SINIAKOVA:

Indian Wells

- Playing BNP Paribas Open for the sixth time
- Best result was 3r run in 2017 (l. Wozniacki)
- In doubles, finished R-Up here in 2017 (w/Hradecka) and 2019 (w/Krejciikova); seeded No.1 this year w/Krejciikova (play Golubic/Teichmann in 1r)
- Faces Clijsters in 1r of singles today; record against wildcards this season is 0-3, losing to Gasparyan at St. Petersburg, Konjuh at Miami and Martincova at Ostrava
- Last match against an opponent ranked outside Top 1000 was 6-1 6-3 victory over No.1004 Frech on the ITF Circuit in Poland eight years ago
- One of seven Czechs in main draw this fortnight (also Bouzkova, Krejciikova, Kvitova, Martincova, Ka.Pliskova and Vondrousova)
- Owns one singles title on hard courts lifting the trophy at 2017 Shenzhen
- With Krejciikova, recently named one of two doubles teams to qualify for this year's WTA Finals to be held in Guadalajara, Mexico in November

Season

- Coming off 1r exit at Ostrava (l. Martincova – held 1MP in final set tie-break)
- Made at US Open (l. Sakkari); in doubles, as No.2 seed w/ Krejciikova upset in 1r (l. Linette/Pera)
- In singles, advanced to 3r at Montréal (l. Sorribes Tormo) and QF at Cleveland (l. Kontaveit); reached SF in doubles at Cincinnati (l. Dabrowski/Stefani)
- With longtime doubles partner, Krejciikova, the two won gold for the Czech Republic at the Tokyo Olympics this year defeating the Swiss team of Bencic/Golubic in the final match
- Reached QF at Prague (l. eventual champion Krejciikova)

- At Bad Homburg, finished R-Up (I. Kerber) - her first singles final since the start of 2018 - then enjoyed 3r run at Wimbledon (I. eventual champion Barty); in doubles at Wimbledon reached QF w/Krejcikova (I. Kudermetova/Vesnina)
- Advanced to SF at Parma (d. No.8 S.Williams, I. eventual champion Gauff) and reached 3r at Roland Garros (I. Zidansek); also lifted second Roland Garros doubles title (w/Krejcikova)
- Contested qualifying at Madrid; bounced back to lift 10th WTA doubles title of her career (w/Krejcikova, d. Dabrowski/Schuurs in F)
- Advanced to QF at Istanbul (I. Bogdan)
- Reached 2r at St. Petersburg (I. Gasparyan) before suffering 1r exit at Miami (I. Konjuh)
- Fell 1r at Dubai (I. Jabeur) and in qualifying at Doha
- Bounced back to reach doubles final at Australian Open w/Krejcikova (I. Mertens/Sabalenka)
- Opened singles campaign in 2021 with 1r exits at Grampains Trophy (I. Kerber) and Australian Open (I. Ferro)

Career Milestones

- Reached two doubles finals in 2020, winning her first event of the season (Shenzhen w/Krejcikova) and finishing R-Up in the last (Linz w/Hradecka); also reached SF at Australian Open and Roland Garros (both w/Krejcikova)
- In singles last year, best results were QF at Strasbourg (I. Sabalenka) and 3r run at Roland Garros (I. Bertens)
- Produced career-best Slam singles result with R16 run at 2019 Roland Garros (d. No.1 Osaka in 3r, I. Keys)
- Finished 2018 ranked No.1 in doubles after winning first two Grand Slam trophies at Roland Garros (d. Hozumi/Ninomiya in F) and Wimbledon (d. Melichar/Peschke in F) both w/Krejcikova, the first pairing to complete the Roland Garros-Wimbledon double since Kim Clijsters and Ai Sugiyama in 2003; also became the first team ever to win the girls' (2013) and ladies' doubles title at SW19
- Also R-Up w/Krejcikova at 2018 WTA Finals Singapore (I. Babos/ Mladenovic)
- Has three Top 5 career wins in singles – against No.4 Halep at 2017 Shenzhen, No.4 Garcia at Wuhan, and No.1 Osaka at 2019 Roland Garros
- Won both singles rubbers during Czech Republic's 3-0 victory over USA in final of 2018 Billie Jean King Cup
- Won two career singles titles in 2017, first at Shenzhen (d. No.4 Halep in 2r, No.10 Konta in SF – the first Top 10 wins of her career – and Riske in F) and then Bastad (d. No.17 Sevastova in QF, No.20 Garcia in SF and No.6 Wozniacki in F)
- Reached doubles final at 2017 US Open (w/Hradecka, I. Chan/Hingis)
- Made Top-50 debut on October 24, 2016
- In 2016, advanced to first two WTA finals, at Bastad (as qualifier, I. Siegemund), Tokyo [Japan Open] (I. McHale)
- Won back-to-back Slam matches for the first time during 3r showing at 2016 Wimbledon (I. A.Radwanska)
- Notched the first Top-20 win of her career by upsetting No.14 Petkovic during QF run at 2015 Birmingham
- Broke into Top 100 for the first time on October 20, 2014 following breakthrough SF run at Moscow (as qualifier, I. eventual champion Pavlyuchenkova)
- Fell 1r on Grand Slam main draw debut at 2014 Australian Open (as qualifier, I. Diyas)
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2013 Miami (I. Muguruza)
- Ranked world No.2 in ITF junior rankings in December 2012; won the girls' doubles titles at Roland Garros, Wimbledon and US Open in 2013

CLIJSTERS:**Indian Wells**

- Playing Indian Wells for the ninth time
- Won title in 2003 and 2005 (d. Davenport in both finals). Is one of four former champions in this year's draw (also Andreescu – 2019, Azarenka – 2012, 2016 and Halep 2015)
- Also finished R-Up on second appearance, in 2001 (l. S.Williams); defeated Hingis in SF to register her first career win over a reigning World No.1
- Made R16 on most recent appearance, in 2011 (l. Bartoli via ret. w/shoulder injury)
- Owns 24-5 win-loss record at Indian Wells; Azarenka (28-8) and Halep (23-8) are the only other women in the draw to pass the 20-win mark
- In doubles, finished R-Up in 2003 w/Sugiyama (l. Davenport/Raymond)
- Faces Siniakova in 1r today; bidding for first win since final tournament of her 'second' career at 2012 US Open (d. Duval, l. Robson in 2r)
- Winner will take on No.10 seed Kerber in 2r. Lost her only match against the German, in straight sets at 2012 Wimbledon
- Oldest of 22 thirtysomethings in the draw. Made her professional debut in August 1997 – nearly seven years before the youngest player in the Indian Wells draw, Katrina Scott, was born
- Thirteenth player in the Open Era to win 40 singles titles, with 41 in total. Among these titles are 31 hard-court titles, with 16 of these coming in the United States
- Accompanied here in Indian Wells by coach Max Filippov and fitness trainer Emmy Simpkins

Season

- Coming off 1r exit at Chicago [Fall Tennis Classic] (l. Hsieh in 3s); also fell 1r in doubles w/Flipkens
- Faced Stephens in exhibition in Atlanta this July
- Underwent knee surgery in October 2020 and COVID-19 forced her to withdraw from Miami and Charleston

Career Milestones

- Suffered 1r exits at three tournaments contested last season: Dubai (l. Muguruza), Monterrey (l. Konta) and US Open (l. Alexandrova)
- Dubai marked the first event of her 2020 comeback campaign; originally targeted an earlier start to the year but injuries delayed her return
- Owner of 41 singles titles, including four Grand Slams, most recently 2011 Australian Open; Runner-Up at 19 events, most recently 2011 Paris (indoors); owns 11 doubles crowns
- Retired at 2012 US Open, losing 76(4) 76(5) to then-18-year-old Laura Robson in 2r
- In final season, advanced to three SFs at 2012 Brisbane, Australian Open (as def. champion) and 's-Hertogenbosch, in addition to a QF finish at the London Olympics (falling to eventual silver medalist Sharapova)
- 13th player in the Open Era to win 40 singles titles or more, adding 2 in 2011, including 4th Grand Slam singles title
- At the time of winning 2011 Australian Open, moved into 3rd place on career prize money list behind both Williams sisters

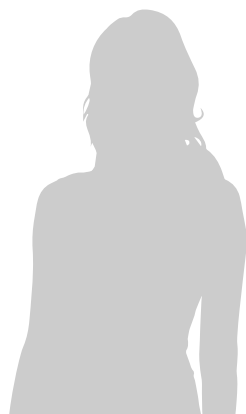

- Returned to tour at 2009 Cincinnati (after more than 2 years away, during which time she became a mother). In 3rd tournament back won 2nd Grand Slam title at US Open; played 4 events in 2009 and ended year ranked No.18; prior to return had not played since May 6, 2007 (l. Vakulenko, 2r Warsaw); announced plans for comeback in March 2009, played exhibitions at Wimbledon in May, 's-Hertogenbosch in June and World Team Tennis in July
- Only player to beat Serena and Venus Williams at the same tournament twice (2002 WTA Champs and 2009 US Open)
- Became 13th player and first Belgian to hold No.1 singles ranking on August 11, 2003; spent total of 20 weeks at No.1; last ranked No.1 on February 20, 2011; also held No.1 ranking in doubles for 3 weeks, becoming only the 5th player in WTA history to hold No.1 singles and doubles simultaneously (Navratilova, Sánchez-Vicario, Hingis and Davenport; S.Williams became 6th player to do so in June 2010)
- Missed much of 2004 w/left wrist injury (underwent surgery on June 12, 2004; played only 1 tournament between then and February 2005; returned to win Indian Wells-Miami double (only 2nd woman after Graf); injured left wrist again at 2006 Montreal and missed a further 2 months. Missed most of 2010 clay court season with left foot injury (suffered at Fed Cup tie)
- Has six career wins vs. reigning No.1, most recently vs. Wozniacki at 2012 Australian Open
- Member of Belgian Fed Cup Team, 2000-06, 2010-11 helping Belgium win its first-ever title in 2001 and Belgian Olympic Team, 2012

CAREER MILESTONES

- Best result of 2020 was run through qualifying to 2r at Hua Hin (l. Zheng)
- Fell in qualifying at all four majors in 2019
- Reached QF on WTA main draw debut, at 2018 Nanchang (l. Linette)
- Won first - and to date only - ITF Circuit title at \$25k Incheon-KOR in 2018
- Played first professional events on ITF Circuit in Asia in 2015
- Achieved career-high ITF junior combined ranking of No.2 after winning Australian Open girls' singles title (d. Burel in F); also won doubles title in Melbourne w/Wang Xinyu


- Best results of 2020 came in the opening month with a QF showing at Brisbane (QF) and R16 run at Australian Open
- Ended 2019 at career-high ranking of No.18, posted on November 4, 2019 - up from No.63 in 2018
- In a breakout 2019 campaign, achieved best Slam result by advancing to QF at Wimbledon, ousting World No.1 Barty to notch biggest win of her career before being halted by eventual R-Up S.Williams
- Additionally, lifted second career WTA singles title at 's-Hertogenbosch (d. Bertens in F after saving 5mp) and finished runner-up at Shenzhen (l. Sabalenka) and Wuhan (l. Sabalenka)
