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AUSTRALIAN OPEN - DAY 1 SHOW COURT MATCH-UPS

[3] NAOMI OSAKA (JPN #4) vs. MARIE BOUZKOVA (CZE #59)

First career meeting

Osaka looking to become first woman since 2013 to defend her Australian Open title... Bouzkova hopes to be only the second player to oust reigning champion in 1r

ANASTASIA POTAPOVA (RUS #90) vs. [8] SERENA WILLIAMS (USA #9)

First career meeting

Potapova one of ten teenagers in main draw... Serena coming off first WTA title since becoming a mother and first since winning here in Melbourne in 2017... Serena only has one career loss in the first round of a Grand Slam

[1] ASHLEIGH BARTY (AUS #1) vs. LESIA TSURENKO (UKR #120)

Tsurenko leads 1-0

Barty starting campaign to become first Australian to win title in Melbourne since 1978.. Tsurenko playing in only her second match since sustaining an elbow injury last August

KATERINA SINIAKOVA (CZE #57) vs. [7] PETRA KVITOVA (CZE #8)

Kvitova leads 2-0

Siniakova looking for fifth career win over a fellow Czech player... Kvitova last year was the first Czech woman to make the final here since 1991

VENUS WILLIAMS (USA # 55) vs. COCO GAUFF (USA #67)

Gauff leads 1-0

Venus looking to to avenge 1r loss to teenager in first round of 2019 Wimbledon... Gauff has yet to fall in 1r in each of her Grand Slam main draw appearances... Venus is the oldest player in the draw while Gauff is the youngest

[24] SLOANE STEPHENS (USA #27) vs. SHUAI ZHANG (CHN #35)

Stephens leads 3-2

Stephens looking for her first match win of the 2020 season... Zhang is the reigning doubles champion (w/ Stosur)... Zhang won their first round meeting here in 2018 in three sets

KRISTIE AHN (USA #92) vs. CAROLINE WOZNIACKI (DEN #36)

First career meeting

Ahn earned first Grand Slam main draw win last year at US Open with run to R16... Wozniacki competing in final tournament of her career

SAMANTHA STOSUR (AUS #99) vs. [Q] CATHERINE MCNALLY (USA #116)

First career meeting

Stosur looking for first singles win in Melbourne since 2015... McNally making her main draw debut here... Stosur is also reigning doubles champion (w/Zhang)

Jabeur leads 1-0

Konta reentered Top 20 for the first time since March 2018 after SF run at Roland Garros... Jabeur's last Top 20 win came over Konta last year at Eastbourne

[Q] MARTINA TREVISAN (ITA #154) vs. [14] SOFIA KENIN (USA #15)

First career meeting

Trevisan making career Grand Slam debut... Kenin won three WTA titles last year to boost her into Top 20

[Q] ANN LI (USA #142) vs. [WC] LIZETTE CABRERA (AUS #121)

First career meeting

Li making career Grand Slam main draw debut... Cabrera looking for first main draw win in three appearances in Melbourne



WTA NO.1 RANKING

Ashleigh Barty will extend her stay at No.1 to 21 consecutive weeks atop the WTA Rankings (28 weeks overall). With her title run last week in Adelaide, she will hold onto that spot after this fortnight regardless of results. **Barty** first reached World No.1 after winning back-to-back titles last at Roland Garros (her first Grand Slam victory) and Birmingham. The top seed has claimed the title 20 times in Melbourne, most recently by Serena Williams in 2015.

QUEST FOR 24

- **Serena Williams** will be hoping to tie Australia's Margaret Court's record of 24 Grand Slam titles
- Since the birth of Alexis Olympia (September 1, 2017), **Williams** has competed at seven Slams, reaching the final on four occasions - 2018-19 Wimbledon and 2018-19 US Open
- Before 2019 where she fell in QF, she had reached the finals in her last three appearances in Melbourne winning in 2015 and 2017
- **Williams** owns an Open Era record 7 Australian Open titles and 81 Australian Open match wins
- Has played and won more matches (85-11 record) than any other woman in Australian Open history

TEENAGE KICKS

- There are ten teenagers in the women's singles main draw at the 2020 Australian Open.
- American Coco Gauff (15) is the youngest player in the field at Melbourne this year, as well as direct entrants Amanda Anisimova (18), Iga Swiatek (18), Anastasia Potapova (18) and Dayana Yastremska (19)
- Five of the teenagers earned their spot in the main draw through qualifying: Leylah Fernandez (17), Elisabetta Cocciaretto (18), Catherine McNally (18), Kaja Juvan (19), Ann Li (19)
- A teenager has won a Grand Slam singles title 34 times (13 different players) in the Open Era. At last year's US Open, Bianca Andreescu (19 yrs, 83 days) became the first teenager to lift a major title since Maria Sharapova at the 2006 US Open. The youngest player to win a Grand Slam title in the Open Era is Martina Hingis at 1997 Australian Open (16 years, 105 days).

DEFENDING THE TITLE

- **Naomi Osaka** is attempting to become just the ninth woman to successfully defend their title at the Australian Open. Others to have completed this feat are Margaret Court, Evonne Goolagong, Stefanie Graf, Monica Seles, Martina Hingis, Jennifer Capriati, Serena Williams and Victoria Azarenka.
- There have been 24 title defenses at Wimbledon, 22 at the US Open, 21 at the Australian Open and 11 at Roland Garros (post-1945):
- 22 different women have successfully defended a Grand Slam singles title at least once in their careers
- 10 different women have successfully defended two or more different Grand Slams
- Six defending champions have lost in the opening round of their title defense: Graf (1994 Wimbledon), Capriati (2003 Australian Open), Myskina (2005 Roland Garros), Kuznetsova (2005 US Open), Kerber (2017 US Open) and Ostapenko (2018 Roland Garros)
- Victoria Azarenka (2012-13) was the last player to defend her title at the Australian Open

STRONG STARTERS

Of the players with 10 or more Grand Slam appearances in this year's Australian Open draw, here are the players with the best strike rate in the opening round at a Grand Slam:

- **Maria Sharapova (51-6 in 1r):** Sharapova's first round loss at the 2010 Australian Open (I. Kirilenko) snapped her streak of 24 consecutive first round wins at the majors
- **Serena Williams (72-1 in 1r):** Serena has lost in the opening round of a Grand Slam only once in her career, at 2012 Roland Garros (I. Razzano)
- **Venus Williams (72-12 in 1r):** Venus will get a second chance against last lost against 15-year-old Coco Gauff who she lost to in the 1r of 2019 Wimbledon
- **Caroline Wozniacki (43-7 in 1r):** Caroline's first round loss at 2012 Wimbledon (I. Paszek) broke her streak of 20 successive first round wins at the Slams.
- **Madison Keys (26-3 in 1r):** Keys has not fallen in the first round on her past 20 major appearances
- **Garbiñe Muguruza (23-5 in 1r):** Muguruza snapped her streak of 20 consecutive first round wins at majors with her loss at 2019 Wimbledon (I. Haddad Maia).

AUSTRALIAN OPEN

- Defending champion here at the Australian Open, having defeated Kvitova in the 2019 final. Is first Japanese man or woman to reach the Australian Open final
- Triumph here in 2019 also saw her ascend to the World No.1 ranking for the first time in her career. Previously, no Japanese man or woman had ever been ranked higher than No.4
- Having won 2018 US Open (d. S.Williams in F), became 10th woman to win US Open and Australian back-to-back (most recently S.Williams in 2015). Also was the first woman to win her second major in a row after winning her first since Capriati did so in 2001 (Australian Open followed by Roland Garros)
- Last woman to defend the Australian Open title was Azarenka, from 2012-13. Last women to defend a Grand Slam title was S.Williams at Wimbledon (2015-16)
- Overall, the Australian Open title has been defended 14 times by eight different players in the Open Era
- The defending champion has exited the tournament in the 1r only once at the Australian Open – Capriati in 2003
- Owns the fewest previous appearances (three) prior to making the Australian Open final since Ivanovic in 2008 – in what was also her fourth appearance, fell to Sharapova in title match. Further back, Graf (1988), Pearce (1995) and Hingis (1997) won the title here on their third appearances, while Seles won the Australian Open in 1991 on her debut
- 2020 marks fifth main draw appearance at the Australian Open, and 16th main draw appearance at a Grand Slam event
- Prior to title run in 2019, previous best result at Australian Open was R16 showing in 2018 - defeated two Top 20 players (No.19 Vesnina and No.17 Barty) before falling to World No.1 and eventual R-Up Halep. 2018's run saw her become the youngest Japanese to reach R16 at a Slam since Sugiyama at 1995 Roland Garros (19 yrs, 342 days) and the youngest player from Japan to reach this stage at Australian Open since Date in 1990 (19 yrs, 122 days)
- On other outings here, made 3r in 2016 (as qualifier, l. Azarenka) – which marked Grand Slam main draw debut - and 2r in 2017 (l. Konta)
- Faces No 56 Bouzkova today 1r – a loss today would be worst-by-ranking at the Slams since falling to No.418 Kanepi at 2017 US Open, and worst on the WTA Tour since 2019 Dubai (l. No.67 Mladenovic)
- Undefeated at the Slams in five previous meetings with Czech women, including two wins (Ka.Pliskova in SF, Kvitova in F) during title run here in 2019
- Has suffered two Grand Slam 1r exits – at 2017 Roland Garros and 2019 Wimbledon

AUSTRALIAN OPEN

- Making main draw debut at the Australian Open – had previously fallen in 2018-19 qualifying
- 2020 Australian Open marks second direct entrance into a Slam, after 2019 US Open (l. Tomljanovic in 1r)
- Overall, this is her fifth main draw appearance at the majors, also appearing at 2018 US Open (as qualifier, l. Bogdan), 2019 Roland Garros (as qualifier l. Andreescu in 1r) and 2019 Wimbledon (as qualifier, l. Sakkari in 2r)
- Faces No.3 Osaka today in 1r match – owns two Top 5 wins in career, over No.4 Halep (2019 Toronto) and No.3 Svitolina (2019 Guangzhou). Also boasts a further Top 10 win over No.8 Stephens (2019 Toronto)
- Looking to join Germany's Marlene Weingartner as the second player to defeat the reigning Australian Open champion in the 1r of their title defense (d. Capriati in 2003)
- Coming off 1r exits at Brisbane (as qualifier, l. Keys) and Hobart (l. Bellis)

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- Best result at majors was 2r showing at 2019 Wimbledon (as qualifier, d. Barthel, l. Sakkari)
- Made 1r exit on Grand Slam main draw debut at 2018 US Open (as qualifier, l. Bogdan). Also suffered 1r defeat at 2019 Roland Garros (as qualifier, l. Andreescu)

CAREER

- Ended 2019 ranked No.57 for career-best year-end finish and first inside the Top 100
- Posted career-high ranking of No.53 on August 12, 2019
- Standout performance of 2019 season was a SF run in her first Premier 5 appearance at Toronto (as qualifier, l. S.Williams in 3s)
- Also in 2019, made QF at Guangzhou and was R-Up at WTA 125K Series event at Guadalajara. Lifted 12th and biggest title of career on ITF Circuit, at \$80K Nur-Sultan-KAZ (d. Kostic in F); broke into the Top 100 for the first time at No.92 following the tournament (on July 22)
- Scored first three career Top 10 wins in 2019, against No.8 Stephens and No.4 Halep (both Toronto), and No.3 Svitolina (Guangzhou)
- Won first Slam main draw match during 2r showing at Wimbledon (as qualifier, d. Barthel, l. Sakkari)
- Highlights of 2018 season were 2r showing at Québec City (as qualifier, l. Lepchenko) and qualifying for first Grand Slam at US Open (l. Bogdan in 1r)

AUSTRALIAN OPEN CONT.

- Enters 2020 Australian Open with a 37-13 main draw Grand Slam record
- Contested Brisbane in opening week of 2020 season, reaching SF (l. eventual R-Up Ka.Pliskova, having help MPs). Loss ended 14-match win streak, with back-to-back titles at 2019 Osaka and Beijing, as well as a win over Kvitova in the RR stage in Shenzhen before withdrawing due to a right shoulder injury

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- Two-time major winner, at 2018 US Open (d. S.Williams in F) and 2019 Australian Open (d. Kvitova in F)
- Is the first woman to win her second major straight after winning her first since Capriati did so in 2001 (Australian Open followed by Roland Garros)
- Won 2019 Australian Open on only her third appearance, becoming the 10th woman to win the US Open and Australian Open back-to-back
- Enjoyed 16-match win streak at the Slams, spanning 2018 US Open (7), 2019 Australian Open (7) and 2019 Roland Garros (2). Most since S.Williams' 33 wins from 1r at 2014 US Open through to QF at 2015 US Open (l. Vinci in SF)
- In reaching R16 at 2018 Australian Open, became youngest Japanese player to reach R16 at a Slam since Sugiyama at 1995 Roland Garros (19y, 342d) and the youngest player from Japan to reach R16 in Melbourne since Date in 1990 (197, 122d)
- Has reached 3r at the other two majors: Roland Garros in 2016 (l. Halep), 2018 (l. Keys) and 2019 (l. Siniakova), and Wimbledon in 2017 (l. V.Williams) and 2018 (l. Kerber)

CAREER

- Finished 2019 ranked No.3 for career-best season-ending finish•Won second Grand Slam at Australian Open (d. Kvitova in F); became first Japanese player to reach World No.1 ranking following the tournament
- In addition, won back-to-back titles for first time in her career at Osaka (d. Pavlyuchenkova in F) and Beijing (d. Barty in F); now owns 5-2 record in WTA singles finals. Defeated No.1 Barty in Beijing final for second career victory over world No.1 (also beat Halep at 2018 Indian Wells)
- Enjoyed break-out season in 2018, posting a 40-20 record resulting in a No.5 (first Top 10 season), up from No.68 in 2017

CAREER CONT.

- Also in 2018, fell 1r at Monterrey, in qualifying at Australian Open, Roland Garros, Wimbledon, Acapulco, Lugano, Stuttgart and Prague, while on ITF Circuit, won one title at \$25k Irapuato-MEX and reached four further SF
- Has won 12 titles in singles and one in doubles on ITF Circuit
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2015 Acapulco (as wildcard, l. Karatantcheva)
- Professional debut was opening round loss in qualifying at 2013 Katowice

- Born in Prague, but currently based in Bradenton, Florida
- Coached by Cristian Requeni
- Favorite surface is hard
- Away from the court, enjoys mathematics, table tennis, swimming and skiing
- Studying Business Administration online at Indiana University East

CAREER CONT.

- Won the first two titles of her career in 2018, at Indian Wells (d. Kasatkina in F) and debut Grand Slam crown at US Open (d.S.Williams in F)
- En route to the Indian Wells title, defeated five-time major champion Sharapova, and A.Radwanska, Ka.Pliskova and Halep. Only set dropped all fortnight was against Sakkari in R16
- Reached one further final in 2018, at Tokyo [PPO] (l. Ka.Pliskova)
- Book-ended 2017 season with QF showings at Auckland and Hong Kong; other highlights included 3r runs at Wimbledon and US Open
- Scored first Top 5 win of career when she defeated No.5 V.Williams at 2017 Hong Kong. Upset win over defending champion and No.6-ranked Kerber at 2017 US Open marked first career Top 10 win
- Voted 2016 WTA Newcomer of the Year; highlight was career-first WTA final at Tokyo [PPO] (l. Wozniacki). Also reached QF on three occasions and 3r at Australian Open, Roland Garros and US Open
- Ranked No.406, made WTA main draw debut at 2014 Stanford. As an alternate, won through qualifying (achieving first WTA qualifying wins), and came from match point down to shock No.19 Stosur in 1r of main draw, before losing to No.18 Petkovic in 2r
- Made WTA qualifying debut at Québec City in 2013 (l. Dabrowski)

PERSONAL

- Began working with Wim Fissette at beginning of 2020 season. Previous coaches include Sascha Bajin and Jermaine Jenkins
- Also in her team is Abdul Sillah (fitness trainer)
- Was born in Osaka, Japan, and moved to USA when she was three years old; holds dual citizenship
- Sponsorship deals include Nike, Citizen, broadcaster Wowow, Nissin, Nissan and ANA Airlines
- Her father, Leonard Max Francois, was born in Haiti and attended college in New York City before moving to Japan where he lived for 13 years
- Mother, Tamaki, is Japanese. Older sister Mari also plays professional tennis

AUSTRALIAN OPEN

- Making second appearance at Australian Open. Reached 2r on main draw debut in 2017 (l. Keys)
- Win over Parmentier in 1r last year was first main draw victory at Grand Slam level
- Reached QF in girls' singles at Melbourne Park in 2016 (l. eventual R-Up Mihailikova)
- Aged 18, is one of 10 teenagers in the draw
- Faces No.9 S.Williams today in 1r; scored sole Top 10 victory of career with upset over No.5 Kerber in 1r at 2019 Roland Garros
- Record in Grand Slam 1r matches stands at 3-2. Overall Grand Slam win-loss record is 3-5
- Began season with qualifying exits at both Brisbane and Adelaide

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- Contesting sixth Grand Slam main draw at 2020 Australian Open
- Best results are 2r showings at Australian Open (l. Keys), Roland Garros (l. Vondrousova) and Wimbledon (l. Martic) in 2019
- Negotiated qualifying without dropping a set, to reach career first main draw at a Grand Slam at 2017 Wimbledon (l. Maria in 1r)
- At 16 years and three months, became youngest player to successfully navigate Slam qualifying since Ana Konjuh, who had just turned 16 when she did it at 2014 Australian Open
- Captured 2016 Wimbledon girls junior title, having to win final point three separate times after two challenge overrules – title lifted her to Junior World No.1
- In junior doubles, posted two runner-up finishes at 2015 US Open and 2016 Roland Garros

- Finished last season ranked No.93 after a season highlighted by SF at Budapest (l. Vondrousova) and Jurmala (l. Sevastova)

- Overall record against teenagers at Australian Open is 21-2, with two defeats coming at hands of V.Williams in 1998 and Stephens in 2013
- Owns 72-1 record in Grand Slam 1r matches, with sole defeat coming to Razzano at 2012 Roland Garros
- Began 2020 season by lifting 73rd career title, at Auckland (d. Pegula in F); also R-Up in doubles w/ Wozniacki (l. Muhammad/Townsend)
- At 38y 108d was the third oldest woman to win a WTA title, after Billie Jean King (twice) and Kimiko Date
- Contesting 2020 Australian Open ranked No.9; at 38 years, 115 days, she is the second oldest player to hold a Top 10 ranking. Billie Jean King was ranked in the Top 10 at 39 years, 322 days

- Two-time R-Up at Melbourne Park, falling to sister S.Williams on both occasions in 2003 and 2017

- Four-time doubles champion here in 2001, 2003, 2009 and 2010 (all w/S.Williams). Also won the mixed doubles title here in 1998 (w/Gimelstob)

- At 39 years of age, is the oldest woman of 21 thirty-somethings in this year's starting field
- By reaching the final in 2017 aged 36 years and 226 days, became the oldest woman to advance to the final at Melbourne Park in the Open Era
- Faces 15-year-old Gauff today in their second career meeting, having fallen to the teenager in the opening round at last year's Wimbledon
- Is 24 years older than Gauff. This marks the biggest age gap in Grand Slam play since 43-year-old Kimiko Date lost to 16-year-old Bencic (27 years younger) in 1r at 2014 Australian Open
- Holds a 72-12 record in Grand Slam 1r matches, including 15-4 at Australian Open. Overall record across the Slams is 269-76
- Today marks her first match since 2019 Tianjin in November (l. Peterson in 1r). Withdrew from Brisbane earlier this month due to a training setback and at last week's event in Adelaide due to a hip injury
- Bidding for 50th career title this fortnight. Lifted last trophy at 2016 Kaohsiung (d. Doi in F)
- Among active players, sits in second place for career hard court titles - 31, trailing only Serena (47) and ahead of Wozniacki (24)

GRAND SLAM HISTORY

- 2020 Australian Open marks 85th Grand Slam main draw appearance, the most in the Open Era
- Is a seven-time Grand Slam singles champion, winning Wimbledon five times: 2000-01 2005 and 2007-08. Also won US Open in 2000 (d. Davenport in F) and 2001 (d. S.Williams in F)
