[8] KAROLINA PLISKOVA (CZE #15)

Anisimova is 1 of 4 players with 30+ wins this year, joining Swiatek, Jabeur and Halep... Anisimova is 1 of 8 Americans in the second round, the most at the tournament since 2001 (when there were 9 Americans)... Anisimova has played 18 3-set matches in 2022, winning 13; she is tied for the Tour lead in both categories... Ka.Pliskova defeated Boulter in opening round despite hitting 16 double faults in her opening win over Boulter; her previous high was set at 2014 Seoul, a tournament she would go on to win the title... Ka.Pliksova, the Tour leader in aces in 5 of the last 7 years, has hit 149 aces (tied for 7th most on Tour) in 21 matches this year (7.1 aces per match)

Badosa is bidding to become the first Spanish quarterfinalist at the tournament since 2019 (Suarez Navarro, QF)... With 27 match wins, Badosa is tied for 7th most wins on Tour entering today



- Finished with a career-high 16 double faults in the opening round win over Boulter; previous career-high was 14, in a SF win over Kirilenko in the SF of 2014 Seoul, a tournament she went on to win the title
- Faces No.22 Amanda Anisimova in 2r today; owns 86-88 record vs. opponents ranked in Top 25
- Owns 4-0 record vs. Anisimova; of players she has played 5 or more times, is undefeated against only Zhang Shuai (7-0), Ana Ivanovic (5-0), Monica Puig (5-0)
- Owns 47-21 career record against players from United States of America, with record in 2022 standing at 1-1
- 10 of 16 WTA titles have come on hard courts, including one in the US, at 2016 Cincinnati. Also finished R-Up on American soil 3 times
- Only player from Czech Republic in the draw.
 Best result by a Czech here were Mandlikova's title runs in 1984-85
- Currently ranked No.15, her lowest position since August 2016
- Has won only nine matches so far this season the fewest she has posted entering the US summer swing since 2013

- Made QF at Wimbledon (l. Halep) and Bad Homburg (l. Halep)
- Progressed to QF at Rome (l. Sabalenka) and R16 at Roland Garros (l. Fernandez)
- Advanced to SF at Charleston (I. Jabeur) and QF at Madrid (I. Alexandrova); upset Sabalenka at both tournaments - the second and third Top-5 wins of her career
- Made 2r at Indian Wells (l. Fernandez via ret. w/illness) and fell 1r at Miami (l. Rogers)
- Suffered qualifying exit at Dubai and reached 2r at Doha (l. Ostapenko)
- Made R16 at Australian Open (d. Osaka in 3r, l. eventual champion Barty)
- Lifted second career title at Melbourne Summer Set 2 (d. Sasnovich in F)

- Posted QF showing at Berlin (l. Gauff), then fell 2r at Eastbourne (after 1r bye, l. Boulter) and Wimbledon (l. Boulter)
- On clay, best results were SF at Strasbourg (l. Juvan) and 3r at Charleston (l. Alexandrova).
 Also fell 2r at Roland Garros (l. Jeanjean), Rome (after 1r bye, l. Teichmann) and Stuttgart (l. Samsonova), and in 1r at Madrid (l. Bouzkova)
- On return to action, suffered 2r defeats at Indian Wells (after 1r bye, l. Kovinic) and Miami (l. Kalinskaya)
- Withdrew from opening month's events, including Australian Open, after injuring her right hand in practice. By missing Australian Open, her streak of competing in 35 consecutive Grand Slam main draws dating back to the 2013 Australian Open came to an end

CAREER MILESTONES

- Ended 2021 season with 3r run at Indian Wells to secure her fourth consecutive Top-100 finish
- Best results of 2021 were QF runs at Parma and Bad Homburg
- Opened 2020 with SF showing at Auckland, going on to reach 3r at US Open, Roland Garros and Doha
- During Doha run, earned third career Top 10 win over No.7 Svitolina (l. Kuznetsova in 3r due to walkover)
- Finished 2019 ranked No.24 the youngest of three teenagers in the Top 50 (also Andreescu and Yastremska)
- Posted career best Grand Slam result with SF run at 2019 Roland Garros - first player (man or woman) born in 2000s to advance to this stage of a major. Scored maiden win over a Top 5 player during 2019 Roland Garros, upsetting No.3 and defending champion Halep in QF
- Result boosted her into Top 50 for first time at No.26 on June 10, 2019
- Won maiden title at 2019 Bogotá (d. Sharma in F); at 17y 222d was the youngest American to win a title since S.Williams at 1999 Indian Wells (17y 169d)
- Made Top 100 debut at No.95 on September 17, 2018, after reaching first WTA final at Hiroshima (as qualifier, l. Hsieh)
- Also in 2018, upset No.9 Kvitova to become the joint-youngest player to reach R16 at Indian Wells, along with Majoli, who made SF in 1994 (both aged 16 years, 199 days)
- Played only two ITF tournaments before making WTA main draw debut at 2017 Miami (l. Townsend in 3s), with Grand Slam bow coming at 2017 Roland Garros (l. Nara in 1r)
- Owns six Top 20 wins: No.9 Kvitova (2018 Indian Wells), No.11 Sabalenka (2019 Australian Open), No.11 Sabalenka (2019 Roland Garros), No.3 Halep (2019 Roland Garros), No.7 Svitolina (2020 Doha) and No.19 Riske (2020 Western & Southern Open)
- In juniors, won US Open girls' singles in 2017 (d. Gauff in F) and was R-Up at 2016 Roland Garros; reached No.2 in junior world rankings
- Owns one singles title on ITF Circuit

- Reached three finals across 2021, at Rome (l. Swiatek), her second Slam final at Wimbledon (l. Barty, having never previously gone beyond R16 at the All England Club) and Montreal (l. Giorgi). Has now reached at least one singles final Tour every year since 2013 (nine straight seasons)
- Ended 2021 season by qualifying for WTA Finals for the fifth consecutive year - only four active players have qualified more than her
- Made Olympic debut, reaching R16 at Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games (l. Giorgi)
- Reached two finals across 2020, at Brisbane (d. Keys) and Rome (l. Halep via ret.)
- Lifted a WTA-leading four titles across the 2019 season (tied with Barty) - triumphed at Brisbane, Rome, Eastbourne and Zhengzhou. Dropped 19 games across five matches during Eastbourne title win (d. Kerber in F) - most economic title run in 2019
- Also reached first Premier Mandatory final at Miami, losing to Barty in straight sets, and produced best Australian Open performance of career, reaching SF (l. eventual champion Osaka in 3s); saved four match points to beat S.Williams in QF
- Lost to twin sister Kr.Pliskova in 2r at Birmingham, in what was their first career main draw encounter
- Made fourth straight appearance at the WTA Finals in 2019, reaching SF for the third year in a row
- Won two titles in 2018 from three finals contested, triumphing at Stuttgart (d. Vandeweghe in F) and Tokyo [PPO] (d. Osaka in F). Posted R-Up finish in Tianjin (l. Garcia in F)
- Won Billie Jean King Cup for Czech Republic in 2015-16 and 2018
- Claimed No.1 ranking on July 17, 2017 despite making 2r exit at Wimbledon (l. Rybarikova). Was the first Czech woman to achieve the No.1 ranking since the computer rankings were introduced in 1975 (Martina Navratilova became No.1 on July 10, 1978 while representing USA)
- Won three titles in 2017, at Brisbane (d. Cornet in F), Doha (d. Wozniacki in F) and Eastbourne (d. Wozniacki in F)

- Made professional debut at 2016 US Open qualifying (l. Hozumi in 2r)
- Is a Grand Slam finalist, reaching the title match at 2016 US Open (l. Kerber)
- Captured fifth WTA doubles title of career at 2016 Birmingham (w/Strycova). At 2013 Linz, with sister Kristyna, became first set of twins to ever win a tour-level doubles title
- Made Top 10 debut after 2015 Stanford R-Up finish; was first time in WTA history that three Czech women ranked inside Top 10 at the same time (also Kvitova and Safarova)
- Scored first Top 20 win of her career over No.16 Petrova in 1r at 2013 Wimbledon
- Won first career WTA title at 2013 Kuala Lumpur (d. Mattek-Sands) and followed it up with two more in 2014 Seoul (d. Lepchenko) and 2014 Linz (d. Giorgi)
- Reached first WTA QF as WC at 2008 Prague (l. Azarenka)
- Made professional debut on ITF Circuit in 2006

- Born in New Jersey but moved to Miami at age 3. Started playing tennis after going to her sister's practices every day and eventually developed a passion for the sport
- Tennis idols growing up were Serena Williams and Maria Sharapova
- Off the court enjoys music, running, writing, jet skiing and going to the beach. Has one dog named Miley

- Currently coached by Sascha Bajin; fitness coach is Martin Nosko and Ivan Trebaticka; trains at and plays for Sparta Praha tennis club
- Married Michal Hrdlicka after 2018 Wimbledon

- In 2018, defeated No.3 seed Stephens, No.8 seed Kontaveit and No.5 seed Sevastova en route to her first WTA final at 2018 Moscow, where she fell in three sets to No.6 seed Kasatkina. Was first Tunisian woman to advance beyond QF at a WTA tournament (Sfar was the only other Tunisian to reach a QF at this level)
- Prior to 2018 Moscow, best tour-level results were QF runs at 2013 Baku, 2017 Taipei City and 2018 Bucharest
- Owns four Top 10 victories, over No.7 Cibulkova (2017 Roland Garros), No.1 Halep (2018 Beijing), No.8 Stephens (2018 Moscow) and No.3 Ka.Pliskova (2020 Doha)
- Member of Tunisian Olympic Team in 2012 and 2016
- Contested first two WTA main draws in 2012, at Doha (as WC) and Olympics
- On ITF Circuit, has 11 singles and one doubles title
- Played first event of career at 2008 ITF/El Menzah-TUN
- Became first North African woman to win a

- Posted ninth successive Top 100 season in 2021, but first non-Top 20 campaign since 2014
- In Grand Slam play, 2021 season was highlighted by R16 run at Wimbledon (l. Golubic)
- Finished 2020 campaign ranked No.16 in the world, with best result being runner-up finish at Brisbane (l. Ka.Pliskova in 3s)
- Lifted biggest title of career during 2019 season at WTA Premier-5 level Cincinnati (d. Kuznetsova in F); afterwards returned to Top 10 for first time since week of June 25, 2018
