- The 1st edition of the Top Seed Open presented by Bluegrass Orthopaedics is headlined by Grand Slam champions: **Serena Williams, Venus Williams, Victoria Azarenka** and **Sloane Stephens**.
- Azarenka and V. Williams are set to face off in a blockbuster first round. The winner will potentially see S. Williams, who opens her Lexington campaign against Bernarda Pera, in the second round.
- One To Watch – Coco Gauff.** The 16-year-old American enters this tournament fresh from reaching the first Grand Slam R16 of her career, earlier this year at the Australian Open. Gauff's run helped her reach her career high ranking of No. 49 on February 24, 2020.

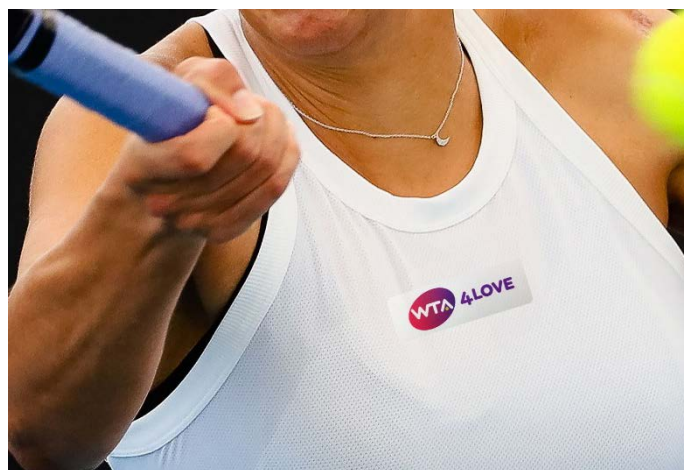

- In addition to the urgent focus on the COVID-19 pandemic, WTA Charities has continued to support a wide range of nonprofit organizations including **live video chats** teaching leadership and character development to youth and **offering support and positive messaging** to Special Olympics participants.

LEXINGTON Tournament History

"-Q" Qualifying match

BOUZKOVA:

- Lone Czech player in the inaugural tournament in Lexington
- Faces No.14 Konta in first round – last beat the Brit earlier this year in SF at Monterrey
- Owns 1-3 record this year (4-7 career record) against Top 20 opponents
- A win today would be the Czech's 15th career WTA victory
- Playing doubles this week w/Teichmann, face the American duo Gauff/McNally in the 1r
- Before hiatus, reached first career WTA final at Monterrey finishing runner-up to Svitolina
- Lost in 1r of first four WTA tournaments of 2020. Reached QF at ITF \$100k Nashville (I. Abanda) in February
- Ended 2019 ranked No.57 for career-best year-end finish and first inside the Top 100
- Posted career-high ranking of No.53 on August 12, 2019
- Standout performance of 2019 season was a SF run in her first Premier 5 appearance at Toronto (as qualifier, I. S.Williams in 3s)
- Also in 2019, made QF at Guangzhou and was R-Up at WTA 125K Series event at Guadalajara. Lifted 12th and biggest title of career on ITF Circuit, at \$80K Nur-Sultan-KAZ (d. Kostic in F); broke into the Top 100 for the first time at No.92 following the tournament (on July 22)
- Scored first three career Top 10 wins in 2019, against No.8 Stephens and No.4 Halep (both Toronto), and No.3 Svitolina (Guangzhou)
- Won first Slam main draw match during 2r showing at Wimbledon (as qualifier, d. Barthel, I. Sakkari)
- Highlights of 2018 season were 2r showing at Québec City (as qualifier, I. Lepchenko) and qualifying for first Grand Slam at US Open (I. Bogdan in 1r)
- Also in 2018, fell 1r at Monterrey, in qualifying at Australian Open, Roland Garros, Wimbledon, Acapulco, Lugano, Stuttgart and Prague, while on ITF Circuit, won one title at \$25k Irapuato-MEX and reached four further SF
- Has won 12 titles in singles and one in doubles on ITF Circuit
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2015 Acapulco (as wildcard, I. Karatantcheva)
- Professional debut was opening round loss in qualifying at 2013 Katowice
- Coached by Cristian Requeni
- Studying Business Administration online at Indiana University East

KONTA:

- One of two Brits (also Watson) in the main draw here at the inaugural Top Seed Open
- Faces No.47 Bouzkova today in 1r – lost last match before hiatus against the young Czech at Monterrey SF
- Owns career 9-17 record over Czech opposition
- Before hiatus reached SF at Monterrey (I. Bouzkova) after losing opening match at previous three tournaments this season: Brisbane (I.Strycova), Australian Open (I. Jabeur) and St. Petersburg (after 1r bye, I. Dodin)
- Missed last few months of 2019 due to knee injury
- Last season was highlighted by historic run at Roland Garros in 2019, recording first ever main draw win in Paris before becoming the first British woman to reach SF since Jo Durie's run to the same stage in 1983
- Re-entered Top 20 on June 10, 2019 for first time since March 2018 (dropped as low as No.50)
- Other highlights in 2019 included QF run at Wimbledon (d. No.9 Stephens and No.6 Kvitova; I. Strycova) and US Open (I. Svitolina), R-Up finish in Rome (I. Ka.Pliskova) and Rabat (I. Sakkari, after leading by a set and a break)
- Highlights in 2018 included a second successive R-Up finish at Nottingham (I. Barty) and SF at Moscow [Kremlin Cup] (I. eventual champion Kasatkina)

- Began 2017 season by lifting title at Sydney (d. A. Radwanska in F), before landing biggest title of career at Miami (d. Wozniacki in F)
- At 2017 Wimbledon became first British player since Virginia Wade in 1978 to reach Wimbledon SF (l. eventual R-Up V. Williams)
- Reached third final of 2017 season at Nottingham (l. Vekic). Also in 2017, reached SF for second year in a row at home event of Eastbourne – QF defeat of World No.1 Kerber was first by a British woman over a reigning No.1 since Barker d. Evert at 1979 Boston
- Reached first Premier Mandatory final of career at 2016 Beijing (l. A. Radwanska)
- Was the non-playing alternate for WTA Finals in Singapore in 2016, narrowly missing qualification in the Top 8
- By virtue of reaching 2016 Beijing final, made WTA Top 10 debut – becoming the first British woman to feature in the elite group since Durie in 1984, and the fourth British woman overall to do so (also Wade and Barker)
- Won career-first singles title at 2016 Stanford in maiden final (d. V. Williams in F). First British woman to reach final of a Premier event since WTA Roadmap was introduced in 2009
- Broke into Top 20 on June 6, 2016 (at No.18) – first British woman in Top 20 for nearly 30 years (the week of October 13, 1986, with Durie at No.20)
- Was voted WTA Most Improved Player in 2016 by international media and fans
- Made tour-level main draw debut at 2011 Copenhagen
- Born in Sydney, Australia; became a British citizen in May 2012. Parents are Gabor (hotelier) and Gabriella (dentist); older sister is Eva (works in fashion)
- Grandfather Tamas Kertesz played football for the Hungarian ‘Golden Team’ with Ferenc Puskas in 1955
- Switched clothing sponsor from Asics to Ellesse at end of 2018
- Currently working with Thomas Hogstedt, formerly worked with Dimitri Zavialoff, Michael Joyce and Wim Fissette

BRENGLE:

- One of thirteen Americans in the main draw of the inaugural Top Seed Open in Lexington
- Faces No.11 Sabalenka in first round, lost to the Belarussian at 2018 Miami
- Owns 6-29 record against Top 20 opponents – last defeated No.14 Vondrousova in 1r of 2019 Wimbledon
- Earlier this year, won title at Newport Beach 125K event (d. Voegele) before falling 2r at Indian Wells 125K (after 1r bye, I. Wickmayer)
- Began 2020 season with qualifying losses at Brisbane and Hobart before falling in 1r at Australian Open (I. Garcia)
- Finished 2019 ranked No.94 for sixth consecutive year-end ranking in the Top 100
- Highlights of year included QF at Nurnberg (I. Siniakova) as well as reaching 2r at Australian Open, Indian Wells, Wimbledon
- Won two titles on ITF circuit at \$60K Berkeley-CA, USA and \$60K Landisville-PA, USA
- Posted fifth consecutive Top 100 finish in 2018, at No.90
- Played predominantly on ITF circuit last season, winning three singles titles in USA, at \$100K Midland-MI, USA \$60K Landisville-PA, USA and \$60K Stockton-CA, USA
- At tour-level, 2018 season highlight was 2r at Wimbledon (I. Giorgi)
- Reached one QF in 2017, at Auckland – d. No.2 S.Williams in R16 for best win of career to date
- 2016 season was highlighted by SF appearance at 's-Hertogenbosch (I. eventual champion Vandeweghe) and QF at Dubai (I. eventual champion Errani)
- 2016 's-Hertogenbosch was third tour-level SF of career (also finalist at 2015 Hobart; semifinalist at 2015 Stuttgart)
- Enjoyed breakthrough start to 2015, reaching first WTA singles final at Hobart (as qualifier, I. Watson), followed by R16 run at Australian Open – left Australia with a 14-3 record
- Reached first SF at Premier-level at 2015 Stuttgart (I. eventual champion Kerber); posted first Top 5 win of career over No.4 Kvitova in 2r. Did not make cut on original entry list but gained admittance due to player withdrawals
- Achieved career-high ranking of No.35 on 4 May 2015
- Reached first WTA QF at 2014 Linz; as qualifier, advanced when Begu retired in second set of 1r match and received walkover from Ivanovic in 2r
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2007 Australian Open (as WC)
- Played first tour event at 2005 US Open, falling 1r of qualifying (as WC)
- Made professional debut at \$25k ITF/Allentown, PA-USA in 2004; won first of 14 ITF singles titles in 2005; also has seven doubles titles on ITF Circuit
- Coached by Glenn Weiner
- Father is Dan, mother is Gaby, brother is David (also plays tennis)
- Began playing tennis at age 2 when mother introduced her to the sport
- Favorite shot is backhand
- Likes to play volleyball and skim boarding

SABALENKA:

- Playing as No.2 seed this week at the inaugural Lexington tournament
- Faces No.79 Brengle today, beat the American in their only meeting at 2018 Miami
- Last lost to a player outside the Top 75 at 2019 Wimbledon falling to No.139 Rybakina
- Tied for fourth most match wins this season at 12 – only behind Rybakina (21), Muguruza (16) and Kenin (15)

- Has hit 64 aces so far this season, tenth most on tour
- Also playing doubles w/Brady as No.2 seed, face Linette/Pegula in 1r
- Before hiatus, won sixth career WTA title at Doha (d. Kvitova in F)
- Went into Doha, coming off QF run at Dubai (l. eventual champion Halep)
- Represented Belarus in Fed Cup play-off victory vs. the Netherlands. Teamed up with Sasnovich in doubles to seal the victory (d. Bertens/Schuurs on a third-set tie-break). In singles, defeated Rus and fell to Bertens
- Fell 1r at Australian Open (l. Suárez Navarro)
- Posted SF run at Adelaide (l. Yastremska). Upset No.4 Halep in QF at Adelaide to score fifth Top 5 win of her career, having previously beaten No.2 Wozniacki (2018 Montréal), No.5 Garcia (2018 Cincinnati), No.5 Kvitova (2018 US Open) and No.1 Barty (2019 Wuhan)
- Opened 2020 campaign with 2r exit at Shenzhen as the defending champion (d. Gasparyan, l. Kr.Pliskova)
- Ended as World No.11 for the second straight year in 2019 after capturing three WTA singles titles at Shenzhen (d. Riske in F), Wuhan (d. Riske in F) and Zhuhai (d. Bertens in F)
- Became first player to successfully defend Wuhan title (d. Kontaveit in 2018 F). Also finished runner-up in doubles with Mertens in 2019 (l. Duan/Kudermetova in F)
- During summer hard court season made R-Up finish at San Jose (l. S.Zheng)
- Made Top 10 debut on January 28, 2019 following 3r run at 2019 Australian Open
- Captured first Grand Slam doubles trophy at US Open (w/Mertens, d. Azarenka/Barty in F). Earlier in the season, the pair claimed the 'Sunshine Double' by winning back-to-back titles at Indian Wells (d. Krejčíková/Siniakova in F) and Miami (d. Stosur/Zhang in F)
- Qualified for WTA Finals Shenzhen (w/Mertens), going 1-2 in the round robin stage

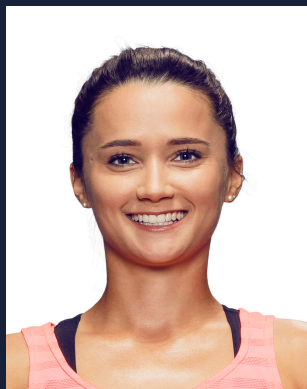

- Has only recorded 13 career losses to players ranked outside the Top 50 – last defeat was at 2017 Auckland to No.72 Brengle

- At age 38, is the second oldest player in the main draw, only younger than her sister Venus at 40 years old
- Entering tournament, holds a tour leading service points won percentage of 65.6%
- Defeat over Anisimova in SF of Auckland earlier this year is currently the shortest completed match of the year at 44min with a score of 6-1,6-1
- In last tournament before hiatus, fell 3r at Australian Open (l. Q.Wang) before participating in Fed Cup action going 1-1 in singles as USA defeated Latvia 3-2 (d. Ostapenko, l. Sevastova)
- Began 2020 season with 73rd career title at Auckland (d. Pegula in F) for first championship since giving birth to her daughter in 2017– also finished R-Up in doubles w/Wozniacki (l. Townsend/Muhammed)

- One of a tournament-leading 16 Americans to start in the inaugural Top Seed Open in Lexington
- Lexington marks the 59th different tournament she has played in her career
- Opens her Lexington campaign against fellow Grand Slam champion Azarenka. Owns a 5-2 career record vs. the Belarusian, most recently defeating her at 2019 Auckland in 3s
- Bidding for her first win of 2020, having fallen in the opening round this year at the Australian Open (I. Gauff), Acapulco (I. Juvan) and Monterrey (I. Schmiedlova). Last victory was over Strycova at 2019 Beijing 1r (I. Bencic in 2r)
- Winner of today's match will face the winner of S. Williams vs. Pera in 2r. Should she face S. Williams, it would mark their 31st career meeting, with S. Williams leading 18-12 (their last meeting came at 2018 US Open)
- Ended 2019 ranked No.53, down from No.40 in 2018
- Reached four QFs across the season, including Auckland (I. eventual R-Up Andreescu), Indian Wells (I. eventual R-Up Kerber), Birmingham (I. eventual champion Barty) and Cincinnati (I. eventual champion Keys)
- Scored her best win of the season at Indian Wells, ousting No.3 Kvitova in 3s. Also defeated the defending champion in Cincinnati, then-ranked No.5 Bertens
- Also made R16 at Miami (I. Halep) and Rome (I. Konta)
- Season highlights in 2018 were SF run at Indian Wells (d. S. Williams in 3r, I. eventual R-Up Kasatkina) and QF effort at Miami (I. Collins)
- Winnings at Indian Wells took her career total past \$40 million – S. Williams (\$84 million) is the only other player to pass this milestone
- Teamed up in Fed Cup for Serena's first competitive match back since giving birth in September 2017 (played dead doubles rubber, I. Kerkhove/Schuurs)
- Ended 2017 season as runner-up at WTA Finals (I. Wozniacki) – the oldest player to ever reach the title bout at the season finale
- Reached two other finals in 2017, at Australian Open (I. S. Williams) and Wimbledon (I. Muguruza) – only player in 2017 to reach two Grand Slam finals
- Shortly after her 37th birthday, returned to Top 10 in WTA Rankings by reaching 2017 Wimbledon final, becoming (at the time) the third oldest player to rank in Top 10 in WTA history behind Billie Jean King (September 26, 1983 – 39 years, 322 days) and Martina Navratilova (December 26, 1994 – 38 years, 75 days); was also surpassed by 37-year-old Serena in February 2019
- 2016 season highlights including winning 49th career singles title at Kaohsiung (d. Doi). Is sixth-oldest player to win a WTA singles title, after Billie Jean King (39) at 1983 Birmingham, Kimiko Date (38) at 2009 Seoul, Serena Williams (38) at 2020 Auckland, Martina Navratilova (37) at 1994 Paris [Indoor] and Francesca Schiavone (36) at 2017 Bogotá
- With 49 titles, currently 11th on list of Open Era titleholders, chasing Monica Seles (53 titles)
- At Grand Slam level in 2016, advanced to SF at Wimbledon (I. Kerber) which was first time reaching that stage at a major since 2010 US Open
- At 2016 Rio Olympics won silver medal in the mixed doubles (w/Ram, I. Mattek-Sands/Sock)
- Returned to Top 10 for first time since March 2011 following victory in final of the 2015 WTA Elite Trophy
- Was diagnosed with Sjögrens Syndrome in 2011, missing the end of that season and start of 2012
- Won singles gold medal at 2000 Sydney Olympics (d. Dementieva in F); won doubles gold three times with sister Serena, at Sydney, Beijing and London
- Spent 11 weeks at World No.1 in singles (first ascended to top spot week of February 25, 2002) and topped the doubles rankings for eight weeks in 2010
- Made WTA main draw debut at Oakland in 1994; as unranked WC, defeated Stafford in 1r before falling to then-world No.2 Sánchez Vicario in three sets
- Owns interior design company, VStarr Interiors. Also set up clothing line called EleVen, designing her own on-court outfits
- Chief Brand Officer of Asutra, a self-care line
- In 2015 received Bachelor of Science in Business Administration from Indiana University East
- Coached by Richard Williams and Oracene Price. Split with long-term coach David Witt during off-season in 2018
- Turned 40 on June 17, 2020

AZARENKA

- One of two Belarusian players represented in this week's main draw – also Sabalenka
- One of four Grand Slam champions in the field – also Stephens, S. Williams and V. Williams
- Competing in just her second WTA event of 2020, having fallen in 1r at Monterrey (I. Zidansek)
- Last tournament of 2019 was the US Open, where she fell to Sabalenka in 1r however reached the doubles final w/Barty (I. Mertens/Sabalenka)
- Faces V. Williams today in their eighth career meeting. Trails the American 2-5 in their career head-to-head, with both wins coming in 2015 at Doha (hard) and Madrid (clay)
- Bidding for her first singles victory since defeating then-No.12 Bencic in 1r at 2019 Cincinnati (via ret.). Last completed-match victory came over Giorgi at 2019 Toronto 1r

- Highlight of 2019 season was reaching 37th career singles final at Monterrey (d. No.5 Kerber in SF before falling to Muguruza in F via ret.). Also reached QF stage on three occasions – Acapulco (l. Kenin), Stuttgart (l. Kontaveit via ret.) and Rome (l. Ka.Pliskova)
- On February 2, 2019 returned to Top 50 for first time following the birth of her child, Leo
- Highlights of 2018 season included SF at Miami (l. Stephens) and QF at San Jose and Tokyo
- Made return to tennis in June 2017 following birth of first child in December 2016
- Comeback tournament was Mallorca, reaching 2r (d. Ozaki, l. Konjuh). Prior to 2017 Mallorca, last tournament contested was 2016 Roland Garros (1r)
- Followed this up with R16 showing at 2017 Wimbledon (l. Halep). Did not play any tournaments after Wimbledon due to personal reasons
- Ended 2016 ranked No.13, despite missing second half of season after going on maternity leave (announced pregnancy mid-July). Lifted three titles, at Brisbane (first title since 2013 Cincinnati) and 'Sunshine Double' of Indian Wells and Miami – third woman to achieve feat after Graf in 1994 and 1996 and Clijsters in 2005
- 2016 Miami marked 20th tour-level singles title of career (20-17 record in finals)
- Posted 26-3 record for first six months of 2016 with losses coming at the Australian Open (QF, l. Kerber), Rome (2r, l. Begu) and Roland Garros (ret. vs. Knapp w/right knee injury)
- Limited to total of 23 events over 2014-15 seasons due to variety of injuries
- Posted five consecutive Top 10 finishes between 2009 and 2013, qualifying for the WTA Finals on each occasion (l. Kvitova in 2011 final in Istanbul)
- Ascended to World No.1 after 2012 Australian Open and held top spot for a total of 51 weeks
- Began 2012 with 26-match win streak – best start since Hingis went 37-0 in 1997. Went on to win tour-leading 69 matches in 2012, season highlighted by six titles, finishing as WTA's year-end No.1
- Won two medals for Belarus at 2012 London Olympics bronze in singles and mixed doubles gold (w/Mirnyi)
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2005 Kolkata
- ITF Junior World Champion for 2005 – reached first tour-level semifinal at Guangzhou the same year
- Currently coached by Dorian Descloix. Formerly coached by Wim Fissette, Sam Sumyk and Michael Joyce
- Gave birth to son Leo in December 2016
- Introduced to tennis at age 7 by mother Alla; father's name is Fedor and older brother is Max

- Lone Canadian in the draw at the inaugural Top Seed Open in Lexington
- At 17-years-old is second youngest player in the main draw – only 16-year-old Gauff is younger
- Earned spot through two qualifying matches defeating Mexico's Zarazua and Australia's Rodionova, both in straight sets
- Faces No.37 Stephens today – owns 2-2 record against Top 50 opponents with both wins coming earlier this year
- Before hiatus, defeated the American to reach QF at Monterrey where she fell to eventual champion Svitolina
- Result helped her reach career high ranking of No.118 on March 9 – currently sitting at No.120 just two spots short

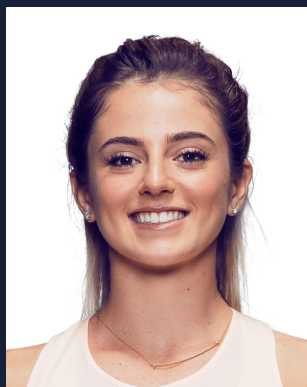

- Recovered from a 4-6 4-4 (0-40) deficit to defeat fellow American Pera in the opening round on Tuesday
- Faces her sister V.Williams today in their 31st career meeting. Owns 18-12 record vs. her sister, including 12-9 on hard courts and 7-5 on US soil
- Has won 9 of the last 11 meetings against her sister, most recently en route to 2018 US Open final (l. Osaka)
- At age 38, is the second oldest player in the main draw, only younger than her sister Venus at 40 years old

- Began 2020 season with 73rd career title at Auckland (d. Pegula in F) for first championship since giving birth to her daughter in 2017– also finished R-Up in doubles w/Wozniacki (l. Townsend/Muhammed)
- Highlights of 2019 season were her 32nd and 33rd Grand Slam finals, at Wimbledon (l. Halep) and US Open (l. Andreescu)
- Reached a further final last year at Toronto (ret. vs. Andreescu w/back injury) – overall record in finals stands at 73-25
- With 73 career singles titles, ranks fifth on the Open Era list of most titles, after Martina Navratilova (167), Chris Evert (154), Steffi Graf (107) and Margaret Court (92)
- All three finals in 2019 – Wimbledon, Toronto and US Open – came in consecutive tournaments
- Ended 2019 ranked No.10, her first year-end finish inside the elite ranking bracket since 2016 (at No.2)
- Other highlights last season were reaching QF at Australian Open and partnering with Andy Murray to contest Mixed Doubles at Wimbledon (reaching 3r)
- Defeated World No.1 Halep in R16 at Australian Open – at 37 years, is oldest player to defeat the reigning World No.1
- Reached two Grand Slam finals in 2018, at Wimbledon (l. Kerber) and US Open (l. Osaka). Made return to Tour following birth of daughter Olympia at 2018 Indian Wells.
- Ended 2017 ranked No.22, despite playing only two events all season, and both in January. Broke streak of 10 consecutive Top 20 finishes. Overall, has 16 Top 10 finishes to her name (most recently in 2019) – third-most behind Navratilova (20) and Evert (19) – including five as the year-end No.1
- Holds distinction of being the oldest No.1 in WTA history – set record when most recent streak began on February 18, 2013. Spent her 319th week at No.1 in May 2017. Third on all-time list after Graf's 377 and Navratilova's 332
- Held the top ranking for 186 consecutive weeks (through 2016 US Open) which equaled the record held by Graf (186 weeks, August 17, 1986 through March 10, 1991)
- Has registered 17 career wins over (eight different) No.1 ranked players, second-most behind Navratilova (18)

- Singles gold medalist at London 2012 Olympics
- Along w/sister Venus held all four Grand Slam titles at same time, from 2009 Wimbledon through 2010 Roland Garros – third pair to do so (also Navratilova/Shriver and Fernandez/Zvereva). Also teamed with Venus to win three Olympic gold medals: 2000 Sydney, 2008 Beijing and 2012 London

- Holds single-season prize money record of \$12,385,572, achieved in 2013
- Coached by father Richard Williams and mother Oracene Price; coaching consultant is Patrick Mouratoglou; hitting partner is Jarmere Jenkins
- Gave birth to daughter Alexis Olympia Ohanian Jr. on September 1, 2017
- Married Reddit co-founder Alexis Ohanian in November 2017 in New Orleans
- Launched her own clothing line, 'Serena', in late 2018

V.WILLIAMS

- One of a tournament-leading 16 Americans to start in the inaugural Top Seed Open in Lexington
- Lexington marks the 59th different tournament she has played in her career
- Defeated fellow former No.1 and Grand Slam champion Azarenka in blockbuster 1r clash on Tuesday, improving her record vs. the Belarusian to 6-2
- Faced just one breakpoint during match against Azarenka and converted all three breakpoints on the Belarusian's serve
- The win over Azarenka marked her first victory of 2020, having fallen in the opening round this year at the Australian Open (I.Gauff), Acapulco (I. Juvan) and Monterrey (I. Schmiedlova)
- Faces S.Williams today for a spot in her first QF since 2019 Cincinnati (I. eventual champion Keys in QF)
- Today marks the 31st career meeting between the Williams sisters and their 23rd on hardcourts. Her last victory over her sister came at 2018 Indian Wells 3r in what was S.Williams first tournament back since giving birth to her daughter
- With a combined age of 79 years, 19 days, S.Williams vs. V.Williams represents the highest combined age in a match since 2004 Charleston when Martina Navratilova (47) faced Amy Frazier (31), with a combined age of 79 years, 28 days
- Ended 2019 ranked No.53, down from No.40 in 2018
- Reached four QFs across the season, including Auckland (I. eventual R-Up Andreescu), Indian Wells (I. eventual R-Up Kerber), Birmingham (I. eventual champion Barty) and Cincinnati (I. eventual champion Keys)
- Scored her best win of the season at Indian Wells, ousting No.3 Kvitova in 3s. Also defeated the defending champion in Cincinnati, then-ranked No.5 Bertens
- Also made R16 at Miami (I. Halep) and Rome (I. Konta)
- Season highlights in 2018 were SF run at Indian Wells (d. S.Williams in 3r, I. eventual R-Up Kasatkina) and QF effort at Miami (I. Collins)
- Winnings at Indian Wells took her career total past \$40 million – S.Williams (\$84 million) is the only other player to pass this milestone
- Teamed up in Fed Cup for Serena's first competitive match back since giving birth in September 2017 (played dead doubles rubber, I. Kerkhove/Schuurs)
- Ended 2017 season as runner-up at WTA Finals (I. Wozniacki) – the oldest player to ever reach the title bout at the season finale

- Reached two other finals in 2017, at Australian Open (l. S.Williams) and Wimbledon (l. Muguruza) – only player in 2017 to reach two Grand Slam finals
- Shortly after her 37th birthday, returned to Top 10 in WTA Rankings by reaching 2017 Wimbledon final, becoming (at the time) the third oldest player to rank in Top 10 in WTA history behind Billie Jean King (September 26, 1983 – 39 years, 322 days) and Martina Navratilova (December 26, 1994 – 38 years, 75 days); was also surpassed by 37-year-old Serena in February 2019
- 2016 season highlights including winning 49th career singles title at Kaohsiung (d. Doi). Is sixth-oldest player to win a WTA singles title, after Billie Jean King (39) at 1983 Birmingham, Kimiko Date (38) at 2009 Seoul, Serena Williams (38) at 2020 Auckland, Martina Navratilova (37) at 1994 Paris [Indoor] and Francesca Schiavone (36) at 2017 Bogotá
- With 49 titles, currently 11th on list of Open Era titleholders, chasing Monica Seles (53 titles)
- At Grand Slam level in 2016, advanced to SF at Wimbledon (l. Kerber) which was first time reaching that stage at a major since 2010 US Open
- At 2016 Rio Olympics won silver medal in the mixed doubles (w/Ram, l. Mattek-Sands/Sock)
- Returned to Top 10 for first time since March 2011 following victory in final of the 2015 WTA Elite Trophy
- Was diagnosed with Sjögrens Syndrome in 2011, missing the end of that season and start of 2012
- Won singles gold medal at 2000 Sydney Olympics (d. Dementieva in F); won doubles gold three times with sister Serena, at Sydney, Beijing and London
- Spent 11 weeks at World No.1 in singles (first ascended to top spot week of February 25, 2002) and topped the doubles rankings for eight weeks in 2010
- Made WTA main draw debut at Oakland in 1994; as unranked WC, defeated Stafford in 1r before falling to then-world No.2 Sánchez Vicario in three sets
- Owns interior design company, VStarr Interiors. Also set up clothing line called EleVen, designing her own on-court outfits
- Chief Brand Officer of Asutra, a self-care line
- In 2015 received Bachelor of Science in Business Administration from Indiana University East
- Coached by Richard Williams and Oracene Price. Split with long-term coach David Witt during off-season in 2018
- Turned 40 on June 17, 2020

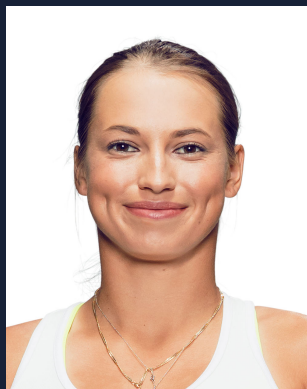

Rogers made waves at the Grand Slam level in 2016 after a dream run to the quarterfinals of Roland Garros – becoming the ninth player ranked outside the Top 100 (No.108) to advance to the last eight in Paris since 1983.

She had a promising 2017 that saw her become a Fed Cup champion, reach three quarterfinals and achieve a new career-high ranking of No.48, however was sidelined with a knee injury that required surgery in 2018.

Rogers won an emotional victory in her comeback at 2019 Volvo Car Open in her hometown of Charleston and has been since trying to get back to her winning ways. Since her return, has reached 2r at 2019 Roland Garros and has won two titles on the ITF circuit.

- Defeated Watson in 1r on Monday hitting 10 aces and winning all seven service games en route to wrapping up victory in little over an hour
- Delivered another accomplished service display against Linette in 2r, dropping serve just once and striking a further seven aces

- Won 12 of the last 15 points of the match to upset No.11 Sabalenka in 2r; now owns three career Top 20 wins, having also defeated No.3 Osaka earlier this year at Australian Open and No.8 Bertens at 2019 Linz
- At 2h 50m, match against Sabalenka was the longest of her career – five minutes longer than her win over Hercog at 2019 Wimbledon

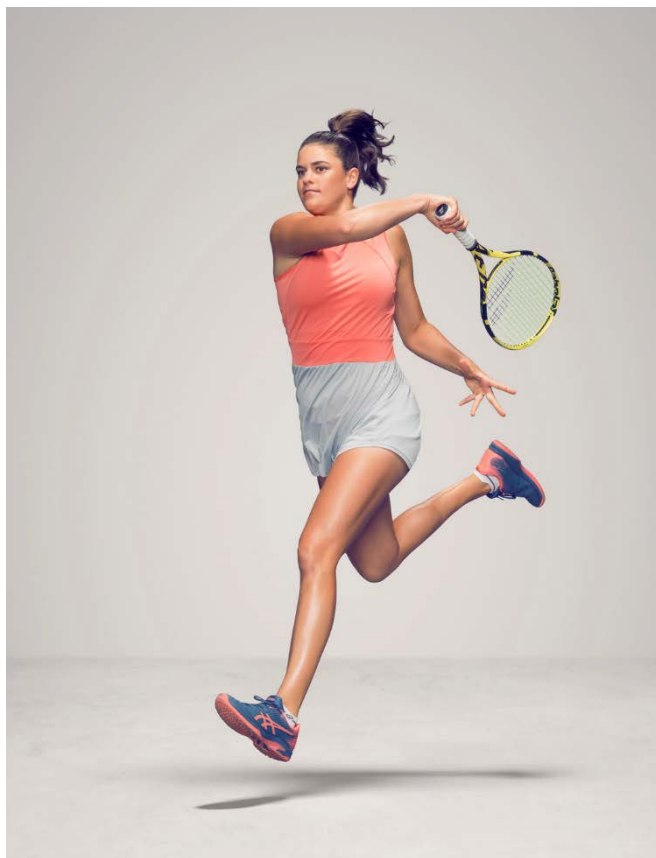

Not many collegiate athletes, let alone tennis players, are able to make the transition to the pro tour, and those that do very rarely tend to pan out, but Jennifer Brady has proven to be an exception to those trends.

The 2014 NCAA National Champion from UCLA turned pro in the summer of 2015 and made a name for herself in 2017 after producing a breakout campaign which led to the first Top 100 finish of her career, ending the year at No.64.

The American turned in strong performances at the Grand Slams in 2017, reaching the last 16 at the Australian Open and US Open. She won through three rounds of qualifying at the Australian Open and went on to become the first American female qualifier to reach the fourth round at Melbourne Park in the Open Era.

Brady has been off to a firing start in 2020, opening the season with a quarterfinal run at Brisbane, where she defeated former World No.1 Maria Sharapova and the reigning No.1 Ashleigh Barty. She also notched three consecutive Top 20 wins to reach the semifinals at Dubai in February.

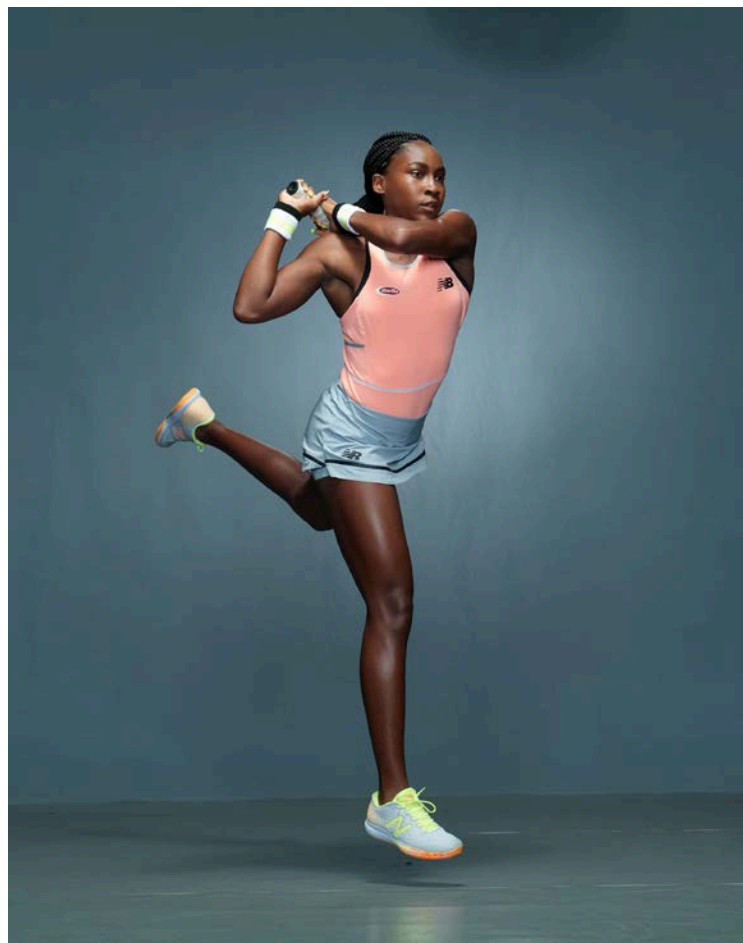

Coco Gauff, a 16-year-old from Delray Beach, FL., took the world by storm during her fairytale run on the grass courts of Wimbledon in 2019. Becoming the youngest player to reach the Wimbledon main draw through qualifying, Gauff quickly proved her worth among the top players as she ousted Venus Williams en route to the fourth round.

Gauff continued to impress in 2019, reaching the third round at the US Open before picking up her maiden WTA singles title at Linz. She also captured her first WTA doubles titles with her good friend Caty McNally at Washington, DC and Luxembourg.

Though she won the hearts of the world at Wimbledon, Coco's impressive game has been on display for much longer. At just 13-years-old she became the youngest player to reach the US Open junior final in 2017. She then went on to lift the 2018 Junior Orange Bowl trophy, the 2018 French Open girls' singles championship and the 2018 US Open girls' doubles championship.

Coco's interest in sport comes as no surprise with both of her parents being colligate athletes, her father playing basketball for Georgia State University and her mother a track and field star at Florida State University. TEICHMANN:

- Playing inaugural Top Seed Open in Lexington, just the fourth tour-level main draw appearance on US soil of her career (also 2r at US Open in 2019 and 1r exits at the Bronx and US Open in 2019)
- Broke serve 11 times across wins over qualifier Kalinskaya in 1r and No.5 seed Putintseva in 2r
- Victory over No.33 Putintseva marked her first Top 50 win since defeating No.5 Bertens to lift her maiden title at 2019 Palermo
- Defeated No.302 Bellis in QF and No.116 Rogers in SF for a spot in her first WTA final since 2019 Palermo title run
- Takes on No.49 Brady in today's final, last defeating the American in December 2019 at a WTA 125K Series tournament in Limoges
- Neither opponent has dropped a set en route to today's match
- Competing in first career final on hardcourt having previously only advanced this far on clay
- Career record in WTA championship matches stands at 2-0 having gone on to win the title each time she has reached this stage - 2019 Prague (d. Muchova in F) and 2019 Palermo (d. No.5 Bertens in F)
- Also contesting doubles this week with partner Bouzkova, face Carter/Stefani in today's doubles final
- In her previous tour-level appearance before the hiatus, reached 2r at Lyon (l. Dodin via ret. w/right ankle injury)

- Also in 2019, made QF on home soil at Lausanne and fell 1r at nine other tour-level events (including Wimbledon and US Open). Won ITF Circuit title at Santa Margherita Di Pula-ITA
- Qualified for first Grand Slam main draw at 2018 US Open, going on to reach 2r (l. Kanepi). Also in 2018, reached 2r at tour level events at Acapulco and Linz and lifted WTA 125K Series title at Newport Beach (w/Doi)
- Spent majority of 2016 on ITF Circuit, winning 44 matches and three titles to rise over 200 places in the rankings. Also reached 2r on WTA main draw debut at Strasbourg and fell in qualifying at US Open

- Played first professional events of career on ITF Circuit in Switzerland and Germany in 2013

BRADY:

- Playing inaugural edition of the Top Seed Open presented by Bluegrass Orthopaedics – her first professional tournament on home soil since reaching QF of New Haven's WTA 125K Series tournament last September (l. eventual champion Blinkova)
- One of sixteen Americans to start the main draw here in Lexington

- Defeated Watson in 1r on Monday hitting 10 aces and winning all seven service games en route to wrapping up victory in little over an hour
- Delivered another accomplished service display against Linette in 2r, dropping serve just once and striking a further seven aces
- Took out No.48 Bouzkova in QF in another fast two-set match for her eighth Top 50 win in 2020
- Blitzed past No.53 Gauff in Saturday's SF, striking eight aces to bring her total in Lexington to 35
- Improved record in SF matches to 1-3, having fallen during this stage in all previous attempts (2017 Hong Kong, 2019 Nottingham, 2020 Dubai)
- Faces No.63 Teichmann in career-first WTA final appearance. Looking to defeat the Swiss for a second time having previously triumphed during a qualifying match at 2019 Western and Southern Open
- Has only been broken on serve a total of three times this week, once in 2r, once in QF match and once in SF match
- Has spent the least amount of time on court (4h28), closely followed by today's opponent (5h10)
- Also has the highest average rank of opponent this week having only faced players in the Top 50 until meeting No.53 Gauff in SF and now No.63 Teichmann in F
- Prior to the tour's resumption, performed well at a series of exhibitions and World Team Tennis matches in the US, posting a 12-7 record including wins over Grand Slam champions Azarenka and Stephens
- In final event before tour's hiatus, fell 2r at Doha (I. Jabeur) coming off career-best week at Dubai, where, as a qualifier, she advanced to first SF at a Premier level defeating three Top 20 opponents in No.6 Svitolina, No.17 Vondrousova and No.16 Muguruza before falling to eventual champion Halep – victory over No.6 Svitolina in 1r marked second Top 10 win of career
- Results helped her reach career high ranking of No.45 (February 24, 2020)
- Fell in the 1r at Australian Open (I. Halep) but progressed to QF in doubles w/Dolehide (I. Hsieh/Strycova). Then suffered 1r exit at St Petersburg (I. Kuznetsova)
- In opening event of the season, came through qualifying before going on to reach QF at Brisbane (I. Kvitova) – scored first career Top 10 win over World No.1 Barty in 2r; broke into Top 50 afterwards
- Ended 2019 season back in Top 60 after dipping as low as No.125 at one point. Season highlights included SF run at Nottingham (I. eventual champion Garcia), 3r showings at Dubai (I. eventual R-Up Kvitova), Indian Wells (I. Barty) and Beijing (I. Andreescu)
- Finished 2018 ranked No.116 following her first Top 100 finish in 2017 (No. 64). Best results included reaching SFs at \$100k ITF/Midland-USA (I. Loeb) and \$80k ITF/Charlottesville-USA (I. Duque-Mariño), 2r showing at Indian Wells (I. Garcia), Roland Garros (I. Putintseva) and Wimbledon (I. Kontaveit)
- Posted first Top 100 year-end finish in 2017 (at No.64) during a campaign in which she reached first WTA career SF at 2017 Hong Kong (I. eventual R-Up Gavrilova)
- Made R16 at 2017 Australian Open and US Open, which remains her best Grand Slam result to date.
- Posted first WTA main draw wins during QF run at 2016 Guangzhou (d. Pivovarova and Kovinic)
- Made first four main draw appearances at tour level in 2016 – at Rio de Janeiro (as qualifier, I. Hercog in 1r), Stanford (I. Cornet in 1r), Montréal (as qualifier I. Svitolina in 1r)

Jil Teichmann is rising up the WTA rankings after steady success on both the ITF Circuit and WTA Tour. The young Swiss is the owner of two WTA singles titles and eight ITF singles titles.

Teichmann enjoyed a breakout year in 2019 advancing to and winning her first two WTA titles at Prague and Palermo where she beat No.5 Kiki Bertens in the final for first career Top 20 win.

Teichmann has represented her home country of Switzerland in Fed Cup play, picking up a doubles victory with Viktorija Golubic against Romania's Mihaela Buzarnescu and Sorana Cirstea in 2018 and wins over Canada's Leylah Fernandez and Gaby Dabrowski in 2020.

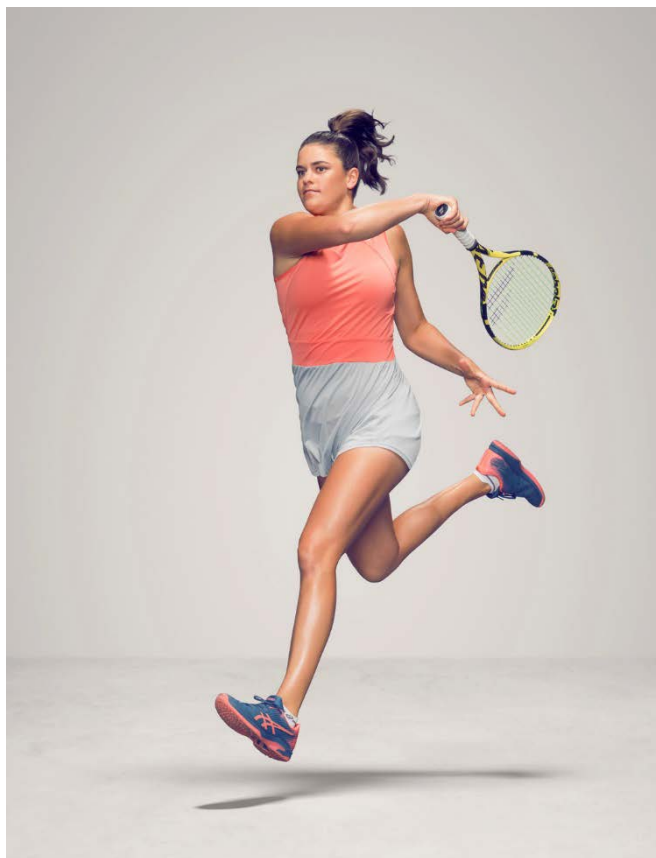

Not many collegiate athletes, let alone tennis players, are able to make the transition to the pro tour, and those that do very rarely tend to pan out, but Jennifer Brady has proven to be an exception to those trends.

The 2014 NCAA National Champion from UCLA turned pro in the summer of 2015 and made a name for herself in 2017 after producing a breakout campaign which led to the first Top 100 finish of her career, ending the year at No.64.

The American turned in strong performances at the Grand Slams in 2017, reaching the last 16 at the Australian Open and US Open. She won through three rounds of qualifying at the Australian Open and went on to become the first American female qualifier to reach the fourth round at Melbourne Park in the Open Era.

Brady has been off to a firing start in 2020, opening the season with a quarterfinal run at Brisbane, where she defeated former World No.1 Maria Sharapova and the reigning No.1 Ashleigh Barty. She also notched three consecutive Top 20 wins to reach the semifinals at Dubai in February.
