Entering Indian Wells, **Sabalenka** leads the Tour in service games won with 86.7% and held all seven service games in her opening match against Rodina... **Tsurenko** upset in-form Vekic in last round... **Sabalenka** defending only 20 points at Indian Wells and Miami

- Making 8th appearance at BNP Paribas Open, where her best result was QF run in 2015 (as qualifier, l. Jankovic via ret w/right foot injury)
- Recovered from 3-1 down in the third set to beat Boulter in final round of qualifying; has come through qualifying at three of her four Tour-level outings this season
- Upset No.33 Zhu Lin in 1r and No.23 Donna Vekic in 2r to register second and third Top-50 wins of the season; also No.42 Andreescu during run to final at Hua Hin
- Faces No.2 Aryna Sabalenka in 3r today; owns eight wins in career over Top-10 players, most recently upsetting No.5 Naomi Osaka at 2019 Brisbane
- Since then, has lost 10 in a row against Top-10 opponents, including to then-No.9 Sabalenka in 3r at 2019 Indian Wells
- Owns 42-69 career record against seeds, while is 4-2 this season
- One of two players from Ukraine to reach 3r (also Kalinina). Deepest run by a Ukrainian at BNP Paribas Open was Elina Svitolina's SF showing in 2019
- Best result by qualifier at Indian Wells was Jenny Byrne's R-Up finish in 1989. More recently Tsurenko (2015) and Dellacqua (2014) made QF here
- Is currently ranked No.95; this time last year was No.141
- All four WTA titles have come on hard courts, at Istanbul in 2015, Guangzhou in 2016 and Acapulco in 2017-18

- Making a 4th appearance at Indian Wells, where her best result was R16 showing in 2019 (l. Kerber)
- Also won doubles title here in 2019 (w/Mertens)
- After 1r bye, beat Evgeniya Rodina in 2r; hit 36 winners to 18 unforced errors - the fourth time in 15 matches this year she has struck 30 or more winners
- Now owns 14 wins this season; only Garcia (16) and Bencic (15) have more
- Faces No.95 Lesia Tsurenko in 3r today; in terms of ranking, defeat today would be worst since falling to No.115 Kanepi at 2022 Australian Open
- Owns 30-8 career record against qualifiers (1-0 this season)
- Owns 12 career titles, including at Australian Open (2023), WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai (2019), and WTA 1000 events in Wuhan (2018-19), Doha (2020) and Madrid (2021)
- Best results on US soil, are her maiden WTA title at 2018 New Haven and R-Up finishes at 2022 WTA Finals Fort Worth and 2019 San Jose
- Seeded second this fortnight; Navratilova in 1991, Davenport in 2000 and Sharapova in 2013 are the only No.2 seeds to win this title
- Following her Australian Open win, she returned to her career-high ranking of No.2 (first achieved in August 23, 2021)
- Is one of the three players on tour with over 100 aces in the 2023 season, along with Garcia (151), Rybakina (122)

CAREER MILESTONES

- Highlights last season were QF at Eastbourne, Budapest and Portoroz. Also enjoyed 3r run at Wimbledon
- Best result in 2021 was run through qualifying to QF at Cluj-Napoca. Also made 2r four times
- Ended 2019 ranked No.70, down from No.27 in 2018, however did post new career-high ranking of No.23 (February 18)
- Advanced to maiden Grand Slam QF at 2018 US Open (l. eventual champion Osaka); upset No.2 seed Wozniacki in 2r
- Defended Acapulco title in 2018 (d. Voegele in F)
- Enjoyed breakthrough season in 2015, finishing year at a career-high ranking of No.33, having started at No.88. Won title at Istanbul (d. U.Radwanska in F) and finished season with SF run at Moscow (l. eventual champion Kuznetsova); marked third Premier-level SF appearance of career (after 2013 Brisbane and 2015 New Haven)
Posted first two Top-10 wins of her career over No.10 Petkovic and No.7 Bouchard during QF run at 2015 Indian Wells
- Made Top-100 debut at on May 28, 2012; rose from No.105 to No.94 following 2r showing at Brussels (as LL, l. A.Radwanska)
- Reached maiden WTA QF at 2012 Memphis
- Member of Ukrainian Billie Jean King Cup Team, 2011-13, 2015-19 and 2021
- Winner of six singles and eight doubles titles on ITF Circuit
- Played first events of career on ITF Circuit in 2007; made WTA main draw debut at 2009 Tashkent
- Highlight of last season was R-Up finish at WTA Finals in Fort Worth (l. Garcia in F); upset No.1 Swiatek, No.2 Jabeur and No.3 Pegula en route to final - only the fourth woman in history to beat the No.1, No.2 and No.3 at the same tournament
- Lifted two titles during 2021 campaign, at Abu Dhabi and Madrid, while was R-Up at Stuttgart. Also reached a further three SFs, including at Wimbledon and US Open
- Rose to career-high No.2 in rankings on August 23, 2021
- In doubles, lifted second major at 2021 Australian Open (w/Mertens, d. Krejckova/Siniakova in F)
- Won final nine matches of 2020 to end the year with back-to-back titles - at Ostrava (d. Azarenka in F) and Linz (d. Mertens in F) - and ranked at No.10
- Having also taken home the silverware at Doha (d. Kvitova in F), was one of two players (also Halep) to lift three singles titles during disrupted 2020 season
- Ended as World No.11 for the second straight year in 2019 after capturing three WTA singles titles at Shenzhen (d. Riske in F), Wuhan (d. Riske in F) and Zhuhai (d. Bertens in F)
- Made Top-10 debut on January 28, 2019 following 3r run at 2019 Australian Open
- Ended 2019 at No.2 in WTA doubles rankings after capturing first Grand Slam doubles trophy at US Open (w/Mertens, d. Azarenka/Barty in F). Earlier in the season, the pair claimed the 'Sunshine Double' by winning back-to-back titles at Indian Wells (d. Krejckova/Siniakova in F) and Miami (d. Stosur/ Zhang in F)
- Qualified for WTA Finals Shenzhen in doubles (w/Mertens), going 1-2 in the round-robin stage
- Enjoyed breakthrough season in 2018, lifting two titles, at New Haven (d. Suárez Navarro in F) and Wuhan (d. Kontaveit in F), winning 46 matches and finishing at No.11 in the rankings
- Also in 2018, was R-Up at Lugano (l. Mertens) and Eastbourne (l. Wozniacki), made SF at Cincinnati, reached five QFs and produced a career-best Grand Slam run to R16 at US Open
- Entered Top 50 on April 16, 2018, after Lugano run, and Top 20 on August 27 of the same year, following New Haven title
- Broke into Top 100 at No.76 on October 16, 2017 after reaching first Tour-level final at Tianjin (l. Sharapova). Also in 2017 made SF at Tashkent (l.

Babos) and lifting WTA 125k Series title at Mumbai (d. Jakupovic)

- Made Grand Slam main draw debut 2017 Wimbledon, falling in 2r (as qualifier, d. Khromacheva, l. Witthoef)
- Fell 1r on main draw debut at 2017 Dubai (as qualifier, l. Ka.Bondarenko)
- Member of Belarus Billie Jean King Cup team that lost to USA in 2017 final - scored first Top-20 win of career with defeat of No.13 Stephens during final in Minsk
- WTA qualifying debut came at 2016 Rabat
- Lifted first three ITF Circuit titles in 2015, including a 13-match win streak towards the year's end, bringing back-to-back trophies in Antalya, Turkey
- Made debut on ITF Circuit in Minsk in 2012

- Father, Viktor, used to work in international relations for a nuclear power plant (now retired); mother, Larisa, is an economist; older sister, Oxana, is lawyer
- Started playing tennis at age 6 when parents introduced her to the sport
- Moved to Kiev at age 17 and studied at Physical Education & Sports in Ukraine for 1.5 years (no longer studying; hopes to return one day)
- Favorite shot is backhand and admires Martina Hingis for her playing style; also liked watching Yevgeny Kafelnikov
- Speaks Russian, Ukrainian and English
- Enjoys watching sports, playing pool and hanging out with friends
- Favorite city is Kiev; favorite tournaments are Australian Open, Wimbledon and Madrid

- Currently working with former hitting partner Anton Dubrov; previously coached by Dmitry Tursunov and Didi Kindlmann
- Started playing tennis when she was 6 by an accident when her father Sergey drove by the tennis courts and decided to give it a try
- Has a sweet tooth and considers something sweet as a perfect present; loves her grandmother's cooking, and looks forward to her pancakes when she is away from home
- Has a tiger tattoo on her left arm, which earned her the nickname "The Tiger"
- She spends her time off with family, catching up with friends, or reading; her favorite book is "The Count of Monte Cristo"

CAREER MILESTONES

- At 2022 Eastbourne, won 29th career title (d. Ostapenko in F) - the second-most among active players behind V.Williams on 49 - and finished R-Up later that summer at Cincinnati (L. Garcia)
