- Making 6th main-draw appearance at Indian Wells (11th overall), where best result was 3r run in 2008 (as qualifier, l. Medina Garrigues)
- Playing fifth tournament since returning from three-year maternity leave at 2022 US Open. Most recent WTA 1000 outing was 1r exit at 2019 Miami (l. Stosur)
- Broke serve five times to upset No.68 Cornet in 1r - second Top-100 win since return to Tour (also No.27 Trevisan at US Open)
- Her 1r win against Cornet was the second time she registered a win in a WTA 1000 event in her career since 2009 (d. McHale at Indian Wells in 2017)
- Faces No.2 Sabalenka in 2r today; has lost all 10 career matches against Top-10 players, most recently losing 6-1 6-3 to No.2 Jabeur at 2022 Monastir
- Only Top-20 win of her career came over No.11 Keys during R16 run at 2018 Wimbledon
- Owns 16-52 career record against seeded players
- Bidding to register back-to-back wins for first time since SF showing at W100 ITF Circuit event in Dubai in December 2018. Last consecutive Tour-level wins came in QF run at 2018 Seoul
- Best career results on hard are SF runs at Guangzhou in 2017, Tashkent in 2010 and 2015, and Memphis in 2011
- Having secured her career-high ranking of No.67 in May 2019, she is currently ranked No.427.
 Playing Indian Wells with a Special Ranking of No.73
- Is the lowest-ranked player left in the draw this year; No.747 Sloane Stephens was the lowestranked player to reach 2r at Indian Wells in 2010

PLAYER NOTES

- Making a 4th appearance at Indian Wells, where her best result was R16 showing in 2019 (l. Kerber)
- Also won doubles title here in 2019 (w/Mertens)
- Indian Wells is the only regular WTA 1000 event at which she has yet toreach QF (not including 2022's inaugural Guadalajara)
- After 1r bye, faces No.427 Evgeniya Rodina in 2r today; won both previous encounters, including en route to maiden WTA SF at 2017 Tashkent
- Most recent match against a player outside Top 400 ended in victory over No.636 Vandeweghe at 2019 San Jose, while last defeat came at hands of No.531 Kalinskaya at W25 ITF Circuit event in Minsk in 2016
- Has lost just one of her 14 matches in the 2023 season (in Dubai QF against eventual champion Krejcikova); only Bencic (15-3), Garcia (15-6) and Vekic (14-2) have won more
- Seeded second this fortnight; Navratilova in 1991, Davenport in 2000 and Sharapova in 2013 are the only No.2 seeds to win this title
- Following her Australian Open win, she returned to her career-high ranking of No.2 (first achieved in August 23, 2021)
- Is one of the three players on tour with over 100 aces in the 2023 season, along with Garcia (144), Rybakina (116)
- Owns 12 career titles, including at Australian Open (2023), WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai (2019), and WTA 1000 events in Wuhan (2018-19), Doha (2020) and Madrid (2021)
- Best results on US soil, are her maiden WTA title at 2018 New Haven and R-Up finishes at 2022 WTA Finals Fort Worth and 2019 San Jose

CAREER MILESTONES

- Returned from three-year maternity leave at 2022 US Open, where she reached 2r (d. Trevisan, l. Tomljanovic). Last year, also made 2r at Monastir
- Career-best ranking is No.67 (May 6, 2019)
- Ended 2018 ranked No.88. Best result came at Wimbledon where she reached the R16 (as qualifier, l. eventual R-Up S.Williams). Upset No.11 Keys in 3r to register first Top-20 win of career
- Standout result of 2017 was reaching SF at Guangzhou (l. eventual champion S.Zhang) and QF at 's-Hertogenbosch (l. Konjuh). Also made 2r at Indian Wells (as LL, l. Garcia), Biel (l. Kontaveit), US Open (l. Svitolina) and Luxembourg (l. Witthoeft)
- Best result of 2016 was QF run at 's-Hertogenbosch in June (l. eventual champion Vandeweghe), which also marked first main draw wins of season. Closed out 2016 with strong showings at WTA 125k events, winning title in Taipei (d. Chang in F) and reaching SF in Honolulu (l. Zhang)
- In doubles, reached first tour-level final at 2016 Gstaad (w/Beck, l. Arruabarrena/ Knoll in F)
- Highlights on 2015 season included SF run at Tashkent (l. Vekic) and QF at Pattaya City (l. Tomljanovic) and Baku (l. Gasparyan)
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2005 Tashkent, advancing to QF
- Has won 13 ITF singles titles and six ITF doubles titles
- Played first events of career on ITF Circuit in 2004

- Highlight of last season was R-Up finish at WTA Finals in Fort Worth (l. Garcia in F); upset No.1 Swiatek, No.2 Jabeur and No.3 Pegula en route to final - only the fourth woman in history to beat the No.1, No.2 and No.3 at the same tournament
- Lifted two titles during 2021 campaign, at Abu Dhabi and Madrid, while was R-Up at Stuttgart. Also reached a further three SFs, including at Wimbledon and US Open
- Rose to career-high No.2 in rankings on August 23, 2021
- In doubles, lifted second major at 2021 Australian Open (w/Mertens, d. Krejcikova/Siniakova in F)
- Won final nine matches of 2020 to end the year with back-to-back titles - at Ostrava (d. Azarenka in F) and Linz (d. Mertens in F) - and ranked at No.10
- Having also taken home the silverware at Doha (d. Kvitova in F), was one of two players (also Halep) to lift three singles titles during disrupted 2020 season
- Ended as World No.11 for the second straight year in 2019 after capturing three WTA singles titles at Shenzhen (d. Riske in F), Wuhan (d. Riske in F) and Zhuhai (d. Bertens in F)
- Made Top-10 debut on January 28, 2019 following 3r run at 2019 Australian Open
- Ended 2019 at No.2 in WTA doubles rankings after capturing first Grand Slam doubles trophy at US Open (w/Mertens, d. Azarenka/Barty in F). Earlier in the season, the pair claimed the 'Sunshine Double' by winning back-to-back titles at Indian Wells (d. Krejcikova/Siniakova in F) and Miami (d. Stosur/ Zhang in F)
- Qualified for WTA Finals Shenzhen in doubles (w/Mertens), going 1-2 in the round-robin stage
- Enjoyed breakthrough season in 2018, lifting two titles, at New Haven (d. Suárez Navarro in F) and Wuhan (d. Kontaveit in F), winning 46 matches and finishing at No.11 in the rankings
- Also in 2018, was R-Up at Lugano (l. Mertens) and Eastbourne (l. Wozniacki), made SF at Cincinnati, reached five QFs and produced a career-best Grand Slam run to R16 at US Open
- Entered Top 50 on April 16, 2018, after Lugano run, and Top 20 on August 27 of the same year, following New Haven title
- Broke into Top 100 at No.76 on October 16, 2017 after reaching first Tour-level final at Tianjin (l. Sharapova). Also in 2017 made SF at Tashkent (l.

- Babos) and lifting WTA 125k Series title at Mumbai (d. Jakupovic)
- Made Grand Slam main draw debut 2017 Wimbledon, falling in 2r (as qualifier, d. Khromacheva, l. Witthoeft)
- Fell 1r on main draw debut at 2017 Dubai (as qualifier, l. Ka.Bondarenko)
- Member of Belarus Billie Jean King Cup team that lost to USA in 2017 final - scored first Top-20 win of career with defeat of No.13 Stephens during final in Minsk
- WTA qualifying debut came at 2016 Rabat
- Lifted first three ITF Circuit titles in 2015, including a 13-match win streak towards the year's end, bringing back-to-back trophies in Antalya, Turkey
- Made debut on ITF Circuit in Minsk in 2012

- Has two children, Anna (10) and Artemiy (2); former player Ekaterina Bychkova is godmother

- Enjoys swimming, listening to music, watching movies and reading (incl. books by Dostoevsky)
- Speaks Russian and English.

- Currently working with former hitting partner Anton Dubrov; previously coached by Dmitry Tursunov and Didi Kindlmann
- Started playing tennis when she was 6 by an accident when her father Sergey drove by the tennis courts and decided to give it a try
- Has a sweet tooth and considers something sweet as a perfect present; loves her grandmother's cooking, and looks forward to her pancakes when she is away from home
- Has a tiger tattoo on her left arm, which earned her the nickname "The Tiger"

CAREER MILESTONES

- Member of Switzerland's victorious team at last November's Billie Jean King Cup Finals in Glasgow, defeating Sanders in opening rubber
- In 2022, had a highly successful clay season when she made SF at Madrid (l. Pegula), QF at Rome (l. Kasatkina) and then reached R16 at a Slam for first time at Roland Garros (l. Stephens)
- Standout result in 2021 was run to final at Cincinnati (as WC, l. Barty); upset No.2 Osaka and No.4 Ka.Pliskova en route
- Other singles highlights in 2021 included SF showings at Adelaide (l. Swiatek) and Dubai (l. Krejcikova), and QF at Phillip Island Trophy (l. Bouzkova)
- Made Top-50 debut following Dubai result (March 15, 2021)
- During truncated 2020 campaign, produced R-Up showing in Lexington (l. Brady) and QF in Strasbourg (l. Svitolina)
- Won first and second titles of her career during 2019 season, coming through qualifying to triumph at Prague (d. Muchova in F) and then at Palermo (d. No.5 Bertens in F)
- Made Top 100 debut after Prague success, jumping from No.146 to No.87 (May 6). Rose to career-high No.54 following Palermo title run (July 29, 2019)
- Also made QF on home soil at Lausanne and fell 1r at nine other tour-level events (including Wimbledon and US Open). Won ITF Circuit title at Santa Margherita Di Pula-ITA
- Qualified for first Grand Slam main draw at 2018 US Open, going on to reach 2r (l. Kanepi). Also, reached 2r at tour level events at Acapulco and Linz and lifted WTA 125K Series title at Newport Beach (w/Doi)
- Spent majority of 2016 on ITF Circuit, winning 44 matches and three titles to rise over 200 places in the rankings. Also reached 2r on WTA main draw debut at Strasbourg and fell in qualifying at US Open
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2015 Luxembourg
- Owns six singles and five doubles titles on ITF Circuit
- Played first professional events of career on ITF Circuit in Switzerland and Germany in 2013
- As a junior won 2014 US Open girls' doubles (w/Soylu) and a gold medal in mixed doubles (w/Zielinski) at 2014 Youth Olympics in Nanjing

- Won sixth career title last season, triumphing at Charleston, while finished R-Up at Berlin and helped Switzerland lift Billie Jean King Cup Finals in Glasgow
- Captured gold medal at Tokyo Olympics (d. Vondrousova in F); also claimed silver in doubles (w/Golubic)
- Other 2021 highlights included R-Up finish at Adelaide (l. Swiatek) and Berlin (l. Samsonova), and six further QFs (including US Open)
- Across a disrupted 2020 reached three QFs, at Adelaide, St. Petersburg and Doha
- Enjoyed a stellar season in 2019, in which she lifted two titles at Dubai (d. Kvitova in F) and Moscow (d. Pavlyuchenkova in F) and posted a career-best 49 Tour-level match wins in 2019 only Ka.Pliskova (52), Barty (54) and Bertens (55) scored more. By contrast, posted a combined total of 37 wins at this level across 2016-18
- Victory in Moscow ensured she became first Swiss player to compete in singles at the WTA Finals since Hingis in 2006, going on to reach SF at the season-ending showpiece in Shenzhen

- Also in 2019, marked 20th Grand Slam main draw by reaching her maiden major SF at US Open (l. eventual champion Andreescu) and finished R-Up at Mallorca (l. Kenin after holding 3mp at 5-4 in second set)
- Was voted WTA Comeback Player of the Year in 2019
- Led the WTA with six victories over Top 5 players in 2019, including upsets over No.1 Osaka at Indian Wells, Madrid and US Open

- Qualified for 2015 WTA Elite Trophy in Zhuhai however withdrew due to hand injury
- Won second WTA doubles title of career in 2015 at Washington, DC (w/Mladenovic), the first coming earlier in the year at Prague (w/Siniakova)
- Voted 2014 WTA Newcomer of the Year after a campaign highlighted by R-Up finish at Tianjin (l. Riske) and QF run at 2014 US Open (defeated No.7 Kerber in 3r, No.10 Jankovic in R16); at 17 years of age, was youngest player through to last eight at Flushing Meadows since 1997 when Hingis won the title
- Played first WTA qualifying event at Luxembourg in October 2011, and first WTA main draw 12 months later at same event as WC (l. V.Williams, 1r); only 15 years, 7 months at the time
- Won junior singles titles at Roland Garros and Wimbledon in 2013; was named ITF Junior World Champion for 2013
