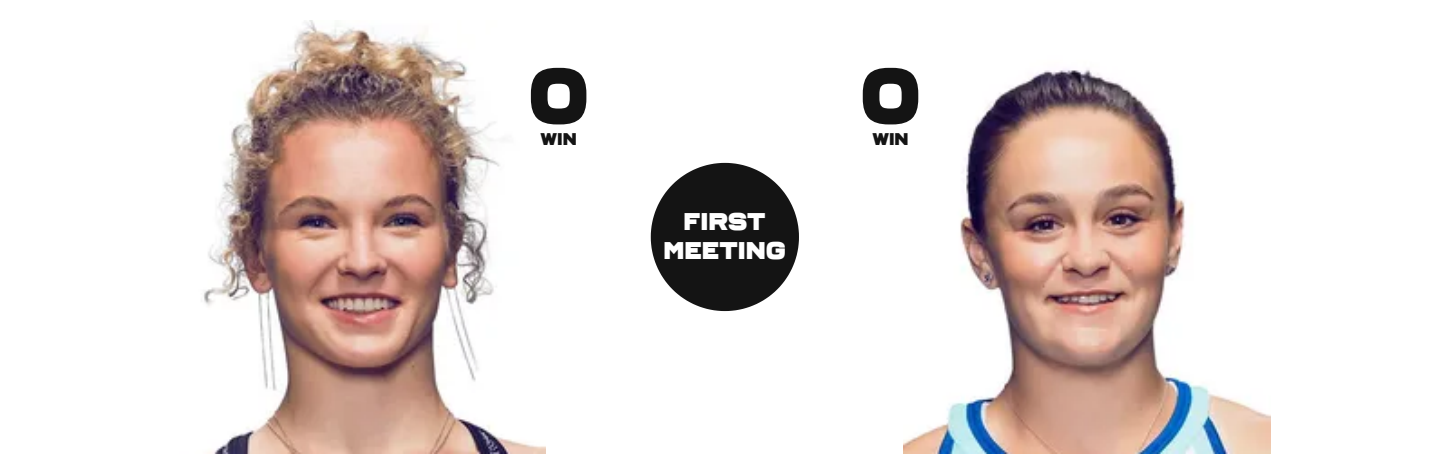

PLAYER NOTES

- Making sixth main draw appearance at Wimbledon (seventh overall)
- Previously reached 3r in 2016 (l. A.Radwanska) and 2018 (l. Giorgi, having held 1MP in second set)
- Won the doubles title at the All England Club in 2018 (w/Krejciakova, d. Melichar/Peschke in F). The all-Czech duo also lifted the junior doubles title in 2013 (in addition to the Roland Garros and US Open doubles titles that same year)
- Seeded No.1 in doubles w/Krejciakova this year
- Defeated LL Y.Wang in 1r (originally drawn to face Konta) and Vandeweghe in 2r. Has now won back-to-back matches at five of her past six tournaments, having not achieved the feat at any of her opening six events this season
- Has won 95% (19/20) of her service games across the first two rounds - the joint most in the tournament (level with Gauff, Keys and Ka.Pliskova)
- Faces No.1 Ashleigh Barty in 3r today; six career wins against Top 10 players came over No.4 Halep and No.10 Konta (both at 2017 Shenzhen), No.6 Wozniacki (2017 Bastad), No.4 Garcia (2018 Wuhan), No.1 Osaka (2019 Roland Garros) and No.8 S.Williams (2021 Parma)
- Owns 1-5 career record against players from Australia in main draw matches, most recently falling to Tomljanovic at 2019 Brisbane
- Record against seeded opposition this season stands at 6-4, winning six of the last eight, including three during last week's Bad Homburg R-Up finish (her first career grass court final)
- Prior to this season, best result on grass was QF at 2015 Birmingham (l. eventual champion Kerber)
- One of five players from Czech Republic to reach 3r (also Krejciakova, Ka.Pliskova, Martincova and Muchova). The United States is the only other nation so well represented (also five)
- Two Czech women have won Wimbledon: Petra Kvitova (2011, 2014) and Jana Novotna (1998)

PLAYER NOTES

- Making fifth main draw appearance at Wimbledon (eighth overall), where her best result was R16 run on previous visit in 2019 (as No.1 seed, l. Riske)
- Won girls' singles title at All England Club in 2011. Two other former junior champions have reached 3r (Ostapenko and Swiatek)
- Top seed for the second time at Wimbledon and the fifth time in her career at the majors (also 2019 Wimbledon, 2020 and 2021 Australian Open and 2021 Roland Garros). Since 1968, the No.1 seed at All England Club has claimed the title on 24 occasions and finished runner-up eight times
- Struck 18 aces in wins over Suarez Navarro in 1r and Blinkova in 2r - has now hit a Tour-leading 227 aces this season
- Also ranks first this season for titles won (three), finals reached (four) and Top-10 wins (six - level with Pegula)
- Has now won 30 matches this season - only Jabeur and Sabalenka have won more (both on 31)
- Faces No.64 Katerina Siniakova in 3r today; only loss this season to a player outside Top 50 came against No.71 Badosa (Charleston)
- Record in Grand Slam 3r matches stands at 7-4
- Owns two titles on grass, at 2019 Birmingham and 2018 Nottingham
- During the Wimbledon fortnight, will spend 82nd and 83rd weeks as World No.1. Could be overtaken at the summit if she falls before SF and Sabalenka wins the title
- One of four players from Australia in the draw (also Perez, Stosur and Tomljanovic). There have been three Australian women's champions at Wimbledon in Open Era: Court (1970) and Goolagong Cawley (1971, 1980)
- Is wearing the FILA Trailblazer collection this fortnight, which pays homage to Evonne Goolagong Cawley on the 50th anniversary of her first title here

SEASON 2021 HISTORY

- At Bad Homburg, finished R-Up (l. Kerber) - her first singles final since the start of 2018
 - Advanced to SF at Parma (d. No.8 S.Williams, l. eventual champion Gauff) and reeached 3r at Roland Garros (l. Zidansek); also lifted second Roland Garros doubles title (w/Krejcikova)
 - Contested qualifying at Madrid; bounced back to lift 10th WTA doubles title of her career (w/Krejcikova, d. Dabrowski/Schuurs in F)
 - Advanced to QF at Istanbul (l. Bogdan)
 - Reached 2r at St. Petersburg (l. Gasparyan) before suffering 1r exit at Miami (l. Konjuh)
 - Fell 1r at Dubai (l. Jabeur) and in qualifying at Doha
 - Bounced back to reach doubles final at Australian Open w/Krejcikova (l. Mertens/Sabalenka)
 - Opened singles campaign in 2021 with 1r exits at Grampains Trophy (l. Kerber) and Australian Open (l. Ferro)
- Exited Roland Garros in 2r (l. Linette via ret. w/hip injury). Also made QF at Rome (l. Gauff via ret. w/right arm injury)
 - Finished R-Up at Madrid (l. Sabalenka in F); defeat to No.7 Sabalenka ended a run a 10 consecutive wins over Top-10 opponents
 - At Stuttgart, won third title of the season at Stuttgart (d. No.9 Ka.Pliskova in QF, No.5 Svitolina in SF and No.7 Sabalenka in F); also won doubles title w/Brady to become first player to sweep both titles since Davenport in 2001
 - Kicked off clay court season with QF showing at Charleston (l. Badosa)
 - Lifted 10th career title, at Miami (d. Andreescu in F via ret. w/left foot injury) – first time defending a title in her career; saved a match point against qualifier Kucova in 2r - S.Williams in 2007 was the last woman to win Miami after saving a match point
 - Ended Australian swing with 2r exit at Adelaide (after 1r bye, l. Collins)
 - Opened season by lifting ninth career title, at the Yarra Valley Classic (d. Muguruza in F). Followed this by advancing to QF at Australian Open (l. Muchova)

CAREER MILESTONES

- Reached two doubles finals in 2020, winning her first event of the season (Shenzhen w/Krejcikova) and finishing R-Up in the last (Linz w/Hradecka); also reached SF at Australian Open and Roland Garros (both w/Krejcikova)
- In singles last year, best results were QF at Strasbourg (l. Sabalenka) and 3r run at Roland Garros (l. Bertens)
- Produced career-best Slam singles result with R16 run at 2019 Roland Garros (d. No.1 Osaka in 3r, l. Keys)
- Finished 2018 ranked No.1 in doubles after winning first two Grand Slam trophies at Roland Garros (d. Hozumi/ Ninomiya in F) and Wimbledon (d. Melichar/Peschke in F) both w/Krejcikova, the first pairing to complete the Roland Garros-Wimbledon double since Kim Clijsters and Ai Sugiyama in 2003; also became the first team ever to win the girls' (2013) and ladies' doubles title at SW19
- Also R-Up w/Krejcikova at 2018 WTA Finals Singapore (l. Babos/ Mladenovic)
- Has three Top 5 career wins in singles – against No.4 Halep at 2017 Shenzhen, No.4 Garcia at Wuhan, and No.1 Osaka at 2019 Roland Garros
- Won both singles rubbers during Czech Republic's 3-0 victory over USA in final of 2018 Billie Jean King Cup
- Won two career singles titles in 2017, first at Shenzhen (d. No.4 Halep in 2r, No.10 Konta in SF – the first Top 10 wins of her career – and Riske in F) and then Bastad (d. No.17 Sevastova in QF, No.20 Garcia in SF and No.6 Wozniacki in F)
- Reached doubles final at 2017 US Open (w/Hradecka, l. Chan/Hingis)
- Made Top 50 debut on October 24, 2016
- In 2016, advanced to first two WTA finals of career, at Bastad (as qualifier, l. Siegemund) and Tokyo [Japan Open] (l. McHale)
- Won back-to-back Grand Slam matches for the first time during 3r showing at 2016 Wimbledon (l. A.Radwanska)
- Notched the first Top 20 win of her career by upsetting No.14 Petkovic during QF run at 2015 Birmingham
- Broke into Top 100 for the first time on October 20, 2014 following breakthrough SF run at Moscow (as qualifier, l. eventual champion Pavlyuchenkova)
- Fell 1r on Grand Slam main draw debut at 2014 Australian Open (as qualifier, l. Diyas)
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2013 Miami (l. Muguruza)
- Finished year-end No.1 for second year in a row in 2020, despite missing all tournaments held after the resumption of play in the summer
- Went 12-3 to start 2020 season, results highlighted by first title on home soil, and eighth overall at Adelaide (d. Yastremska in F). Followed up with first SF run at Australian Open (l. eventual champion Kenin) and runner-up finish at Doha (l. Kvitova)
- Stellar season in 2019 brought four singles titles – including maiden major at Roland Garros (d. Vondrousova in F) and WTA Finals in Shenzhen (d. Svitolina in F); registered Tour-leading 57 match wins, with 11-6 record against Top 10 opponents
- Broke into Top 10 after defeating Ka.Pliskova in F at 2019 Miami (week of April 1) and became first Australian woman in 43 years to secure No.1 singles ranking after title run at Birmingham, where she defeated Goerges in F (June 24, 2019)
- Other highlights in 2019 included R-Up finishes at Sydney (scored first win over a reigning No.1, Halep, en route; l. Kvitova) and Beijing (l. Osaka) and reached SF at Cincinnati and Wuhan. In doubles, won Rome titles and was R-Up at US Open (both w/Azarenka)
- In 2019, spearheaded Australia to its first Billie Jean King Cup final since 1993, against France in Perth; went 1-1 in singles (d. Garcia, l. Mladenovic) and dropped decisive doubles (w/Stosur) as the French prevailed 3-2
- In 2018, won two singles titles and four doubles titles, finishing the season ranked No.15 in singles and No.7 in doubles; was one of only two players to finish the year in the Top 20 in both disciplines (along with Mertens)

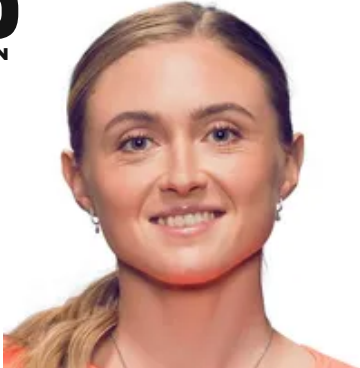
