TOURNAMENT TALKING POINTS

- Two-time champion **Julia Goerges** returns as No.4 seed to defend the title she won against Bianca Andreescu 12 months ago. Including her current 10-match winning streak at the tournament, the German has won 25 matches in Auckland more than any other player in the tournament's history
- Saturday's draw also paired top seed **Serena Williams** with fellow major winner **Svetlana Kuznetsova**. The two have faced each other 13 times, with the American leading the head-to-head 10-3
- Also in the draw is former World No.1 **Caroline Wozniacki**, who is playing the penultimate event of her career before retiring after the Australian Open. The Dane will open her tournament against wildcard **Paige Mary Hourigan**
- No.2 seed **Petra Martic**, who won a career-best 35 main draw matches to end last season at No.15, will open the new campaign against **Alison Van Uytvanck**
- One to Watch Coco Gauff. The 15-year-old American is coming off a breakthrough year and most recently won her first WTA title in Linz. Having also reached the fourth round at Wimbledon, Gauff ended 2019 ranked No.68 the youngest player inside the Top 100

S.WILLIAMS:

- Contesting ASB Classic for the second time. On her previous visit in 2017, she beat Parmentier in 1r before being upset by No.72 Brengle in 2r
- However, 24 days after her upset at the hands of Brengle in 2017, she lifted her 23rd and most recent Grand Slam title, at the Australian Open (d. V.Williams)
- Last season, Hopman Cup (3-0 singles record as US made round robin exit) was the only event she contested in the lead up to the Australian Open (I. Ka.Pliskova in QF after holding 4mp)
- Highlight of 2019 season were her 32nd and 33rd Grand Slam finals, at Wimbledon (I. Halep) and US Open (I. Andreescu)
- At 37 years and 347 days for New York final, is the oldest Grand Slam finalist in the Open Era
- Record in Slam finals stands at 23-10. Chasing Margaret Court's record of 24 Grand Slam singles titles, the all-time record
- By making US Open final, owns the largest gap between first Grand Slam final appearance and most recent final appearance at 19 yrs, 362 days (d. Hingis in 1999 US Open) previously held by V.Williams at 19 yrs, 312 days (l. Hingis in 1997 US Open, l. Muguruza in 2017 Wimbledon)
- Reached a further final last year at Toronto (ret. vs. Andreescu w/back injury) overall record in final stands at 72-25
- With 72 career singles titles, ranks fifth on the Open Era list of most titles, after Martina Navratilova (167), Chris Evert (154), Steffi Graf (107) and Margaret Court (92)
- All three finals in 2019 Wimbledon, Toronto and US Open came in consecutive tournaments
- Ended 2019 ranked No.10, her first year-end finish inside the elite ranking bracket since 2016 (at No.2)
- Other highlights last season were reaching QF at Australian Open and partnering with Andy Murray to contest Mixed Doubles at Wimbledon (reaching 3r)
- Defeated World No.1 Halep in R16 at Australian Open at 37 years, is oldest player to defeat the reigning World No.1
- Reached two Grand Slam finals in 2018, at Wimbledon (I. Kerber) and US Open (I. Osaka). Made return to Tour following birth of daughter Olympia at 2018 Indian Wells.
- Aged 35y 125d at the conclusion of 2017 Australian Open, is the oldest player to win a Grand Slam title in the Open Era (d. V.Williams in F). Has won 10 Grand Slam titles as a 30-something
- Boasts the longest span of Grand Slam singles glory all-time. Pre-Open Era, Helen Wills Moody won her majors over the course of 15y 9.5m. Serena won her first Slam at 1999 US Open, some 17y 6.5m before her 2017 Australian title.
 WTA legends Evert, Navratilova and Graf all won their Slams over a 12-year span
- The 2017 Australian Open final saw Serena and Venus have the oldest combined age of any Grand Slam final match-up in the Open Era (71 years, 351 days), beating the previous record set by Flavia Pennetta and Roberta Vinci (66 years, 19 days) at the 2015 US Open. Prior to that all-Italian final the record was held for nearly four decades by Virginia Wade and Betty Stove who had a combined age of just over 63 years, 11 months at 1977 Wimbledon In the Open Era, Williams' 11-year gap between Roland Garros titles in 2002 and 2013 (without winning another Roland Garros title during that time) is the longest gap for a woman at any Grand Slam

- Has twice been in possession of all four majors for a "Serena Slam" (2002 Roland Garros to 2003 Australian Open and 2014 US Open to 2015 Wimbledon)
- Has won 14 Grand Slam doubles titles, all with sister Venus most recently at 2016 Wimbledon (d. Babos/ Shvedova in F). Also won mixed doubles titles at 1998 Wimbledon and 1998 US Open (both w/Mirnyi)
- The sisters held all four Grand Slam titles at same time, from 2009 Wimbledon through 2010 Roland Garros third pair to do so (also Navratilova/Shriver and Fernandez/Zvereva). Also teamed with Venus to win three Olympic gold medals: 2000 Sydney, 2008 Beijing and 2012 London
- Ended 2017 ranked No.22, despite playing only two events all season, and both in January. Broke streak of 10 consecutive Top 20 finishes. Overall, has 16 Top 10 finishes to her name (most recently in 2019) third-most behind Navratilova (20) and Evert (19) including five as the year-end No.1
- Holds distinction of being the oldest No.1 in WTA history set record when most recent streak began on February 18, 2013. Spent her 319th week at No.1 in May 2017. Third on all-time list after Graf's 377 and Navratilova's 332
- Held the top ranking for 186 consecutive weeks (through 2016 US Open) which equaled the record held by Graf (186 weeks, August 17, 1986 through March 10, 1991)
- Has registered 17 career wins over (eight different) No.1 ranked players, second-most behind Navratilova (18)
- Among active players, owns the most titles on clay (13), hard (46) and grass (8)
- Singles gold medalist at London 2012 Olympics, and doubles gold medalist at 2000 Sydney, 2008 Beijing and 2012 London (all w/V.Williams)
- Spent eight weeks as co-No.1 in doubles (w/V. Williams); one of six players to hold No.1 in singles and doubles simultaneously (also Navratilova, Hingis, Sánchez Vicario, Davenport and Clijsters)
- Holds single-season prize money record of \$12,385,572, achieved in 2013
- Gave birth to daughter Alexis Olympia Ohanian Jr. on September 1, 2017
- Married Reddit co-founder Alexis Ohanian in November 2017 in New Orleans
- Recently launched her own clothing line, 'Serena'

GIORGI:

- Contesting ASB Classic for the first time, having come through three rounds of qualifying the first time she has contested qualifying since 2018 New Haven
- Faces No.10 S.Williams today; her most recent Top 10 win came over No.2 Wozniacki at 2018 Tokyo [PPO]
- During last year's Australian swing, reached 2r at Sydney (I. Kerber) and 3r at Australian Open (I. Ka.Pliskova)
- Highlight of 2019 season were R-Up finishes at Washington DC (I. Pegula) and the Bronx (I. Linette), and QF run at Osaka (I. Mertens)
- Ended 2018 season perched at a career-best ranking of No.26, winning second career title in final event at Linz (d. Alexandrova in F). Won 29 tour-level matches in 2018 the most wins she had previously posted in a single season was 28, in 2014

- Advanced to first Grand Slam QF at 2018 Wimbledon (I. eventual R-Up S.Williams) on her 26th appearance at this level; became the first Italian woman to reach the QF of Wimbledon since 2009 (Schiavone, I. Dementieva)
- Posted sixth consecutive Top 100 season, finishing 2017 ranked No.79 (up from No.83 in 2017). Made SF at Shenzhen
 (I. Riske) and QF at Biel (I. Sasnovich), Prague (I. Barthel) and Birmingham (I. Barty)
- In 2016 reached final at Katowice for the third year in a row (I. Cibulkova). Appeared in four additional quarterfinals in 2016, at Hobart (I. Bouchard), Prague (I. Ka.Pliskova), Washington, DC (I. Davis) and Seoul (I. Zhang)
- Won first career title at 2015 's-Hertogenbosch (d. Bencic in F). Has 2-6 record in finals, having also won 2018 Linz (d. Alexandrova in F) and been R-Up at 2014 Linz (l. Ka.Pliskova held match points), Katowice in 2014 (l. Cornet held match points), 2015 (l. Schmiedlova) and 2016, 2019 Washington DC (l. Pegula) and 2019 the Bronx (l. Linette)
- Finished 2015 season with then best year-end ranking (No.34), up one place from No.35 in 2014. Season highlighted by winning her first WTA singles title at 's-Hertogenbosch (d. Bencic in F)
- Had never reached WTA QF prior to 2014; reached QF or better at seven events during that season
- Made Top 100 debut on July 9, 2012 and broke into Top 50 on May 26, 2014. Career-high ranking is No.26 (October 22, 2018)
- Tour-level main draw debut came as a qualifier at 2011 Wimbledon
- On ITF Circuit, winner of five singles titles
- Played first career professional tournament at 2006 ITF/Baku-AZE

WOZNIACKI:

- Contesting ASB Classic for the seventh time; is a two time runner-up, having made the final as top seed in 2015 (l. V.Williams) and 2018 (l. Goerges)
- Followed up R-Up finish in 2018 by lifting sole Grand Slam title at Australian Open
- Auckland is the penultimate event of her career, having announced during the off-season that she will retire after the upcoming Australian Open
- Faces No.447 Hourigan in 1r today; last lost to a player outside Top 200 came against No.864 Kremer at 2009 Luxembourg
- Ended 2019 ranked No.38 her first non-Top 20 finish since 2007 having announced rheumatoid arthritis diagnosis at WTA Finals in October 2018
- Season highlight in 2019 was reaching final at Charleston (I. Keys) and SF at Beijing, where she was the defending champion (I. Osaka)
- With 30 singles titles, sits fourth among active players, behind S.Williams, V.Williams and Sharapova). Until 2019, had won at least one title in 11 straight seasons (since 2008), including six titles in both 2010 and 2011
- Highlight of 2018 was winning her first Grand Slam title (d. Halep in F) and reclaiming the World No.1 ranking at Australian Open becoming just the fourth player all-time (also, Navratilova, Ivanovic and Azarenka) to simultaneously win her maiden major title and ascend to No.1; saved 2mp (in 2r vs. Fett) en route to title
- Season highlight in 2017 was winning biggest title of career to that point at 2017 WTA Finals Singapore (d. V.Williams in F)
- Scored three wins over No.1-ranked players in 2017, against Ka.Pliskova (Toronto), Muguruza (Tokyo [PPO]) and Halep (Singapore). Had never previously secured victory over the top-ranked player in her career; lifetime record now stands at 4-6 vs. No.1 players (also beat Halep at 2018 Australian Open)
- In addition to 2018 Australian Open triumph, is also a two-time Grand Slam runner-up, losing the title match at the US Open in 2009 (I. Clijsters) and 2014 (I. S.Williams). Became first Danish player to reach a Grand Slam final since Kurt Nielsen at 1955 Wimbledon
- Made Grand Slam debut at 2007 Roland Garros (l. Dechy in 1r). Would go on to play 36 consecutive majors until streak was snapped by withdrawal from 2016 Roland Garros (w/right ankle injury)
- Won first WTA title at 2008 Stockholm, the first title won by a Danish woman
- Denmark's flag bearer at 2016 Rio Olympics
- Rose to No.1 on October 11, 2010 and held No.1 ranking for total of 67 weeks; returned to No.1 on January 29, 2018 after Australian Open title for the first time in six years, marking the longest gap between stints at the top spot since the computer rankings were introduced in November 1975 (6 years, 0 days)





HOURIGAN:

- Playing in the main draw at the ASB Classic for the first time, having fallen in qualifying on five previous occasions
- One of three wildcards in this year's draw (also Ivanov and Bouchard); best result by a wildcard here were title runs by Bradtke in 1995 and Wickmayer in 2010
- At Auckland in 2019 fell in qualifying in singles before bouncing back to reach doubles final (w/Townsend, I. Bouchard/Kenin)
- Faces No.39 Wozniacki today in first match against a Top 100 player and first in the main draw of a WTA event
- Finished 2019 season at No.431after posting a 28-22 record; on ITF Circuit won title at \$15k Cancun-MEX and reached two further SFs
- Reached career-high ranking of No.408 on August 5, 2019
- In terms of ranking, best career win came over No.289 Arconada during SF run at \$25K Fort Worth, TX-USA in 2018
- Overall, owns two singles titles and eight doubles titles on ITF Circuit
- Member of New Zealand Fed Cup team in 2017 and 2019
- Made professional debut at ASB Classic in 2013, falling at the first hurdle in qualifying
- Contested the girls' singles at the Australian Open in 2013
- Was born in Turakina in the North Island, and is of part Māori descent

- Contesting ASB Classic for the second time. On her previous visit in 2017, she beat Parmentier in 1r before being upset by No.72 Brengle in 2r
- However, 24 days after her upset at the hands of Brengle in 2017, she lifted her 23rd and most recent Grand Slam title, at the Australian Open (d. V.Williams)
- Last season, Hopman Cup (3-0 singles record as US made round robin exit) was the only event she contested in the lead up to the Australian Open (I. Ka.Pliskova in QF after holding 4mp)



- Defeated World No.1 Halep in R16 at Australian Open at 37 years, is oldest player to defeat the reigning World No.1
- Reached two Grand Slam finals in 2018, at Wimbledon (I. Kerber) and US Open (I. Osaka). Made return to Tour following birth of daughter Olympia at 2018 Indian Wells.
- Aged 35y 125d at the conclusion of 2017 Australian Open, is the oldest player to win a Grand Slam title in the Open Era (d. V.Williams in F). Has won 10 Grand Slam titles as a 30-something

- Making sixth main draw appearance at ASB Classic, where she is bidding to reach QF for the first time
- Takes on S.Williams today looking to record back-to-back victories at a WTA tournament for the first time since defeated Pavlyuchenkova and Sakkari at Indian Wells in March 2019 (I. V.Williams)
- Ended 2019 season ranked No.85 her eighth Top 100 season in the past nine years with the highlights of her campaign a fourth ITF Circuit title at \$80K Cagnes-sur-Mer-FRA and a 3r run at Indian Wells
- 2018 highlight was 3r showing at Miami (d. No.24 Strycova in 2r, l. Muguruza)
- In 2017 posted SF runs at Acapulco and Tokyo [Japan Open] and QF at Tianjin

- Contesting ASB Classic for the first time, where she is the youngest player in the starting field
- Hit 15 winners including four aces during straight sets 1r win on Monday; also through to doubles SF this week w/McNally
- Faces Siegemund the second oldest player left in the draw today; bidding to reach second career QF at tour level, having also reached that stage during title run at 2019 Linz
- Made breakthrough on pro tour in 2019, winning main draw debut at Miami (d. McNally) prior to making Cinderella run through qualifying to R16 at Wimbledon
- Became first 15-year-old to reach R16 at Wimbledon and also appear on Centre Court since Hingis in 1996.
 Defeated idol Venus Williams in 1r to become youngest player (15y, 123d at end of event) to win main draw match at Wimbledon since Capriati (15y, 100d) reached SF in 1991; and youngest at all Slams since Kournikova (15y, 93d) advanced to R16 at 1996 US Open

- Standout results of 2019 season were SF run at Bucharest (I. Tig) and QF showings at Hiroshima (I. Kudermetova) and Luxembourg (I. Rybakina). Meanwhile, in doubles lifted fifth career WTA title, at Guangzhou (w/Peng)
- Returned to Top 100 for first time in 12 months on April 8, 2019 (after reaching 2r at Charleston)
- Made comeback from long-term knee injury in 2018; best performances at tour level were QF runs at Bucharest and Moscow [River Cup], while reached three finals on the ITF Circuit, including a title run at \$25K Bad Saulgau-GER
- Promising 2017 season ended by serious right knee injury, sustained at Nürnberg in May (ret. vs. Krejcikova)

- Also in 2016 reached maiden WTA final as qualifier at 2016 Stuttgart (as qualifi er, l. Kerber). Made SF at Bucharest (l. Sevastova) on clay, before advancing to QF at Rio Olympics (l. eventual gold medalist Puig) and 3r at the US Open (l. V.Williams)
- Has twice reached 3r at a Grand Slam, at 2016 Australian Open (I. Beck) and 2016 US Open (I. V.Williams)



- Faces Cornet today for a spot in the SF, last played the Frenchwoman at 2019 US Open falling in straight sets
- Finished 2019 at No.76 for her first ever career Top 100 finish, up from No.125 in 2018
- Won her first WTA title at 2019 Citi Open in Washington DC (d. Giorgi in F) to reach her career high ranking of No.
 55
- Also in 2019, made main draw debut at Roland Garros (I. eventual champion Barty in 1r) and Wimbledon (I. Buzarnescu in 1r) as well as Miami Open as a qualifier (I. Konta in 1r)
- Highlights of 2018 included finishing runner-up as a qualifier at Quebec City (I. Parmentier in F), recording SF finish at Houston 125K (I. S.Peng) and reaching QF or better at 10 ITF events
- Won doubles title w/Manasse at 2018 Houston 125K (d. Krawczyk/Olmos in F)

- Contesting ASB Classic for the second time. On her previous visit in 2017, she beat Parmentier in 1r before being upset by No.72 Brengle in 2r
- However, 24 days after her upset at the hands of Brengle in 2017, she lifted her 23rd and most recent Grand Slam title, at the Australian Open (d. V.Williams)
- Last season, Hopman Cup (3-0 singles record as US made round robin exit) was the only event she contested in the lead up to the Australian Open (I. Ka.Pliskova in QF after holding 4mp)
- Beat Giorgi in 1r on Tuesday has now won all five matches against the Italian
- Defeated McHale in 2r came back from a set down for the third time in the pair's four career meetings
- Faces Siegemund in QF- leads head to head 1-0 after beating her in straight sets at 2016 Indian Wells
- Highlights of 2019 season were her 32nd and 33rd Grand Slam finals, at Wimbledon (I. Halep) and US Open (I. Andreescu)
- At 37 years and 347 days for New York final, is the oldest Grand Slam finalist in the Open Era
- Record in Slam finals stands at 23-10. Chasing Margaret Court's record of 24 Grand Slam singles titles, the all-time record
- By making US Open final, owns the largest gap between first Grand Slam final appearance and most recent final appearance at 19 yrs, 362 days (d. Hingis in 1999 US Open) previously held by V.Williams at 19 yrs, 312 days (l. Hingis in 1997 US Open, l. Muguruza in 2017 Wimbledon)
- Reached a further final last year at Toronto (ret. vs. Andreescu w/back injury) overall record in final stands at 72-25
- With 72 career singles titles, ranks fifth on the Open Era list of most titles, after Martina Navratilova (167), Chris Evert (154), Steffi Graf (107) and Margaret Court (92)
- All three finals in 2019 Wimbledon, Toronto and US Open came in consecutive tournaments
- Ended 2019 ranked No.10, her first year-end finish inside the elite ranking bracket since 2016 (at No.2)
- Other highlights last season were reaching QF at Australian Open and partnering with Andy Murray to contest Mixed Doubles at Wimbledon (reaching 3r)
- Defeated World No.1 Halep in R16 at Australian Open at 37 years, is oldest player to defeat the reigning World No.1



- Reached two Grand Slam finals in 2018, at Wimbledon (I. Kerber) and US Open (I. Osaka). Made return to Tour following birth of daughter Olympia at 2018 Indian Wells.
- Aged 35y 125d at the conclusion of 2017 Australian Open, is the oldest player to win a Grand Slam title in the Open Era (d. V.Williams in F). Has won 10 Grand Slam titles as a 30-something
- Boasts the longest span of Grand Slam singles glory all-time. Pre-Open Era, Helen Wills Moody won her majors over the course of 15y 9.5m. Serena won her first Slam at 1999 US Open, some 17y 6.5m before her 2017 Australian title. WTA legends Evert, Navratilova and Graf all won their Slams over a 12-year span
- The 2017 Australian Open final saw Serena and Venus have the oldest combined age of any Grand Slam final match-up in the Open Era (71 years, 351 days), beating the previous record set by Flavia Pennetta and Roberta Vinci (66 years, 19 days) at the 2015 US Open. Prior to that all-Italian final the record was held for nearly four decades by Virginia Wade and Betty Stove – who had a combined age of just over 63 years, 11 months at 1977 Wimbledon • In the Open Era, Williams' 11-year gap between Roland Garros titles in 2002 and 2013 (without winning another Roland Garros title during that time) is the longest gap for a woman at any Grand Slam
- Has twice been in possession of all four majors for a "Serena Slam" (2002 Roland Garros to 2003 Australian Open and 2014 US Open to 2015 Wimbledon)
- Has won 14 Grand Slam doubles titles, all with sister Venus most recently at 2016 Wimbledon (d. Babos/ Shvedova in F).
 Also won mixed doubles titles at 1998 Wimbledon and 1998 US Open (both w/Mirnyi)
- The sisters held all four Grand Slam titles at same time, from 2009 Wimbledon through 2010 Roland Garros third pair to do so (also Navratilova/Shriver and Fernandez/Zvereva). Also teamed with Venus to win three Olympic gold medals: 2000 Sydney, 2008 Beijing and 2012 London
- Ended 2017 ranked No.22, despite playing only two events all season, and both in January. Broke streak of 10 consecutive Top 20 finishes. Overall, has 16 Top 10 finishes to her name (most recently in 2019) third-most behind Navratilova (20) and Evert (19) including five as the year-end No.1
- Holds distinction of being the oldest No.1 in WTA history set record when most recent streak began on February 18, 2013. Spent her 319th week at No.1 in May 2017. Third on all-time list after Graf's 377 and Navratilova's 332
- Held the top ranking for 186 consecutive weeks (through 2016 US Open) which equaled the record held by Graf (186 weeks, August 17, 1986 through March 10, 1991)
- Has registered 17 career wins over (eight different) No.1 ranked players, second-most behind Navratilova (18)
- Among active players, owns the most titles on clay (13), hard (46) and grass (8)
- Singles gold medalist at London 2012 Olympics, and doubles gold medalist at 2000 Sydney, 2008 Beijing and 2012 London (all w/V.Williams)
- Spent eight weeks as co-No.1 in doubles (w/V. Williams); one of six players to hold No.1 in singles and doubles simultaneously (also Navratilova, Hingis, Sánchez Vicario, Davenport and Clijsters)
- Holds single-season prize money record of \$12,385,572, achieved in 2013
- Gave birth to daughter Alexis Olympia Ohanian Jr. on September 1, 2017
- Married Reddit co-founder Alexis Ohanian in November 2017 in New Orleans

SIEGEMUND:

- Playing in the main draw here in Auckland for the second time (fourth overall)
- Beat McNally in 1r and Gauff in 2r; came back from a set down to book her spot in the QF
- Faces S.Williams in 2r today in second career meeting (0-1)
- Has won her past six matches against teenagers, stretching back to Indian Wells last March (I. Vondrousova)
- Standout results of 2019 season were SF run at Bucharest (I. Tig) and QF showings at Hiroshima (I. Kudermetova) and Luxembourg (I. Rybakina). Meanwhile, in doubles lifted fifth career WTA title, at Guangzhou (w/Peng)
- Returned to Top 100 for first time in 12 months on April 8, 2019 (after reaching 2r at Charleston)
- Made comeback from long-term knee injury in 2018; best performances at tour level were QF runs at Bucharest and Moscow [River Cup], while reached three finals on the ITF Circuit, including a title run at \$25K Bad Saulgau-GER
- Promising 2017 season ended by serious right knee injury, sustained at Nürnberg in May (ret. vs. Krejcikova)
- Prior to injury, won first Premier-level title of career on home soil at 2017 Stuttgart (d. Mladenovic in F). Scored three wins over Top 10 opponents en route to title, defeating No.9 Kuznetsova, No.3 Ka.Pliskova and No.5 Halep
- In 2016, enjoyed tour-level breakthrough, registering 30 tour-level matches and first WTA singles title on clay at Bastad (d. Siniakova in F)
- Also in 2016 reached maiden WTA final as qualifier at 2016 Stuttgart (as qualifier, I. Kerber). Made SF at Bucharest (I. Sevastova) on clay, before advancing to QF at Rio Olympics (I. eventual gold medalist Puig) and 3r at the US Open (I. V.Williams)
- Has twice reached 3r at a Grand Slam, at 2016 Australian Open (I. Beck) and 2016 US Open (I. V.Williams)
- Advanced to first two QF at WTA level in 2015, at Florianopolis then Luxembourg
- Owns five WTA doubles titles: 2015 's-Hertogenbosch (w/Muhammad), 2015 Florianopolis (w/Beck), 2015 Luxembourg (w/Barthel), 2018 Moscow (w/Panova) and 2019 Guangzhou (w/Peng); runner-up at 2015 Marrakech (w/Zanevska), 2016 Mallorca (w/Friedsam) and New Haven (w/Hsieh)
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2003 Leipzig and finally main draw debut seven years later at 2010 Bastad
- On ITF Circuit, winner of 12 singles titles and 20 doubles titles
- Played first pro events of career on ITF Circuit in 2002

- Contesting ASB Classic for the seventh time; is a two time runner-up, having made the final as top seed in 2015 (I. V.Williams) and 2018 (I. Goerges)
- Followed up R-Up finish in 2018 by lifting sole Grand Slam title at Australian Open
- Auckland is the penultimate event of her career, having announced during the off-season that she will retire after the upcoming Australian Open
- Dropped just one game to wildcard No.447 Hourigan in 1r on Monday to kick off farewell tour
- Defeated 2017 ASB Classic champion Davis after a hard-fought, two hour and 20 minute match to advance to QF
- Faces two-time defending champion, No.4 seed Goerges in today's QF match for their 11th career meeting. The Dane looks to avenge her loss to Goerges at the ASB Classic championship match in 2018 where she fell in straight sets
- Ended 2019 ranked No.38 her first non-Top 20 finish since 2007 having announced rheumatoid arthritis diagnosis at WTA Finals in October 2018
- Season highlight in 2019 was reaching final at Charleston (I. Keys) and SF at Beijing, where she was the defending champion (I. Osaka)




- With 30 singles titles, sits fourth among active players, behind S.Williams, V.Williams and Sharapova). Until 2019, had won at least one title in 11 straight seasons (since 2008), including six titles in both 2010 and 2011
- Highlight of 2018 was winning her first Grand Slam title (d. Halep in F) and reclaiming the World No.1 ranking at Australian Open becoming just the fourth player all-time (also, Navratilova, Ivanovic and Azarenka) to simultaneously win her maiden major title and ascend to No.1; saved 2mp (in 2r vs. Fett) en route to title
- Season highlight in 2017 was winning biggest title of career to that point at 2017 WTA Finals Singapore (d. V.Williams in F)
- Scored three wins over No.1-ranked players in 2017, against Ka.Pliskova (Toronto), Muguruza (Tokyo [PPO]) and Halep (Singapore). Had never previously secured victory over the top-ranked player in her career; lifetime record now stands at 4-6 vs. No.1 players (also beat Halep at 2018 Australian Open)
- In addition to 2018 Australian Open triumph, is also a two-time Grand Slam runner-up, losing the title match at the US Open in 2009 (I. Clijsters) and 2014 (I. S.Williams). Became first Danish player to reach a Grand Slam final since Kurt Nielsen at 1955 Wimbledon
- Made Grand Slam debut at 2007 Roland Garros (I. Dechy in 1r). Would go on to play 36 consecutive majors until streak was snapped by withdrawal from 2016 Roland Garros (w/right ankle injury)
- Won first WTA title at 2008 Stockholm, the first title won by a Danish woman
- Denmark's flag bearer at 2016 Rio Olympics
- Rose to No.1 on October 11, 2010 and held No.1 ranking for total of 67 weeks; returned to No.1 on January 29, 2018 after Australian Open title for the first time in six years, marking the longest gap between stints at the top spot since the computer rankings were introduced in November 1975 (6 years, 0 days)

GOERGES:

- As No.4 seed and two-time defending champion, enters ASB Classic for the eleventh time in her career
- Lifted the title in 2018 (d. Wozniacki) and 2019 (d. Andreescu) while posting a runner-up finish in 2016 (l. Stephens)
- Additionally, reached SF in 2011 (I. Arn) and 2017 (I. Konjuh) and QF in 2015 (I. Wozniacki)
- Fired nine aces to defeat Minnen in 1r before powering past Teichmann in 2r to advance to her seventh QF in Auckland
- In rematch of 2018 ASB Classic final, faces No.5 seed Wozniacki in QF today for their 11th career meeting and fourth meeting at this tournament. Goerges has won six of their last eight matches and leads in head-to-heads, 2-1 in Auckland and 6-4 overall
- Bidding to extend 12-match win streak in Auckland
- Finished 2019 campaign at No.28, having accrued two runner-up finishes (Birmingham, Luxembourg), reached R16 at a Slam for third consecutive year (US Open), and began season by defending title at Auckland

- Earned first Top 10 win of career over No.9 Kvitova in 3r at 2018 Indian Wells
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2017 Miami (I. Townsend in 3s)
- In juniors, won US Open girls' singles in 2017 and was R-Up at 2016 Roland Garros
- Mother is Olga, both parents were born and raised in Moscow; sister Maria Anisimova-Egee played tennis at University of Pennsylvania and now lives in New York






