Faces No.8 Svitolina today; recovered from 4-1 down in the final set to win her most recent encounter with the Ukrainian in SF at Doha this February
- Entered 2019 Wimbledon ranked No.7 – was World No.1 and top seed entering last year's event
- The last remaining of six Romanian women in the starting field this fortnight (also Buzarnescu, Cirstea, Ruse, Bogdan and Niculescu). Is bidding to become the first Romanian woman to reach the Wimbledon singles final
- Reached QF at Eastbourne – the only grass event contested in the run up to 2019 Wimbledon (I. Kerber)
- Last year, having triumphed at Roland Garros, did not contest a grass court tournament before Wimbledon where she fell in 3r (I. Hsieh)
- Has won one career title on grass at 2013 's-Hertogenbosch (d. Flipkens in F)

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- 2019 Wimbledon marks 37th career Grand Slam appearance - 36th consecutive appearance
- Won first Grand Slam title of career at 2018 Roland Garros (d. Stephens in F) after three runner-up finishes in Paris in 2014 (I. Sharapova in 3s), 2017 (I. Ostapenko in 3s) and at Australian Open in 2018 (I. Wozniacki in 3s)

- Fell at opening hurdle in both Birmingham (l. Gasparyan) and Eastbourne (after 1r bye, l. Cornet)
- Reached 3r at Roland Garros (l. Muguruza)
- Suffered 2r exit as defending champion in Rome (after 1r bye, l. Azarenka) and fell 1r at Madrid (l. Parmentier)
- Made second career WTA Premier Mandatory SF of her career at Indian Wells (l. eventual champion Andreescu). At Miami fell 2r (after 1r bye, l. Y.Wang)
- Reached SF at Doha (l. Halep after leading 4-1 in final set) and Dubai (l. eventual champion Bencic after leading 5-3 in final set)
- Advanced to QF at Australian Open for second year in a row (l. eventual champion Osaka)
- Opened 2019 season with 2r exit at Brisbane as defending champion (after 1r bye, l. Sasnovich)

CAREER MILESTONES

- Won 13th – and most prestigious – career title at 2018 WTA Finals (d. Stephens in F), after going 3-0 during round robin stage. Ended year ranked No.4
- Last year, also won titles at Rome (as defending champion, d. No.1 Halep in F), Dubai (as defending champion, d. Kasatkina in F) and Brisbane (d. Sasnovich in F); career record in finals now stands at 13-2, including a current nine match win streak
- At the Slams in 2018, reached QF at Australian Open (l. Mertens), R16 at US Open (l. Sevastova), 3r appearance at Roland Garros (l. Buzarnescu) and suffered 1r upset at Wimbledon (l. Maria)
- Posted SF run at Montréal (as defending champion, l. Stephens) and made five further QFs
- Enjoyed stand-out 2017, finishing year at No.6, winning a tour-leading five titles and posting second-most wins (53, behind Wozniacki with 60)
- Season culminated by qualifying for WTA Finals in Singapore, becoming first Ukrainian woman to qualify for the season-ending tournament in singles (fell at round robin stage with 1-2 record)
- In 2017, became first player to win three Premier 5 titles in a single season (Dubai, Rome, Toronto), since such tournaments were introduced in 2009
- One of five players to make Top 10 debut in 2017, after winning Dubai in February (also Ostapenko, Garcia, Mladenovic and Vandeweghe). Peaked in rankings at No.3 on September 11, 2017
- On four occasions could have reached World No.1 spot – at 2017 US Open, then needed to win 2017 Beijing (fell in QF), then needed to triumph at 2017 WTA Finals (failed to progress from group stage), or reach final at 2018 Australian Open (fell in QF)

GRAND SLAM CONT.

- Was the first Romanian woman to advance to final at Australian Open in 2018 (l. Wozniacki)
- Made SF at Wimbledon in 2014 (l. Bouchard) and US Open in 2015 (l. eventual champion Pennetta)

SEASON

- In only pre-Wimbledon grass court event, reached QF at Eastbourne (l. eventual R-Up Kerber)
- As the defending champion, posted QF run at Roland Garros (l. Anisimova)
- Suffered opening match loss at Rome (after 1r bye, l. Vondrousova)

WIMBLEDON

- Making 19th main draw appearance at Wimbledon. Among active players, only Venus, who made her 22nd appearance this fortnight, has contested more
- Bidding to win her eighth Wimbledon singles title, having lifted the Venus Rosewater Dish in 2002-03, 2009-10, 2012, 2015-16; also a three-time runner-up here, in 2004, 2008 and 2018
- Currently tied with Stefanie Graf on seven Wimbledon titles; in the Open Era, only Martina Navratilova has won more (nine titles); pre-Open Era, Helen Wills-Moody won eight
- Six-time doubles champion here w/Venus in 2000, 2002, 2008-09, 2012 and 2016
- Won mixed doubles w/Mirnyi in 1998; playing mixed doubles this fortnight w/A.Murray (face top seeds Soares/Melichar in 3r on Wednesday)
- Is making Grand Slam appearance number 72 this fortnight – second on the Open Era list, behind only her sister V.Williams (83)
- Victory here would see her tie Australia's Margaret Court on 24 major singles titles, the all-time record
- Winner of eight grass court titles – won gold medal at London 2012 Olympics in addition to Wimbledon crowns – the most among active players, followed by V.Williams (five) and Kvitova (four)
- Finished R-Up last year (I. Kerber). At 36 years and 291 days, was the third-oldest woman to reach a Slam final in the Open Era, after Navratilova (37 years, 258 days) at 1994 Wimbledon and V.Williams (37 years, 29 days) at 2017 Wimbledon
- Should she reach the final this year, would become the oldest Grand Slam finalist in the Open Era (37 years and 291 days)
- Last year, was No.181 (entered under special ranking of No.1 and seeded No.25), became lowest-ranked and lowest-seeded woman to reach an Open Era Wimbledon final – previous lowest-ranked was World No.31 V. Williams (d. Bartoli in 2007 Wimbledon F) and lowest-seeded was No.23 Lisicki (l. No.15 Bartoli and No.23 V.Williams in 2007)
- This year, defeated Gatto-Monticone and Juvan in 1r and 2r to improve Grand Slam record against qualifiers to 23-0 – Juvan was only the third qualifier to take a set from her (also Zvonareva at 2002 Roland Garros and Santangelo at 2008 Wimbledon)
- In 3r, beat No.17 seed Georges in a rematch of last year's SF – her second Top 20 win of the season (also No.1 Halep at Australian Open)
- Beat Suárez Navarro 6-2 6-2 in R16 – her seventh consecutive win against the Spaniard
- Struck 19 aces during QF win over fellow American Riske, taking her total for the fortnight to a tournament-leading 41; has only hit more aces in a single match three times at SW19 - Azarenka in 2012 (24), Zheng in 2012 (23) and Dementieva in 2009 (20)

WIMBLEDON

- Making 16th main draw appearance at Wimbledon (17th overall). Only V.Williams (22) and S.Williams (19) have played Wimbledon more times (Kuznetsova and Stosur also have 16 appearances)
- Contesting first Grand Slam singles SF of career, on 53rd attempt – the most outings before reaching the last four at a major in the Open Era, followed by Likhovtseva (46) and Vinci (44)
- First unseeded semifinalist at Wimbledon since Rybarikova in 2017 and bidding to become the first unseeded finalist at Wimbledon in the Open Era
- At 33y 3m old, is the oldest first-time Grand Slam semifinalist in the Open Era and would be the second oldest first-time Slam finalist of the Open Era, after Flavia Pennetta (33y 7m at 2015 US Open)
- At No.54, a win today would make Strycova Wimbledon's second-lowest ranked finalist after S.Williams herself – Serena was ranked No.181 last year (l. Kerber) but seeded No.25
- Bidding to become the fifth Czech-born woman to reach the Wimbledon singles final after Navratilova, Mandlikova, Novotna and Kvitova
- Has defeated three seeds en route to today's semi-finals
- Defeated No.19 seed Konta in QF in straight sets – after recovering a 3-0 first set, dropped just four more games, striking 22 winners for just nine unforced errors across the match
- Recovered from 6-4 5-2 down, winning nine straight games, to see off No.21 seed Mertens in R16
- Defeated No.4 seed Bertens in 3r for her first Top 20 win of the season and seventh career win over a Top 5 ranked player
- Opened Wimbledon campaign by defeating Tsurenko in 1r and registered 50th Grand Slam win in 2r, dispatching Siegemund
- Heads into today's match against No.10 S.Williams with a 10-56 career record against Top 10 opponents (3-15 at majors)
- Previous best singles result at Wimbledon, or any Slam, was QF run in 2014 (d. No.2 Li en route, l. Kvitova)
- Played last year's tournament as ranked No.23 and No.23 seed, falling in 3r (l. Goerges in a match lasting nearly three hours)
- Now has 21 career match wins at Wimbledon – more than at any other Slam, with overall major record standing at 53-52
- Has served and volleyed 65 times in her four matches so far; by contrast, the other three remaining players have done so a combined total of five times
- Sole unseeded player to reach SF – bidding to be the first unseeded finalist at Wimbledon in the Open Era. The unseeded Grand Slam finalist was Vondrousova at 2019 Roland Garros

- Following Riske result, has now won 198 sets at Wimbledon - the third-most sets won by any woman in the tournament's history, behind Navratilova (249) and Evert (200)
- Loss to No.54 Strycova today would be first to a player ranked outside Top 50 since I. No.78 Cepelova at 2014 Charleston; would be worst loss-by-ranking in Grand Slam play since falling to No.111 Razzano in 1r at 2012 Roland Garros
- With a combined age of 70, S.Williams vs. Strycova is the 'oldest' Wimbledon women's match since Serena defeated Date in 2013, with a combined age of 74
- Wimbledon record now stands at 97-11, surpassing Evert (96-15) for second place on the all-time match wins list in the women's singles (behind Navratilova, 120-14)
- Win-loss record across all Slams is now 342-47 – the most wins by a woman in the Open Era
- Career record in Wimbledon SF stands at 10-1 – sole loss at this juncture was to Venus in 2000. Overall record in Grand Slam SF is 31-5, with most recent loss coming at 2016 US Open (I. Ka.Pliskova)
- Serena's 106-13 record on grass reigns supreme over all other active players on tour, followed by V.Williams (94-21) and Sharapova (80-20)
- Bidding to become the fourth mother to win a major singles titles in the Open Era, following Margaret Court, Evonne Goolagong Cawley and Kim Clijsters
- Needs to reach final in order to remain in Top 10 and could go as high as No.8 by lifting the title

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- A 23-time Grand Slam singles winner, ahead of Stefanie Graf (22) on Open Era leaderboard, and behind only Margaret Court (24) all time
- Her titles were won at Australian Open: 2003, 2005, 2007, 2009-10, 2015, 2017; Roland Garros: 2002, 2013, 2015; Wimbledon: 2002-03, 2009-10, 2012, 2015-16; US Open: 1999, 2002, 2008, 2012-14
- Owns a 23-8 record in Slam finals, with losses coming at 2001 US Open (I. V.Williams), 2004 Wimbledon (I. Sharapova), 2008 Wimbledon (I. V.Williams), 2011 US Open (I. Stosur), 2016 Australian Open (I. Kerber), 2016 Roland Garros (I. Muguruza), 2018 Wimbledon (I. Kerber) and 2018 US Open (I. Osaka)
- Aged 35y 125d at the end of 2017 Australian Open, is the oldest player to win a major in the Open Era
- Boasts the longest span of Grand Slam singles glory all-time. Pre-Open Era, Helen Wills Moody won her majors over the course of 15y 9.5m. Serena won her first Slam at 1999 US Open, 17y 6.5m before her 2017 Australian title. WTA legends Evert, Navratilova and Graf all won their Slams over a 12 year span

- Wimbledon junior girls' doubles champion in 2002 (w/ Elke Clijsters)
- On grass, other career highlights included R-Up finishes at Birmingham in 2014 and 2016
- Currently the Czech No.5 of seven women in Top 100 (week of July 1, 2019)
- Singles ranking has suffered this year after she failed to back up R16 efforts at Australian Open and Roland Garros in 2018. By virtue of results this fortnight, is projected to rise to No.32 and could go to No.22 by reaching the final
- In with a shot at usurping Mladenovic as doubles World No.1 this week but would need to win the Wimbledon title. Through to QF (w/Hsieh, seeded No.3); team faces Babos/Mladenovic in SF

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- 2019 Wimbledon marks 53rd main draw appearance at a Slam. One of seven active players who've contested more than 50 Slams, behind V.Williams, S.Williams, Kuznetsova, Stosur, Sharapova and Cornet
- Before this fortnight, best result at Slam was QF run at 2014 Wimbledon (d. Li Na in the last match of the Chinese star's career, as well as Wozniacki en route, I. eventual champion Kvitova). Occasion marked first time in Open Era that three Czech women advanced to QF at a Slam (also Safarova, Kvitova)
- Advanced to R16 at Australian Open in 2016 (I. Azarenka), 2017 (I. S.Williams) and 2018 (I. Ka.Pliskova) and Roland Garros in 2018 (I. Putintseva)
- Reached 3r at US Open in 2014 (I. Bouchard), 2015 (I. Lisicki) and 2018 (I. Mertens)
- At 2010 Australian Open played what was then the longest Grand Slam match (d. Kulikova in four hours and 19 minutes – since surpassed by Kuznetsova-Schiavone at 2011 Australian Open)
- In doubles is a five-time semifinalist, at 2014 US Open (w/Date), 2015 Australian Open (w/Krajicek), 2017 US Open (w/Safarova), 2018 Roland Garros (w/Sestini Hlavackova) and 2019 Australian Open (w/Vondrousova)
- Five-time Grand Slam doubles semifinalist, most recently at 2019 Australian Open (w/Vondrousova; I. eventual champions Stosur/Zhang)
- In successful junior career, won back-to-back Australian Open girls' singles titles in 2002 (d. Sharapova in F) and 2003 (d. Kutuzova in F) and was R-Up at the 2002 US Open (I. Kirilenko). Also won three junior Slams in doubles: 2001 Australian Open (w/Cetkovska), 2002 Roland Garros (w/Groenefeld) and 2002 Wimbledon (w/E.Clijsters)
- Wimbledon junior girls' doubles champion in 2002 (w/ Elke Clijsters)

GRAND SLAM CONT.

- The 2017 Australian Open final saw Serena and Venus have the oldest combined age of any Grand Slam final match-up in the Open Era (71 years, 351 days), beating the previous record set by Flavia Pennetta and Roberta Vinci (66 years, 19 days) at the 2015 US Open. Prior to that all-Italian final the record was held for nearly four decades by Virginia Wade and Betty Stove – who had a combined age of just over 63 years, 11 months at 1977 Wimbledon
- In 2015, came within two wins of completing the calendar year Grand Slam, having won the Australian Open, Roland Garros and Wimbledon; l. Vinci in SF at US Open. Two women in Open Era had previously achieved the feat: Court (1970) and Graf (1988)
- Has twice been in possession of all four majors for a “Serena Slam” (2002 Roland Garros to 2003 Australian Open and 2014 US Open to 2015 Wimbledon)
- Has won 14 Grand Slam doubles titles, all with sister Venus – most recently at 2016 Wimbledon (d. Babos/Shvedova in F). Also won mixed doubles titles at 1998 Wimbledon and 1998 US Open (both w/Mirnyi)

SEASON

- Fell 3r at Roland Garros (l. Kenin)
- Made 2019 clay debut in Rome, defeating Peterson in 1r before withdrawing against sister Venus Williams due to a continuing left knee injury
- Fell 3r at both Indian Wells (ret. vs. Muguruza w/ viral illness) and Miami (withdrew prior to match vs. Q.Wang w/left knee injury)
- Returned to Top 10 for the first time since coming back from pregnancy on February 18
- Reached QF at Australian Open (l. Ka.Pliskova after holding 4mp)
- Overcame World No.1 Halep in R16 – was first time facing the reigning World No.1 since 2013 Doha (l. Azarenka in F) and was first win since 2013 Brisbane (d. Azarenka in SF). Aged 37, is the oldest player to defeat the reigning World No.1, bettering sister Venus’s win vs. Kerber aged 36 at 2017 Miami
- Now owns a 17-12 win-loss record vs. World No.1s - only Navratilova has more wins with 18
- Began 2019 at Hopman Cup, posted wins over Bencic, Sakkari and Boulter as USA made RR exit

CAREER MILESTONES

- Returned to Top 20 in 2018 year-end rankings (at No.16) despite playing only seven tournaments
- Was R-Up at both Wimbledon (l. Kerber) and US Open (l. Osaka) last season, and advanced to R16 at Roland Garros (withdrew prior to match against Sharapova w/right pectoral muscle tear)

SEASON

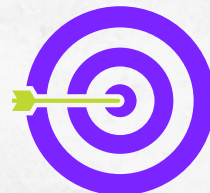

WIMBLEDON

- Making ninth main draw appearance at Wimbledon (10th overall) and 30th across all four majors
- Through to QF for the first time at a major. Previous best showing was R16 run at 2013 US Open (l. Hantuchova)
- Best previous results at Wimbledon were 3r showings in 2013 (l. Kanepi), 2014 (l. Sharapova) and 2017 (l. Vandeweghe)
- Reached 2r in 2018 (l. Bencic, after holding four match points)
- Fell 1r on four occasions, including event debut as WC in 2010 (l. Wickmayer) as well as 2011 (l. Zvonareva), 2015 (l. Safarova) and 2016 (l. Vinci)
- With a 11-8 win-loss record heading into QF, Wimbledon is her most successful major
- In late-finishing 1r encounter against Vekic, recovered from 4-1 down in the final set
- Edged past Jorovic in 2r, prevailing 9-7 in third set lasting 1h19m
- In 3r, recovered from 3-0 down in the final set to upset No.13 Bencic
- Prevailed in another three-set match in R16 to upset No.1 Barty - her seventh career Top 10 win, having previously overcome No.10 Kvitova (2013 US Open), No.10 Suárez Navarro (2015 Stanford), No.8 Kuznetsova (2016 Tianjin), No.3 A.Radwanska (2017 Shenzhen), No.7 Garcia (2018 Miami) and No.4 Bertens (2019 's-Hertogenbosch)
- Has spent 9h05m on court en route to the QF; since 2002, only one other woman has spent longer in reaching the last eight - Paszek in 2011, 9h34m
- Also only the third woman ever to drop a set in each round en route to the QF (also Russell in 1982 and Capriati in 1993)
- Faces S.Williams in QF today; owns 2-3 record at Grand Slams against fellow Americans
- Earlier in grass swing put together a 10-match win streak, taking in titles at \$100k ITF-Surbiton-GBR (d. Rybarikova in F) and second career WTA title at s'-Hertogenbosch (d. Bertens in F)
- On grass, was also a finalist at 2016 Nottingham and is a two-time semifinalist at Birmingham (2010, 2013)
- By making QF, is projected to return to the Top 40

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- Best previous result across all majors is R16 showing at 2013 US Open (d. No.10 Kvitova en route, l. Hantuchova) and 2019 Wimbledon
- Has reached 3r at Australian Open in 2014 (l. Kerber) and at Wimbledon on three previous occasions (2013-14, 2017, 2019)
- Reached 2r on debut at Roland Garros in 2014 but is yet to go further in Paris

WIMBLEDON

- Making 19th main draw appearance at Wimbledon. Among active players, only Venus, who made her 22nd appearance this fortnight, has contested more
- Bidding to win her eighth Wimbledon singles title, having lifted the Venus Rosewater Dish in 2002-03, 2009-10, 2012, 2015-16; also a two-time runner-up here, in 2004, 2008 and 2018
- Currently tied with Stefanie Graf on seven Wimbledon titles; in the Open Era, only Martina Navratilova has won more (nine titles); pre-Open Era, Helen Wills-Moody won eight
- Six-time doubles champion here w/Venus in 2000, 2002, 2008-09, 2012 and 2016. Won mixed doubles w/Mirnyi in 1998; playing mixed doubles this fortnight w/A.Murray (face No.14 seeds Martin/Atawo in 2r)
- Is making Grand Slam appearance number 72 this fortnight – second on the Open Era list, behind only her sister V.Williams (83)
- Victory here would see her tie Australia's Margaret Court on 24 major singles titles, the all-time record
- Winner of eight grass court titles – won gold medal at London 2012 Olympics in addition to Wimbledon crowns – the most among active players, followed by V.Williams (five) and Kvitova (four)
- Finished R-Up last year (l. Kerber). At 36 years and 291 days, was the third-oldest woman to reach a Slam final in the Open Era, after Navratilova (37 years, 258 days) at 1994 Wimbledon and V.Williams (37 years, 29 days) at 2017 Wimbledon
- Last year, was No.181 (entered under special ranking of No.1 and seeded No.25), became lowest-ranked and lowest-seeded woman to reach an Open Era Wimbledon final – previous lowest-ranked was World No.31 V. Williams (d. Bartoli in 2007 Wimbledon F) and lowest-seeded was No.23 Lisicki (l. No.15 Bartoli and No.23 V.Williams in 2007)
- This year, defeated Gatto-Monticone and Juvan in 1r and 2r to improve Grand Slam record against qualifiers to 23-0 - Juvan was only the third qualifier to take a set from her (also Zvonareva at 2002 Roland Garros and Santangelo at 2008 Wimbledon)
- In 3r, beat No.17 seed Georges in a rematch of last year's SF - her second Top 20 win of the season (also No.1 Halep at Australian Open)
- Beat Suárez Navarro 6-2 6-2 in R16 - her seventh consecutive win against the Spaniard, against whom she is still yet to drop more than three games in a single set
- Wimbledon record now stands at 96-11, drawing her level with Evert (96-15) in second place on the all-time match wins list in the women's singles (behind Navratilova, 120-14)
- Win-loss record across all Slams is now 341-47 –the most wins in the Open Era (men or women)

- Won second WTA singles title of career at 's-Hertogenbosch – d. top seed Bertens in F, having lost first set 6-0 and saved 5MP in second set
- Defeat of No.4 Bertens in 's-Hertogenbosch final marked second Top 5 win of career – also d. No.3 A.Radwanska at 2017 Shenzhen

- 2018 highlights included R-Up finish at Nürnberg (I. Larsson in F), reaching QF at Hobart (I. Buzarnescu), 's-Hertogenbosch (I. Vandeweghe), Mallorca (I. Stosur) and Tokyo (I. Ka.Pliskova). Also won eighth ITF Circuit singles title at Surbiton (d. Perrin in F)
- Reached 3r at 2018 Miami (I. Y.Wang) for her best result at a Premier Mandatory tournament; defeated No.7 Garcia along the way for what was fifth career Top 10 win; current Top 10 win-loss record 7-25
- 2017 highlights include R-Up at 2017 Shenzhen (I. Siniakova, having defeated No.3 A.Radwanska en route – at the time was best win by ranking of career)
- Member of Fed Cup winning USA team in 2017
- Won maiden WTA singles title at 2014 Tianjin without dropping a set (d. Bencic in F)
- Made Top 100 debut on July 22, 2013 (No.96)
- Reached first WTA semifinal at 2010 Birmingham (as qualifier, I. Sharapova)
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2010 Charleston
- Winner of nine singles and one doubles title on ITF Circuit

WIMBLEDON CONT.

- Faces Riske in QF; owns 41-10 record against fellow Americans at the majors, including 16-match winning streak that was ended at 2019 Roland Garros by Kenin
- Record in Grand Slam QF matches stands at 36-14, with most recent defeat at this juncture coming to Ka.Pliskova at 2019 Australian Open
- Serena's 105-13 record on grass reigns supreme over all other active players on tour, followed by V.Williams (94-21) and Sharapova (80-20)
- Bidding to become the fourth mother to win a major singles titles in the Open Era, following Margaret Court, Evonne Goolagong Cawley and Kim Clijsters

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- A 23-time Grand Slam singles winner, ahead of Stefanie Graf (22) on Open Era leaderboard, and behind only Margaret Court (24) all time
- Her titles were won at Australian Open: 2003, 2005, 2007, 2009-10, 2015, 2017; Roland Garros: 2002, 2013, 2015; Wimbledon: 2002-03, 2009-10, 2012, 2015-16; US Open: 1999, 2002, 2008, 2012-14
- Owns a 23-8 record in Slam finals, with losses coming at 2001 US Open (I. V.Williams), 2004 Wimbledon (I. Sharapova), 2008 Wimbledon (I. V.Williams), 2011 US Open (I. Stosur), 2016 Australian Open (I. Kerber), 2016 Roland Garros (I. Muguruza), 2018 Wimbledon (I. Kerber) and 2018 US Open (I. Osaka)
- Aged 35y 125d at the end of 2017 Australian Open, is the oldest player to win a major in the Open Era
- Boasts the longest span of Grand Slam singles glory all-time. Pre-Open Era, Helen Wills Moody won her majors over the course of 15y 9.5m. Serena won her first Slam at 1999 US Open, 17y 6.5m before her 2017 Australian title. WTA legends Evert, Navratilova and Graf all won their Slams over a 12 year span
- The 2017 Australian Open final saw Serena and Venus have the oldest combined age of any Grand Slam final match-up in the Open Era (71 years, 351 days), beating the previous record set by Flavia Pennetta and Roberta Vinci (66 years, 19 days) at the 2015 US Open. Prior to that all-Italian final the record was held for nearly four decades by Virginia Wade and Betty Stove – who had a combined age of just over 63 years, 11 months at 1977 Wimbledon
- In 2015, came within two wins of completing the calendar year Grand Slam, having won the Australian Open, Roland Garros and Wimbledon; I. Vinci in SF at US Open. Two women in Open Era had previously achieved the feat: Court (1970) and Graf (1988)
- Has twice been in possession of all four majors for a "Serena Slam" (2002 Roland Garros to 2003 Australian Open and 2014 US Open to 2015 Wimbledon)

- Fell 3r at Roland Garros (l. Kenin)
- Made 2019 clay debut in Rome, defeating Peterson in 1r before withdrawing against sister Venus Williams due to a continuing left knee injury

- Returned to Top 20 in 2018 year-end rankings (at No.16) despite playing only seven tournaments
- Was R-Up at both Wimbledon (l. Kerber) and US Open (l. Osaka) last season, and advanced to R16 at Roland Garros (withdrew prior to match against Sharapova w/right pectoral muscle tear)
- Made her return to tour as a mother at Indian Wells in March 2017, falling to sister V.Williams in 3r, having defeated Diyas and Bertens in straight sets

- Fell in 3r last year (l. Goerges in a match lasting nearly three hours)
- In 1r this year, broke four times to see off No.33 Tsurenko
- Hit 31 winners during 2r win over No.82 Siegemund - her 50th singles win across all majors

- Is one of four unseeded players to reach the last eight - the first time this has happened at Wimbledon since 1997, when there were only 16 seeds (Tausiat, Basuki, Kournikova, Chladkova). Across all Slams, it last occurred at 2016 Roland Garros (Bertens, Pironkova, Putintseva and Rogers)
- Is contesting doubles this fortnight w/Hsieh as the No.3 seeds (face Begu/Niculescu in 3r)

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- Best result at a Grand Slam came with QF run at 2014 Wimbledon (d. Li - in the last match of the Chinese star's career - and Wozniacki en route, I. eventual champion Kvitova). Occasion marked first time in Open Era that three Czech women advanced to QF at a Slam (also Safarova, Kvitova)

- Has won 94% (44/47) of service games across opening three rounds. Is the only remaining player to post a 90% or more service hold success rate (followed by Muchova and S.Williams - both 85%)
- Faces Strycova in QF today; including wins over Siniakova and Kvitova this fortnight, owns 3-3 career record against Czechs at Slams
- Owns a 3-1 record in QF matches at the Slams
- Overall win-loss record at Wimbledon is 11-7, and 34-22 across the majors
- Last year at Wimbledon was No.22 seed on a ranking of No.24; playing this event as the No.19 seed ranked No.18 this week
- Owns 32 wins over past four seasons on grass - the most of any player on tour, followed by Kerber (30)
- In 2018, posted 5-3 record on grass, highlighted by R-Up finish at Nottingham (l. Barty)
- Including results at 2019 Wimbledon, has won 31 matches on grass over the past four seasons - the most of any player on tour. In addition to Wimbledon exploits also made runs to back-to-back finals at Nottingham in 2017 and 2018

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- 2019 Wimbledon marks 23rd main draw appearance at a Grand Slam
- Is a three-time Grand Slam semifinalist. Made Slam breakthrough with historic run to SF at 2016 Australian Open (l. eventual champion Kerber); first British woman to reach the last four at Melbourne Park since Sue Barker in December 1977, and at any Grand Slam since Jo Durie at 1983 US Open

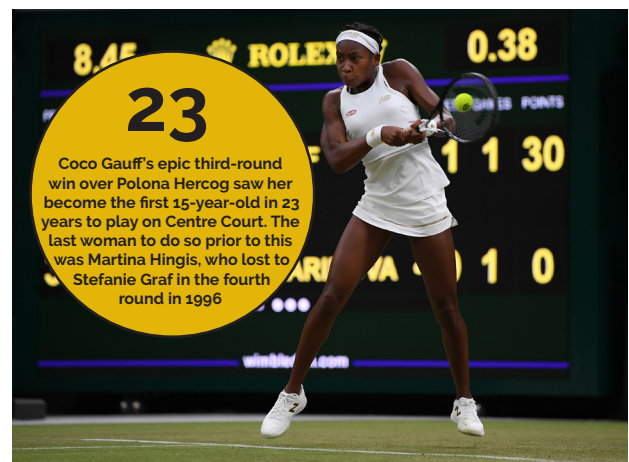

TEENAGE KICKS

At 15 years and 122 days at the end of the tournament, Gauff is the youngest player to reach the last 16 at a major since Anna Kournikova at 1996 US Open and at Wimbledon since Jennifer Capriati's semifinal run in 1991.

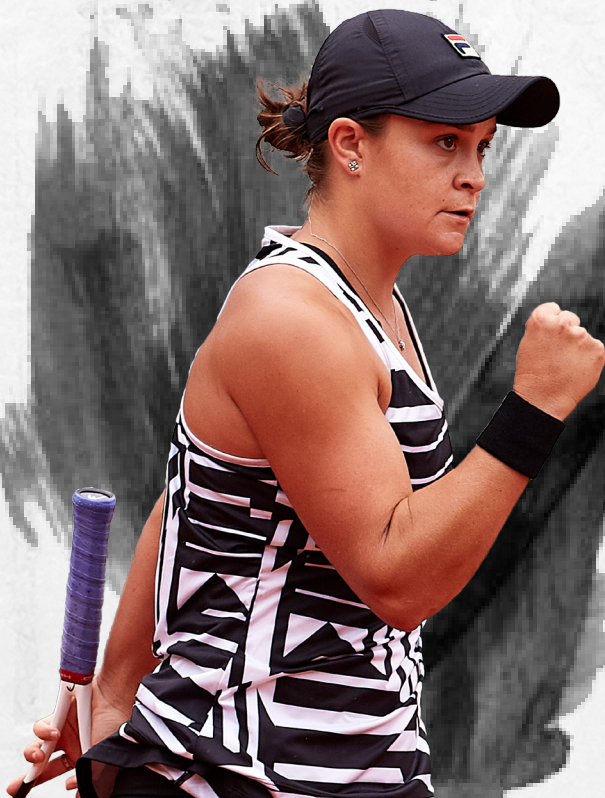

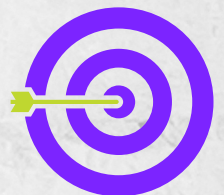

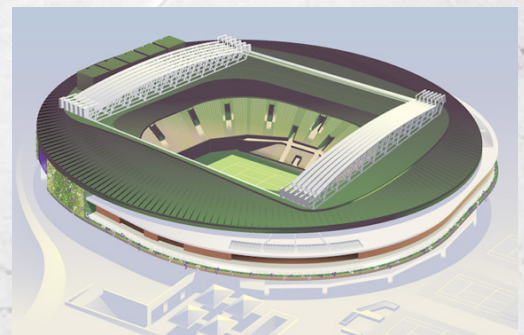

RAISING THE ROOF

- The No.1 Court Project, a collaboration between the AELTC and lead contractor Sir Robert McAlpine, took **two years** to design, **three years** to construct, and was completed on time and on budget

- Making fourth main draw appearance at Wimbledon (seventh overall) and 20th across all Slams
- Through to R16 for the first time here and fourth consecutive occasion across all Slams
- Attempting to become the only player to reach the QF in all three majors this year
- Other past results in SW19 included 3r exit in 2018 (l. Kasatkina) and 1r exits in 2012 (l. Vinci) and 2017 (l. Svitolina). Fell in qualifying in 2013-14 and 2016
- Having won past two tournaments contested – Roland Garros and Birmingham – and including first three wins in SW19 this week, is now on a 15-match win streak. Has dropped just one set along the way, against Anisimova in SF at Roland Garros

- Making main draw debut at Wimbledon this fortnight; fell in 2r of qualifying here last year (l. Bouchard)
- Through to R16 at a Grand Slam for the first time
- Advanced to fourth round with wins over Krunić, Brengle and Kontaveit, whom she defeated for the second major in a row (also 2019 Roland Garros, 1r)
- 3r defeat of No.20 Kontaveit here on Friday marked third Top 20 win of career – also No.12 Muguruza (2018 US Open) and No.17 Kontaveit (2019 Roland Garros)
- Looking for her career first Top 10 win over No.3 Ka.Pliskova today. Is 0-4 vs. Top 10 opponents in 2019, having fallen to No.8 Ka.Pliskova (her opponent again today) at Australian Open, No.7 Svitolina at Doha, No.4 Kerber at Miami and No.5 Kerber at Monterrey
- Competing this week on a career high ranking of No.68 (achieved on June 10, 2019). By contrast, was No.223 this time last year
- Three Czech players have made it through to R16 (also Kvitová and Stryčková) – best showing by the nation since 2014
- Muchova vs. Ka.Pliskova is the sole all-country derby in the R16
- Currently the Czech No.6 of seven women in the Top 100 (week of July 1, 2019)

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- 2019 Wimbledon marks fourth Grand Slam main draw of her career
- Reached 3r at 2018 US Open in her main draw debut at the majors (as qualifier, l. Barty in 3r)
- Also fell 2r at 2019 Roland Garros and 1r at 2019 Australian Open
- Earned USD\$156,000 in prize money during last year's Flushing Meadows run, more than doubling her career total
- Previously fell in qualifying at US Open in 2016, and Roland Garros and Wimbledon in 2018

SEASON

- Opened grass court season with 1r exit at 's-Hertogenbosch (l. eventual champion Riske)
- Fell 2r at Roland Garros on main draw debut (d. Kontaveit, l. Begu)
- Finished R-Up in Prague (l. qualifier Tiechmann)
- Made R16 at Monterrey (l. Kerber) and came through qualifying in Miami to reach final 16 (d. Hibino, l. Kerber)
- Came through qualifying to reach maiden Premier quarter-final at Doha (l. Svitolina)

WIMBLEDON

- Making eighth main draw appearance at Wimbledon (ninth overall)
- Having fallen in qualifying in 2010, made main draw debut as a qualifier in 2012 (l. Stephens in 1r)
- Has equaled best previous result at All England Club, having reached R16 last year (2018) for the first time (l. Bertens). Result followed five successive 2r exits
- Owns a 7-1 record in Grand Slam R16 matches – sole loss at this stage was here last year
- Enjoying equal-highest seeding at SW19 – No.3 (also 2017; l. Rybarikova in 2r)
- Currently ranked No.3, is the only remaining player with a chance of usurping Barty at No.1 with a deep run this fortnight (needs to reach at least F)
- Hit 26 winners on way to winning 1r match over No.101 Zhu
- Struck 23 winners and just six unforced errors in 2r win over Puig
- Defeated Hsieh in three sets in 3r on Friday; now holds the most three-set wins in 2019 – 15
- Has now hit 328 aces this season – the most on tour, ahead of Bertens (310)
- Over the past four seasons, has won 29 matches on grass, the third-most on tour behind Kerber (30) and Konta (31)
- With 38 match wins registered so far this season, trails only Barty (39)
- Arrives at Wimbledon having captured second Eastbourne title (after 2017) and third grass court title of career (also 2016 Nottingham)
- Following her title win at Eastbourne (d. Kerber in F), sits at No.2 on the Porsche Race to Shenzhen – top eight players of 2019 qualify for the season finale at the WTA Finals Shenzhen
- Bidding to become the first player since 2004 to win Wimbledon having captured a WTA grass court event in the lead-up (Sharapova—Birmingham); the last woman to win Eastbourne and then Wimbledon was Jana Novotná in 1998
- Has reached the QF stage or better in seven of 11 events contested in 2019, and advanced to at least SF on five occasions (by contrast, reached six SF across all of 2018)
- Has gone 3-1 in finals so far this year; this is the fourth time she has reached four (or more) finals in a single season, having also achieved this in 2014 (five), 2015 (six) and 2016 (four)
- Her coach, Conchita Martínez, won the Wimbledon singles title 25 years ago (1994, d. Navratilova in F)

- Suffered 2r exits in 2016 (l. Bouchard) and 2018 (l. Cibulkova) and fell 1r in 2012, 2013, 2014 and 2015
- Hit 27 winners to defeat Romanian qualifier Bogdan in 1r
- In 2r, won 78% of service points and did not face a break point in victory over Siniakova

- Faces No.6 Kvitova in R16 today; in addition to wins over Stephens, owns one more Top 10 win this season, over No.4 Bertens at Rome

- Owns a 4-2 record in R16 matches at the Slams
- Overall win-loss record at Wimbledon is 10-7, and 33-22 across the majors
- Last year at Wimbledon was No.22 seed on a ranking of No.24; playing this event as the No.19 seed ranked No.18 this week
- In 2018, posted 5-3 record on grass, highlighted by R-Up finish at Nottingham (l. Barty)
- Including results at 2019 Wimbledon, has won 31 matches on grass over the past four seasons - the most of any player on tour. In addition to Wimbledon exploits also made runs to back-to-back finals at Nottingham in 2017 and 2018

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- 2019 Wimbledon marks 23rd main draw appearance at a Grand Slam
- Is a three-time Grand Slam semifinalist. Made Slam breakthrough with historic run to SF at 2016 Australian Open (l. eventual champion Kerber); first British woman to reach the last four at Melbourne Park since Sue Barker in December 1977, and at any Grand Slam since Jo Durie at 1983 US Open

- Also made QF at Australian Open in 2017 (l. eventual champion S.Williams), while at US Open made R16, in 2015 (l. Kvitova) and 2016 (l. Sevastova)

- Making 12th appearance at Wimbledon, where she is a two-time champion, lifting the Venus Rosewater Dish in 2011 (d. Sharapova in F) and 2014 (d. Bouchard in F)
- Semifinalist in 2010 (l. S.Williams) and also a two-time quarterfinalist here, in 2012 (l. S.Williams) and 2013 (l. Flipkens)
- One of six former Wimbledon champions in the starting field, along with defending champion Kerber, Muguruza, Sharapova, S.Williams and V.Williams – only S.Williams has also advanced to 3r
- Seeded No.6 at All England Club this year, the same position she occupied when she lifted the title in 2014
- Playing Wimbledon as the Czech No.2 (behind Ka.Pliskova) of seven women in the Top 100 (week of July 1, 2019)
- Currently at No.3 on the Porsche Race to Shenzhen Leaderboard, behind Barty and Ka.Pliskova
- Broke serve five times to defeat No.56 Jabeur in 1r, then struck 24 winners - including eight aces - to see off Mladenovic in 2r
- Did not face a break point in comfortable 3r win over Linette
- Has now won 31 matches so far this season – sixth most on tour
- Faces No.19 Konta in R16 today; looking for first Top 20 win since title run at Stuttgart in April (d. No.13 Sevastova, No.7 Bertens and No.15 Kontaveit)
- Record in Grand Slam R16 matches stands at 11-6, with most recent defeat at this stage coming to Kerber at 2016 US Open
- In lead up to Wimbledon, was unable to defend Birmingham title due to the same left arm injury that forced her to withdraw from Roland Garros
- Entered 2019 Wimbledon in third place on tour this year for service points won (62.9%) and service games won (79.1%)

- Has 4-4 record in Grand Slam R16 matches. Most recent defeat at this stage of a major came at 2018 US Open (l. Sevastova)
- Best career results on grass were QF runs at 2014 's-Hertogenbosch and 2018 Birmingham, and R16 showing at 2017 Wimbledon

- Making 19th main draw appearance at Wimbledon. Among active players, only Venus, who is made her 22nd appearance this fortnight, has contested more
- Bidding to win her eighth Wimbledon singles title, having lifted the Venus Rosewater Dish in 2002-03, 2009-10, 2012, 2015-16; also a two-time runner-up here, in 2004, 2008 and 2018
- Currently tied with Stefanie Graf on seven Wimbledon titles; in the Open Era, only Martina Navratilova has won more (nine titles); pre-Open Era, Helen Wills-Moody won eight
- Six-time doubles champion here w/Venus in 2000, 2002, 2008-09, 2012 and 2016. Won mixed doubles w/Mirnyi in 1998; playing mixed doubles this fortnight w/A.Murray (face No.14 seeds Martin/Atawo in 2r)
- Is making Grand Slam appearance number 72 this fortnight – second on the Open Era list, behind only her sister V.Williams (83)
- Victory here would see her tie Australia's Margaret Court on 24 major singles titles, the all-time record
- Winner of eight grass court titles – won gold medal at London 2012 Olympics in addition to Wimbledon crowns – the most among active players, followed by V.Williams (five) and Kvitova (four)
- Finished R-Up last year (l. Kerber). At 36 years and 291 days, was the third-oldest woman to reach a Slam final in the Open Era, after Navratilova (37 years, 258 days) at 1994 Wimbledon and V.Williams (37 years, 29 days) at 2017 Wimbledon
- Last year, was No.181 (entered under special ranking of No.1 and seeded No.25), became lowest-ranked and lowest-seeded woman to reach an Open Era Wimbledon final – previous lowest-ranked was World No.31 V. Williams (d. Bartoli in 2007 Wimbledon F) and lowest-seeded was No.23 Lisicki (l. No.15 Bartoli and No.23 V.Williams in 2007)
- This year, defeated qualifiers Gatto-Monticone and Juvan in 1r and 2r before winning 3r against Georges in a rematch of last year's SF - Wimbledon record now stands at 95-11 - third place on the all-time match wins list in the women's singles (behind Navratilova, 120-14, and Evert, 96-15)
- Win-loss record across all Slams is now 340-47 – the most wins in the Open Era (men or women)
- Has won all 23 career matches against qualifiers at Grand Slam level - Juvan was only the third to take a set from her (also Zvonareva at 2002 Roland Garros and Santangelo at 2008 Wimbledon)
- Win over No.17 Goerges was first against a Top 20 player since defeating No.1 Halep at Australian Open
- Faces Suárez Navarro in R16; record in Grand Slam R16 matches stands at 50-8, with most recent defeat at this juncture coming to Ivanovic at 2014 Australian Open (also withdrew from R16 match vs. Sharapova at 2018 Roland Garros w/pectoral injury)

WIMBLEDON

- Making 10th career main draw appearance at the All England Club, where she is through to the R16 for a third time
- Also made it this far in 2013 (l. Kvitova) and 2016 (l. V.Williams)
- By virtue of last year's 3r showing passed \$10 million in career prize money
- Began 2019 Wimbledon campaign with straight-set wins over Stosur, Parmentier and Davis - one of six players to reach R16 without dropping a set
- Faces No.10 S.Williams in R16; including win over Davis in 3r, owns 12-6 career record against Americans at Slams
- Along with opponent today, S.Williams is one of three thirtysomethings left in the draw (also Strycova); three also made this juncture in 2018 (Hsieh, Kerber and S.Williams)
- Most recent Top 10 win came over No.6 Garcia at 2018 US Open
- In terms of ranking, best win at Wimbledon was against No.25 Kanepi in 2009 1r
- Record in Grand Slam R16 matches is 7-8
- Lone Spaniard remaining in this year's draw
- Aside from performances here, career highlights on grass are SF showings at 2013 's-Hertogenbosch (l. Halep) and 2016 Birmingham (d. No.4 Kerber in QF, l. Keys)

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- Best Grand Slam results have been reaching the QF stage at three of the four majors – at Roland Garros in 2008 (as qualifier, l. Jankovic) and 2014 (l. Bouchard), at Australian Open in 2009 (l. Serena won her first Slam at 1999 US Open, 17y 6.5m before her 2017 Australian title. WTA legends Evert, Navratilova and Graf all won their Slams over a 12 year span
- The 2017 Australian Open final saw Serena and Venus have the oldest combined age of any Grand Slam final match-up in the Open Era (71 years, 351 days), beating the previous record set by Flavia Pennetta and Roberta Vinci (66 years, 19 days) at the 2015 US Open. Prior to that all-Italian final the record was held for nearly four decades by Virginia Wade and Betty Stove – who had a combined age of just over 63 years, 11 months at 1977 Wimbledon

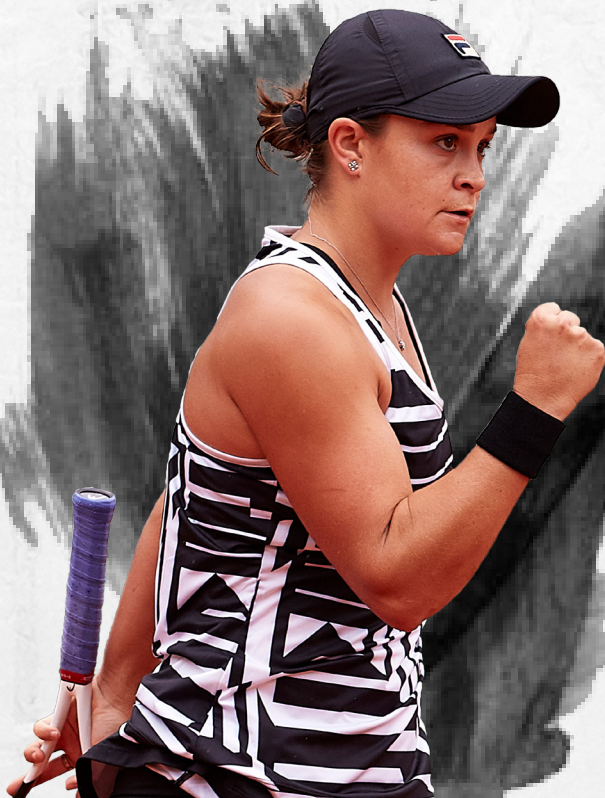

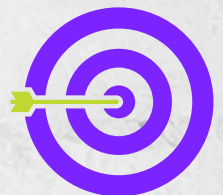

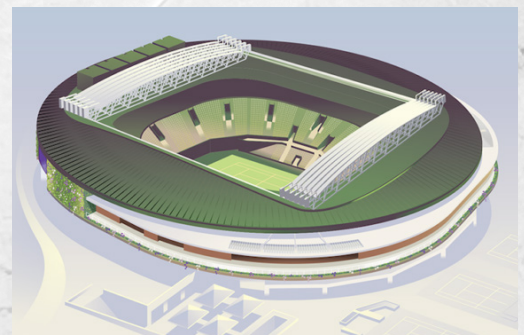

- The No.1 Court Project, a collaboration between the AELTC and lead contractor Sir Robert McAlpine, took **two years** to design, **three years** to construct, and was completed on time and on budget
- The redevelopment coincides with the **10th anniversary** of the roof on Centre Court
- The retractable roof requires **164 drives** and **44 motors** to move it
- The roof takes between **8-10 minutes** to fully retract or deploy

- Making fourth main draw appearance at Wimbledon (seventh overall) and 20th across all Slams
- Through to 3r here for the second year in a row, having fallen to Kasatkina at this stage in 2018
- Bidding to advance to R16 at All England Club for the first time. The last Australian woman to reach R16 here was Jarmila Wolfe (Gajdosova) in 2010
- Other previous results in SW19 included 2r exits in 2012 (I. Vinci) and 2017 (I. Svitolina). Fell in qualifying in 2013-14 and 2016
- Having won past two tournaments contested – Roland Garros and Birmingham – and including first two wins in SW19 this week, is now on a 14-match win streak. Has dropped just one set along the way, against Anisimova in SF at Roland Garros
- Defeated Zheng and Van Uytvanck in order to set up today's encounter with Dart. Won 86% of points on first serve against Zheng and 79% against Van Uytvanck; serve was broken just once in each match

- Also fell in 3r three times, in 2012 (l. Lisicki), 2015 (l. Safarova) and 2016 (l. Kuznetsova)
- 2017 Wimbledon marked first tournament back following 11 months on sidelines w/foot injury (had surgery in January), falling to Riske in 1r
- Reached girls' singles QF and won girls' doubles title w/Babos in 2010 (d.Khromacheva/Svitolina in F)
- Overcame No.91 Bacsinszky in 1r - improving record against opponents outside the Top 50 to 14-3 this season, with three losses coming to No.172 Haddad Maia (Acapulco), No.109 Voegele (Indian Wells) and No.62 Maria (Miami)
- Dropped only two games to see off No.57 Wang in 2r on Thursday
- Faces British No.1 Konta in 3r today; is yet to win a match against the Brit - this will be their fourth meeting this year
- Is 13-6 in 3r matches at Grand Slams, most recently losing at 2016 Wimbledon as No.18 seed (l. Kuznetsova)
- Last year, was one of four Top 10 seeds to fall at first hurdle here (also Garcia, Kvitova and Svitolina)
- One of 19 Americans in starting field; six reached 3r
- Best career results on grass were SF run at 2015 Eastbourne and QF showings at 2013 Wimbledon and 2014 Birmingham
- Since start of 2018 season, 3r has been pivotal for Stephens, with a win usually predicting a deep run: Champion (Miami), Finalist (RG, Montreal, WTA Finals) Semifinalist (Madrid), Quarterfinalist (USO, Charleston, RG), and R16 (AO)

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- 2019 Wimbledon marks 30th Grand Slam main draw appearance
- Enjoyed fairytale run at 2017 US Open, lifting maiden Grand Slam title at Flushing Meadows (d. Keys in F). At No.83, is second-lowest ranked Grand Slam champion (since inception of computer rankings in 1975) and 14th unseeded player to advance to a Grand Slam final in the Open Era, and only fifth unseeded champion
- Best result across other Slams was R-Up finish at 2018 Roland Garros (l. Halep)
- Prior to 2017 US Open triumph, best result across all majors was reaching SF at 2013 Australian Open (d. S.Williams in QF, l. eventual champion Azarenka)
- Also just the second American (after Davenport) to beat both Williams sisters in Grand Slam match play
- Advanced to SF at 2013 Australian Open (d. Halep, Mladenovic and S.Williams en route) and QF at 2013 Wimbledon (l. eventual champion Bartoli)

WIMBLEDON

- Making eighth appearance at Wimbledon; achieved best result here in 2017 when she became the first British woman since Virginia Wade in 1978 to reach SF (l. V.Williams)
- Suffered 2r exits in 2016 (l. Bouchard) and 2018 (l. Cibulkova) and fell 1r in 2012, 2013, 2014 and 2015
- Hit 27 winners to defeat Romanian qualifier Bogdan in 1r
- Advanced to today's bout with No.9 Stephens by defeating No.38-ranked Siniakova in 2r
- One of two British women to advance to 3r this week, along with Dart; the last time two Brits made R16 at Wimbledon was 1984 (Durie and Hobbs)
- Owns a 1-0 record in 3r matches at the All England Club – and is 6-0 in 3r across all Slams, having gone on to reach at least QF stage four of those times
- Overall win-loss record at Wimbledon is 8-7, and 31-22 across the majors
- Last year at Wimbledon was No.22 seed on a ranking of No.24; playing this event as the No.19 seed ranked No.18 this week
- In 2018, posted 5-3 record on grass, highlighted by R-Up finish at Nottingham (l. Barty)
- Including 2r win over Siniakova on Tuesday, has won 30 matches on grass over the past four seasons, including runs to back-to-back finals at Nottingham in 2017 and 2018. Only Kerber has won as many grass matches during this period (also 30)

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- 2019 Wimbledon marks 23rd main draw appearance at a Grand Slam
- Is a three-time Grand Slam semifinalist. Made Slam breakthrough with historic run to SF at 2016 Australian Open (l. eventual champion Kerber); first British woman to reach the last four at Melbourne Park since Sue Barker in December 1977, and at any Grand Slam since Jo Durie at 1983 US Open
- Has since reached SF at 2017 Wimbledon (l. R-Up V.Williams), becoming the first British woman to reach the last four since Wade in 1978 (l. Evert), and at 2019 Roland Garros (l. Vondrousova)
- Became the eighth active player to reach a major SF on hard, grass and clay: also Azarenka, Bouchard, Halep, Kvitova, Sharapova, S.Williams and V.Williams
- Also made QF at Australian Open in 2017 (l. eventual champion S.Williams), while at US Open made R16, in 2015 (l. Kvitova) and 2016 (l. Sevastova)

- In 2018 posted best year-end finish of career to date, at No.6; reached career-high No.3 ranking on July 16, 2018
- Season highlights in 2018 included capturing first Premier Mandatory title at Miami – subsequently made Top 10 debut at No.9. Also reached her second Grand Slam final, at Roland Garros and posted R-Up finishes at Montréal and WTA Finals
- Won her maiden Grand Slam title at 2017 US Open, d. Keys 6-3 6-0 to become the fifth unseeded player to win a major in the Open Era
- Voted 2017 WTA Comeback Player of the Year. Returned to action at Wimbledon after 11 months on sidelines w/foot injury (had surgery in the January)
- After 1r loss at 2017 Washington DC, went 15-2 through US Open title run, including back-to-back SF at Toronto and Cincinnati
- Won three titles in 2016, at Auckland, Acapulco and Premier-level Charleston. Won maiden singles title in first final contested at 2015 Washington, DC
- At No.97 was youngest player in year-end Top 100 in 2011; and after a phenomenal sophomore season, reached No.38 and was the youngest player, and the only teenager, in the year-end Top 50 in 2012
- Made Top 20 debut on January 29, 2013

- On grass prior to Wimbledon, reached 2r at Birmingham (d. Kontaveit, I. Ostapenko) and advanced to R16 at Eastbourne (I. Jabeur)
- Made historic run at Roland Garros, recording maiden 1r win in Paris before moving on to become the first British woman to reach the SF since Jo Durie's run to the same stage in 1983
- Re-entered Top 20 on June 10, 2019 for the first time since March 2018 (dropped as low as No.50)

- Made 2r exit at Madrid (I. Halep)

- In 2017, posted career-high season finish of No.9 (second Top 10 season in a row). Peaked in rankings at No.4 on July 17, 2017
- Began 2017 season by lifting title at Sydney (d. A.Radwanska in F), before landing biggest title of career at Premier-Mandatory Miami (d. Wozniacki in F)
- At 2017 Wimbledon became first British player since Virginia Wade in 1978 to reach Wimbledon SF (l. eventual R-Up V.Williams)

- Reached first Premier Mandatory final of career at 2016 Beijing (l. A.Radwanska)
- Non-playing alternate for WTA Finals in Singapore in 2016, narrowly missing qualification in the Top 8
- By virtue of reaching 2016 Beijing final, made WTA Top 10 debut – first British woman to feature in the elite group since Durie in 1984, and the fourth British woman overall to do so (also Wade and Barker)
- Won career-first singles title at 2016 Stanford in maiden final (d. V.Williams in F). First British woman to reach final of a Premier event since WTA Roadmap was introduced in 2009
- Broke into Top 20 on June 6, 2016 (at No.18) – first British woman in Top 20 for nearly 30 years (the week of October 13, 1986, with Durie at No.20)
- Was voted WTA Most Improved Player in 2016 by international media and fans

- Born in Sydney, Australia; became a British citizen in May 2012. Parents are Gabor (hotelier) and Gabriela (dentist); older sister is Eva (works in fashion)
- Switched clothing sponsor from Asics to Ellesse

WIMBLEDON

- Making 19th main draw appearance at Wimbledon. Among active players, only Venus, who is making her 22nd appearance this fortnight, has played here more times
- Bidding to win her eighth Wimbledon singles title, having lifted the Venus Rosewater Dish in 2002-03, 2009-10, 2012, 2015-16; also a two-time runner-up here, in 2004, 2008 and 2018
- Currently tied with Stefanie Graf on seven Wimbledon titles; in the Open Era, only Martina Navratilova has won more (nine titles); pre-Open Era, Helen Wills-Moody won eight
- Six-time doubles champion here w/Venus in 2000, 2002, 2008-09, 2012 and 2016, and won mixed doubles w/Mirnyi in 1998; playing mixed doubles this fortnight w/A.Murray (face Mies/Guarachi in 1r)
- Is making Grand Slam appearance number 72 this fortnight – second on the Open Era list, behind only her sister V.Williams (83)
- Victory this fortnight would see her tie Australia's Margaret Court on 24 Grand Slam singles titles, the all-time record
- Winner of eight grass court titles – won gold medal at London 2012 Olympics in addition to Wimbledon crowns – the most among active players, followed by V.Williams (five) and Kvitova (four)
- Finished R-Up last year (l. Kerber). At 36 years and 291 days, was the third-oldest woman to reach a Slam final in the Open Era, after Navratilova (37 years, 258 days) at 1994 Wimbledon and V.Williams (37 years, 29 days) at 2017 Wimbledon
- Last year, was No.181 (entered under special ranking of No.1 and seeded No.25), became lowest-ranked and lowest-seeded woman to reach an Open Era Wimbledon final – previous lowest-ranked was World No.31 V. Williams (d. Bartoli in 2007 Wimbledon F) and lowest-seeded was No.23 Lisicki (l. No.15 Bartoli and No.23 V.Williams in 2007)
- This year, defeated qualifiers Gatto-Monticone and Juvan in 1r and 2r to improve Wimbledon record to 94-11 - third place on the all-time match wins list in the women's singles (behind Navratilova, 120-14, and Evert, 96-15)
- Win-loss record across all Slams is now 339-47 –the most wins in the Open Era (men or women)
- Has won all 23 career matches against qualifiers at Grand Slam level - Juvan was only the third to take a set from her (also Zvonareva at 2002 Roland Garros and Santangelo at 2008 Wimbledon)
- Faces No.17 Goerges in 3r; only Top 20 win of the season came over No.1 Halep at Australian Open
- Record in Grand Slam 3r matches stands at 59-9, with most recent defeat at this juncture coming to Kenin at 2019 Roland Garros

WIMBLEDON

- Making 12th appearance at Wimbledon, where last year she posted her best Grand Slam result by reaching SF (l. today's opponent S.Williams)
- With Kerber winning title at All England Club in 2018, it marked the first time that two Germans reached the last four at the same Slam since 1993 Roland Garros – Huber (SF) and Graf (Champion)
- Coming off a R-Up performance in Birmingham (l. eventual champion Barty); marked the second grass court final of her career, having previously been R-Up at 2017 Mallorca (l. Sevastova)
- Currently ranked No.17 - will spend her 89th and 90th consecutive week in the Top 20 during The Championships
- Seeded No.18 - her eighth consecutive majors among the seeds
- Defeated Ruse in 1r after firing 28 winners, including 10 aces
- Produced another aggressive display to end the run of qualifier Flink in 2r, another 10 aces contributing to a total of 33 winners; season total for aces now stands at 166
- Holds a 6-1 record on grass this season after opening two rounds – bidding today to match last season's total of seven wins on the surface (7-3 record)
- Faces S.Williams today in a rematch of last year's SF; suffered straight-set defeat to the American at both Wimbledon and Roland Garros last year, winning just 29 of 105 return points across both matches
- Including matches against S.Williams, whom she also lost against at 2010 Roland Garros, owns 3-9 record against American opposition at majors
- Has two Top 10 wins at majors, over No.7 Errani (2014 Australian Open) and No.5 Wozniacki (2015 Roland Garros)
- Record in Grand 6-7 Grand Slam 3r matches, with most recent defeat at this stage coming to S.Williams at 2018 Roland Garros
- Goerges is the oldest title winner of the 2019 season after lifting the trophy at Auckland earlier this year
- Started with new coach Sebastian Sachs earlier this year, at Rome

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- At 2019 Wimbledon will contest 45th consecutive major (and 46th in total), the third longest streak on tour (after Cornet - 51 and Pavlyuchenkova - 46)
- Posted best Grand Slam result at 2018 Wimbledon, where she reached SF (l. S.Williams)
- Previously had reached R16 – but never further – on five occasions, at Australian Open (2012-13 and 2015), Roland Garros (2015) and US Open (2017)
- Made main draw debut at 2007 US Open, as qualifier, lost to eventual champion Henin in 1r

- Serena's 103-13 record on grass reigns supreme over all other active players on tour, followed by V.Williams (94-21) and Sharapova (80-20)
- Bidding to become the fourth mother to win a major singles titles in the Open Era, following Margaret Court, Evonne Goolagong Cawley and Kim Clijsters

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- A 23-time Grand Slam singles winner, ahead of Stefanie Graf (22) on Open Era leaderboard, and behind only Margaret Court (24) all time
- Her titles were won at Australian Open: 2003, 2005, 2007, 2009-10, 2015, 2017; Roland Garros: 2002, 2013, 2015; Wimbledon: 2002-03, 2009-10, 2012, 2015-16; US Open: 1999, 2002, 2008, 2012-14
- Owns a 23-8 record in Slam finals, with losses coming at 2001 US Open (I. V.Williams), 2004 Wimbledon (I. Sharapova), 2008 Wimbledon (I. V.Williams), 2011 US Open (I. Stosur), 2016 Australian Open (I. Kerber), 2016 Roland Garros (I. Muguruza), 2018 Wimbledon (I. Kerber) and 2018 US Open (I. Osaka)
- Aged 35y 125d at the end of 2017 Australian Open, is the oldest player to win a major in the Open Era
- Boasts the longest span of Grand Slam singles glory all-time. Pre-Open Era, Helen Wills Moody won her majors over the course of 15y 9.5m. Serena won her first Slam at 1999 US Open, 17y 6.5m before her 2017 Australian title. WTA legends Evert, Navratilova and Graf all won their Slams over a 12 year span
- The 2017 Australian Open final saw Serena and Venus have the oldest combined age of any Grand Slam final match-up in the Open Era (71 years, 351 days), beating the previous record set by Flavia Pennetta and Roberta Vinci (66 years, 19 days) at the 2015 US Open. Prior to that all-Italian final the record was held for nearly four decades by Virginia Wade and Betty Stove – who had a combined age of just over 63 years, 11 months at 1977 Wimbledon
- In 2015, came within two wins of completing the calendar year Grand Slam, having won the Australian Open, Roland Garros and Wimbledon; I. Vinci in SF at US Open. Two women in Open Era had previously achieved the feat: Court (1970) and Graf (1988)

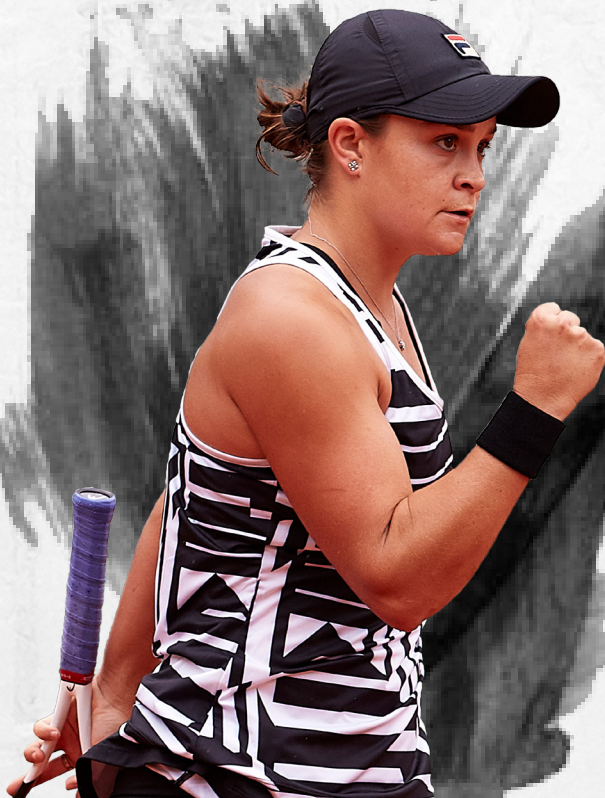

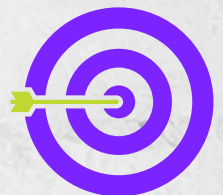

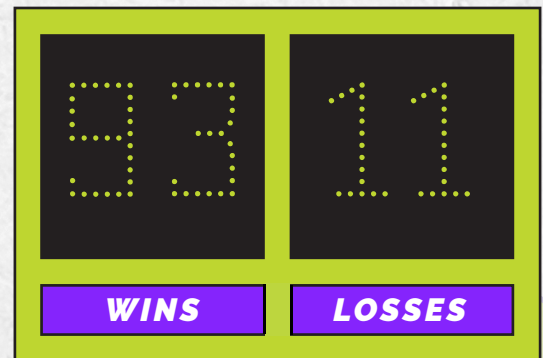

- Making 19th main draw appearance at Wimbledon. Among active players, only Venus has played Wimbledon more times who is making her 22nd appearance this fortnight
- Bidding to win her eighth Wimbledon singles title, having lifted the Venus Rosewater Dish in 2002-03, 2009-10, 2012, 2015-16; also a two-time runner-up here, in 2004, 2008 and 2018
- Currently tied with Stefanie Graf on seven Wimbledon titles; in the Open Era, only Martina Navratilova has won more (nine titles); pre-Open Era, Helen Wills-Moody won eight
- Six-time doubles champion here w/Venus in 2000, 2002, 2008-09, 2012 and 2016, and won mixed doubles w/Mirnyi in 1998; playing mixed doubles this fortnight w/A.Murray
- Is making Grand Slam appearance number 72 this fortnight – second on the Open Era list, behind only her sister V.Williams (83)
- Victory this fortnight would see her tie Australia's Margaret Court on 24 Grand Slam singles titles, the all-time record
- Winner of eight grass court titles – won gold medal at London 2012 Olympics in addition to Wimbledon crowns – the most among active players, followed by V.Williams (five) and Kvitova (four)
- Finished R-Up last year (I. Kerber). At 36 years and 291 days, was the third-oldest woman to reach a Slam final in the Open Era, after Navratilova (37 years, 258 days) at 1994 Wimbledon and V.Williams (37 years, 29 days) at 2017 Wimbledon
- Last year, was No.181 (entered under special ranking of No.1 and seeded No.25), became lowest-ranked and lowest-seeded woman to reach an Open Era Wimbledon final – previous lowest-ranked was World No.31 V. Williams (d. Bartoli in 2007 Wimbledon F) and lowest-seeded was No.23 Lisicki (l. No.15 Bartoli and No.23 V.Williams in 2007)
- This year, defeated qualifier Gatto-Monticone in 1r to improve Wimbledon record to 93-11 - third place on the all-time match wins list in the women's singles (behind Navratilova, 120-14, and Evert, 96-15)
- Win-loss record across all Slams is now 338-47 –the most wins in the Open Era (men or women)
- Faces another qualifier No.133 Juvan in 1r today; only losses to players ranked outside Top 100 at a major were to unranked Clijsters at 2009 US Open and No.111 Razzano at 2012 Roland Garros
- Has a perfect 22-0 record against qualifiers across the majors (including 1r win at 2019 Wimbledon), dropping only two sets, against Zvonareva at 2002 Roland Garros and Santangelo at 2008 Wimbledon
- Last loss to a teenager in Grand Slam play was at the hands of Stephens at 2013 Australian Open

WIMBLEDON

- Making Wimbledon debut (main draw or qualifying)
- Negotiated an arduous route through qualifying at Roehampton last week; broke to stay in the match before defeating Grammatikopoulou in first round, then recovered from 6-4 4-1 down to beat Eraydin 24 hours later
- The deepest run by a qualifier at Wimbledon in 2018 was Rodina's R16 effort. Best ever result by a qualifier here was Stevenson's SF showing in 1999

- Currently ranked No.133, 10 places off career-high (set on May 6, 2019); by contrast, this time last year was ranked No.261
- As a junior fell 1r in Wimbledon girls' singles in 2016 and 2017, although did bounce back to lift doubles title w/Danilovic the second year (d. McNally/Os-uigwe in F). Also won the Nike Junior International Roehampton on grass in 2017

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- A 23-time Grand Slam singles winner, ahead of Stefanie Graf (22) on Open Era leaderboard, and behind only Margaret Court (24) all time
- Her titles were won at Australian Open: 2003, 2005, 2007, 2009-10, 2015, 2017; Roland Garros: 2002, 2013, 2015; Wimbledon: 2002-03, 2009-10, 2012, 2015-16; US Open: 1999, 2002, 2008, 2012-14
- Owns a 23-8 record in Slam finals, with losses coming at 2001 US Open (l. V.Williams), 2004 Wimbledon (l. Sharapova), 2008 Wimbledon (l. V.Williams), 2011 US Open (l. Stosur), 2016 Australian Open (l. Kerber), 2016 Roland Garros (l. Muguruza), 2018 Wimbledon (l. Kerber) and 2018 US Open (l. Osaka)
- Aged 35y 125d at the end of 2017 Australian Open, is the oldest player to win a major in the Open Era
- Boasts the longest span of Grand Slam singles glory all-time. Pre-Open Era, Helen Wills Moody won her majors over the course of 15y 9.5m. Serena won her first Slam at 1999 US Open, 17y 6.5m before her 2017 Australian title. WTA legends Evert, Navratilova and Graf all won their Slams over a 12 year span
- The 2017 Australian Open final saw Serena and Venus have the oldest combined age of any Grand Slam final match-up in the Open Era (71 years, 351 days), beating the previous record set by Flavia Pennetta and Roberta Vinci (66 years, 19 days) at the 2015 US Open. Prior to that all-Italian final the record was held for nearly four decades by Virginia Wade and Betty Stove – who had a combined age of just over 63 years, 11 months at 1977 Wimbledon
- In 2015, came within two wins of completing the calendar year Grand Slam, having won the Australian Open, Roland Garros and Wimbledon; l. Vinci in SF at US Open. Two women in Open Era had previously achieved the feat: Court (1970) and Graf (1988)
- Has twice been in possession of all four majors for a "Serena Slam" (2002 Roland Garros to 2003 Australian Open and 2014 US Open to 2015 Wimbledon)

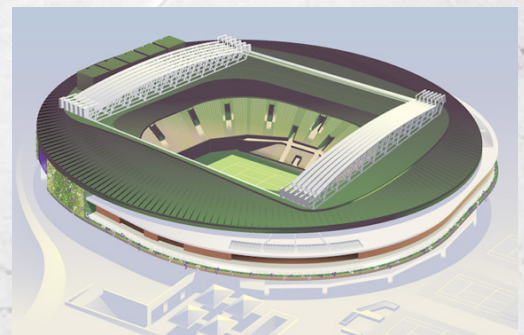

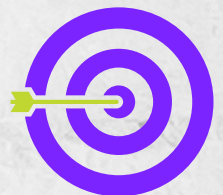

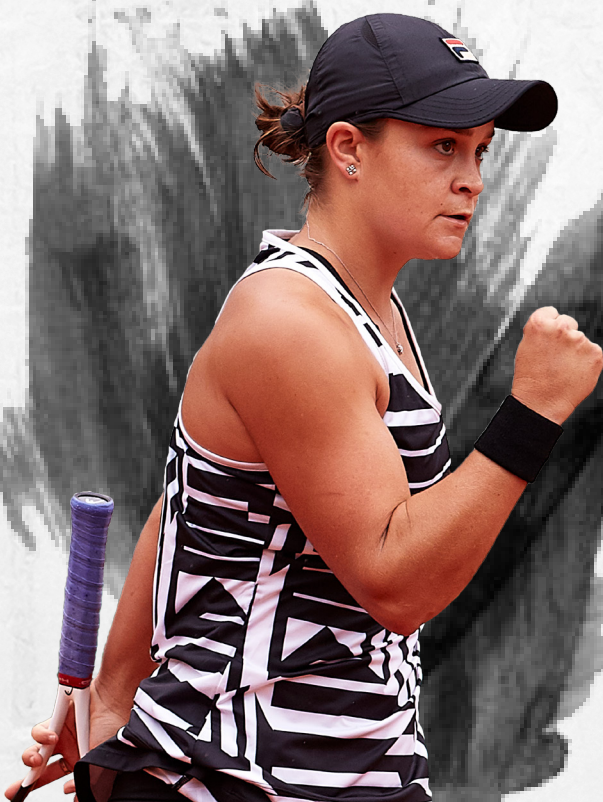

WIMBLEDON

- Making fourth main draw appearance at Wimbledon (seventh overall) and 20th across all Slams
- Achieved best result here in 2018 with 3r run (l. Kasatkina)
- Other results here were 2r exits in 2012 (l. Vinci) and 2017 (l. Svitolina). Fell in qualifying in 2013-14 and 2016
- Arrives at All England Club having won past two tournaments: Roland Garros and Birmingham
- Became the first Roland Garros champion to go on and win a grass court title in the same season since Henin in 2007 (Eastbourne)
- Rose to No.1 on June 24 after title run at Birmingham - only second Australian to do so (also Goolagong Cawley April 26-May 9, 1976)
- Enters Wimbledon as No.1 seed for first time in her career - played last years event on a ranking of No.17 and was seeded for the first time
- Win-loss record this year is 36-5 - the joint-best on tour (level with Ka.Pliskova who is on 36-9 after her 1r win here on Monday)
- Faces No.43 Zheng in today's 1r match; sole loss to a player outside Top 10 in 2019 came at hands of No.63 Mladenovic at Rome
- To date has gone 10-9 in 1r matches at Slams - will be looking to reach second week here at the All England Club for the first time
- Three players bidding to usurp her as No.1 after Wimbledon: Ka.Pliskova, Bertens and Kvitova
- Posted 10-3 record on grass last year including a title run in Nottingham (d. Konta)
- Won Wimbledon girls' singles title in 2011

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- Won first ever major title at 2019 Roland Garros becoming third Australian woman in the Open Era to win Roland Garros, joining Court (1969-70, 1973) and Goolagong Cawley (1971)
- Prior best result to date was QF showing at 2019 Australian Open (l. Kvitova) and R16 at 2018 US Open (l. Ka.Pliskova) and 2019 Roland Garros
- Has advanced to 3r on four occasions, at Wimbledon in 2018 (l. Kasatkina), Australian Open in 2017 (l. Barthel), and 2018 (l. Osaka), and US Open in 2017 (l. eventual champion Stephens). Made 2r at Roland Garros in 2013 (l. Kirilenko) and 2018 (l. S.Williams)
- First Slam main draw (2012 Australian Open) came from winning Tennis Australia's WC Play-Off
- Lifted maiden Grand Slam doubles trophy at 2018 US Open (w/Vandeweghe), defeating No.1 seeds Krejickova/Siniakova in SF and No.2 seeds Mladenovic/Babos in F

WIMBLEDON

- Making fifth main draw appearance at Wimbledon (seventh overall). Best result here was reaching 2r last year (d. Q.Wang, l. Halep) - fell in qualifying in 2012 and 2014
- Coming off the back of 1r exit at Eastbourne (l.Vondrousova)
- Faces No.1 Barty in today's 1r; lost only previous meeting with a World No.1 in 2r here 12 months ago
- Best career win came over No.2 Kerber at 2016 Doha
- Owns 11-8 career record against Australian opposition, including three defeats at the hands of Barty
- Career record in Grand Slam 1r matches stands at 5-12 (1-3 at Wimbledon)
- Best career result on grass was SF run at 2016 Nottingham
- No.13 seed in doubles this fortnight w/Duan
- At No.43, currently China's No.2 of four as it stands in the Top 100 (week of July 1, 2019)

- Advanced to three Grand Slam doubles finals in 2013 (Australian Open, Wimbledon, US Open) and was also R-Up at Roland Garros in 2017 (all w/Delacqua)
- Won 2011 Wimbledon girls' singles title

SEASON

- Coming off title run at Birmingham (d. Goerges in F)
- Before that won first ever Grand Slam title at Roland Garros taking her to World No.2 on June 10, 2019
- Made QF at Madrid (l. Halep), R16 at Rome (l. Mladenovic); withdrew from Strasbourg (right arm injury)
- Won biggest title of career at the time at 2019 Miami – run included three Top 10 wins, over No.8 Bertens (R16), No.2 Kvitova (QF) and No.7 Ka.Pliskova (F)
- Win over Kvitova at Miami was 200th of career (including ITF Circuit) and 100th at main draw level
- Made Top 10 rankings debut after Miami triumph (week of April 1) at No.9 (rose from No.11); became ninth Australian woman to crack the elite bracket
- Also became only player to currently rank in Top 10 in both singles and doubles – enters Roland Garros ranked No.8 in both disciplines
- Made R16 at Indian Wells (l. Svitolina in second longest match so far in 2019 – 3hr 12min)
- Led Australia to 3-2 away win over USA on Fed Cup duty in February, defeating Kenin and Keys in singles before teaming up with Hon to win decisive doubles rubber over Collins and Melichar
- Also won both singles rubbers in Fed Cup SF against Belarus in Brisbane (d. Sabalenka, Azarenka) as well as decisive doubles rubber (w/Stosur); Australia hosts France in November's final
- Posted 8-2 record on home soil in January, reaching QF at Australian Open and finishing R-Up at Sydney for second year in a row (l. Kvitova at both tournaments)
- Opened 2019 season at the Hopman Cup. Posted 2-1 singles record as home nation made group stage exit (d. Cornet, d. Muguruza, l. Kerber)

CAREER MILESTONES

- Posted career best season-finish in 2018, ending at No.15, winning titles at Nottingham and Zhuhai and reaching final on home soil at Sydney. Other 2018 highlights included SF runs at Montréal and Wuhan
- Won maiden Grand Slam doubles title at 2018 US Open (w/Vandeweghe) and picked up three other titles at Miami, Rome, and Montréal. Fell SF at WTA Finals (w/Vandeweghe)

- At WTA 125K Series events in 2018, won Zhengzhou (d. Y.Wang in F) and was R-Up at Anning (l. Khromacheva in F)
- Also won 11th ITF title in 2018 at \$100k ITF/Suzhou-CHN
- Registered only five tour-level wins in 2017, as injury ended her season prematurely; right knee injury forced her to miss all tournaments after 2017 US Open
- Highlights of 2016 season included SF run at Nottingham (d. Konta in 2r, l. Riske) and first Premier QF at Stanford (l. eventual champion Konta in 3s) and Doha, defeating No.2 Kerber in 2r; l. eventual runner-up Ostapenko
- In beating Kerber, became fourth Chinese woman to defeat a Top 2-ranked player, after Li Na (six wins), Zheng Jie (three wins) and Zhang Shuai (two wins)
- At Rio Olympics, reached 2r in singles (l. Kasatkina) and 2r in doubles (w/Xu, l. Errani/Vinci)
- In doubles, reached final at 2016 Shenzhen (w/Xu) and SF at 2016 Australian Open (w/Xu; l. Hlavackova/Hradecka). Was second SF at Australian Open – also 2013 (w/Lepchenko)
- Won first WTA Premier doubles title at 2015 Stanford (w/Xu); now owns four tour-level doubles titles, having also won at 2011 Guangzhou (w/Hsieh), 2015 Tianjin (w/Xu) and 2019 Acapulco (w/Azarenka)

- Making seventh main draw appearance at Wimbledon (eighth overall)
- Achieved best result last year by advancing to QF (l. Georges); previous best result at All England Club was 3r run in 2016 (l. Halep)
- Second time in career entering a Grand Slam as a Top 5 seed - played in Paris earlier this year as No.4 seed
- Coming off SF run at Eastbourne (l. eventual champion Ka.Pliskova)
- Faces No.98 Minella in 1r; a loss would be her worst, in terms of ranking, since falling to No.137 Gasparyan in October 2018 at Linz
- Is tied with Garcia and Ka.Pliskova for most wins on grass this season with 7-2 record, including final run at 's-Hertogenbosch
- Entering 2019 Wimbledon, has won 72.3% of her first service points - the second-best on tour behind Ka.Pliskova (73.5%)
- Leads tour in aces with 303 - Ka.Pliskova close behind with 299
- Improved to 6-1 vs. Top 10 players after defeating No.10 Sabalenka in QF at Eastbourne. Tied with Barty for second most wins against such players this season, only behind Bencic with eight
- Currently at No.5 position on the Porsche Race to Shenzhen - top eight players of 2019 qualify for the season finale at the WTA Finals Shenzhen

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- Best result across the Slams came with SF run at 2016 Roland Garros (l. eventual R-Up S.Williams)
- Enjoyed her best result at Wimbledon in 2018 by reaching her second career Grand Slam QF (l. Goerges). Became first Dutch woman to reach QF at Wimbledon since Krajicek in 2007
- In 2018 reached 3r for first time at both Australian Open (l. eventual champion Wozniacki) and US Open (l. Vondrousova)
- Is a two-time Grand Slam quarterfinalist in doubles, at 2015 Australian Open (w/Larsson, l. Goerges/Groenefeld) and 2016 Roland Garros (w/Larsson, l. eventual champions Garcia/Mladenovic)

SEASON

- Coming off SF appearance at Eastbourne (l. eventual champion Ka.Pliskova)
- Recorded a final run on home soil in 's-Hertogenbosch, could not convert five championship points in loss to Riske
- At Roland Garros, retired from 2r match against Kuzmova due to gastrointestinal illness

WIMBLEDON

- Making fifth main draw appearance at Wimbledon (ninth overall)
- First time contesting at the All England Club since playing in 2017 while four months pregnant with her daughter, revealing her pregnancy after a 1r exit to Schiavone
- Achieved best result by advancing through three rounds of qualifying to reach 2r in 2016 (l. Stephens)
- Coming off 1r exit in Eastbourne (l. Jabeur)
- Squares off against No.4 Bertens for the third time in today's 1r action, defeating the Dutch player in their first career meeting over a decade ago at 2008 Alkmaar before falling to her at 2010 Bucharest
- A win today would mark her first career victory over a Top 20 player, previously 0-15; in terms of ranking, best career win came over No.25 Garcia at 2017 Taipei City
- Sole woman from Luxembourg in this year's main draw

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- 2019 Wimbledon marks 19th time contesting a Grand Slam main draw
- In 2010, advanced to 3r at US Open in her main draw debut at a major (as qualifier, l. V.Williams) – remains equal-best result at a Grand Slam (also 2012 US Open)
- Has made 2r at Australian Open in 2014 and 2017, Roland Garros in 2019 and Wimbledon in 2016

SEASON

WIMBLEDON

- Making 19th main draw appearance at Wimbledon. Among active players, only Venus has played Wimbledon more often (she is making her 22nd appearance this fortnight)
- Bidding to win her eighth Wimbledon singles title, having lifted the Venus Rosewater Dish in 2002-03, 2009-10, 2012, 2015-16; also a two-time runner-up here, in 2004, 2008 and 2018
- Currently tied with Stefanie Graf on seven Wimbledon titles; in the Open Era, only Martina Navratilova has won more (nine titles); pre-Open Era, Helen Wills-Moody won eight
- Six-time doubles champion here w/Venus in 2000, 2002, 2008-09, 2012 and 2016. Also won mixed doubles w/Mirnyi in 1998
- Is making Grand Slam appearance number 72 this fortnight – second on the Open Era list, behind only her sister V.Williams (83)
- Victory this fortnight would see her tie Australia's Margaret Court on 24 Grand Slam singles titles, the all-time record
- Winner of eight grass court titles – won gold medal at London 2012 Olympics in addition to Wimbledon crowns – the most among active players, followed by V.Williams (five) and Kvitova (four)
- During last year's R-Up finish improved Wimbledon record to 92-11, overtaking sister Venus in third place on the all-time match wins list in the women's singles (behind Navratilova, 120-14, and Evert, 96-15)
- At 36 years and 291 days, was the third-oldest woman to reach a Slam final in the Open Era, after Navratilova (37 years, 258 days) at 1994 Wimbledon and V.Williams (37 years, 29 days) at 2017 Wimbledon
- Last year, was No.181 (entered under special ranking of No.1 and seeded No.25), became lowest-ranked and lowest-seeded woman to reach an Open Era Wimbledon final – previous lowest-ranked was World No.31 V. Williams (d. Bartoli in 2007 Wimbledon F) and lowest-seeded was No.23 Lisicki (l. No.15 Bartoli in F) and No.23 V.Williams in 2007
- Entering this year's tournament, win-loss record across all Slams stands at 337-47 –the most wins in the Open Era (men or women)
- Faces No.161 Gatto-Monticone in 1r today; only losses to players ranked outside Top 100 at a major were to unranked Clijsters at 2009 US Open and No.111 Razzano at 2012 Roland Garros
- Defeat to Razzano was also her only 1r defeat at this level; overall 1r Grand Slam record stands at 70-1
- Serena's 101-13 record on grass reigns supreme over all other active players on tour, followed by V.Williams (94-20) and Sharapova (80-19)
- Bidding to become the fourth mother to win a major singles titles in the Open Era, following Margaret Court, Evonne Goolagong Cawley and Kim Clijsters



WIMBLEDON

- Making Wimbledon debut (main draw or qualifying)
- Came through qualifying at Roehampton last week, recovering from 6-3 4-1 down to beat former No.46 Dodin in the final round
- The deepest run by a qualifier at Wimbledon in 2018 was Rodina's run to R16. Best ever result by a qualifier here was Stevenson's SF showing in 1999
- Faces No.10 S.Williams in 1r today; only previous match against a Top 20 player was 7-6(6) 6-3 loss to No.11 Vinci at 2013 Palermo
- This is one of six matches between thirtysomethings in 1r (also Suarez Navarro-Stosur, Sharapova-Parmentier, Maria-Kerber, Strycova-Tsurenko and Petkovic-Niculescu); there are 24 players aged 30 or over in this year's draw
- In terms of ranking, best career win came over No.102 Jakupovic in qualifying at 2019 Stuttgart
- Has won only one tour-level main draw match in her career, reaching 2r at 2014 Kuala Lumpur (d. Jabeur, l. Diyas). At this level, also fell 1r at Palermo in 2013, and Lugano, Stuttgart and Roland Garros in 2019

- A 23-time Grand Slam singles winner, ahead of Stefanie Graf (22) on Open Era leaderboard, and behind only Margaret Court (24) all time
- Her titles were won at Australian Open: 2003, 2005, 2007, 2009-10, 2015, 2017; Roland Garros: 2002, 2013, 2015; Wimbledon: 2002-03, 2009-10, 2012, 2015-16; US Open: 1999, 2002, 2008, 2012-14
- Owns a 23-8 record in Slam finals, with losses coming at 2001 US Open (l. V. Williams), 2004 Wimbledon (l. Sharapova), 2008 Wimbledon (l. V. Williams), 2011 US Open (l. Stosur), 2016 Australian Open (l. Kerber), 2016 Roland Garros (l. Muguruza), 2018 Wimbledon (l. Kerber) and 2018 US Open (l. Osaka)
- Aged 35y 125d at the end of 2017 Australian Open, is the oldest player to win a major in the Open Era
- Boasts the longest span of Grand Slam singles glory all-time. Pre-Open Era, Helen Wills Moody won her majors over the course of 15y 9.5m. Serena won her first Slam at 1999 US Open, 17y 6.5m before her 2017 Australian title. WTA legends Evert, Navratilova and Graf all won their Slams over a 12 year span
- The 2017 Australian Open final saw Serena and Venus have the oldest combined age of any Grand Slam final match-up in the Open Era (71 years, 351 days), beating the previous record set by Flavia Pennetta and Roberta Vinci (66 years, 19 days) at the 2015 US Open. Prior to that all-Italian final the record was held for nearly four decades by Virginia Wade and Betty Stove – who had a combined age of just over 63 years, 11 months at 1977 Wimbledon
- In 2015, came within two wins of completing the calendar year Grand Slam, having won the Australian Open, Roland Garros and Wimbledon; l. Vinci in SF at US Open. Two women in Open Era had previously achieved the feat: Court (1970) and Graf (1988)
- Has twice been in possession of all four majors for a “Serena Slam” (2002 Roland Garros to 2003 Australian Open and 2014 US Open to 2015 Wimbledon)
- Has won 14 Grand Slam doubles titles, all with sister Venus – most recently at 2016 Wimbledon (d. Babos/Shvedova in F). Also won mixed doubles titles at 1998 Wimbledon and 1998 US Open (both w/Mirnyi)

- Overcame World No.1 Halep in R16 – was first time facing the reigning World No.1 since 2013 Doha (l. Azarenka in F) and was first win since 2013 Brisbane (d. Azarenka in SF). Aged 37, is the oldest player to defeat the reigning World No.1, bettering sister Venus's win vs. Kerber aged 36 at 2017 Miami

- Making 15th appearance at Wimbledon, where she was champion in 2004 to lift her career first Grand Slam title (d. S.Williams in F); only Russian in women's history to win the title here
- One of six former champions in this year's draw - also Kerber (2018), Muguruza (2017), Kvitova (2011, 2014), S.Williams (2002-03, 2009-10, 2012, 2015-16) and V.Williams (2000-01, 2005, 2007-08)
- In 2004, became first woman not seeded in the Top 8 to win the Wimbledon title since seeding began in 1927

- Holds three career grass court titles (2004 Birmingham and Wimbledon, and 2005 Birmingham). Among active players, only three players own more - S.Williams (8), V.Williams (5) and Kvitova (4)
- Is the last woman to lift the Wimbledon trophy after winning one of the pre-Wimbledon grass events (2004 Birmingham)
- One of 11 former World No.1s to begin the draw in London - also Azarenka, Barty, Halep, Kerber, Muguruza, Osaka, Ka.Pliskova, S.Williams, V.Williams and Wozniacki
- One of 24 thirtysomethings entered in this year's main draw
- One of 11 Russians competing this fortnight

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- 2019 Wimbledon marks 56th main draw appearance at a Grand Slam, the fifth-most among active players

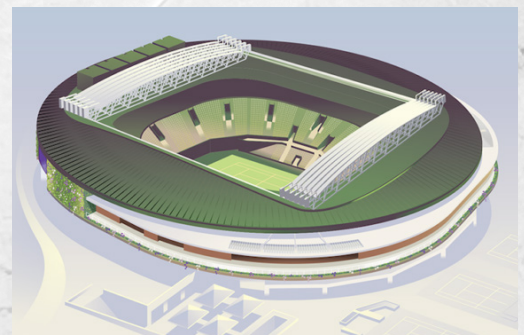

RAISING THE ROOF

- The No.1 Court Project, a collaboration between the AELTC and lead contractor Sir Robert McAlpine, took **two years** to design, **three years** to construct, and was completed on time and on budget

- Making 22nd appearance at Wimbledon (most among active players); at 39 years of age, is the oldest woman of 24 thirtysomethings in the starting field at this year's Championships
- Five-time champion at the All England Club, winning in 2000 (d. Davenport in F), 2001 (d. Henin in F), 2005 (d. Davenport in F), 2007 (d. Bartoli in F) and 2008 (d. S. Williams in F). Only Navratilova (9), Graf (7) and S. Williams (7) have won the title more times
- In addition, finished R-Up in 2002, 2003, 2009 and 2017 and is a six-time doubles champion (all w/S. Williams)
- By reaching the final in 2017 (l. Muguruza) aged 37 years and 29 days, became the oldest woman to advance to the final at the All England Club since 1994 (Martina Navratilova, R-Up at 37 years, 258 days old)
- Has contested most main draw matches at the All England Club among active players – owns 89-16 win-loss record, ahead of Serena's 92-11; in Open Era, only Navratilova (120-14) and Evert (96-15) played more matches here
- Seeking 90th career victory at Wimbledon today as she takes on Gauff in 1r
- Is 24 years older than Gauff, her opponent today. This marks the biggest age gap in Grand Slam play since 43-year-old Kimiko Date lost to 16-year-old Bencic (27 years younger) in 1r at 2014 Australian Open; at Wimbledon the last time there was a 24-year age gap came in 2013, when Date, 42, beat Witthoef, 18
- Holds a 71-11 record in Grand Slam 1r matches, including an impressive 19-2 at Wimbledon
- Bidding for 50th career title this fortnight. Lifted last trophy at 2016 Kaohsiung (d. Doi in F)
- Sits in second place among active players for grass court titles with five, behind Serena (eight) and ahead of Kvitova (four)

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- 2019 Wimbledon marks 83rd Grand Slam main draw appearance, the most in the Open Era
- Is a seven-time Grand Slam singles champion, winning Wimbledon five times: 2000-01 2005 and 2007-08. Also won US Open in 2000 (d. Davenport in F) and 2001 (d. S. Williams in F)
- In addition, a nine-time Grand Slam R-Up across all four majors: Wimbledon (2002-03, 2009 and 2017), US Open (1997, 2002), Roland Garros (2002) and Australian Open (2003, 2017)
- The span between her maiden Grand Slam final at the US Open in 1997 and 2017 Wimbledon is the longest in Open Era history, followed by Navratilova 1975-94

- Reached two other finals in 2017, at Australian Open (I. S. Williams) and Wimbledon (I. Muguruza) – only player in 2017 to reach two Grand Slam finals
