PLAYER NOTES

- Making 5th main draw appearance at the Australian Open, where her best result came last year, making the R16 (l. S.Williams in three sets)
- Overall this is her 17th Grand Slam main draw appearance, and owns a 26-16 record across the Slams
- Is currently ranked No.2 and can potentially overtake Barty to become the World No.1 for the first time in her career if she reaches the final. If Barty reaches the QF, would need to win the title
- This is her fourth year being seeded at the Australian Open, and highest-ever at Melbourne Park. Has also been seeded No.2 at 2021 Wimbledon and US Open
- Faces No.128 Storm Sanders in 1r today - had won her last 16 matches against players ranked No.100 or lower prior to loss to No.100 Juhan last week at Adelaide 2
- Has not lost back-to-back matches to players ranked No.100 or lower since 2019, losing to No.214 Aiava ('s-Hertogenbosch) and then No.139 at Rybarikova (Wimbledon)
- Has suffered five 1r exits at the Slams, most recent coming here at Australian Open in 2020 (l. Suarez Navarro)
- Owns 11-5 career record against players from Australia
- Has lost her first two matches of a new season for the first time ever in her professional career (either on Tour or ITF Circuit)
- Last lost three matches in a row in 2019 - fell to Anisimova at Roland Garros, then Aiava at 's-Hertogenbosch and finally Rybarikova at Wimbledon
- Nine of her 10 career titles have come on hard, most recently at 2021 Abu Dhabi
- One of 3 players from Belarus to contest the 1r - also Sasnovich and Azarenka. Best showing by a Belarusian here were Azarenka's title runs in 2012-13

- Bidding for first main draw win today, having lost all three previous 1r matches. Does own one qualifying win at Melbourne Park, coming over Anderson in 2020
- Best result by a WC at the Australian Open was Henin's R-Up finish in 2010
- Overall this is her sixth Grand Slam main draw appearance (also 2021 Roland Garros and US Open), and bidding for first Grand Slam main draw win today
- Faces No.2 Aryna Sabalenka in 1r today - highest opponent faced (and only Top 10 player) in career was loss to No.4 Svitolina at 2020 Hua Hin
- Best win of career came over No.18 Mertens at 2021 Bille Jean King Cup Finals; best win of career on Tour came over No.28 Putintseva at 2021 Adelaide
- Owns one further Top 50 win - over No.39 Peng Shuai at 2014 Hobart
- Best career result on a hard court were QF runs at Prague and Adelaide last year
- One of 8 players from Australia in draw, only USA (19) is better represented
- Today's winner faces Ann Li or Wang Xinyu in 2r
- Is currently ranked No.128 - career-high is No.119, posted in late 2021

CAREER MILESTONES

- Lifted two titles during 2021 campaign, at Abu Dhabi and Madrid, while was R-Up at Stuttgart. Also reached a further three SFs, including at Wimbledon and US Open
- Won final nine matches of 2020 to end the year with back-to-back titles - at Ostrava (d. Azarenka in F) and Linz (d. Mertens in F) - and ranked at No.10
- Having also taken home the silverware at Doha (d. Kvitova in F), was one of two players (also Halep) to lift three singles titles during disrupted 2020 season
- At Ostrava completed the sweep of titles by teaming up with Mertens to win the doubles
- Ended as World No.11 for the second straight year in 2019 after capturing three WTA singles titles at Shenzhen (d. Riske in F), Wuhan (d. Riske in F) and Zhuhai (d. Bertens in F)
- Having also won Wuhan in 2018 (d. Kontaveit in F), became first player to successfully defend Wuhan title
- Made Top 10 debut on January 28, 2019 following 3r run at 2019 Australian Open
- Ended 2019 at No.2 in WTA doubles rankings after capturing first Grand Slam doubles trophy at US Open (w/Mertens, d. Azarenka/Barty in F). Earlier in the season, the pair claimed the 'Sunshine Double' by winning back-to-back titles at Indian Wells (d. Krejčíková/Siniakova in F) and Miami (d. Stosur/ Zhang in F)
- Qualified for WTA Finals Shenzhen in doubles (w/Mertens), going 1-2 in the round robin stage
- Enjoyed breakthrough season in 2018, lifting two titles, at New Haven (d. Suárez Navarro in F) and Wuhan (d. Kontaveit in F), winning 46 matches and finishing at No.11 in the rankings
- Also in 2018, was R-Up at Lugano (l. Mertens) and Eastbourne (l. Wozniacki), made SF at Cincinnati, reached five QFs and produced a career-best Grand Slam run to R16 at US Open
- Entered Top 50 on April 16, 2018, after Lugano run, and Top 20 on August 27 of the same year, following New Haven title
- Broke into Top 100 at No.76 on October 16, 2017 after reaching first tour-level final at Tianjin (l. Sharapova). Also in 2017 made SF run at Tashkent (l. Babos) and lifting WTA 125k Series title at Mumbai (d. Jakupovic)
- Made Grand Slam main draw debut 2017 Wimbledon, falling in 2r (as qualifier, d. Khromacheva, l. Witthoef)
- Fell 1r on main draw debut at 2017 Dubai (as qualifier, l. Ka.Bondarenko)
- Reached maiden WTA QFs last year, at Adelaide (l. Bencic) and Prague (l. Minnen)
- Enjoyed productive campaign in doubles in 2021, finishing R-Up at Charleston (w/Perez) and Nottingham (w/Dolehide) and making SF at Wimbledon (w/Dolehide) and QF at US Open (w/Dolehide); ended year at career-high No.30
- Last year, made 2r at Hua Hin, fell 1r at Prague and Strasbourg and in qualifying at Australian Open and Brisbane
- In February 2020 lifted WTA doubles title at Hua Hin w/Ar.Rodionova without dropping a set
- Owns one other WTA title, triumphing at 2017 Nottingham w/Adamczak. She has also finished R-Up three times, most recently w/Perez at Istanbul in September 2020 - rose to career-high No.62 in doubles rankings on September 14, 2020
- Won second of two career singles titles on ITF Circuit at \$60K ITF/Playford-AUS in November 2019
- Fell 1r at Australian Open singles in 2014-17, while has contested qualifying at Roland Garros and US Open
- Posted career-high singles ranking of No.202 on February 10, 2014
- Won first ITF Circuit singles title at \$25k ITF/Launceston-AUS in February 2013
- Owns 12 doubles titles on ITF Circuit
- Made professional debut at \$25k ITF/Espérance-AUS in 2009

- Member of Belarus Fed Cup team that lost to USA in 2017 final - scored first Top 20 win of career with defeat of No.13 Stephens during 2017 Fed Cup final in Minsk
- WTA qualifying debut came at 2016 Rabat
- Lifted first three ITF Circuit titles in 2015, including a 13-match win streak towards the year's end, bringing back-to-back trophies in Antalya, Turkey
- Made debut on ITF Circuit in Minsk in 2012

- Currently working with former hitting partner Anton Dubrov; previously coached by Dmitry Tursunov and Didi Kindlmann
- Started playing tennis when she was 6 by an accident when her father Sergey drove by the tennis courts and decided to give it a try

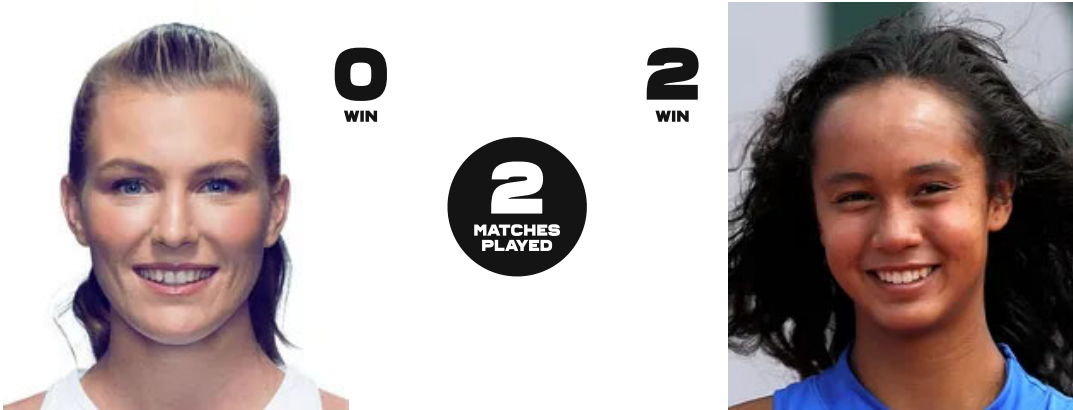

- Also finished R-Up in mixed doubles with compatriot Ebden at 2021 Australian Open
- Only singles victory last season came during 2r showing at Australian Open
- Contested 65th career Grand Slam main draw appearance at 2020 Australian Open - among active players, only V.Williams, S.Williams and Kuznetsova have played more majors
- Won third Grand Slam doubles title at 2019 Australian Open (w/Zhang), having previously triumphed at 2005 US Open and 2006 Roland Garros (both w/Raymond)
- Member of Australian team that advanced to final of Billie Jean King Cup in 2019 -country's first final in the team competition since 1993; l. decisive doubles rubber to France (w/Barty)
- Won ninth and most recent WTA singles title at 2017 Strasbourg (d. Gavrilova in F)
- Advanced to fifth Grand Slam SF of career at 2016 Roland Garros (l. eventual champion Muguruza). Following Roland Garros result, rose to No.14 - marked first time ranked inside Top 15 since week of August 26, 2013

- Produced best year-end ranking of No.162 in 2019, after winning 28 matches and reaching two W60 finals on ITF Circuit
- Owns three singles and eight doubles titles on ITF Circuit
- A singles and doubles All-American all four years she played college tennis at UCLA, from 2011-15
