SWIATEK: Recovered from 6-4 4-2 down to win in their first meeting at 2019 Washington DC... Is the first player since Halep in 2017 to reach four WTA 1000 finals in a season... Leads the Tour for main-draw match wins with 34 (also won two Billie Jean King Cup singles rubbers)... On a 27-match winning streak, the longest since S.Williams went 27 unbeaten in 2015... Has won 10-straight matches at Rome, the longest streak here since S.Williams posted 21-straight victories between 2012 and 2019... Bidding to become only the second woman to lift four WTA 1000 titles in a season, following S.Williams in 2013... Has won 40 of her last 41 sets contested and this week has dropped only 17 games en route to the final... Served up a Tour-leading 13 6-0 sets this year... Won a Tour-leading 26 matches via straight-sets... Is 30-0 when winning the first set at WTA 1000 tournaments... Triumphed in her last seven finals, dropping an average of only 3.4 games

JABEUR: Upset the Pole twice last season, at Wimbledon and Cincinnati... Playing this week on a career-high ranking of No.7, after winning the title at the WTA 1000 event in Madrid... Will move to No.6 by reaching the final and No.5 by lifting the title... Owns a Tour-leading 17 wins on clay... Enters today's match on a career-best 11-match winning streak... Has served 62 aces on clay this year, third-most behind Alexandrova and Sabalenka... Has won 15 matches at WTA 1000 tournaments this year, ranking second on Tour behind Swiatek on 21... Prevailed in her only other meeting against a World No.1, defeating Halep via retirement at 2018 Beijing... Bidding to join Safina (2009) and S.Williams (2013) as only the third woman to sweep the Madrid and Rome titles in the same year... Has won 10 three-set matches this season, tied with Haddad Maia for most on Tour

- Making 3rd appearance at Rome, where she won the title in 2021 (d. Ka.Pliskova in F)
- Also fell 1r in 2020 (l. Rus) - her final tournament before lifting title at Roland-Garros
- After 1r bye, beat Ruse in 2r, Azarenka in 3r, Andreescu in QF and Sabalenka in SF to score 24th, 25th, 26th and 27th wins in a row (including Billie Jean King Cup) - best streak on Tour since S.Williams' 27 unbeaten between 2014 WTA Finals and 2015 Madrid
- Last player to win 28 or more matches in a row was S.Williams in 2013 (Miami-Wimbledon)
- Is the third youngest player to win 20 or more matches since 2000, behind only V.Williams (35 wins in 2000) and S.Williams (21 wins in 2002)
- Has won past four events (Doha, Indian Wells, Miami and Stuttgart). Last player to win five in a row was S.Williams in 2013 (Miami, Charleston, Madrid, Rome and Roland-Garros)
- Faces No.7 Ons Jabeur in today's final; owns 11 wins in career over Top-10 players, with six of these coming on clay
- Is appearing in her fifth final at a WTA 1000 tournament; has won the previous four in straight sets, over Ka.Pliskova at 2021 Rome, and Kontaveit at 2022 Doha, Sakkari at 2022 Indian Wells and Osaka at 2022 Miami
- Overall record in WTA finals is 7-1; has won the past seven in straight sets, with only loss coming to Hercog at 2019 Lugano
- Owns 32-19 career record against seeds, while is 16-2 this season
- Is No.1 seed this week; previous two WTA events as top seed were 2021 Ostrava (QF) and 2022 Stuttgart (WON)
- Is currently ranked No.1, having risen to top spot on April 4, 2022; S.Williams was the last World No.1 to win Rome title in 2016
- In addition to title here, last year on clay made QF at Roland-Garros and 3r at Madrid

PLAYER NOTES

- Making 2nd main-draw appearance at Rome, where she suffered 1r exit on debut in 2020. Also contested qualifying in 2019
- Beat No.26 Cirstea in 1r, No.41 Tomljanovic in 2r, No.40 Putintseva in 3r, No.4 Sakkari in QF and No.23 Kasatkina in SF; now owns 63 wins in career over Top-50 players, including 36 since the start of 2021 campaign
- Rallied from 6-1 5-2 to upset Sakkari in QF; was 10th career Top-10 win and first since beating No.6 Svitolina at 2021 Chicago
- Saved 1MP to beat Kasatkina in SF and stretch her career-best Tour-level winning streak to 11
- Has won 25 matches so far in 2022, second on Tour behind Swiatek (34). Also ranked first for clay-court wins with 17
- Faces No.1 Swiatek in today's final; only previous match versus a World No.1 was win over Halep (via ret. w/back) at 2018 Beijing
- Record in WTA finals stands at 2-4
- Owns 36-47 career record against seeds, while is 4-5 this season
- Coming off lifting her first clay-court title, at WTA 1000-level tournament in Madrid. Has also finished R-Up at 2022 Charleston and 2021 Charleston [250]
- Is first woman to reach final at Madrid and Rome in the same season since Halep in 2017. Only women to sweep both titles in same year are Safina (2009) and S.Williams (2013)
- Currently ranked at career-high No.7 (first achieved Nov. 1, 2021) - one of two Tunisian women in rankings (also No.765 Chiraz Bechri)
- During last year's European clay-court swing, reached R16 at Roland-Garros and 3r at Madrid
- Struck 840 winners this season - the most on Tour, followed by Swiatek (674)
- Involved in 13 three-set matches in 2022, only Anisimova (9-4) has played this many

SEASON 2022 HISTORY

- Withdrew from Madrid (w/right shoulder injury)
- At Stuttgart, claimed fourth title in a row (d. Sabalenka in F)
- Won both singles rubbers during Poland's 4-0 Billie Jean King Cup victory over Romania (d. Buzarnescu and Prisacariu)
- Lifted Miami title without dropping a set (d. Osaka in F), becoming only fourth woman to complete 'Sunshine Double' (also Graf, Clijsters and Azarenka)
- At Indian Wells, won fifth career title (d. Sakkari in F); is the first player to win five or more WTA titles before turning 21 since Wozniacki in 2009
- Lifted title at Doha (d. Kontaveit in F)
- Fell 2r at Dubai (l. eventual champion Ostapenko)
- Reached SF during defense of Adelaide title (l. eventual champion Barty) and also at Australian Open (l. Collins)

- Coming off lifting biggest title of her career at Madrid (d. Pegula in F), becoming the first African to win a WTA 1000-level tournament
- Finished R-Up at Charleston (l. Bencic) and reached QF at Stuttgart (l. Badosa)
- Fell 2r at Indian Wells (after 1r bye, l. Saville) and R16 at Miami (l. Collins)
- In Middle East, advanced to QF at both Dubai (l. Halep) and Doha (l. Kontaveit)
- Made QF in season opener at Sydney (ret. against Kontaveit w/lower back injury). Subsequently withdrew from Australian Open

CAREER MILESTONES

- Won two titles last season, at Adelaide and Rome. Other highlights included QF at Roland Garros and SF at Ostrava and qualifying for WTA Finals Guadalajara (fell in group stage)
- Also finished doubles R-Up at 2021 Roland Garros (w/Mattek-Sands, I. Krejčíková/Siniaková)
- Won her maiden Tour-level title at 2020 Roland Garros without dropping a set, becoming the first player from Poland - man or woman - to win a Grand Slam singles title and first from her country to reach a major final since Agnieszka Radwanska at 2012 Wimbledon
- Ranked No.54, she became the lowest-ranked woman to win the Roland Garros title in the Open Era and the lowest-ranked finalist since 1977 (No.56 Mihai). At 19y 132d, is the youngest champion in Paris since Monica Seles (18y 187d) in 1992
- Also became the first player to win her debut Tour-level title at a Grand Slam since Jelena Ostapenko at 2017 Roland Garros
- Won WTA Most Improved Player of the Year for 2020, as voted on by members of the media. Her coach, Piotr Sierżputowski, was voted by members of the WTA Coach Program as the WTA Coach of the Year for 2020
- Also won the 2020 WTA Fan Favorite Award, as voted on by fans
- Owns six career wins over Top 10 ranked players, having defeated No.16 Q.Wang (2019 Roland Garros), No.18 Wozniacki (2019 Toronto), No.20 Vekic (2020 Australian Open), No.19 Vondroušová (2020 Roland Garros), No.2 Halep (2020 Roland Garros) and No.6 Kenin (2020 Roland Garros)
- Ended 2019 season ranked No.61 after a campaign highlighted by R-Up finish at Lugano (I. Hercog) and R16 run at Roland Garros (I. Halep)
- Also in 2019, reached 3r at Toronto (I. Osaka) and made 2r five times (incl. Australian and US Open)
- Broke into Top 100 at No.88 after R-Up finish at 2019 Lugano
- Ended 2018 season ranked No.175 (up from No.690 in 2017), after posting 42-6 record in ITF Circuit
- Highlights of 2018 campaign were four titles on the ITF Circuit, including at the \$60k clay court events in Budapest-HUN and Montreux-SUI
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2019 Auckland
- Member of Poland's Fed Cup team, 2018-20
- Broke into Top 10 on October 18, 2021, following SF run at Indian Wells (I. eventual champion Badosa)
- At 2021 Birmingham, became first Arab woman to win a WTA title (d. Kasatkina in F). Followed this with QF at Wimbledon (I. Sabalenka)
- Last season also finished R-Up at Charleston [250] (I. Sharma) and Chicago [500] (I. Muguruza)
- Reached maiden Grand Slam QF at 2020 Australian Open to become the first Arab woman to reach that stage at a major (I. eventual champion Kenin); made Top 50 debut at No.45 after breakthrough performance in Melbourne
- Made further QFs in 2020 at Doha (d. No.3 Ka.Pliskova, I. Kvitová), Lexington (I. Gauff), Western & Southern Open (I. eventual champion Azarenka) and Ostrava (I. Sakkari); posted career-high ranking of No.31 on August 31, 2020
- Season highlights in 2019 were matching best result at the Slams with 3r run at US Open (matching 2017 Roland Garros and now 2020 Australian Open) and SF appearances at Eastbourne (I. eventual R-Up Kerber) and Tianjin (I. eventual champion Peterson)
- In 2018, defeated No.3 seed Stephens, No.8 seed Kontaveit and No.5 seed Sevastova en route to her first WTA final at 2018 Moscow, where she fell in three sets to No.6 seed Kasatkina. Was first Tunisian woman to advance beyond QF at a WTA tournament (Sfar was the only other Tunisian to reach a QF at this level)
- Prior to 2018 Moscow, best tour-level results were QF runs at 2013 Baku, 2017 Taipei City and 2018 Bucharest
- Owns four Top 10 victories, over No.7 Cibulková (2017 Roland Garros), No.1 Halep (2018 Beijing), No.8 Stephens (2018 Moscow) and No.3 Ka.Pliskova (2020 Doha)
- Member of Tunisian Olympic Team in 2012 and 2016
