PLAYER NOTES

- Making 11th career main draw appearance at the All England Club, where she has made R16 on three occasions, including 2019
- By virtue of 2018's 3r showing here passed \$10 million in career prize money milestone
- Faces No.1 Ashleigh Barty in 1r today; owns 28 wins in career over Top-10 players, although only two on grass (No.5 Stosur at 2012 Olympics and No.4 Kerber at 2016 Birmingham)
- Most recent Top 10 win on any surface was over No.6 Caroline Garcia at 2018 US Open
- Has played two reigning WTA No.1s, losing to S.Williams six times (2010 Australian Open, 2013 Rome, 2013 US Open, 2014 Madrid, 2015 Miami, 2015 Madrid) and Kerber once (2017 Monterrey) - all in straight sets
- In terms of ranking, best career win was over No.2 Halep en route to 2015 Rome final
- Owns 13-6 career record against players from Australia in main draw matches, most recently beating Stosur here at Wimbledon in 1r two years ago
- Across career, is 37-9 in Grand Slam 1r matches
- Best career results on grass are SF runs at 2016 Birmingham and 2013 's-Hertogenbosch
- One of five players from Spain in the draw (also Badosa, Bolsova, Muguruza and Sorribes Tormo)
- Best Open Era results by Spanish women at Wimbledon were title runs from Garbiñe Muguruza (2017) and Conchita Martínez (1994)

PLAYER NOTES

- Making fifth main draw appearance at Wimbledon (eighth overall), where her best result was R16 run on previous visit in 2019 (as No.1 seed, L. Riske)
- Other past results in SW19 included 3r showing in 2018 (L. Kasatkina) and 1r exits in 2012 (L. Vinci) and 2017 (L. Svitolina). Fell in qualifying in 2013-14 and 2016
- Faces No.138 Carla Suárez Navarro in 1r today; has lost twice to players ranked outside Top 100 at a Slam, against No.181 Barthel (2017 Australian Open) and No.451 S.Williams (2018 Roland Garros)
- Record in Grand Slam 1r matches stands at 15-9, most recently losing at this stage at 2017 Wimbledon
- Owns 5-2 career record against players from Spain in main draw matches, while is 2-1 this season (d. Muguruza at Yarra Valley Classic and Badosa at Madrid; L. Badosa at Charleston)
- Top seed for the second time at Wimbledon and the fifth time in her career at the majors (also 2019 Wimbledon, 2020 and 2021 Australian Open and 2021 Roland Garros). Since 1968, the No.1 seed at All England Club has claimed the title on 24 occasions and finished runner-up on eight times
- Owns two titles on grass, at 2019 Birmingham and 2018 Nottingham
- One of four players from Australia in the draw (also Perez, Stosur and Tomljanovic). Three Australian women have won Wimbledon in Open Era: Court (1970) and Goolagong Cawley (1971, 1980)
- During the Wimbledon fortnight, will spend 82nd and 83rd weeks as World No.1. Could be overtaken at the summit if she falls before SF and Sabalenka wins the title
- Has won 28 matches this season - only Jabeur and Sabalenka have won more (both on 29)
- This season, ranks first for titles won (three), finals reached (four), aces struck (209) and Top-10 wins (six - level with Pegula)
- Is wearing the FILA Trailblazer collection this fortnight, which pays homage to Evonne Goolagong Cawley on the 50th anniversary of her first title here

SEASON 2021 HISTORY

- Fell 1r at Roland Garros (l. Stephens in 3s) in first tournament since announcing her recovery from Hodgkin lymphoma
- Exited Roland Garros in 2r (l. Linette via ret. w/hip injury). Also made QF at Rome (l. Gauff via ret. w/right arm injury)
 - Finished R-Up at Madrid (l. Sabalenka in F); defeat to No.7 Sabalenka ended a run a 10 consecutive wins over Top-10 opponents
 - At Stuttgart, won third title of the season at Stuttgart (d. No.9 Ka.Pliskova in QF, No.5 Svitolina in SF and No.7 Sabalenka in F); also won doubles title w/Brady to become first player to sweep both titles since Davenport in 2001
 - Kicked off clay court season with QF showing at Charleston (l. Badosa)
 - Lifted 10th career title, at Miami (d. Andreescu in F via ret. w/left foot injury) – first time defending a title in her career; saved a match point against qualifier Kucova in 2r - S.Williams in 2007 was the last woman to win Miami after saving a match point
 - Ended Australian swing with 2r exit at Adelaide (after 1r bye, l. Collins)
 - Opened season by lifting ninth career title, at the Yarra Valley Classic (d. Muguruza in F). Followed this by advancing to QF at Australian Open (l. Muchova)

CAREER MILESTONES

- In September 2020, revealed that she had been diagnosed with Hodgkin Lymphoma and would undergo six months of chemotherapy
- Only wins at the start of 2020 were during 2r showings at Australian Open and Doha
- Highlights of 2019 included QF runs at Dubai (l. Svitolina) and San Jose (l. Sabalenka) and R16 showings at Doha (l. Bertens), Rome (l. Bertens) and Wimbledon (l. S.Williams)
- By virtue of her 2018 Wimbledon result (3r), passed \$10 million in career prize money
- Defeated No.6 Garcia and former champion Sharapova en route to a QF showing at 2018 US Open
- Reached her third career QF appearance at 2018 Australian Open (l. eventual champion Wozniacki), equaling her best result at the Grand Slams
- Season highlight in 2016 was winning biggest title of career at Premier 5 Doha. Triumph was second WTA singles title, after winning first at 2014 Oeiras
- Returned to Top 10 after 2016 Doha title at No.6, a new career-high singles ranking
- Ended 2015 season third on list for Top 5 wins (4-6 record), defeating No.3 Kvitova (3r Dubai), No.3 Kvitova (QF Doha), No.4 Kvitova (QF Rome) and No.2 Halep (SF Rome)
- One of six players to make Top 10 rankings debut in 2015 (April 6, 2015 at No.10), rising as high as No.8 during the season. Third Spanish women to achieve a Top 10 ranking, after Sánchez-Vicario and Martínez; Muguruza has since become the fourth
- In doubles, qualified for 2015 WTA Finals (w/Muguruza) after winning two titles at Birmingham and Tokyo [PPO], and posting R-Up finishes at Dubai and Madrid. Pair advanced to final in Singapore, falling to top seeds Hingis/Mirza
- QF run at 2008 Roland Garros made her the first qualifier to reach Roland Garros last eight since 2001; and ranked No.132, became joint-lowest-ranked quarterfinalist at Roland Garros (also Pierce)
- Fell 1r on WTA main draw debut at 2008 Viña del Mar (as qualifier, l. de los Rios). Came through qualifying to make SF at her very next tournament, at Bogotá (l. Salerni)
- Made professional debut in 2003 at an ITF Circuit tournament in her hometown of Las Palmas, Gran Canaria
- Finished year-end No.1 for second year in a row in 2020, despite missing all tournaments held after the resumption of play in the summer
- Went 12-3 to start 2020 season, results highlighted by first title on home soil, and eighth overall at Adelaide (d. Yastremska in F). Followed up with first SF run at Australian Open (l. eventual champion Kenin) and runner-up finish at Doha (l. Kvitova)
- Stellar season in 2019 brought four singles titles – including maiden major at Roland Garros (d. Vondrousova in F) and WTA Finals in Shenzhen (d. Svitolina in F); registered Tour-leading 57 match wins, with 11-6 record against Top 10 opponents
- Broke into Top 10 after defeating Ka.Pliskova in F at 2019 Miami (week of April 1) and became first Australian woman in 43 years to secure No.1 singles ranking after title run at Birmingham, where she defeated Goerges in F (June 24, 2019)
- Other highlights in 2019 included R-Up finishes at Sydney (scored first win over a reigning No.1, Halep, en route; l. Kvitova) and Beijing (l. Osaka) and reached SF at Cincinnati and Wuhan. In doubles, won Rome titles and was R-Up at US Open (both w/Azarenka)
- In 2019, spearheaded Australia to its first Billie Jean King Cup final since 1993, against France in Perth; went 1-1 in singles (d. Garcia, l. Mladenovic) and dropped decisive doubles (w/Stosur) as the French prevailed 3-2
- In 2018, won two singles titles and four doubles titles, finishing the season ranked No.15 in singles and No.7 in doubles; was one of only two players to finish the year in the Top 20 in both disciplines (along with Mertens)

CAREER MILESTONES

- Highlight of an interrupted 2020 season were R16 runs at Australian Open and US Open
- Reached two finals across 2019, including a R-Up finish at Indian Wells (l. Andreescu), in what was the first Premier Mandatory final of her career. As a result, passed the \$28 million prize money mark – currently eighth on the all-time list
- Victory over Kontaveit in 2r at 2019 Doha marked 600th career win across all levels

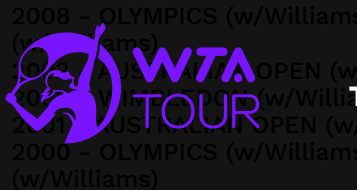

CAREER MILESTONES

- Reached four QFs across 2019, including Auckland (l. eventual R-Up Andreescu), Indian Wells (l. eventual R-Up Kerber), Birmingham (l. eventual champion Barty) and Cincinnati (l. eventual champion Keys)
- Scored her best win of the 2019 season at Indian Wells, ousting No.3 Kvitova in 3s. Also defeated defending champion and then-ranked No.5 Bertens in Cincinnati
- Season highlights in 2018 were SF run at Indian Wells (d. S.Williams in 3r, l. eventual R-Up Kasatkina) and QF effort at Miami (l. Collins)
- Winnings at Indian Wells took her career total past \$40 million – S.Williams (\$92 million) is the only other player to pass this milestone
- Teamed up in Fed Cup for Serena's first competitive match back since giving birth in September 2017 (played dead doubles rubber, l. Kerkhove/Schuurs)
- Ended 2017 season as runner-up at WTA Finals (l. Wozniacki) – the oldest player to ever reach the title bout at the season finale
- Reached two other finals in 2017, at Australian Open (l. S.Williams) and Wimbledon (l. Muguruza) – only player in 2017 to reach two Grand Slam finals
- Shortly after her 37th birthday, returned to Top 10 by reaching 2017 Wimbledon final, becoming (at the time) the third oldest player to rank in Top 10 in WTA history behind Billie Jean King (September 26, 1983 – 39 years, 322 days) and Martina Navratilova (December 26, 1994 – 38 years, 75 days); also surpassed by 37-year-old Serena in February 2019
- During 2016 season won 49th career singles title at Kaohsiung (d. Doi). Is sixth-oldest player to win a WTA singles title, after Billie Jean King (39) at 1983 Birmingham, Kimiko Date (38) at 2009 Seoul, Serena Williams (38) at 2020 Auckland, Martina Navratilova (37) at 1994 Paris [Indoor] and Francesca Schiavone (36) at 2017 Bogotà
- With 49 titles, currently 11th on list of Open Era titleholders, chasing Monica Seles (53 titles)
- At Grand Slam level in 2016, advanced to SF at Wimbledon (l. Kerber) which was first time reaching that stage at a major since 2010 US Open
- At 2016 Rio Olympics won silver medal in the mixed doubles (w/Ram, l. Mattek-Sands/Sock)
- Returned to Top 10 for first time since March 2011 following victory in final of the 2015 WTA Elite Trophy
- Played just two events in 2020 after 11 months out of competition due to injury, suffered 1r exit at US Open (l. Stephens) and fell qualifying at Roland Garros
- Finished 2019 season ranked No.110; campaign was highlighted by SF run at Hiroshima (l. Hibino)
- Enjoyed stellar year in 2018, reaching her first three WTA singles finals and breaking into the Top 20
- Rose to career-high ranking of No.20 on August 6, 2018 before progress was stalled when she badly injured her right ankle in Montréal
- Lifted first WTA singles title at Premier level San Jose (d. Sakkari in F) in 2018
- Prior to 2018, had three WTA main draw wins to her name. Ended that season with a 36-21 record at tour, main draw level
- Posted her first five Top 20 wins of career in 2018, over No.6 Ostapenko (2018 Doha), No.4 Svitolina (2018 Roland Garros), No.5 Svitolina (2018 Birmingham), No.20 Bertens (2018 Eastbourne) and No.15 Mertens (San Jose)
- Enjoyed run to R16 at 2018 Roland Garros, her best result at a major (l. Keys). Also made QF stage in doubles in Paris (w/Bara, l. H.Chan/Z.Yang)
- Reached first four career doubles finals in 2018, winning Strasbourg (w/Olaru, d. N.Kichenok/An.Rodionova in F) and finishing RUP at Prague, Nottingham and Eastbourne
- Made second WTA singles final of career at Prague (l. Kvitova in 3s); rose to then-careerhigh ranking of No.32 following the tournament (May 7, 2018)
