**GAUFF:** Triumphed on a third set tie-break when they last met at 2022 Toronto... Recovered from 4-2 down in the final set to beat qualifier Peterson on Tuesday... Had never been past third round in two previous visits to Indian Wells Tennis Garden... At least one American has reached the QF stage in 10 consecutive WTA 1000 tournaments... Has not won a set in past five matches against Top-10 opponents... Celebrated 19th birthday earlier this week

**SABALENKA:** Only win over the American came at 2020 Ostrava, a result that began a 15-match, three-tournament, winning streak... Has lost just one match and five sets in 16 outings this season... Appearing in QF at Indian Wells for the first time... Is defending only 20 points at Indian Wells and Miami... Along with Bencic is one of two women with multiple singles titles in 2023... Lifted doubles title here with Mertens four years ago

[7] MARIA SAKKARI (GRE #7) Head-to-Head [15] PETRA KVITOVA (CZE #15)  
**4-3**

**SAKKARI:** Dropped just three games in winning their most recent encounter, at Indian Wells in 2022... Bidding to become the first woman to reach back-to-back finals here since Sharapova in 2013... Each match this fortnight has gone to three sets, including coming from a break down in the decider to beat Pliskova in the last round... Has won her past 10 hard-court QFs

**KVITOVA:** Last beat the Greek on clay at 2021 Stuttgart... Saved four match points to upset No.3 seed Pegula in round of 16... Since 2009 has appeared in 98 WTA 1000 tournaments, second behind only Pavlyuchenkova on 100... Has never been beyond QF in 11 previous visits to Indian Wells... Two Czechs have reached this stage at Indian Wells for the first time since 2019

## QUARTERFINALS QUICK HITS

- The leading two seeds – No.1 **Iga Swiatek** and No.2 **Aryna Sabalenka** – have advanced to the quarterfinals for the first time at Indian Wells since 2014, when No.1 Li Na and No.2 Agnieszka Radwanska reached the semifinals and final, respectively
- The Czech Republic is the only country with multiple representatives left in the singles draw – **Petra Kvitova** and **Karolina Muchova**. The last time two Czech women reached the Indian Wells quarterfinals was 2019, when Karolina Pliskova and Marketa Vondrousova both fell at this stage
- **Coco Gauff's** progress means that for the 10th consecutive WTA 1000 tournament at least one American has reached the quarterfinals. The last time an American did not advance to this stage was 2021 Cincinnati, while at Indian Wells it was 2014
- Kvitova is into the last eight at a WTA 1000 event for the 35th time in her career; only Agnieszka Radwanska (42), Simona Halep (39) and Caroline Wozniacki (36) have done so more often
- **Sorana Cirstea** and Kvitova are the last remaining players aged over thirty in the draw. It is the third year in a row multiple thirtysomethings have appeared in the Indian Wells quarterfinals
- Muchova has spent the most time on court this fortnight, requiring nine hours and 40 minutes to negotiate her four matches. She is followed by **Maria Sakkari**, who took seven hours and 14 minutes to reach this stage, across three matches. In contrast, Sabalenka has needed barely over three hours, although she did receive an opening match bye and a walkover in the third round

### PLAYER NOTES

- Making 3rd appearance at BNP Paribas Open, where she fell 3r in 2021 (l. eventual champion Badosa) and 2022 (l. Halep)
- After 1r bye, defeated Bucsa in 2r, Noskova in 3r and Peterson in R16 to reach her fourth QF from five tournaments in 2023
- Deepest runs of her career at WTA 1000 tournaments are to SF at 2021 Rome and 2023 Dubai, with an overall win-loss record of 33-19 (only other teenager to play 50 or more matches at this level is Pavlyuchenkova with 53)
- Faces No.2 Sabalenka in QF today; owns seven wins in career over Top-10 players, most recently against No.6 Sabalenka at 2022 Toronto
- Since then, has lost five straight matches against Top-10 opponents (all in straight sets)
- Owns 21-36 career record against seeds (1-3 in 2023)
- Record in WTA QF matches stands at 10-11 (6-9 on hard courts)
- Last American remaining in the draw; at least one home player has reached QF every year since 2014
- V.Williams was the last American to reach SF here (2018), while S.Williams was the most recent to reach the final (2016) and also win the title (2001)
- Has won 14 matches so far in 2023; only Garcia (17), Sabalenka (15), Bencic (15), Swiatek (15) and Pegula (15) have more
- Seeded No.2 in doubles this fortnight w/Pegula (l. Kato/Sutjiadi in 3r)
- Two of her three career titles have come on hard courts, at 2019 Linz (indoor) and 2023 Auckland (outdoor)
- Best career result on US soil was SF run at 2020 Lexington

- Making a 4th appearance at Indian Wells, where her best previous result was R16 showing in 2019 (l. Kerber)
- Also won doubles title here in 2019 (w/Mertens)
- Now reached QF at all regular WTA 1000 tournaments (exception being 2022 inaugural event in Guadalajara)
- This is her 36th appearance at WTA 1000 level, winning four titles
- After 1r bye, advanced past Rodina in 2r, Tsurenko (via walkover) in 3r and Krejckikova in R16; struck 16 aces taking her season total to 118
- Faces No.6 Gauff in QF today; has lost three of their four career meetings, although did beat her en route to 2020 Ostrava title (first match in 15-match, three-tournament, winning streak)
- Since losing to Gauff at 2022 Toronto, has won seven straight matches against Americans
- Owns 22 wins in career over Top-10 players, most recently beating No.10 Bencic at 2023 Australian Open
- Has 65-42 career record against seeds (5-0 in 2023)
- Record in WTA QF matches stands at 30-16 (20-13 on hard courts)
- Seeded second this fortnight; Navratilova in 1991, Davenport in 2000 and Sharapova in 2013 are the only No.2 seeds to win this title
- Following her Australian Open win, she returned to her career-high ranking of No.2 (first achieved in August 23, 2021)
- Has lost just one of her 15 matches this season (in Dubai QF against eventual champion Krejckikova); only Garcia (17-7) has won more
- Owns 12 career titles, including at Australian Open (2023), WTA EliteTrophy Zhuhai (2019), and WTA 1000 events in Wuhan (2018-19), Doha(2020) and Madrid (2021)
- Best results on US soil, are her maiden WTA title at 2018 New Haven and R-Up finishes at 2022 WTA Finals Fort Worth and 2019 San Jose

## CAREER MILESTONES

- In 2022, reached maiden Grand Slam final at Roland-Garros (l. Swiatek); was the youngest major finalist since Sharapova won 2004 Wimbledon
- Made Top-10 debut on September 12, 2022, following QF run at US Open (l. Garcia)
- Highlight of 2021 campaign was completing singles-doubles title sweep at Parma; defeated Q.Wang in singles final and teamed up w/McNally to win doubles
- In 2021 also reached SF at Adelaide and Rome, while at the Slams made QF at Roland-Garros and R16 at Wimbledon
- Finished R-Up in doubles at 2021 US Open (w/McNally, l. Stosur/Zhang)
- First cracked the Top 50 on February 24, 2020 at No.49, following a R16 appearance at Australian Open to tie her career best Grand Slam result - during run, defeated V.Williams in 1r and her first Top-5 opponent in No.4 Osaka in 3r (l. eventual champion Kenin in 3s)
- Enjoyed breakout season in 2019, highlighted by maiden WTA singles title at Linz (as lucky loser, d. Ostapenko in F) - earned her first Top-10 win en route to title over No.8 Bertens in QF

- Broke into Top 50 for first time at No.49 on October 9, 2017
- At 2016 Australian Open, by reaching 2r (d. Y.Wang, l. Suárez Navarro) became the first woman from Greece to win a main draw match at a Slam since Daniilidou d. Ka.Pliskova at 2013 Australian Open
- At 2022 Eastbourne, won 29th career title (d. Ostapenko in F) - the second-most among active players behind V.Williams on 49 - and finished R-Up later that summer at Cincinnati (l. Garcia)
- Best result in 2021 was title run at Doha (d. Muguruza in F). Also made SFs at Bad Homburg and Ostrava, and QFs at Stuttgart, Madrid and Cincinnati
- Reached final at Doha in 2020 (l. Sabalenka)
- Reached title match at 2019 Australian Open for third career Grand Slam final appearance - result moved her to World No.2, matching her career high ranking. Had she beaten Osaka in the final, would have claimed World No.1 ranking
- Also in 2019, qualified for WTA Finals in Shenzhen for seventh time (went 0-3 in group play)
- Won a WTA-leading five titles in 2018, at St Petersburg (d. Mladenovic in F), Doha (d. Muguruza in F), Prague (d. Buzarnescu in F), Madrid (d. Bertens in F) and Birmingham (d. Rybarikova in F)
- Titles in 2018 came on all three surfaces - first player to win a title on three difference surfaces in a season since S.Williams in 2015
- Began 2017 season in May at Roland Garros (2r, l. Mattek-Sands) after a knife attack in her home in Czech Republic on December 20, 2016; required extensive surgery to left hand. Won title at 2017 Birmingham only a month later
- Contested Rio Olympics in August 2016, winning the singles bronze medal (l. Puig in SF, d. Keys in bronze medal play-off)
- Runner-up at 2015 WTA Finals in Singapore (l. A.Radwanska in 3s). Former champion at the season finale, which she won on her event debut in 2011 (d. Azarenka in F)
- Was first player born in 1990s to win a Grand Slam title at 2011 Wimbledon
- At 2012 Sydney was two wins from becoming No.1 (had won Wimbledon and WTA Finals in previous six months)
- Owns six wins over current World No.1s: Safina (2009 US Open), Wozniacki (2011 WTA Finals), S.Williams (2015 Madrid), Kerber (2016 Wuhan), Wozniacki (2018 Doha) and Barty (2020 Doha)
- Among active players, owns the most wins in indoor hard-court events
- Member of Czech Republic's Billie Jean King Cup winning team in 2011-12, 2014-16 and 2018
- Made professional debut on ITF Circuit in Czech

- Reached first career WTA QF at 2016 Istanbul (as qualifier, L. Kovinic)
- Fell 1r on WTA main draw debut at 2015 US Open (as qualifier, L. Q.Wang)
- WTA qualifying debut came at 2012 Palermo
- Made debut on ITF Circuit in 2010; owns seven ITF Circuit singles titles and five in doubles
