CAREER MILESTONES

- Won maiden WTA title at 2020 Istanbul (d. Bouchard in F); at No.88 was the lowest-ranked title winner in 2020
- Rose to career-high singles ranking of No.56 at the end of the 2020 season (October 26, 2020); previous high ranking of No.58 came after Istanbul title (September 14, 2020)
- Won first main draw matches at a Grand Slam in 2020, including 3r showing at Roland Garros (l. Ferro) - a career-best Slam result
- Passed \$1 million in career prizemoney after 3r run at Roland Garros
- · In 2019, reached second career WTA final, playing first WTA event in two years following injury and maternity leave break, at Bucharest (d. No.11 Sevastova, l. Rybakina)
- Returned to the Top 300 following Bucharest run, then went on to reach QF at Lugano (l. Potapova) and made 2r at Hiroshima and Seoul. Also won WTA 125K Series title at Karlsruhe
- Gave birth to daughter Sofia in November 2018; did not play competitive tennis between September 2017 and April 2019
- Her 2017 season ended when she was taken off court in a wheelchair in 1r at Guangzhou
- Cracked Top 100 for first time in early 2017 (No.83) after reaching the 3r at 2017 Miami (as qualifier, l. V.Williams)
- Highlights in 2016 include QF run at Madrid (l. Stosur), SF appearance at Seoul (l. Arruabarrena) and Grand Slam main draw debut at Wimbledon (l. No.20 seed Errani in 1r)
- In 2015, advanced to first WTA final at Baku (as qualifier, l. Gasparyan)
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2015 Bucharest (as qualifier, l. Hercog in 2r)
- Competed in WTA qualifying for first time at 2014 Bucharest
- Played first event of career at ITF/Craiova-ROU in 2009

- Improved year-end ranking from 2019 by over 200 spots, having finished last year at No.255 while ending the 2020 season at No.48, entering the Top 100 and the Top 50 for the first time in her career
- Enjoyed breakout season in 2020 which was highlighted by SF run as a qualifier at Roland Garros where she recorded her maiden Grand Slam main draw match win before going on to scalp No.5 Svitolina to reach the final four and notch the first Top 50 win of her career Posted a
- 13-match winning streak (across all levels) between claiming the ITF title at \$60k ITF/ Saint-Malo-FRA and reaching the final four at Roland Garros as a qualifier (l. eventual champion Swiatek)
- Kicked off 2020 season with back-to-back titles on the ITF Circuit at \$25k ITF/Malibu-USA and \$25k ITF/Petit Bourg-FRA before advancing to SF at WTA 125K event in Newport Beach, California – a 14 match winning streak (across
- Crowned 2020 WTA Newcomer of the Year Won
- gold medal at 2019 Pan American Games in Lima (d. Dolehide in F) to earn a place at the Tokyo Olympic Games
- Also in 2019, lifted titles at \$25K ITF/Santa Margherita Di Pula-ITA and \$25K ITF/Monzon-**ESP**
- Only tour-level outing in 2018 was 2r run at Nurnberg (as qualifier, l. Flipkens)
- Won first tour-level match during 2r showing at 2017 Monterrey (d. Brengle, l. No.24 Garcia). Also in 2017 made 2r at Bucharest and fell 1r at Bogota and Rabat
- Posted only Top 200 year-end finish of her career in 2016 after compiling 45-24 record and lifting two titles on ITF Circuit
- Also in 2016 made debut in WTA qualifying at Rabat and then fell 1r on main draw bow at Bucharest (as qualifier, l. Kovinic)
- Member of Argentina Fed Cup team 2014-17,
- Owns 14 singles and eight doubles titles on ITF Circuit
- Made professional debut on ITF Circuit in 2011

- Reached final at Doha in 2020 (l. Sabalenka) it was her 37th title-match, sits seventh on list for most finals among active players

- Contested Rio Olympics in August 2016, winning the singles bronze medal (l. Puig in SF, d. Keys in bronze medal play-off)
- Runner-up at 2015 WTA Finals in Singapore (l. A.Radwanska in 3s). Former champion at the season finale, which she won on her event debut in 2011 (d. Azarenka in F)
- Was first player born in 1990s to win a Grand Slam title at 2011 Wimbledon (since joined by Muguruza, Ostapenko, Stephens, Wozniacki, Halep, Osaka, Barty and Kenin)
- At 2012 Sydney was two wins from becoming No.1 (had won Wimbledon and WTA Finals in previous six months)
- Owns six wins over current World No.1s: Safina (2009 US Open), Wozniacki (2011 WTA Finals), S.Williams (2015 Madrid), Kerber (2016 Wuhan), Wozniacki (2018 Doha) and Barty (2020 Doha)
- · Among active players, owns the most wins in indoor hardcourt events (77)
- Member of Czech Republic's Fed Cup winning team in 2011-12, 2014-16 and 2018

- · Ended 2020 season with career-high ranking of No.97 (November 9, 2020) and first-ever Top 100 finish
- · Best result of campaign was 3r run at US Open (d. No.20 Riske in 2r, l. Kerber)
- Advanced to 2r on Grand Slam debut at 2020 Australian Open (as qualifier, l. eventual champion Kenin)
