2024 UNITED CUP – TALKING POINTS

- For the second consecutive year, the **ATP Tour** and **Hologic WTA Tour** are launching the tennis season with the **United Cup** team event. Four of the world's Top 10 women – No.1 **Iga Swiatek**, No.5 **Jessica Pegula**, No.7 **Marketa Vondrousova** and No.9 **Maria Sakkari**.
- They will be joined by five Top 10 players on the Pepperstone ATP Rankings, World No. 1 **Novak Djokovic**, No. 6 **Stefanos Tsitsipas**, No. 7 **Alexander Zverev**, No. 9 **Hubert Hurkacz** and No. 10 **Taylor Fritz**.
- Eighteen national teams will compete across six groups of three teams competing in a round-robin format. Each team can have up to six members – a maximum of three ATP players and three WTA players. Perth's RAC Arena and Sydney's Ken Rosewall Arena will host three groups with the competition taking place from December 29 to January 7. Each tie will consist of two singles matches followed by one mixed doubles match.
- A trio of teams boast a pair of Top-10 players: Poland (Swiatek, Hurkacz), USA (Pegula, Fritz) and Greece (Tsitsipas, Sakkari). They are all headlining their respective groups, while Czech Republic (Vondrousova, ATP No. 31 **Jiri Lehecka**), France (WTA No. 20 **Caroline Garcia**, ATP No. 22 **Adrian Mannarino**) and Croatia (WTA No. 23 **Donna Vekic**, ATP No. 37 **Borna Coric**) headline the remaining three groups.
- Captain **Lleyton Hewitt** will lead an Australian team that includes 2023 year-end doubles World No.1 **Storm Hunter** and **Ajla Tomljanovic**, who missed the Australian summer last year due to knee surgery. World No. 12 **Alex de Minaur** joins them after a successful year that saw him climb to career-high No. 11, highest Pepperstone ATP ranking by an Australian man since Hewitt in August 2006.
- **Fritz** and **Pegula** will aim to defend the title, as they helped Team USA capture the inaugural United Cup trophy at the start of 2023 season. Fritz later on won titles at Delray Beach and Atlanta and made the quarter-finals of US Open, while Pegula captured titles in Montreal and Seoul, reached quarter-finals at Australian Open, Wimbledon and the championship match at the WTA Finals in Cancun.
- **Djokovic** will begin his 2024 season teaming up with WTA No. 119 **Olga Danilovic**. The 36-year-old aims to repeat the dream start to his last season that saw him pick up Adelaide-1 and Australian Open titles, ending the year with ATP Tour-leading 7 titles, including 3 Grand Slam titles to up his record-extending tally to 24.
- Current WTA World No. 1 **Swiatek** leads a Polish team after a 2023 season that saw her win a WTA tour-leading six singles titles, while former World No. 1 **Angelique Kerber** returns to the tour for the first time since 2022 Wimbledon, having taken time away from tennis to give birth to daughter Liana.
- WTA World No.56 **Katie Boulter** is set to make her United Cup debut in Perth, as Great Britain's No.1 WTA Player. ATP World No. 18 Cameron Norrie is joining her after going 3-0 in singles at United Cup last year, helping Team GB reach Host City Finals before losing to eventual champions Team USA.
- Five countries, Canada, Chile, China, Netherlands and Serbia, are making their United Cup debuts. Canadian team will feature WTA No. 35 **Leylah Fernandez**, who led Canada to Billie Jean King Cup trophy last month, joined by ATP No. 29 **Felix Auger-Aliassime**, who helped Canada capture ATP Cup and Davis Cup titles in 2022.

POLAND – GROUP A

Hubert Hurkacz | Age: 26 | World No. 9 | Career-High No. 9 | 2023: 46-24 (2 Titles) | Career: 171-123 (7 Titles)

> Top Polish men's player in history ended 2021 at career-high No. 9 after qualifying for Nitto ATP Finals, then finished 2022 at No. 10.

> Entered 2021 Wimbledon on 6-match losing streak, then reached 1st Grand Slam SF by defeating 8-time champion Federer 6-3 7-6(4) 6-0 in final singles match of Swiss' career.

> Upset 5 seeds to win 2021 ATP Masters 1000 Miami title and saved a championship point to win 2023 ATP Masters 1000 Shanghai after losing in the 2022 ATP Masters 1000 Montreal final.

> Also advanced to ATP Masters 1000 SFs at 2021 Paris, 2022 Miami and 2023 Cincinnati and captured ATP Masters 1000 doubles titles at 2020 Paris w/Auger-Aliassime and 2022 Miami w/Isner.

> Defeated No. 1 Medvedev 6-1 6-4 in 63 minutes to win 5th ATP Tour singles title in 5th final at 2022 Halle (now 7-2 in finals).

Iga Swiatek | Age: 22 | World No. 1 | Career-High No. 1 | 2023: 68-11 (6 Titles) | Career: 281-66 (17 Titles)

> Secured the WTA Year-End No.1 ranking in the final match of the season by winning the championship at WTA Finals with a win over Jessica Pegula as she became the youngest woman to finish atop the rankings in consecutive years since Caroline Wozniacki (2010, 2011).

> Swiatek was voted 2023 WTA Player of the Year for the second consecutive year, becoming the first player to earn the honors in back-to-back seasons since Serena Williams (2012-16). Her season was highlighted by successfully defending her Roland Garros title, winning WTA 1000 title at Beijing and capturing the WTA Finals title

> After holding the No.1 ranking for 75-consecutive weeks – a streak that ended on September 11, 2023 – Swiatek returned to top of the rankings on November 6 with this week marking her 83rd career week at No.1

> At 22 years old has won 17 singles titles, including four Grand Slam singles titles with three coming at Roland Garros (2020, 2022, 2023) and also winning at 2022 US Open

> Won 37-straight matches winning streak in 2022 - joint-longest unbeaten run on Tour since 1990 – a streak that included six title runs

> Won her maiden Tour-level title at 2020 Roland-Garros without dropping a set, becoming the first player from Poland - man or woman - to lift a Slam.

> As a junior, won girls' singles at 2018 Wimbledon and leading Poland to Junior Fed Cup in 2016.

Alejandro Davidovich Fokina | Age: 24 | World No. 26 | Career-High No. 21 | 2023: 32-28 (Toronto SF) | Career: 96-97 (1 Final)

> Achieved career-high No. 21 in August 2023 and improved year-end ranking for 8th consecutive year in 2023, finishing at No. 26.

> Broke Djokovic 9 times in Monte Carlo 2R win, setting record for most breaks of Djokovic in a best-of-3-set match to defeat then-World No. 1 en route to 1st ATP Tour final of career at 2022 ATP Masters 1000 Monte Carlo.

> Advanced to 1st Grand Slam QF at 2021 Roland Garros and 1st ATP Masters 1000 QF at 2021 Monte Carlo, highlighted by 5-set win over Ruud in Roland Garros 3R.

> Ended junior career as World No. 2 after winning Wimbledon boys' singles title and posting 20-1 record in 2017.

> Owns 2 cats and launched Adoptas.org in 2021, a pet adoption platform that aims to connect anyone looking to adopt or foster a pet with shelters and rescues across Spain.

Sara Sorribes Tormo | Age: 27 | World No. 48 | Career-High No. 32 | 2023: 28-16 (Cleveland Title) | Career: 278-250 (2 Titles)

> Currently ranked No.48 in the WTA Rankings, is the highest ranked Spanish woman and is one of four Spanish women in the Top 100 along with No.61 Cristina Bucsa, No.63 Rebeka Masarova and No.64 Paula Badosa

> Won second career singles title at Cleveland 2023 – qualified and defeated three seeds (No.3 Kudermetova, No.9 Stephens and No.4 Alexandrova) en route to the title.

> Missed start of 2023 season with a left foot injury before returning at Bogota in April. Made R16 at Roland Garros (I. Haddad Maia) in best Grand Slam result of her career

> Reached career-high ranking of No.32 on February 7, 2022 and currently owns career-high ranking at No.32 after winning a WTA 1000 title in Beijing last season (w/Bouzkova)
