- After a 1r bye, defeated fellow American Stephens then Paolini to reach R16; has not dropped a set through first two matches
- Faces No.7 Svitolina in R16 today - owns six career wins over Top 10 players all of which have come this year: No.5 Svitolina at Australian Open; No.6 Ka.Pliskova at Doha, Dubai and Miami; No.2 Osaka at Rome; and No.10 Ka.Pliskova at Berlin
- Looking to reach sixth QF of the year also doing so at Australian Open where she beat today's opponent in R16 (l. Brady in QF), Doha (as qualifier, l. Kvitova in SF), Dubai (l. Mertens in QF), Rome (l. Martic in QF), Berlin (l. Azarenka in QF) and Montreal (l. Giorgi in SF)
- Owns 1-2 career record against players from Ukraine in main-draw matches
- Sole WTA title came on hard courts at 2019 Washington DC
- One of two players from the U.S. in the bottom half of the draw to reach R16
- Last American to win the title here was S.Williams in 2001
- Is currently ranked No.24; this time last year was No.60

SEASON 2021 HISTORY

- Made 3r at US Open (l. Bencic) before making R16 at Chicago 500 (l. Jabeur)
- Reached SF at Montreal defeating four Top 30 opponents en route (l. eventual champion Giorgi) then reached R16 at Cincinnati (l. Ka.Pliskova)
- Fell 1r at Olympics (l. eventual gold medal winner Bencic)
- On grass, advanced to QF at Berlin (l. Azarenka), then made 2r at Bad Homburg (l. Siniakova) and Wimbledon (l. Samsonova)
- Reached 3r at Madrid (l. Sabalenka), then QF at Rome (d. No.2 Osaka in 2r, l. Martic) and 3r at Roland Garros (l. Kenin)
- Made R16 at Miami (l. Sakkari); recovered from 4-2 down in the third set to beat No.6 Ka.Pliskova in 3r – now owns a Tour-leading four Top 10 wins in 2021, having also defeated No.6 Pliskova at Doha and Dubai, and No.5 Svitolina at Australian Open
- Enjoyed strong Middle Eastern swing, reaching her first WTA 500 SF, at Doha (as qualifier, l. eventual champion Kvitova) – was the first qualifier to reach last four in the tournament's history – then made QF at Dubai (l. Mertens)
- Advanced to maiden Grand Slam QF at Australian Open, where she notched her fourth career Top 20 win over No.13 Azarenka and career first Top 10 win over No.5 Svitolina before falling to eventual R-Up Brady in three sets
- Made 3r run at Yarra Valley Classic (l. Kenin)
- Opened season at Abu Dhabi, falling 1r (l. Svitolina)

- Coming off QF run at Chicago 500 (l. Jabeur)
- Reached QF at US Open (l. Fernandez in 3s), following title run at Chicago 250 (d. Cornet in F)
- Suffered opening round defeats at Montreal (after 1r, l. Konta) and Cincinnati (after 1r bye, l. Kerber)
- Won bronze medal at Olympics (l. Vondrousova in SF)
- On grass, suffered 2r exits at Berlin (after 1r bye, l. Alexandrova), Eastbourne (l. Rybakina) and Wimbledon (l. Linette)
- Upset in 1r at Madrid (l. Teichmann after holding 6MP), then reached QF at Rome (l. eventual champion Swiatek) and 3r at Roland Garros (l. eventual champion Krejcikova)
- Began clay court season with SF run at Stuttgart (l. eventual champion Barty)
- Advanced to first SF of the season at Miami (l. eventual champion Barty); win over No.10 Kvitova in R16 was first over a Top 10 player since R-Up finish at 2019 WTA Finalis in Shenzhen
- Progressed to QF at Doha (as No.1 seed, l. Azarenka) and then suffered 2r exit at Dubai as No.1 seed (after 1r bye, l. Kuznetsova)
- In Melbourne, reached QF at Gippsland Trophy (l. eventual champion Mertens) and then R16 at Australian Open (l. Pegula)
- Advanced to QF in opening tournament of the season, at Abu Dhabi (l. Kudermetova)

CAREER MILESTONES


- Began 2020 with runner-up finish at Auckland (l. S.Williams), other standout results were a QF at Western & Southern Open (as qualifier, l. Mertens) and a 3r showing at US Open (l. Kvitova)
- On the doubles court in 2020, reached QFs of Roland Garros (w/Muhammad) and Cincinnati (w/Rogers)
- Won her first WTA title at 2019 Washington DC (d. Giorgi in F) to reach a career high ranking of No.55 (August 5, 2019)
- Also in 2019, fell 1r on main draw debut at Roland Garros (l. eventual champion Barty) and Wimbledon (l. Buzarnescu) and Miami (as a qualifier, l. Konta)
- Broke into Top 100 for the first time on February 4, 2019 following back-to-back R-Up finishes at WTA 125K Series event at Newport Beach and \$100K ITF/Midland-MI, USA
- Highlights of 2018 included finishing runner-up as a qualifier at Quebec City (l. Parmentier in F), recording SF finish at Houston WTA 125K (l. S.Peng) and reaching QF or better at 10 ITF events
- Won doubles title w/Manasse at 2018 Houston 125K (d. Krawczyk/Olmos in F)
- Did not play between January and August 2017 after undergoing hip surgery. Primarily played at ITF events for the rest of the year, winning two doubles titles with Townsend
- Played a mixture of WTA and ITF Circuit events in 2016 with highlight coming at Washington DC, where she defeated No.14 Stosur for first Top 20 win of career on her way to a SF finish (l. Davis)
- Reached 2r on Grand Slam main draw debut at 2015 US Open (as qualifier, d. Van Uytvanck, l. Cibulkova)
- Sidelined from tennis for a year and a half between 2013 and 2015 due to a right knee injury
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2009 Ponte Vedra Beach and WTA main draw debut at 2012 Indian Wells
- Won her 14th and 15th titles in 2020, firstly at Monterrey (d. Bouzkova in F) and then Strasbourg (d. Rybakina in F)
- Contested her 30th consecutive major at 2020 Australian Open (streak broke by skipping 2020 US Open). Is a two-time semifinalist at Grand Slam level, at 2019 Wimbledon (l. eventual champion Halep) and 2019 US Open (l. S.Williams). Became the first woman from Ukraine to reach a major SF; on the men's, Medvedev made that stage at Roland Garros in 1993 (SF) and 1999 (R-Up)
- Highlight of 2019 was reaching the title match as defending champion at the Shiseido WTA Finals (l. Barty)
- In 2018, won 13th – and most prestigious – career title at 2018 WTA Finals (d. Stephens in F), after going 3-0 during round robin stage. Ended year ranked No.4. Also won titles at Rome (as defending champion, d. No.1 Halep in F), Dubai (as defending champion, d. Kasatkina in F) and Brisbane (d. Sasnovich in F)
- Enjoyed standout 2017, finishing year at No.6, winning a tour-leading five titles and posting second-most wins (53, behind Wozniacki with 60). Season culminated by qualifying for WTA Finals in Singapore, becoming first Ukrainian woman to qualify for the season-ending tournament in singles (fell at round robin stage with 1-2 record)
- In 2017, became first player to win three Premier 5 titles in a single season (Dubai, Rome, Toronto), since such tournaments were introduced in 2009
- One of five players to make Top 10 debut in 2017, after winning Dubai in February (also Ostapenko, Garcia, Mladenovic and Vandeweghe). Peaked in rankings at No.3 on September 11, 2017
- On four occasions could have reached World No.1 – at 2017 US Open, then needed to win 2017 Beijing (fell QF), then needed to triumph at 2017 WTA Finals (fell in group stage), or reach final at 2018 Australian Open (fell in QF)
- End to 2016 season also saw her reach first SF at Premier Mandatory level at Beijing (l. A.Radwanska) Qualified for 2016 WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai for the second time (l. Kvitova in F)
- Reached three finals in 2016, winning Kuala Lumpur (d. Bouchard in F) and R-Up at New Haven (l. A.Radwanska) and Zhuhai (l. Kvitova)
- Other 2016 season highlight was QF at Rio Olympics

- Owns two career doubles titles: 2014 Istanbul (w/Doi) and 2015 Istanbul (w/Gavrilova)
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2012 Baku (lost in 1r but went on to win title there in both 2013 and 2014)
- Ukrainian Fed Cup Team, 2012-15, 2017, 2020
- Played first ITF Circuit events of career in 2008
- Junior highlights include winning 2010 Roland Garros girls' title at age 15 (d. Jabeur in F)

- Owns 4-0 career record against players from Canada in main-draw matches
- Best career result on hardcourts is SF result at 2020 Lexington where she beat today's opponent Fernandez in the 2r (I. Teichmann)

- Last American to win the title here was S.Williams in 2001
- A win today would be her 28th of the season; she has never previously won this number of Tour-level matches in a single campaign (previous best was 23-20 in 2017)
- Is currently ranked No.44, having returned to Top 50 this March and reached a career high of No.40 in July

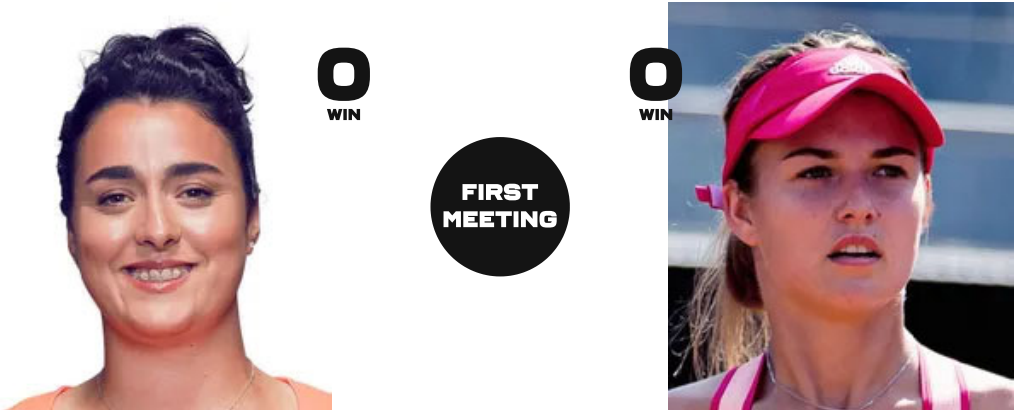
