- Faces No.95 Anhelina Kalinina in F today; Record in WTA final matches stands at 1-2
- Owns 5-11 career record against players from Ukraine, with record in 2021 standing at 1-1 (L. Svitolina at Australian Open, d. Kozlova this week in Budapest)
- Best career result on clay is lifting the 2019 Nurnberg trophy
- During last year's European clay swing reached QF at Rome
- Only player from Kazakhstan in this week's draw

- Making first appearance at Budapest
- Has beaten Anna Kalinskaya, Bernarda Pera, Panna Udvardy and Danielle Collins so far this week to reach her career first WTA final
- Also reached her career first WTA SF this week
- Faces No.42 Yulia Putintseva in F today; owns 3 wins in career over Top 50 players, most recently No.42 Danielle Collins this week in Budapest
- Prior to this week, best career result on clay was 2r at 2019 Jurmala and Bastad
- Owns 13 clay court titles on ITF Circuit, with four of these coming this season - including last week at \$100k ITF/Contrexéville-FRA
- Also won title at \$60k ITF/Montpellier-FRA the week before that; is on a 14-match winning streak and is 31-3 on clay this season (at all levels)
- One of two Ukrainians in the draw (also Kozlova, L. Putintseva in QF)
- Is currently ranked at a career-high No.95, after breaking into Top 100 for the first time after Contrexéville triumph (July 12, 2021)

- Suffered 1r exits at Madrid (l. Konta) and Rome (l. Gauff), before reaching 2r at Belgrade (l. Konjuh) and Strasbourg (l. Linette). Fell 1r at Roland Garros (l. Jabeur)
- Reached QF at Charleston (l. Kovinic)
- Made 2r exit at Miami (after 1r bye, l. No.95 Stojanovic)
- Opened 2021 season by reaching 3r at Abu Dhabi (l. Kenin after holding 1MP) and 2r at Grampians Trophy (l. Azarenka). Advanced to 3r at Australian Open (l. Svitolina), then fell 2r at Adelaide (l. No.292 Sanders)

- Won ITF \$100K in Contrexeville, France (d. Galfi) and ITF \$60K in Montpellier, France (d. Sherif)
- Fell in last round of qualifying at Wimbledon (l. Diatchenko)
- Made 2r (as qualifier, d. Kerber, l. Collins) at Roland-Garros
- During clay season, won ITF \$60K in Zagreb, Croatia and ITF \$25K in Oeiras 2, Portugal
- Won ITF \$100K in Contrexeville, France (d. Galfi)
- Defeated in second round of qualifying for Australian Open (l. Juvan)

CAREER MILESTONES

- Recorded 300th career win (at all levels) with 1r triumph over Flipkens at 2020 Roland Garros
- Standout results of 2020 were QF runs at US Open (l. Brady) – first Kazakh woman to reach last eight in New York – and Rome (l. Halep)
- Owns one win over a reigning World No.1, upsetting Osaka on grass at 2019 Birmingham
- Won first career title at 2019 Nürnberg (d. Zidansek in F); afterwards rose to No.28 in rankings – one spot off career best No.27 (achieved February 6, 2017)
- Best result of 2018 was QF run at Roland Garros (l. Keys)
- Reached maiden WTA final in 2017 at St Petersburg (l. Mladenovic) after notching two Top 10 wins over No.8 Kuznetsova and No.5 Cibulkova – first over a Top 5 player – (l. Mladenovic in F); first woman from Kazakhstan to reach a WTA final since Shvedova at 2015 Bogotá (l. Pereira)
- Rose to new career-high ranking of No.27 on February 6, 2017 following St Petersburg
- In 2016 became first Kazakh to reach the quarterfinals at Roland Garros – or at any major – since Shvedova in 2012, eventually losing to S.Williams in 3s
- Defeated No.14 V.Williams en route to first Premier-level quarterfinal of career at 2016 Charleston
- First Top 10 win came over No.10 Petkovic at 2015 Nürnberg (via ret.)
- Progressed to maiden WTA SF at 2015 Bastad (l. eventual champion Larsson)
- In 2014, reached first two WTA QFs, first on clay at Bastad (as qualifier, l. Cepelova) and then on hard at Osaka (l. eventual champion Stosur). Between these two results, scored first Top 20 win – over No.14 Pennetta – during run through qualifying to 2r at Montréal
- Made it through to 2r on Grand Slam main draw debut at 2013 Australian Open (d. McHale, l. Suárez Navarro)
- Advanced to 2r on WTA main draw debut at 2012 Copenhagen (as WC, d. Barbat, l. Jankovic)
- On ITF Circuit, winner of six singles titles and six doubles titles
- Kazakhstan Fed Cup Team, 2014-20
- Professional debut at 2009 Luxembourg ended with defeat to Flipkens in final round of qualifying
- Best result of 2020 was R-Up finish at \$100k ITF/Midland-MI, USA. At WTA level, fell 1r twice (including US Open) and in qualifying three times (including the year's other two majors)
- Highlight of 2019 was reaching 2r at Jurmala (d. Siniakova, l. Tig) and winning ITF title at \$25k Perov in the Czech Republic
- Reached career-high ranking of No.107 on December 17, 2018
- Made her Grand Slam main draw debut at 2018 US Open - came through qualifying to make 2r (l. Stephens)
- Also in 2018 made second tour-level appearance of her career, falling 1r at Washington DC (as qualifier, l. Bonaventure)
- Sidelined for 10 months at the end of 2015 w/shoulder injury, playing only 12 matches in 2016 season
- As a junior was runner-up in girls' singles at 2014 US Open (l. Bouzkova) and doubles champion at 2014 Australian Open (w/Kulichkova)

OTHER INFORMATION

- Coached by Roman Kislianskii
 - Father's name is Anton; mother's name is Anna; younger brother's name is Ilya (plays ice hockey). Introduced to sport by father; liked it and was soon practicing at Spartak Club in Moscow
 - Moved to Paris to attend Mouratoglou Academy after winning a big Under 14s event; has trained there ever since
 - Baseline player whose favorite shot is forehand; favorite surface is clay. Australian Open and US Open are favorite tournaments
 - Tennis idols were Martina Hingis and Justine Henin - still watches videos of Henin on YouTube
 - Also enjoys dancing, music, singing, Sudoku, playing cards and chess
 - Person she would most like to meet is Eminem
 - Changed representation from Russia to Kazakhstan in May 2012
- Trained in Trnava, Slovakia at the Empire Academy, under the tutelage of Vladimir Platenik; formerly worked with Dinara Safina
 - Started playing tennis aged six
 - Favorite surface is hard
 - Enjoyed successful junior career, winning girls' doubles at 2014 Australian Open (w/Kulichkova), and finishing runner-up in singles at 2014 US Open (l. to Bouzkova).
