



CAREER MILESTONES

- Finished last season with SF runs at Luxembourg, Chicago [500] and Moscow
- Won silver medal in singles at Olympics in Tokyo (l. Bencic)
- Opened 2021 campaign with SF at Yarra Valley Classic before R16 showing at Australian Open
- Highlights of 2020 include defeating No.6
 Svitolina to reach SFs at Rome (l. Ka.Pliskova) as well as a QF run to kick off the season at Adelaide (l. No.1 Barty)
- Enjoyed break-out season in 2019, reaching three finals across the year and posting careerhigh ranking of No.14 on July 1, 2019
- Finished R-Up at Budapest (l. Van Uytvanck) and Istanbul (l. Martic) before reaching championship match at Roland Garros (l. Barty); did not drop a set en route to final in Paris
- Ranked No.38, was joint-third lowest-ranked woman to reach Roland Garros final, and aged 19, was first teenager to reach title match there since Ivanovic in 2007
- Posted first win of career over a Top 2 player in 2019, defeating No.2 Halep at Indian Wells and then Rome
- Forced to end 2019 season down early due to left wrist injury – did not play again following 1r exit at Wimbledon
- In doubles, has reached SF at 2019 Australian Open (w/Strycova) and QF at 2017 Wimbledon (w/Bellis)
- At 2018 US Open, became the first teenager to reach the last 16 at Flushing Meadows since 2016 (Konjuh, QF – 18) and the youngest Czech player to advance to this stage in New York since 2005 (Vaidisova, R16 – 16)
- Was the biggest ranking mover on tour in 2017, moving from No.376 to No.67 (309 places)
- Made WTA breakthrough by winning International-level title at 2017 Biel/Bienne (d. Kontaveit in F), in just her second WTA main draw. At No.233, was the lowest-ranked title winner in 2017 and aged 17 years, 293 days was the youngest since Konjuh (17 years, 169 days) at 2015 Nottingham
- Advanced to 2r on tour-level debut at 2016 Prague – as wildcard
- Made professional debut at 2014 \$100k
 ITF/Prague-CZE (d. Suk, l. Brengle in 2r); on ITF
 Circuit, winner of seven singles and four doubles titles
- In juniors won doubles at Australian Open and Roland Garros in 2015 (both w/Kolodziejova). In singles, was semifinalist at both Roland Garros

- Made a welcome return to form and fitness in 2021, rising nearly 500 places in the rankings
- Achieved her first significant result since returning from along-standing elbow injury when she reached R16 at Miami as a wildcard. Aquarterfinal at Istanbul and a runner-up finish at Belgrade – her first finalin over four years – continued this ascent during the clay court season, whilea run through qualifying to the semifinals at San Jose helped her close theyear at No.66 in the rankings
- Highlight of 2020 was winning her third title on the ITF circuit at \$25K Zagreb-CRO (d. Mrdeza in F)
- Highlight of 2020 was winning her third title on the ITF circuit at \$25K Zagreb-CRO (d. Mrdeza in F)
- In 2019, played just three events before ending season early due to right elbow injury
- Contested four tournaments in 2018 before ending season early due to right elbow injury
- Underwent surgery on right elbow after 2017 US Open, ending season early
- Notched second-consecutive Top 50 finish in 2017, finishing the year at No.44
- Posted career-high ranking of World No.20 on July 31, 2017
- Highlight of 2017 was making second career singles final at Auckland (I. Davis). Rose to new career-high ranking of No.36 following result (January 9, 2017)
- Ended 2016 at No.48 for career-best year-end finish
- Season highlight was posting best result at a Grand Slam with QF run at 2016 US Open (l. eventual R-Up Ka.Pliskova). Became first Croatian woman to reach the QF at Flushing Meadows, and first at any Grand Slam since Karolina Sprem at 2004 Wimbledon (l. QF). Unranked players aside, at No.92 Konjuh was the equal second-lowest ranked player through to quarterfinals at the US Open since rankings began in November 1975 (Kerber was also ranked No.92 in 2011)
- Season highlights US Open aside were SF at Guangzhou (l. Jankovic) and QF at Moscow (as LL, l. Svitolina) Represented Croatia at Rio Olympics, falling 2r in singles (l. Suarez Navarro)
- Forced to withdraw from Nottingham as defending champion – with w/lower back injury
- Won first WTA singles title at 2015 Nottingham (d. Niculescu in F)

and Wimbledon and rose to No.1 on ITF junior rankings in 2015

- Made WTA main draw debut as wildcard at 2014 Auckland (d. top seed Vinci in 1r, l. Davis in 3s)
- Played first pro events of career on ITF Circuit in Croatia and Turkey in 2012
- On ITF Circuit won one singles title at \$10k ITF/Montpellier-FRA (d. Khromacheva in F)
- Claimed junior girls No.1 ranking after winning the Australian Open singles and doubles titles in 2013; also won 2013 US Open girls singles title

- Began playing tennis at 4 years old with her father, David Voundrous, and by 10-years-old she was practicing in Prague. Mother, Jindriska Anderlova played volleyball in the top Czech league
- Favorite surface is clay because she grew up on it, but believes her game is more suited for hard courts
- Chose tennis over soccer because she prefers the individual nature of the sport





- Went on to reach the Final at Prague (l. Krejcikova)

- · Reached further two QF in the 2021 season at Chicago (l. Peterson) and Ostrava (l. Sakkari)
- Broke into Top 100 at No.98 on April 5, 2021, following 2r showing at Miami
- Highlight of 2020 season was SF run at Istanbul (l. eventual champion Tig)
- In 2019, season highlight was fourth ITF Circuit title of career at \$25K Essen-GER
- Won third ITF Circuit singles title of career in 2018, at \$25k ITF/Obidos and made QF run at WTA 125K Series event at Taipei
- · Advanced to first tour-level SF at 2017 Gstaad, earning career first Top 20 win over then-No.20 Garcia
- Earned a then career-high singles ranking of No.114 following 2r run at 2017 Nanchang (l. eventual champion Peng)
- Win-loss record at tour-level in 2017 was 5-7, including three wins at Gstaad and 2r runs at Monterrey (d. McHale, l. Boserup) and Nanchang (d. Kudryavtseva, l. Peng)
- · Advanced to maiden WTA SF at Québec City in 2016 (l. Davis)
- In 2015, reached first WTA QF at Florianopolis (l. Mattek-Sands)
- Made WTA qualifying and main draw debut at 2013 Nurnberg (l. Cabeza Candela in 1r)
- · Owns four singles titles on the ITF Circuit at 2014 \$10k ITF/Heraklion-GRE, 2015 \$25k ITF/Lenzerheide-SUI, 2018 \$25k ITF/Obidos and 2019 \$25k Essen-GER
- · Professional debut came on ITF Circuit in Germany in 2010 (as qualifier, l. 1r)

- · Finished 2021 season ranked no. 56, having fallen from 2020 year-end ranking of no. 16
- Reached her best 2021 results on GRASS QF at Berlin (l. Samsonova) and 4r at Wimbledon (l. Golubic)
- Started the 2021 season at Qatar and Dubai where she lost in 2r on both ocassions (l. Sakkari and Potapova)
- · Finished 2020 campaign ranked No.16 in the world, with best result being runner-up finish at Brisbane (l. Ka.Pliskova in 3s)
- Lifted biggest title of career during 2019 season at WTA Premier-5 level Cincinnati (d. Kuznetsova in F); afterwards returned to Top 10 for first time since week of June 25, 2018
- Reached QF at Roland Garros (l. Barty). One of three Americans to make last eight (also Anisimova and Stephens) - the first time since 2004 (Capriati, S.Williams and V.Williams)
- Reached first Grand Slam final in 2017 in New York, losing out to Stephens in 10th all-American US Open final in the Open Era. At 22, became the youngest Flushing Meadows finalist since 19-year-old Wozniacki lost to Clijsters in 2009
- Enjoyed first Top 10 year-end finish in 2016 (at No.8), as youngest player in the year-end Top 25
- Broke into Top 10 on June 20, 2016, becoming 118th player to reach the elite bracket since computer rankings were introduced. Became first American to make Top 10 debut since S.Williams in 1999
- Made WTA Finals debut at Singapore in 2016, going 1-2 in round robin play
- Represented USA at 2016 Rio Olympics, reaching SF (lost Bronze medal match against Kvitova)
- Qualified for WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai in 2015 (went 1-1 in round robin stage on all three appearances); advanced to SF stage in 2018 however withdrew before match due to a left knee injury
- Cracked Top 20 on February 2, 2015
- Was second-youngest player to win a WTA title in 2014, at Eastbourne (after Vekic at Kuala Lumpur); also, youngest American to win a title since Vania King in October 2006 (17 years, 254 days, Bangkok)
- Made tour-level debut at 2009 Ponte Vedra Beach at 14 years old (as WC, d. Kudryavtseva); was seventh youngest player to win a WTA main draw match at 14 years, 48 days, and youngest since Hingis in 1994


