Barty won in two tight sets when they clashed at Australian Open four years ago... **Giorgi** has only ever beaten one Top-10 player at a Slam... **Barty** conceded only three games in her opening two matches, the fewest by any player en route to third round since 2013... **Giorgi** bidding to reach last 16 here for the first time

- Making 10th appearance at Australian Open, where her best result were 3r runs in 2015 (l. V.Williams), 2019 (l. Ka.Pliskova) and 2020 (l. Kerber)
- Won all eight service games during 1r win over Potapova
- Withstood a late comeback and 45 unforced errors - to beat Tereza Martincova in 2r
- Faces No.1 Ashleigh Barty in 3r today; owns 13 wins in career over Top-10 players, most recently No.6 Karolina Pliskova in Montreal final last year
- Has never beaten a current WTA No.1, with best win over No.2 Wozniacki at 2018 Tokyo [PPO]
- Only Grand Slam victory over a Top-10 player was also against Wozniacki, at 2013 US Open
- Since losing to Barty here in 2018, has won all five matches against Australian opponents, most recently Tomljanovic on her way to SF at 2021 Eastbourne
- Only player from Italy left in women's singles. Since 2000, the deepest runs by an Italian woman at Melbourne Park was to QF, by Flavia Pennetta (2014), Sara Errani (2012), Francesca Schiavone (2011) and Adriana Serra Zanetti (2002)
- Owns two WTA titles on hard courts, at 2021 Montreal (outdoors) and 2018 Linz (indoors)
- Is currently ranked No.33, having returned to Top 50 after last summer's title run at Montreal

PLAYER NOTES

- Making 9th appearance at Australian Open, where she has made at least QF on past three visits
- Best result was 2020's SF run (l. eventual champion Kenin)
- Was R-Up in doubles at Melbourne Park in 2013 (w/Dellacqua, l. Errani/Vinci)
- Is No.1 seed here for the third year in a row. The top seed at the Australian Open has claimed the title on 20 occasions, most recently S.Williams in 2015
- In the Open Era, the top seed has only once failed to make R16 at Australian Open (1979 -Ruzici l. Mary Sawyer)
- Beat qualifiers Lesia Tsurenko and Lucia Bronzetti for the loss of just three games in opening two rounds. This is the fewest conceded en route to 3r since 2013: Sharapova -0 and S.Williams - 2 (neither reached the final that year)
- Is yet to drop serve this fortnight, fending off all six break points faces
- Takes on No.33 Camila Giorgi in 3r today; struck 12 aces to win a hard-fought encounter with the Italian in 2r here in 2018
- Owns 5-1 career record against players from Italy, while is 2-1 at the majors (d. Giorgi at 2018 Australian Open; d. Bronzetti at 2022 Australian Open; l. Vinci at 2012 Wimbledon)
- Last Australian to reach final here was Wendy Turnbull in 1980, while the most recent champion was Chris O'Neil in 1978
- Is currently spending 111th and 112th nonconsecutive week as World No.1 (eighth on alltime list), although if she fails to reach final here then place at the summit could come under threat from Krejcikova or Sabalenka
- Owns nine hard-court titles, most recently at 2022 season opener in Adelaide (d. Rybakina in F)
- This fortnight bidding to win third Slam on third different surface. S.Williams is the only active player to have won majors on hard, clay and grass

- Best result last season was R-Up finish at Parma (l. Gauff). Also reached 3r at Phillip Island Trophy and 2r on six occasions
- · Ended 2020 ranked at No.34, the third consecutive season finish as Chinese No.1
- · Year highlighted by upsetting 23-time Grand Slam champion S.Williams en route to reach R16 for the first time at Australian Open (l. Jabeur)
- Due to various concerns with the pandemic and waist injury (lumbar disc herniation), did not play again following 1r exit at Doha
