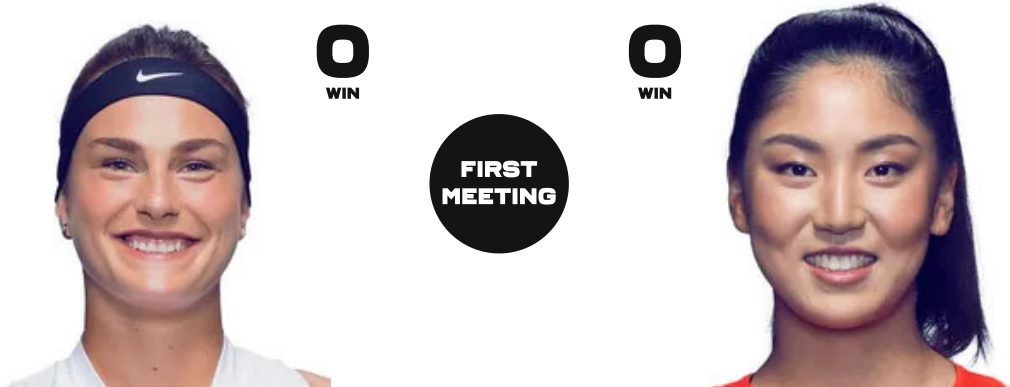

### PLAYER NOTES

- Making 5th main draw appearance at the Australian Open, where her best result came last year, making the R16 (l. S.Williams in three sets)
- Overall this is her 17th Grand Slam main draw appearance, and including her 1r win here, owns a 27-16 record across the Slams
- Is currently ranked No.2 and can potentially overtake Barty to become the World No.1 for the first time in her career if she reaches the final. If Barty reaches the QF, would need to win the title
- This is her fourth year being seeded at the Australian Open, and highest-ever at Melbourne Park. Has also been seeded No.2 at 2021 Wimbledon and US Open
- Wozniacki in 2018 was the last No.2 seed to win the Australian Open
- Overcame Sanders in 1r on Tuesday - rallied from a set and a break down to prevail in three sets. Was first win of season - lost her first two matches of a new season for the first time ever in her professional career (either on Tour or ITF Circuit)
- Faces No.100 Wang Xinyu in 2r today - had won her last 16 matches against players ranked No.100 or lower prior to loss to No.100 Juhan last week at Adelaide 2
- Owns 9-2 career record against players from China
- Has suffered four 2r exits at the Slams, most recent coming at 2020 US Open
- Nine of her 10 career titles have come on hard, most recently at 2021 Abu Dhabi
- One of 3 players from Belarus to start the main draw - Sasnovich fell 1r and Azarenka plays Svitolina in 3r. Best showing by a Belarusian here were Azarenka's title runs in 2012-13
- Today's winner will face either Vondrousova or Samsonova

### PLAYER NOTES

- Making 2nd main draw appearance at Australian Open, and has posted best result across the Grand Slams by reaching 2r this week
- In three previous major appearances, fell 1r at 2018 Australian Open (as WC), 2019 US Open and 2021 Wimbledon
- This year's Australian Open marks first direct entry to Slam based off her ranking
- Contesting this fortnight at No.100 - one spot off her career high of No.99 (first set November 15, 2021)
- In opening match on Tuesday, overcame No.56 Ann Li to score seventh Top 100 win of career
- Faces World No.2 Sabalenka today in 2r - previous highest ranked opponent faced in career was No.6 Kenin at 2021 Wimbledon
- Best win of career came over No.20 Raducanu at 2021 Linz
- Best career result on hard court is SF run at 2021 Prague
- One of five players from China to reach 2r. Only the USA (eight) is better represented in the draw
- Best result by a Chinese woman at Australian Open was Li Na's title run in 2014

## CAREER MILESTONES

- Lifted two titles during 2021 campaign, at Abu Dhabi and Madrid, while was R-Up at Stuttgart. Also reached a further three SFs, including at Wimbledon and US Open
- Won final nine matches of 2020 to end the year with back-to-back titles - at Ostrava (d. Azarenka in F) and Linz (d. Mertens in F) - and ranked at No.10
- Having also taken home the silverware at Doha (d. Kvitova in F), was one of two players (also Halep) to lift three singles titles during disrupted 2020 season
- At Ostrava completed the sweep of titles by teaming up with Mertens to win the doubles
- Ended as World No.11 for the second straight year in 2019 after capturing three WTA singles titles at Shenzhen (d. Riske in F), Wuhan (d. Riske in F) and Zhuhai (d. Bertens in F)
- Having also won Wuhan in 2018 (d. Kontaveit in F), became first player to successfully defend Wuhan title
- Made Top 10 debut on January 28, 2019 following 3r run at 2019 Australian Open
- Ended 2019 at No.2 in WTA doubles rankings after capturing first Grand Slam doubles trophy at US Open (w/Mertens, d. Azarenka/Barty in F). Earlier in the season, the pair claimed the 'Sunshine Double' by winning back-to-back titles at Indian Wells (d. Krejčíková/Siniakova in F) and Miami (d. Stosur/ Zhang in F)
- Qualified for WTA Finals Shenzhen in doubles (w/Mertens), going 1-2 in the round robin stage
- Enjoyed breakthrough season in 2018, lifting two titles, at New Haven (d. Suárez Navarro in F) and Wuhan (d. Kontaveit in F), winning 46 matches and finishing at No.11 in the rankings
- Also in 2018, was R-Up at Lugano (l. Mertens) and Eastbourne (l. Wozniacki), made SF at Cincinnati, reached five QFs and produced a career-best Grand Slam run to R16 at US Open
- Entered Top 50 on April 16, 2018, after Lugano run, and Top 20 on August 27 of the same year, following New Haven title
- Broke into Top 100 at No.76 on October 16, 2017 after reaching first tour-level final at Tianjin (l. Sharapova). Also in 2017 made SF run at Tashkent (l. Babos) and lifting WTA 125k Series title at Mumbai (d. Jakupovic)
- Made Grand Slam main draw debut 2017 Wimbledon, falling in 2r (as qualifier, d. Khromacheva, l. Witthoeft)
- Fell 1r on main draw debut at 2017 Dubai (as qualifier, l. Ka.Bondarenko)
- Made Top 100 debut on November 15, 2021
- Advanced to QF at Courmayeur (l. Vekic) and Linz (as qualifier, l. eventual champion Riske)
- Reached SF at Prague (l. eventual champion Krejčíková)
- In 2020, fell 1r at Shenzhen (l. Muguruza) and Hua Hin (l. Liang)
- Posted career-high ranking of 135 on February 24, 2020
- Opened 2019 season with maiden Tour-level main draw win at Shenzhen Open (d. F.Xun, l. Sharapova), went on to post two more 2r runs at Nanchang (l. Rybakina) and Tianjin (as qualifier, l. Peterson)
- Lifted maiden WTA doubles title at 2019 Nanchang w/L.Zhu (d. Peng/Zhang in F)
- Won three consecutive ITF titles in 2019, at \$25K ITF/Shenzhen 2-CHN (d. F.Xun in F), \$25K ITF/Hengyang-CHN (d. Z.Sun in F) and \$25K ITF/Tianjin-CHN (d. Jovic in F)
- In 2018, won maiden title of career at \$25K ITF/Nonthaburi 4-THA (d. Wang Xiyu in F)
- Made Grand Slam main draw debut at 2018 Australian Open (l. Cornet in 1r)
- Also in 2018, contested qualifying on WTA Tour for the first time at Shenzhen Open and competed in maiden WTA main draw at Guangzhou (l. Khazaniuk)
- Advanced to 2r on professional debut at \$10K ITF/Prokuplje 2-SRB in 2016 (as qualifier, l. Zakarlyuk)

- Member of Belarus Fed Cup team that lost to USA in 2017 final - scored first Top 20 win of career with defeat of No.13 Stephens during 2017 Fed Cup final in Minsk
- WTA qualifying debut came at 2016 Rabat
- Lifted first three ITF Circuit titles in 2015, including a 13-match win streak towards the year's end, bringing back-to-back trophies in Antalya, Turkey
- Made debut on ITF Circuit in Minsk in 2012

- Currently working with former hitting partner Anton Dubrov; previously coached by Dmitry Tursunov and Didi Kindlmann
- Started playing tennis when she was 6 by an accident when her father Sergey drove by the tennis courts and decided to give it a try
- Loves her family and her young sister. Loves to laugh, has a sweet tooth and considers something sweet as a perfect present. Dreams of having a dog. Loves her grandmother's cooking, and looks forward to her pancakes when she is away from home
- She spends her time off with family, catching up with friends, or reading. Her favorite book is "The Count of Monte Cristo"
- Favorite movies are Titanic, Home Alone, Never Back Down
- Her role model is Roger Federer

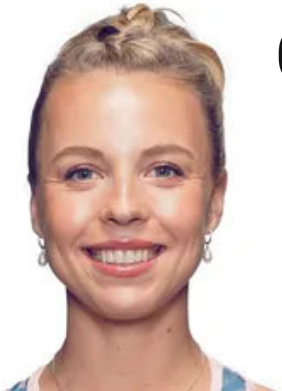

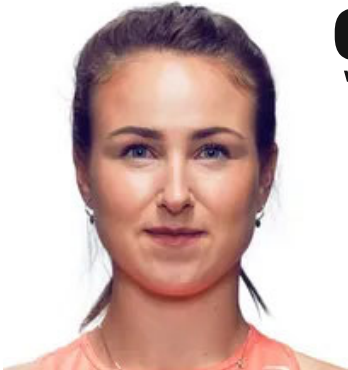
