BNP PARIBAS OPEN – DAY 7 – FOURTH ROUND

[1] IGA SWIATEK (POL #1) Head-to-Head EMMA RADUCANU (GBR #77)

Swiatek triumphed in straight sets when they met in QF at 2022 Stuttgart... Swiatek is bidding to become just the second player to defend this title... Swiatek has held the No.1 ranking since moving to No.1 on April 3, 2022... Only three women have held the No.1 ranking for more consecutive weeks in their first stint at No.1: Graf (186), Hingis (80) and S.Williams (57)... Last British woman to defeat the World No.1 was Johanna Konta at 2017 Eastbourne (d. Kerber)... This the fourth tournament Raducanu has won three or more main draw matches in a row... Raducanu is the fifth British woman to reach R16 at Indian Wells and is bidding to be the first Brit to reach the QF at the tournament

[16] BARBORA KREJCIKOVA (CZE #16) Head-to-Head [2] ARYNA SABALENKA (#2)

Despite dropping the first set 6-0 in the last meeting, Krejckikova rallied to defeat Sabalenka in 3-sets in the quarterfinals in Dubai earlier this year; Krejckikova went on to win the title in Dubai... Krejckikova advanced to R16 in 2021, her only other main draw appearance at Indian Wells... Entering Indian Wells, Sabalenka leads the Tour in service games won with 86.7% and held all seven service games in her opening match against Rodina (advanced to fourth round via walkover)... Sabalenka is defending only 20 points at Indian Wells and Miami... Sabalenka and Bencic are only women with multiple singles titles this year... Krejckikova is top seed in doubles with partner Katerina Siniakova and they are through to QF

[15] PETRA KVITOVA (CZE #15) Head-to-Head [3] JESSICA PEGULA (USA #3)

Kvitova won the match-up earlier this year at United Cup... Since 2009, Kvitova has appeared in 98 WTA 1000 tournaments, second most behind only Pavlyuchenkova (100)... In 11 previous appearances at Indian Wells, Kvitova has never been beyond QF (2013, 2016)... Pegula has reached QF at six of her last seven WTA 1000 tournaments... Pegula's has won 15 matches this season, tied for second most on Tour behind only Caroline Garcia (17); Bencic also has 15 wins

SORANA CIRSTEIA (ROU #83) Head-to-Head [5] CAROLINE GARCIA (FRA #5)

Garcia has won previous two meetings in 3-sets – 2019 Madrid and 2017 Toronto... Garcia leads the Tour in aces 162; hit 18 aces in her first two matches, including 11 aces vs. Fernandez... Cirstea owns four Top 5 wins, most recently at 2017 Beijing... Making her 11th appearance at Indian Wells, Cirstea has equaled best result at Indian Wells (also R16 in 2022)



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[6] COCO GAUFF (USA #6)

[Q] REBECCA PETERSON (SWE #103)

Monday (March 13), Gauff celebrated her 19th birthday... Peterson won the only previous meeting at an ITF Circuit event at 2019 Midland... Last year two qualifiers reached the R16 – Daria Saville and Harriet Dart; the last time a qualifier reached QF was 2015 (Lesia Tsuruenko)... Gauff has won 28-straight matches against opponents ranked outside the Top 50... Including qualifying and ITF level, Peterson has won 26 of her last 32 matches... Peterson is trying to become the second Swedish woman to reach the QF stage at Indian Wells (Catarina Lindqvist, 1989, QF)... Peterson would become the first Swedish woman to reach the QF stage at a WTA 1000

R16 QUICK HITS

- The Top 3 seeds – No.1 Iga Swiatek, No.2 Aryna Sabalenka and No.3 Jessica Pegula – have advanced to the R16 for the first time at Indian Wells since 2015. The last time the Top 3 seeds all advanced to the QF at Indian Wells was 2008
- Five Czech women – Barbora Krejckova, Petra Kvitova, Karolina Muchova, Karolina Pliskova and Marketa Vondrousova – have advanced to the R16 at Indian Wells for the first time in tournament history.
- Since 2009 when WTA 1000 level was first introduced, this is the first time five Czech women have reached R16
- For the 8th consecutive WTA 1000 level tournament, at least two Americans have reached the R16 – Coco Gauff and Jessica Pegula
- At least one American has reached the QF stage in 10-straight WTA 1000 tournaments. The last time an American did not reach the QF at a WTA 1000 level was 2021 Cincinnati.
- At least one American has reached the QF at Indian Wells in the last 8 stagings of the tournament (every year since 2014).
- Kvitova is trying to reach the QF at a WTA 1000 level for the 35th time in her career; only Agnieszka Radwanska (42), Simona Halep (39) and Caroline Wozniacki (36) have reached more QF at the WTA 1000 level
- Rebecca Peterson is the first Swedish woman to reach the R16 at Indian Wells since 1997 Asa Svensson. Peterson is trying to become the second Swedish woman to reach the QF at the tournament (Catarina Lindqvist, QF, 1989)
- Emma Raducanu joins Harriet Dart (2022), Johanna Konta (2016), Heather Watson (2015) and Clare Wood (1993) as the fifth British woman to reach the R16 at Indian Wells. Raducanu is trying to become the first Brit to reach the QF.

PLAYER NOTES

- Making 3rd main-draw appearance at Indian Wells (4th overall), where she is defending champion, having won 2022 title (d. Sakkari in F)
- Last year, went on to complete 'Sunshine Double' by also winning Miami - Graf (1994, 1996), Clijsters (2005) and Azarenka (2016) are the only other women to achieve the feat
- Also made R16 in 2021 (l. Ostapenko) and contested qualifying in 2019
- After 1r bye, faced no break points in 2r victory over Liu - sixth time this season she has won a set without dropping a game - before hard-fought 3r clash with 2019 champion Andreescu
- Now won 14 matches so far in 2023, only Garcia (17), Bencic (15) and Pegula (15) have more
- Win-loss record at WTA 1000 level improves to 45-13; her winning percentage is now 77.6%, second only to S.Williams (83.1%)
- Faces No.77 Raducanu in R16; won only previous meeting en route to 2022 Stuttgart title
- Last loss to a player ranked outside Top 50 came against No.338 Konjuh at 2021 Miami
- In Tour-level matches, owns 3-0 record against players from Great Britain, beating Watson (2021 Eastbourne), Dart (2022 Australian Open) and Raducanu (2022 Stuttgart)
- Only player from Poland to reach R16 (Frech and Linette fell in 2r)
- Is top seed for the 16th time in her career; has won the title as No.1 seed on six occasions
- Leading seed has won title here 11 times, most recently in 2012 (Azarenka d. Sharapova in F)
- Currently ranked No.1 and will remain there until at least the week of April 3, taking her career total to 53 - will move above Azarenka in 12th place on all-time list
- Owns seven titles on hard courts, at 2021 Adelaide, 2022 Doha, 2022 Indian Wells, 2022 Miami, 2022 US Open, 2022 San Diego and 2023 Doha

PLAYER NOTES

- Making 3rd appearance at Indian Wells, where her best previous result was reaching 3r in 2022 (l. Martic)
- This fortnight, beat Kovinic in 1r, Linette in 2r and Haddad Maia in 3r, to register back-to-back wins for first time since SF run in Seoul last September
- Victory over No.21 Linette was first Top-50 win since beating No.22 Azarenka at 2022 Cincinnati, while upset of No.13 Haddad Maia was her third career Top-20 triumph (also No.12 Bencic and No.18 Sakkari at 2021 US Open)
- Faces No.1 Swiatek in R16 today; has lost all three career encounters with Top-10 players in straight sets, against No.1 Swiatek (2022 Stuttgart), No.8 Pegula (2022 Cincinnati) and No.7 Gauff (2023 Australian Open)
- Owns 2-1 career record against players from Poland, losing to Swiatek (2022 Stuttgart) and beating Linette (2022 Seoul and 2023 Indian Wells)
- Bidding to win four matches in a row for first time since run through qualifying to 2021 US Open title
- One of two British women in the main draw (qualifier Swan l. Bucsa in 1r)
- Best results by British women at Indian Wells are R16 showings by Clare Wood in 1993, Heather Watson in 2015, Johanna Konta in 2016, Harriet Dart in 2022 and now her own run in 2023
- Is currently ranked No.77; this time last year was No.13
- Is making her first appearance on tour since Australian Open where she fell in 2r (l. Gauff). Withdrew from recent tournament in Austinw/tonsillitis

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CAREER MILESTONES

- In 2022, lifted second and third Grand Slam titles, at Roland-Garros (d. Gauff in F) and US Open (d. Jabeur in F)
- Triumph in Paris was the last of six straight titles during 37-match winning streak - joint-longest unbeaten run on Tour since 1990
- Won two titles in 2021, at Adelaide and Rome. Other highlights included QF at Roland-Garros and SF at Ostrava and qualifying for WTA Finals Guadalajara (fell in group stage)
- Also finished doubles R-Up at 2021 Roland-Garros (w/Mattek-Sands, l. Krejčíková/Siniakova)
- Won her maiden Tour-level title at 2020 Roland-Garros without dropping a set, becoming the first player from Poland - man or woman - to win a Grand Slam singles title and first from her country to reach a major final since A.Radwanska at 2012 Wimbledon
- Ranked No.54, she became the lowest-ranked woman to win the Roland-Garros title in the Open Era and the lowest-ranked finalist since 1977 (No.56 Mihai). At 19y 132d, is the youngest champion in Paris since Monica Seles (18y 187d) in 1992
- Also became the first player to win her debut Tour-level title at a Grand Slam since Jelena Ostapenko at 2017 Roland-Garros
- Won WTA Most Improved Player of the Year for 2020, as voted on by members of the media. Also won the 2020 WTA Fan Favorite Award
- Ended 2019 season ranked No.61 after a campaign highlighted by R-Up finish at Lugano (l. Hercog) and R16 run at Roland-Garros (l. Halep). That year also reached 3r at Toronto (l. Osaka) and made 2r five times (incl. Australian and US Open)
- Broke into Top 100 at No.88 after R-Up finish at 2019 Lugano
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2019 Auckland
- Ended 2018 season ranked No.175 (up from No.690 in 2017), after posting 42-6 record and winning four titles on ITF Circuit
- Member of Poland's Billie Jean King Cup team, 2018-20, 2021-22
- On professional debut, came through qualifying to win title at \$10k ITF/Stockholm-SWE in 2016; owns seven singles titles at this level
- Enjoyed stellar junior career, including winning girls' singles at 2018 Wimbledon (d. Küng in F) and leading Poland to Junior Fed Cup in 2016
- Struggled with injuries and form throughout 2022 dropping as low as No.83 after 1r exit at US Open
- Best performance came late in the year with SF run in Seoul (l. Ostapenko via ret. w/left glute injury). Also made QF at Stuttgart (l. eventual champion Swiatek) and Washington DC (l. eventual champion Samsonova) with best win-by-ranking coming over No.22 Azarenka during 3r run at Cincinnati
- Earned a career best year in 2021 jumping over 300 ranking spots and finishing the season inside the Top 20 at a career high of No.19 earning her the 2021 WTA Newcomer of the Year Award
- Reached QF at Cluj-Napoca 2 (l. Kostyuk) and made appearances at Indian Wells and Linz
- Won the US Open in only her fourth Tour-level appearance (d. fellow teenager Fernandez in F); did not drop a set and upset No.12 Bencic and No.18 Sakkari along the way to become the first qualifier to lift a Grand Slam title
- Fell 1r at San Jose (as WC, l. Zhang) and finished R-Up at WTA 125K Series event in Chicago (l. Tauson)
- At Wimbledon, became the youngest British woman in the Open Era to reach R16 (l. Tomljanovic via ret.); upset Top-50 players Vondrousova and Cirstea en route
- Made debut WTA main draw appearance at 2021 Nottingham (as WC, l. Dart in 1r)
- Ended 2020 by finishing R-Up at \$25k ITF/Sunderland-GBR
- Won title at \$25k ITF/Pune-IND in 2019
- Lifted first two ITF Circuit titles in 2018, at \$15k ITF/Antalya-TUR and \$15k ITF/Tiberias-GRE
- Owns three singles titles on ITF Circuit
- In Juniors she reached back-to-back quarter finals of Wimbledon and US Open in 2018

OTHER INFORMATION

- Coached by Tomasz Wiktorowski. previously worked with Piotr Sierzputowski
 - Father is former Olympic rower Tomasz Swiatek, who competed in the men's quadruple sculls event at the 1988 Summer Olympics in Seoul
 - This summer organised 'Iga Swiatek and friends for Ukraine' event in Krakow, which featured a mixed doubles match between Agnieszka Radwanska, Sergiy Stakhovsky, Polish junior Martyn Pawelski and herself, and was attended by Poland's First Lady, Agata Kornhauser-Duda, Elina Svitolina and Andriy Shevchenko. The occasion was watched by almost 15,000 people live and a further one million on television, raising more than half a million Euros for Ukrainian children and teenagers affected by the war
 - Started playing tennis because her older sister was playing and wanted to beat her
 - Enjoys rock music, including AC/DC and Pink Floyd
 - Includes PZU, ASICS, Tecnifibre, Rolex and Xiaomi in her endorsement portfolio
- Currently working with Sebastian Sachs
 - Only child, parents are Ian (Romanian) and Renee (Chinese). Born in Toronto and moved to Bromley, south of London, at the age of two
 - Favorite shot is forehand and favorite surface is hard
 - Started playing tennis aged five
 - In the summer of 2021, completed her A-level exams in maths and English
 - Has a wide variety of interests in sports such as go-karting, horse riding, tap dancing, golf, skiing and basketball

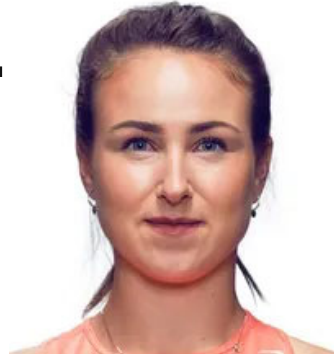
