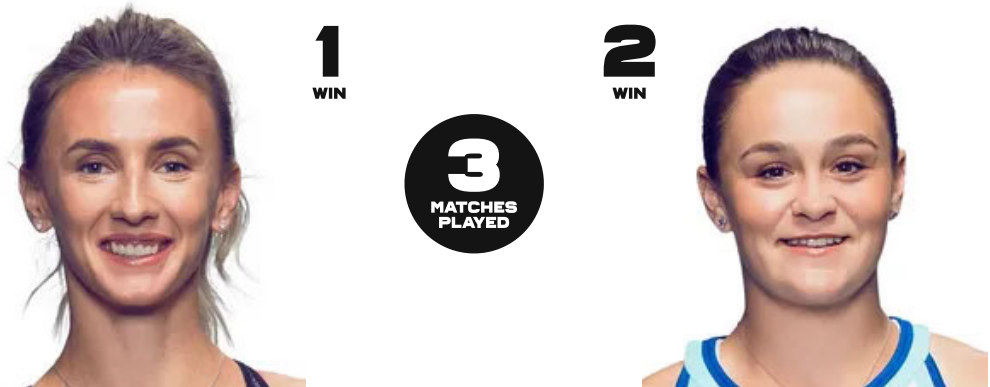

PLAYER NOTES

- Making 11th appearance at Australian Open, where her best result was run through qualifying to 3r in 2013 (l. Wozniacki)
- Made Grand Slam debut here at Melbourne Park in 2011, coming through qualifying to reach 2r (d. Schnyder, l. Makarova)
- Came through qualifying this year - dropped only 13 games during straight-sets defeats of Raina, Muhammad and Avanesyan - to reach first Grand Slam main draw since 2020 Australian Open (l. Barty in 1r)
- Faces Barty in 1r today; lost to No.1 and top seed Barty in 1r here at Melbourne Park in 2020, while also lost to then-No.1 Kerber at the same stage in 2017 (both matches went to three sets)
- Owns eight Top-10 wins in her career, most recently against No.5 Osaka at 2018 Brisbane; two of these victories have come at majors, over No.6 Safarova (2015 US Open) and No.2 Wozniacki (2018 US Open)
- In terms of ranking, best career win was over No.2 Wozniacki in 2r at 2018 US Open
- Owns 7-4 career record against players from Australia in main-draw matches
- Record in Grand Slam 1r matches is 16-17
- One of five players from Ukraine in the draw (also Kalinina, Kostyuk, Svitolina and Yastremska, who are also in top half of the draw)
- Best result by a Ukrainian woman at Australian Open were QF runs from Svitolina 2018-19
- Best result by a qualifier at Australian Open was SF run from Christine Dorey in 1978, while Zhang Shuai is the only one to reach QF in past 30 years
- All four career titles have come on hard courts: 2015 Istanbul, 2016 Guangzhou, 2017-18 Acapulco

PLAYER NOTES

- Making 9th appearance at Australian Open, where she has made at least QF on past three visits
- Best result was 2020's SF run (l. eventual champion Kenin)
- Was R-Up in doubles at Melbourne Park in 2013 (w/Dellacqua, l. Errani/Vinci)
- Is No.1 seed here for the third year in a row. The top seed at the Australian Open has claimed the title on 20 occasions, most recently S.Williams in 2015
- In the Open Era, the top seed has lost in 1r on six occasions across all Grand Slams, with one of these coming at Australian Open (1979 - Ruzici l. Mary Sawyer)
- Faces No.119 Lesia Tsurenko in 1r today; last loss to a player ranked outside Top 100 came against No.153 Kuznetsova at 2019 Cincinnati, while across the majors it was No.451 S.Williams at 2018 Roland Garros
- Owns 6-5 career record against players from Ukraine in main-draw matches, winning the last six
- Has 17-9 record in Grand Slam 1r matches, last tasting defeat against Svitolina at 2017 Wimbledon. Three of these defeats have come at Melbourne Park, most recently against S.Williams in 2014
- This fortnight bidding to win third Slam on third different surface. S.Williams is the only active player to have won majors on hard, clay and grass
- One of eight players from Australia in main draw. Only USA (19) is better represented in the draw
- Last Australian to reach final here was Wendy Turnbull in 1980, while the most recent champion was Chris O'Neil in 1978
- Is currently spending 111th and 112th non-consecutive week as World No.1 (eighth on all-time list), although if she fails to reach final here then place at the summit could come under threat from Krejčíková or Sabalenka
- Owns nine hard-court titles, most recently at 2022 season opener in Adelaide (d. Rybakina in F)

CAREER MILESTONES

- Best result last season was run through qualifying to QF at Cluj-Napoca (l. Peterson). Also made 2r four times
- Ended 2019 ranked No.70, down from No.27 in 2018, however did post new career-high ranking of No.23 (February 18)
- Kicked off season in strong fashion by reaching final of Brisbane (l. Ka.Pliskova), her first final at WTA Premier level
- Defeat of No.5 Osaka en route to 2019 Brisbane final was second win over a Top 5 player, after upsetting No.2 Wozniacki at 2018 US Open. Was previously 0-9 vs. Top 5 players prior to these two wins
- Forced to end 2019 season after Washington D.C. in August due to right elbow injury – spent rest of the year training and doing rehab in Marbella
- Successfully defended her title at Acapulco in 2018 (d. Voegele in F). Other highlights of 2018 season came at the majors, where she reached QF at US Open (l. eventual champion Osaka) and R16 at Roland Garros (ret. vs. Muguruza w/leg injury), and made SF at Hobart and reached QF stage at Birmingham and Cincinnati
- Highlight of 2017 was third career singles title at Acapulco (d. Mladenovic in F). Also reached SF at Hobart and 's-Hertogenbosch and QF at Stanford and Moscow
- Enjoyed breakthrough season in 2015, finishing year at a career-high ranking of No.33, having started at No.88. Won title at Istanbul (d. U.Radwanska in F) and finished season with SF run at Moscow (l. eventual champion Kuznetsova); marked third Premier-level SF appearance of career (after 2013 Brisbane and 2015 New Haven)
- Member of Ukrainian Billie Jean King Cup Team, 2011-13 and 2015-19
- Winner of six singles and eight doubles titles on ITF Circuit
- Played first events of career on ITF Circuit in 2007; made WTA main draw debut at 2009 Tashkent
- Finished as year-end No.1 for third consecutive year (2019-21)
- In 2021, posted a 42-8 record, while winning a Tour-leading five titles, highlighted by collecting her second Grand Slam title at Wimbledon
- Finished year-end No.1 in 2020, despite missing all tournaments held after the resumption of play in the summer. Went 12-3 to start 2020 season, results highlighted by first title on home soil, and eighth overall at Adelaide (d. Yastremska in F). Followed up with first SF run at Australian Open (l. eventual champion Kenin) and runner-up finish at Doha (l. Kvitova)
- Stellar season in 2019 brought four singles titles – including maiden major at Roland Garros (d. Vondrousova in F) and WTA Finals in Shenzhen (d. Svitolina in F); registered Tour-leading 57 match wins, with 11-6 record against Top 10 opponents
- Broke into Top 10 after defeating Ka.Pliskova in F at 2019 Miami (week of April 1) and became first Australian woman in 43 years to secure No.1 singles ranking after title run at Birmingham, where she defeated Goerges in F (June 24, 2019)
- Other highlights in 2019 included R-Up finishes at Sydney (scored first win over a reigning No.1, Halep, en route; l. Kvitova) and Beijing (l. Osaka) and reached SF at Cincinnati and Wuhan. In doubles, won Rome titles and was R-Up at US Open (both w/Azarenka)
- In 2019, spearheaded Australia to its first Billie Jean King Cup final since 1993, against France in Perth; went 1-1 in singles (d. Garcia, l. Mladenovic) and dropped decisive doubles (w/Stosur) as the French prevailed 3-2
- In 2018, won two singles titles and four doubles titles, finishing the season ranked No.15 in singles and No.7 in doubles; was one of only two players to finish the year in the Top 20 in both disciplines (along with Mertens)
- Captured first Grand Slam doubles trophy at 2018 US Open (w/Vandeweghe, d. No.1 seeds Krejciakova/Siniakova in SF and No.2 seeds Mladenovic/Babos in F)

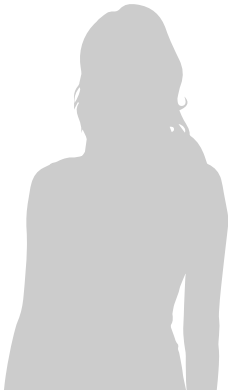

CAREER MILESTONES

- Highlight of last season was lifting 16th career title at Chicago [250]. Also made SF at Miami, Stuttgart and the Olympics (won bronze medal)

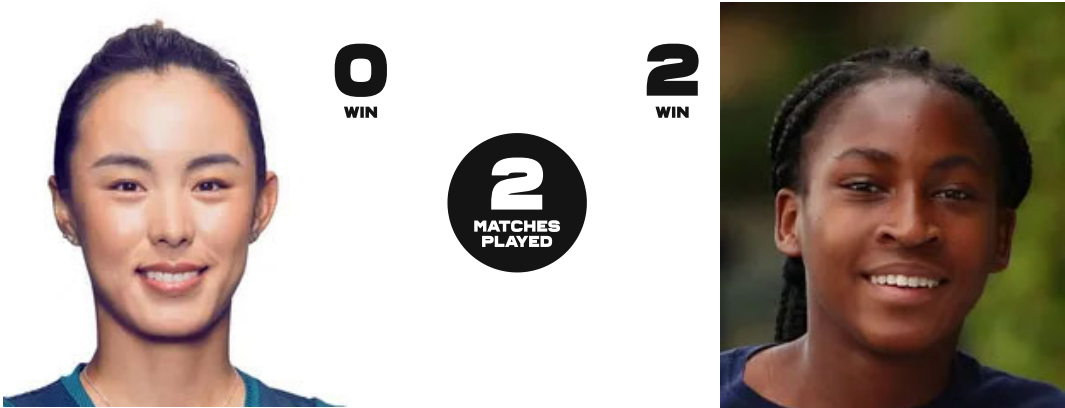

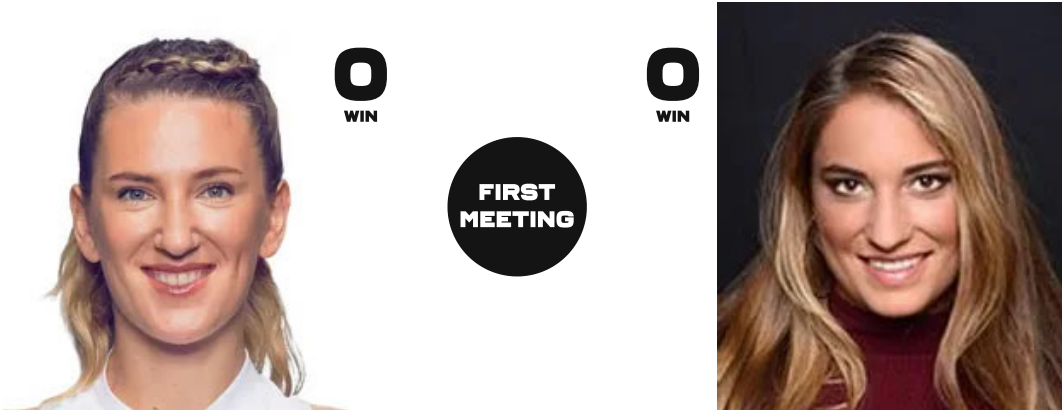
