GRASS COURT QUEEN

In the week leading up to Wimbledon, **Angelique Kerber** triumphed on home soil at Bad Homburg to collect her third grass court title. She has built on this momentum at the All England Club, three more wins in the opening week taking her career total on grass to an impressive 79.

BREAKING NEW GROUND

Viktorija Golubic, Aryna Sabalenka and **Ajla Tomljanovic** are all through to their maiden Grand Slam quarterfinals.

Additionally, on Tuesday **Ashleigh Barty, Ons Jabeur** and **Karolina Pliskova** will be playing their first Wimbledon quarterfinals. This is the first time in the Open Era that the last eight at the All England Club contains six first-time quarterfinalists.

HAPPY HUNTING GROUND

Two years ago, an unseeded **Karolina Muchova** sent seeds tumbling as she reached her maiden Grand Slam quarterfinal.

This year, she has retraced her footsteps to become only the third woman in the Open Era to advance to the last eight on her first two appearances at the All England Club. The other two were Chris Evert (1972-73) and Jelena Dokic (1999-2000).



JUNIOR SENIOR

Ashleigh Barty's first breakthrough on the international stage came in 2011, when she lifted the girls' singles title at Wimbledon as a 15-year-old. In the Open Era, three women have backed up junior titles by later lifting the Venus Rosewater Dish: Ann Jones, Martina Hingis and Amélie Mauresmo.

- Making sixth appearance (ninth overall) at Wimbledon, where she has made it beyond 2r for the first time
- Struck 21 winners to 16 unforced errors in 1r win over Greet Minnen, then battled past the in-form Cornet in 2r
- Recovered from 6-4 2-0 down to beat recent Eastbourne champion Ostapenko in 3r; now owns three Top-50 wins this season, having also upset No.21 Vondrousova (Rome) and No.17 Mertens (Birmingham)
- Advanced to maiden Slam QF when Raducanu retired midway through second set
- Has won four main draw matches in a row for the first time since R-Up finish at 2019 Hua Hin
- Faces No.1 Ashleigh Barty today in the first all-Australian Grand Slam QF since Goolagong d. Turnbull at 1980 Wimbledon
- This is also the first time two Australian women have reached QF at the same major since 1988 Australian Open (Mandlikova and Minter)
- Owns 8-3 career record against fellow Australians in main draw matches, while is 1-1 this season (d. Cabrera at Phillip Island Trophy; l. Sanders at Adelaide)
- Three wins in career over Top 10 players, came against No.3 A.Radwanska (2014 Roland Garros), No.9 Sabalenka (2019 Miami) and No.8 Bertens (2019 Zhengzhou)
- Record against seeded players in 2021 is 2-6
- One of six first-time Wimbledon quarterfinalists in the draw - an Open Era record
- Overall record in WTA QF matches stands at 7-11
- Bidding to become first Australian woman to reach SF here since Dokic in 2000. There have been three Australian women's champions at Wimbledon in Open Era: Court (1970) and Goolagong Cawley (1971, 1980)
- Prior to 2021 Wimbledon, best career result on grass were QF runs at 2019 Nottingham and 2018 Mallorca

PLAYER NOTES

- Making fifth main draw appearance at Wimbledon (eighth overall), where she made R16 in 2019 (as No.1 seed, l. Riske)
- Won girls' singles title at All England Club in 2011. Only three junior champions have gone on to lift the Venus Rosewater Dish in the senior ranks (Jones, Hingis and Mauresmo)
- Top seed for the second time at Wimbledon and the fifth time in her career at the majors (also 2019 Wimbledon, 2020 and 2021 Australian Open and 2021 Roland Garros). Since 1968, the No.1 seed at All England Club has claimed the title on 24 occasions and finished runner-up eight times
- Struck 33 aces in wins over Suarez Navarro in 1r, Blinkova in 2r, Siniakova in 3r and Krejciikova in R16 - has now hit a Tour-leading 242 aces this season
- Has successfully returned 86% of the serves she has faced this fortnight - the highest percentage of any woman left in the draw (followed by Kerber on 85%)
- Has now won 32 matches in 2021 - only Jabeur and Sabalenka have won more (both 33)
- Faces No.75 Ajla Tomljanovic in QF today; record in Slam QF is 2-2
- Overall record in WTA QF matches is 22-10 Owns
- 5-2 career record against players from Australia in main draw matches, most recently beating Gavrilova in 2r at 2021 Australian Open Owns
- two titles on grass, at 2019 Birmingham and 2018 Nottingham. Is one of 11 active players to win multiple titles on the surface
- During the Wimbledon fortnight, will spend 82nd and 83rd weeks as World No.1. Could be overtaken at the summit if she falls before SF and Sabalenka wins the title
- Is wearing the FILA Trailblazer collection this fortnight, which pays homage to Evonne Goolagong Cawley on the 50th anniversary of her first title here

SEASON 2021 HISTORY

- Coming off 1r exit at Madrid (as qualifier, l. Rybakina)
 - In Charleston, won back-to-back main draw matches for the first time since 2019 to reach 3r at Volvo Car Open (l. Stephens) and then 2r at MUSC Health Women's Open (l. Tauson)
 - Made 2r at Miami (l. Osaka)
 - Suffered 1r exit at Adelaide (l. Sanders)
 - Also on home soil, posted 2r showings at Phillip Island Trophy (l. Pavlyuchenkova) and Australian Open (l. Halep – having led 5-2 in final set), and suffered 1r exit at Gippsland Trophy (l. Cornet)
 - Reached 2r in opening tournament of the season, at Abu Dhabi (l. eventual champion Sabalenka); also reached SF in doubles (w/Kenin, l. eventual champions Aoyama/Shibahara)
- Exited Roland Garros in 2r (l. Linette via ret. w/hip injury). Also made QF at Rome (l. Gauff via ret. w/right arm injury)
 - Finished R-Up at Madrid (l. Sabalenka in F); defeat to No.7 Sabalenka ended a run a 10 consecutive wins over Top-10 opponents
 - At Stuttgart, won third title of the season at Stuttgart (d. No.9 Ka.Pliskova in QF, No.5 Svitolina in SF and No.7 Sabalenka in F); also won doubles title w/Brady to become first player to sweep both titles since Davenport in 2001
 - Kicked off clay court season with QF showing at Charleston (l. Badosa)
 - Lifted 10th career title, at Miami (d. Andreescu in F via ret. w/left foot injury) – first time defending a title in her career; saved a match point against qualifier Kucova in 2r - S.Williams in 2007 was the last woman to win Miami after saving a match point
 - Ended Australian swing with 2r exit at Adelaide (after 1r bye, l. Collins)
 - Opened season by lifting ninth career title, at the Yarra Valley Classic (d. Muguruza in F). Followed this by advancing to QF at Australian Open (l. Muchova)

CAREER MILESTONES

- Equaled best result at home Slam by advancing to 2r at 2020 Australian Open (l. Muguruza)
- Ended 2019 season by representing Australia in Perth final of Billie Jean King Cup vs. France – went 1-1 in singles (d. Parmentier, l. Mladenovic) as visitors prevailed 3-2
- Posted career-high ranking of No.39 on April 1, 2019 (following 3r run at Miami 3r)
- Four-time WTA singles finalist, most recently finishing runner-up at 2019 Hua Hin (l. Yastremska). Earlier finals came at 2015 Pattaya City (l. Hantuchova), 2018 Rabat (l. Mertens) and 2018 Seoul (l. Bertens)
- Posted two Top 10 wins in 2019, her first for almost five years, defeating No.10 Sabalenka (Miami) and No.8 Bertens (Zhengzhou). Other Top 10 defeat, and best win of career, came over No.3 A.Radwanska at 2014 Roland Garros
- Reached first Premier-level SF of career at 2019 Zhengzhou (l. eventual champion Ka.Pliskova)
- Underwent shoulder surgery in February 2016 and was sidelined for rest of season; returned at 2017 Acapulco, more than 12 months later
- Made Top 50 debut in 2015, rising as high as No.47 (week of February 23)
- Best Grand Slam result to date is R16 run at 2014 Roland Garros (d. No.32 seed Vesnina in 2r and No.3 seed A.Radwanska in 3r, l. Suárez Navarro)
- Announced in 2014 she would switch nationalities and start representing Australia (first did so at 2014 US Open)
- On ITF Circuit, winner of four singles titles and three doubles titles
- Made pro debut on ITF Circuit in Croatia in 2007 and WTA main draw debut at 2009 Indian Wells (as WC, l. 1r)
- As a junior, achieved career-high ranking of No.4, won Australian Open junior doubles title in 2009 (w/McHale), and was a member of Croatia's victorious junior Fed Cup team in 2009
- Finished year-end No.1 for second year in a row in 2020, despite missing all tournaments held after the resumption of play in the summer
- Went 12-3 to start 2020 season, results highlighted by first title on home soil, and eighth overall at Adelaide (d. Yastremska in F). Followed up with first SF run at Australian Open (l. eventual champion Kenin) and runner-up finish at Doha (l. Kvitova)
- Stellar season in 2019 brought four singles titles – including maiden major at Roland Garros (d. Vondrousova in F) and WTA Finals in Shenzhen (d. Svitolina in F); registered Tour-leading 57 match wins, with 11-6 record against Top 10 opponents
- Broke into Top 10 after defeating Ka.Pliskova in F at 2019 Miami (week of April 1) and became first Australian woman in 43 years to secure No.1 singles ranking after title run at Birmingham, where she defeated Goerges in F (June 24, 2019)

- Faces No.28 Angelique Kerber in QF today; is 1-1 in Grand Slam QF matches, losing to Svitolina at 2019 Wimbledon and beating Barty at 2021 Australian Open
- Overall record in WTA QF matches stands at 4-4
- Away from Wimbledon, only Tour-level grass court appearances of career ended in 1r exits at 2019 's-Hertogenbosch and 2021 Berlin
- One of two players from Czech Republic to reach QF. Was also one of two Czechs to make this stage in 2019 (also Strycova, who went on to reach SF)
- Two Czech women have won Wimbledon title in Open Era: Kvitova (2011, 2014) and Novotna (1998)
- Is No.19 seed this fortnight - among the seeds for sixth major in a row
- Currently ranked No.22 and could make her Top-10 debut by lifting the title on Saturday

CAREER MILESTONES

- Highlight of an interrupted 2020 season were R16 runs at Australian Open and US Open
- Reached two finals across 2019, including a R-Up finish at Indian Wells (L. Andreescu), in what was the first Premier Mandatory final of her career. As a result, passed the \$28 million prize money mark – currently eighth on the all-time list
- Victory over Kontaveit in 2r at 2019 Doha marked 600th career win across all levels
- Defeated Haddad Maia in 2r at 2019 Australian Open for 100th Grand Slam match-win (one of seven active players to achieve the feat)
- Won two titles in 2018, at Sydney (d. Barty in F) and third Grand Slam crown of career at Wimbledon (d. S.Williams in F), finishing the season ranked No.2
- Also in 2018, advanced to SF at Australian Open (L. Halep in 3s, having held two match points), Dubai (L. eventual champion Svitolina) and Eastbourne (L. eventual champion Wozniacki)
- Best results of 2017 season were R-Up finish at Monterrey and SF runs at Tokyo [PPO] and Dubai
- Enjoyed an outstanding 2016 season, winning first Grand Slam titles of career at Australian Open (d. S.Williams in F) and US Open (d. Ka.Pliskova in F), finishing R-Up at Wimbledon (L. S.Williams in F) and rising to World No.1 in the WTA rankings. At 28, became oldest player to make her debut at World No.1
- At 2016 Australian Open, became first Grand Slam champion to save match point en route to the title since Li Na at 2014 Australian Open (Kerber saved a match point in 1r win over Doi)
- Finished 2016 year-end World No.1 ranking – became 12th WTA player to achieve the feat and second German woman to do so after Graf (eight times)
- Was voted WTA Player of the Year in 2016 by international media; also, ITF World Champion and Olympics silver medalist that year. Ended the season with a tour-leading 63-18 win-loss record
- Part of the Germany team that reached the final of 2014 Billie Jean King Cup. Also played the competition in 2007-08, 2012-13, 2015-18
- Made Grand Slam breakthrough with run to SF at 2011 US Open (ranked No.92, upset No.13 A.Radwanska, L. eventual champion Stosur)
- Broke into Top 100 on May 14, 2007 and reached first WTA QF one month later at 's-Hertogenbosch (L. Chakvetadze)
- Posted best result at US Open by reaching R16 in 2020 – handed V.Williams her first-ever opening round loss in New York in 22 appearances, then saved three MPs vs. Cirstea in 3r, before falling to eventual R-Up Azarenka
- Finished 2019 season in rich vein of form, winning 18 of last 24 matches, including capturing maiden WTA title at Seoul (d. Linette in F), SFs at Zhuhai (L. eventual champion Sabalenka) and Moscow (L. Pavlyuchenkova) and maiden major QF at Wimbledon (L. Svitolina)
- During run to last eight at 2019 Wimbledon upset No.3 Ka.Pliskova in R16 to record her first Top 10 victory; following the tournament, broke into Top 50 at No.43 on July 15, 2019
- First WTA final appearance came during R-Up finish on home soil at 2019 Prague (L. Teichmann) – made Top 100 debut at No.74 following the tournament (May 6, 2019)
- Advanced to maiden WTA QF at 2019 Doha (as qualifier, L. Svitolina)
- Billie Jean King Cup debut came during 4-0 World Group play-off win over Canada in 2019
- Reached 3r on Grand Slam main draw debut at 2018 US Open (as qualifier, d. No.12 Muguruza in 2r, L. Barty in 3r)
- Fell 1r on WTA main draw debut at 2017 Seoul (as qualifier, L. Hon)
- Won second – and most recent – career ITF Circuit title in 2016 and posted 39-18 win-loss record; at tour-level fell in qualifying at US Open
- Played first events of career on ITF Circuit in Croatia in 2013
