**Krejcikova** and **Siniakova** are appearing in the SF of this tournament for the second time... **Melichar-Martinez** and **Schuurs** secured their place with a champions tie-break victory on Sunday... **Siniakova** is still in the hunt to finish the year as doubles No.1

- Maria Sakkari is the highest seed left in the tournament. This is only the second time since the introduction of the round robin in 2003 that none of the leading three seeds have reached the semifinals (also 2018)
- All four players finished the round-robin stage with a 2-1 record, meaning the eventual champion will be the 10th woman to win the WTA Finals after losing a match en route. The previous nine to achieve the feat were Maria Sharapova (2004), Amelie Mauresmo (2005), Justine Henin (2006), Kim Clijsters (2010), Serena Williams (2014), Agnieszka Radwanska (2015), Dominika Cibulkova (2016), Caroline Wozniacki (2017) and Ashleigh Barty (2019)
- The progress of Paula Badosa and Garbiñe Muguruza means that for the first time in WTA Finals history, two
  Spaniards will be in the semifinal line-up. Muguruza also made the last four in 2015, while Arantxa Sanchez Vicario
  achieved the feat twice, going on to finish runner-up in 1993
- Paula Badosa, Anett Kontaveit and Garbiñe Muguruza have all won 40 or more matches this season. They are among eight women on tour to reach this mark
- **Kontaveit** leads to tour in 2021 for hard-court wins with 38, with **Muguruza** second on 33. Elina Svitolina is third on 31, followed by Marketa Vondrousova on 29, with **Sakkari** on 28
- Muguruza has hit the highest number of aces this tournament among the semifinalists (21), although the fewest across the season as a whole (total: 170). Badosa (212), Kontaveit (221) and Sakkari (245) have all passed the 200-ace mark this campaign
- **Kontaveit** has won 92.9% of her service games here, up on her season average of 73.1%. Across her three matches, the Estonian has dropped serve only twice (both against Muguruza) and faced only nine break points
- Badosa, who celebrated her 24th birthday on Monday, is the youngest player left in the draw. The average age of the semifinalist is just under 26, up from 24 years old at the 2019 tournament (Ashleigh Barty, Belinda Bencic, Karolina Pliskova and Elina Svitolina)
- Sakkari, Kontaveit and Badosa are among the six players to have made their Top-10 debut this season. The other three are Iga Swiatek, Barbora Krejcikova and Ons Jabeur
- Including her results here, **Sakkari** now owns a tour-leading 9-5 record vs. Top-10 ranked opponents this year. Before the 2021 season, the Greek was 10-13 against the Top 10

## **RANKINGS WATCH**

Regardless of her result against Paula Badosa, **Garbiñe Muguruza** will finish the season as the top-ranked
Spanish woman. She could move to No.3 if she reaches
the final, otherwise she will finish at No.5 or No.6 (if
Maria Sakkari wins the title).

**Anett Kontaveit** is guaranteed to finish 2021 in the Top 8. The highest she can finish is No.6.

**Badosa** is projected to move to No.8, going as high as No.6 with the title.

By lifting the Billie Jean King Trophy, **Sakkari** could move to a career-high No.4 in the rankings, or No.5 (if Muguruza reaches the final).

## **PATRIOT GAMES**

The WTA Finals has been won by 23 women from 14 different countries. However, the progress of **Paula Badosa, Garbiñe Muguruza, Anett Kontaveit** and **Maria Sakkari** guarantees that a new nationality will be engraved on the Billie Jean King Trophy this year.

Anett Kontaveit and Maria Sakkari are the first players ever to qualify for the season-ending finale from Estonia and Greece, respectively.

Meanwhile, Badosa and Muguruza are bidding to go one better than 1993 runner-up Arantxa Sánchez Vicario and lift the title.

#### **PLAYER NOTES**

- Making first appearance at the WTA Finals, and one of six singles debutantes this year (three have advanced to SF)
- Won the first two titles of her career in 2021, firstly at Belgrade and then Indian Wells, helping her amass 3112 points on the Porsche Race to the WTA Finals
- With Muguruza also advancing to SF, it is the first time in the tournament's history two Spaniards have reached this stage. Also first WTA Finals to feature multiple Spaniards since 2000 (Arantxa Sanchez-Vicario and Conchita Martinez)
- A Spaniard has reached the WTA Finals championship match once in the event's history
   1993, Sanchez-Vicario (l. Sabatini)
- Won 10 straight games to upset No.2 Sabalenka in opening round-robin match; now owns four Top-5 wins in her career, having also beaten No.3 Sabalenka (2021 Cincinnati), No.1 Barty (2021 Charleston) and No.5 Krejcikova (2021 Indian Wells)
- Edged past No.6 Sakkari to qualify for SF before eight-match winning run was ended by Swiatek on Monday (longest tour-level unbeaten streak was nine in a row at Belgrade and Roland-Garros this spring)
- Faces No.5 Muguruza in SF today; win-loss record against higher-ranked opponents this season is 20-9
- Owns 3-1 career record against fellow Spaniards in main-draw matches, most recently beating Bolsova at 2021 Wimbledon
- Record in WTA SF matches stands at 2-5
- Broke into Top 10 for the first time last Monday.
   This time last year was ranked No.69
- Is one of eight women to post 40 or more maindraw wins this season
- Has second-most 3-sets wins on Tour in 2021, going 16-6 (level with Jabeur, trails Kasatkina's 17-7). Also has second-most tie-break wins (10-7), behind Andreescu on 11-5

- Making fourth appearance at the WTA Finals, where her best result was SF on debut in 2015 (l. eventual champion A.Radwanska), posting a 3-0 round-robin record
- Also qualified in 2016 and 2017, going 1–2 in the group stage on both occasions
- In doubles, qualified with Suarez Navarro in 2014 and 2015, on the second occasion going on to reach the championship match (l. Hingis/Mirza)
- In opening round-robin match, lost to Ka.Pliskova despite leading 5-4 in the decisive tie-break; now trails in their career head-tohead 9-2
- Bounced back to beat Krejcikova and Kontaveit; now owns 5-8 record against Top-10 players this season, having also beaten No.4 Kenin (Yarra Valley Classic) and No.8 Sabalenka (Doha and Dubai)
- Now holds a 12-2 main-draw record in Mexico (including results here). On most recent visits, lifted back-to-back titles at Monterrey in 2018 and 2019
- Has struck 21 aces in her three matches the most of the four semifinalists
- Faces No.10 Badosa in SF today; when she reached SF at this event in 2015, fell to eventual champion A.Radwanska in a match lasting 2h 41m
- Owns 8-2 career record against players from Spain in main-draw matches, most recently beating Suarez Navarro at 2019 Sydney
- Record in WTA SF matches stands at 13-17
- Has now won 40 matches this season, her most in a single campaign since 2017 (45-18 record)
- Of her nine career titles, seven have come on hard courts including two this year at Dubai and Chicago 500; only titles to not come on hard courts were two Grand Slam titles at 2016 Roland Garros and 2017 Wimbledon
- Is currently ranked No.5, having last month returned to the Top 5 for the first time since the summer of 2018
