SWIATEK:

Australian Open

- Making fifth consecutive main-draw appearance at Australian Open
- Made 2r on Grand Slam debut here in 2019 (as qualifier, I. Giorgi)
- Best result at Melbourne Park is last year's SF run (I. Collins)
- As a junior finished R-Up in 2017 Australian Open girls' doubles (w/Chwalinska)
- Is a three-time major winner, triumphing at Roland Garros in 2020 (d. Kenin in F) and 2022 (d. Gauff in F), and at US Open in 2022 (d. Jabeur in F)
- Faces No.69 Niemeier in 1r today; rallied from a set and a break down to beat the German en route to 2022
 US Open title
- Last loss to a player outside Top 50 came against No.338 Konjuh at 2021 Miami
- Career record in Grand Slam 1r matches is 14-1 (.933 winning percentage is the highest among active players); only loss came against No.81 Golubic at 2019 Wimbledon (also her only loss to a player outside Top 50 at a Slam)





- Is top seed for the fourth Slam in a row; No.1 seed has only at first hurdle once at Australian Open, Ruzici in 1979 (I. Sawyer)
- One of two women representing Poland in singles field; no Polish woman has ever reached Australian Open singles final
- Won 47 hard-court matches last season the most since A.Radwanska notched up 52 in 2013
- Opened 2023 season representing Poland at inaugural United Cup; posted 5-1 record in singles and mixed doubles as Polish team reached SF

- In 2022, lifted second and third Grand Slam titles, at Roland-Garros (d. Gauff in F) and US Open (d. Jabeur in F)
- Triumph in Paris was the last of six straight titles during 37-match winning streak joint-longest unbeaten run on Tour since 1990
- Won two titles in 2021, at Adelaide and Rome. Other highlights included QF at Roland-Garros and SF at Ostrava and qualifying for WTA Finals Guadalajara (fell in group stage)
- Also finished doubles R-Up at 2021 Roland-Garros (w/Mattek-Sands, I. Krejcikova/Siniakova)
- Won her maiden Tour-level title at 2020 Roland-Garros without dropping a set, becoming the first player from Poland man or woman to win a Grand Slam singles title and first from her country to reach a major final since A.Radwanska at 2012 Wimbledon
- Ranked No.54, she became the lowest-ranked woman to win the Roland-Garros title in the Open Era and the lowest-ranked finalist since 1977 (No.56 Mihai). At 19y 132d, is the youngest champion in Paris since Monica Seles (18y 187d) in 1992
- Also became the first player to win her debut Tour-level title at a Grand Slam since Jelena Ostapenko at 2017 Roland-Garros
- Won WTA Most Improved Player of the Year for 2020, as voted on by members of the media. Also won the 2020 WTA Fan Favorite Award
- Ended 2019 season ranked No.61 after a campaign highlighted by R-Up finish at Lugano (I. Hercog) and R16 run at Roland-Garros (I. Halep). That year also reached 3r at Toronto (I. Osaka) and made 2r five times (incl. Australian and US Open)
- Broke into Top 100 at No.88 after R-Up finish at 2019 Lugano
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2019 Auckland
- Ended 2018 season ranked No.175 (up from No.690 in 2017), after posting 42-6 record and winning four titles on ITF Circuit
- Member of Poland's Billie Jean King Cup team, 2018-19, 2021-22





- On professional debut, came through qualifying to win title at \$10k ITF/Stockholm-SWE in 2016; owns seven singles titles at this level
- Enjoyed stellar junior career, including winning girls' singles at 2018 Wimbledon (d. Küng in F) and leading Poland to Junior Fed Cup in 2016

NIEMEIER:

<u>Australian Open</u>

- Making Australian Open main-draw debut
- Last year, fell to Hartono in 3s at final hurdle of qualifying here
- Three previous main-draw Slam outings all came in 2022, with best result a QF run at Wimbledon (I. Maria)
- Faces No.1 Swiatek in 1r today; lost to the Pole during R16 showing at 2022 US Open
- Only other career meeting with a Top-10 player was an upset of No.3 Kontaveit at 2022 Wimbledon
- In terms of ranking, best career win on a hard court came over No.38 Putintseva at 2022 US Open
- Overall is 2-1 in Grand Slam 1r matches, with only defeat coming against Stephens at 2022 Roland Garros
- One of five Germans in draw; two German women have won this title, Graf (1988-90, 1994) and Kerber (2016)
- Opened 2023 season by losing both singles rubbers in straight sets while representing Germany at United Cup, then fell a first hurdle of qualifying at Adelaide 2

- Enjoyed success at Slams in 2022, advancing to QF at Wimbledon (I. Maria) and R16 at US Open (I. eventual champion Swiatek)
- Last season also reached QF at Lausanne (I. Potapova) Cluj-Napoca (I. Paolini). Won titles on Croatian soil at WTA 125K Makarska and at W60 tournament in Zagreb
- Made Top 100 debut (at No.94) on May 9, 2022
- In 2021 also advanced to SF at Hamburg and made it through qualifying to lift third ITF Circuit title of her career at W25 Prague
- On second WTA main draw, reached SF at 2021 Strasbourg (as qualifier, I. eventual champion Krejcikova); upset No.46 Rogers in 2r to score first Top 50 win of her career
- Best results of 2020 were SF runs at W25 Cherbourg-en-Cotentin and W25 Las Palmas de Gran Caneria
- Fell 1r on WTA main draw debut at 2019 Nurnberg (as qualifier, I. Kr.Pliskova)
- Rose over 500 places in the rankings in 2018 after posting 31-17 record and reaching two ITF Circuit finals
- Lifted maiden ITF Circuit title in 2018, at W15 Kaltenkirchen
- Made professional debut on ITF Circuit in Central Europe in 2016

PEGULA:

<u>Australian Open</u>

- Making fourth main-draw appearance at Australian Open having reached QF in last two visits in 2021 (I. Brady) and 2022 (I. Barty)
- Also fell 1r in 2020 (I. Townsend) and competed in qualifying in 2013 and 2016
- Run here in 2021 performance was first major QF appearance and reached three more last year at Australian Open, Roland Garros and US Open
- Won 14 Grand Slam matches last year; only Swiatek (21) registered more
- Faces No.161 Jaqueline Cristian in 1r; has not lost 1r at a major since 2020 Roland Garros when ranked No.60 (I. Sabalenka)
- Career record in Grand Slam 1r matches is 10-6; has won eight straight opening rounds at majors
- Has won 19 of her last 20 matchups against players outside the Top 100; only loss came to No.168 CoCo Vandeweghe at 2022 Charleston





- One of 18 players from the United States in the draw (including LL Mandlik); the last American to win the title here was Sofia Kenin in 2020
- Holds 3-3 record against Romanian players with a 1-2 record at majors
- Opened 2023 season helping the United States win the inaugural United Cup with a 4-1 singles record including a 6-2 6-2 win over World No.1 Swiatek in SF, only loss came to No.16 Kvitova in group play; also won all four mixed doubles matches played

- Achieved career-high No. 3 in October 2022 after defeating four Grand Slam champions at Guadalajara, en route to ending three-year wait for second WTA title (d. Sakkari in F)
- Qualified for WTA Finals Fort Worth in both singles and doubles (w/Gauff), thus becoming the first Americans to debut in singles and doubles at the season-ending showpiece since Davenport in 1994
- Reached QF at three of the four majors in 2022, breaking into Top 10 after doing so at Roland Garros (June 6, 2022)
- One of seven players to win 40+ matches last season, alongside Swiatek, Jabeur, Garcia, Sakkari, Kasatkina and Bencic
- In 2021, reached the QF or better on seven occasions, including at the Australian Open
- Broke into Top 20 on November 1, 2021
- Began 2020 with runner-up finish at Auckland (I. S.Williams), other standout results were a QF at Western & Southern Open (as qualifier, I. Mertens) and a 3r showing at US Open (I. Kvitova)
- On the doubles court in 2020, reached QFs of Roland-Garros (w/Muhammad) and Cincinnati (w/Rogers)
- Won her first WTA title at 2019 Washington DC (d. Giorgi in F)
- Also in 2019, fell 1r on main draw debut at Roland-Garros (I. eventual champion Barty) and Wimbledon (I. Buzarnescu) and Miami (as a qualifier, I. Konta)
- Broke into Top 100 for the first time on February 4, 2019 following back-to-back R-Up finishes at WTA 125K Series event at Newport Beach and W100 ITF Circuit tournament in Midland-MI, USA
- Highlights of 2018 included finishing R-up as a qualifier at Quebec City (I. Parmentier in F), recording SF finish at Houston WTA 125K Series tournament (I. S.Peng) and reaching QF or better at 10 ITF events
- Did not play between January and August 2017 after undergoing hip surgery. Primarily played at ITF Circuit events for the rest of the year, winning two doubles titles with Townsend
- Played a mixture of WTA and ITF Circuit events in 2016 with highlight coming at Washington DC, where she defeated No.14 Stosur for first Top-20 win of career on her way to a SF finish (I. Davis)
- Reached 2r on Grand Slam main draw debut at 2015 US Open (as qualifier, d. Van Uytvanck, I. Cibulkova)
- Sidelined from tennis for a year and a half between 2013 and 2015 due to a right knee injury
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2009 Ponte Vedra Beach and WTA main draw debut at 2012 Indian Wells





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CRISTIAN:

<u>Australian Open</u>

- Made Grand Slam main-draw debut at 2022 Australian Open, going on to reach 2r (d. Minnen, I. Keys)
- Also contested qualifying at Melbourne Park in 2020
- Across all Slams, win over Minnen last year was first and only Grand Slam main draw win; fell 1r at 2022 US
 Open in only other major main draw appearance (I. No.2 Kontaveit)
- Faces another Top 5 player in 1r this week, World No.3 Jessica Pegula looking for her first main-draw match win since 2022 Doha where she defeated No.20 Elena Rybakina in 1r as a lucky loser (suffered a right knee injury in Doha that kept her out until US Open)
- Win over Rybakina remains only Top 20 victory of career; currently 0-3 against Top 10 opponents falling to No.5 Sofia Kenin at 2020 Lyon, No.4 Barbora Krejcikova at 2022 Sydney and No.2 Anett Kontaveit at 2022 US Open
- One of five players from Romania in the draw with Irina-Camelia Begu, Ana Bogdan, Sorana Cirstea and Patricia Maria Tig; best result by a player from Romania was Simona Halep's R-Up finish in 2018
- Holds 1-3 record against American players, only win came over No.100 Bernarda Pera at 2022 St. Petersburg; also lost to an American in her only WTA final appearance at 2021 Linz (I. Riske-Amritraj)
- Contesting 2023 Australian Open with a protected ranking of No.65
- So far in 2023, contested qualifying at Auckland and fell 1r at Hobart (I. No.1 seed Bouzkova)

- Earned a new career high ranking of No.58 on January 31, 2022 after making her Grand Slam main draw debut at Australian Open and reaching 2r (d. Minnen, I. Keys)
- Also reached 2r at Sydney (I. Krejcikova), St. Petersburg (I. Sasnovich) and Doha (I. Kasatkina via ret.); in Doha earned her first career Top 20 win with a victory over No.20 Elena Rybakina
- Suffered knee injury keeping her out of 2022 season from February-August; made return at US Open for her first main draw appearance in New York (I. No.2 Kontaveit)
- On ITF Circuit in 2022, won title at \$80k ITF/Le Neuborg-FRA
- Ended 2021 campaign in fine form, reaching SF at Nur-Sultan (I. eventual champion Van Uytvanck), QF at Cluj-Napoca (I. Halep) before finishing R-Up at Linz (I. Riske)
- Broke into Top 100 on November 8, 2021
- Advanced to maiden WTA QF at 2021 St. Petersburg (I. Kuznetsova)
- Season highlight in 2020 was 2r run at Lyon (as qualifier, I. Kenin)





• Made debut for Romania in Billie Jean King Cup in 2020, winning singles rubber against Kudermetova during 3-2 qualifying defeat to Russia

- Making Australian Open main-draw debut
- Last year, fell at final hurdle of qualifying here, losing to Baptiste after coming within three points of victory in second set
- Also contested Australian Open qualifying in 2020-21
- Only contested two Grand Slam main draws in her career, reaching 3r at 2022 US Open (as qualifier, I. Pegula) and falling 1r at 2022 Wimbledon (as LL, I. Anisimova)
- Lost in qualifying rounds at a Slam five times, including 2020, 2021 and 2022 Australian Open
- Faces No.6 Sakkari in 1r today; has faced one Top-10 opponent in her career, losing to No.8 Pegula in 3s at 2022 US Open
- In terms of ranking, best career win came over No.42 Begu at 2022 US Open
- Opened season by falling at first hurdle in qualifying at Adelaide 1 and Hobart

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Career Milestones

- Finished last season with 44-25 record (across all levels), jumping more than 100 spots in ranking and breaking Top 100 in October after winning ITF W60 Las Vegas
- Rose to career-high No.74 on November 7, 2022
- Fell 1r on Grand Slam main-draw debut at 2022 Wimbledon (as LL, I. Anisimova), then advanced to 3r at US Open (as qualifier, I. Pegula)
- At Tour level in 2022 also fell 1r at Miami and Charleston, while contested qualifying on eight occasions
- Started off 2022 with a title win at W60+H Traralgon; also made F at W60 Liepaja (I. Navarro) and W60 Berkeley CA (I. Brengle)
- Fell 1r on WTA main-draw debut at 2018 Tianjin
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2018 Nanchang
- Owns four titles in singles and two in doubles on ITF Circuit

SAKKARI:

<u>Australian Open</u>

- Making eighth main-draw appearance at Australian Open
- Best results are R16 runs in 2020 (I. Kvitova) and 2022 (I. Pegula)
- Across all major, best results are SF showings at Roland Garros and US Open in 2021
- Faces No.117 Yuan in 1r; last loss to a player outside Top 100 came against No.144 Parks at 2022 Ostrava, while at the Slams it came at hands of No.103 Maria at 2022 Wimbledon
- Career record in Grand Slam 1r matches is 21-6, with last defeat coming against Mladenovic at 2021 Australian Open
- Opened 2023 season helping Greece reach SF at the inaugural United Cup; going 6-1 in singles and mixed doubles

- Finished 2022 ranked No.6 for the second consecutive year; a four-time finalist in 2022 including runs to the final at two WTA 1000 tournaments Indian Wells and Guadalajara [1000]; returned to the WTA Finals advancing to the semifinals, falling to eventual champion Caroline Garcia
- Climbed as high as No.3 in the rankings (March 21, 2022), the highest ranking every achieved by a Greek woman
- Historic 2021 season was highlighted by her becoming first Greek woman to break into the Top 10 (at No.10, September 27) as well as the first from her country to qualify for the WTA Finals

- Registered back-to-back SF runs at Toronto (I. eventual champion Andreescu) and Cincinnati (I. eventual champion Keys), subsequently leading to Top 20 debut at No.20 on August 19, 2019
- During this run, defeated No.1 Barty (Toronto) and No.1 Osaka (Cincinnati) to become first player since October 2001 to defeat World No.1s in consecutive weeks (Davenport); also became youngest American to defeat reigning No.1 in eight years (after McHale)
- Advanced to R16 at 2019 Roland Garros (d. S.Williams, I. eventual champion Barty) became first American to defeat Serena at the majors since Stephens at 2013 Australian Open QF

AZARENKA:

<u>Australian Open</u>

- Making 15th main draw appearance at the Australian Open, where she is a two-time champion, lifting the title in in 2012 (d. Sharapova) and 2013 (d. Li Na), marking the last time the title here was successfully defended
- Has reached three other Slam finals, all at the US Open, finishing R-Up in 2012 (I. S.Williams), 2013 (I. S.Williams) and 2020 (I. Osaka)
- Overall this is her 60th Grand Slam main draw appearance, and entering today's match owns a 148-55 record across the majors
- Has reached the SF at both Roland-Garros (2013) and Wimbledon (2011-12)
- Only other former Australian Open champion in the draw is her opponent today Kenin
- One of 11 current or former Grand Slam champions in the 2023 main draw
- A loss to No.203 Kenin today would be her worst loss by ranking at a Slam of her career since falling to No.217 A.Radwanska at 2006 Wimbledon (Azarenka was ranked No.101 at the time)
- Has suffered 10 losses in 1r at majors in career, with most recent coming here at 2021 Australian Open (I. Pegula)
- Contested both Adelaide events in lead up to 2023 Australian Open, reaching QF in week 1 (I. eventual R-Up Noskova) and fell 1r in week 2 (I. Kudermetova, having held MPs)

- Standout result in 2022 was SF in last tournament, at Guadalajara (I. eventual champion Pegula). Also reached QFs at Washington DC and Adelaide, while made R16 at Australian Open and US Open
- Best result in 2021 came in final event when she finished R-Up at Indian Wells (I. Badosa on third set tiebreak). Also made SFs at Doha and Bad Homburg





- One of five players to reach three or more finals in 2020, lifting one trophy at the Western & Southern Open her first title since 2016. Finished year ranked No.13 her best season-end ranking since 2013 (No.2)
- Advanced to her fifth career Grand Slam final at 2020 US Open, which helped her return to the Top 20 for the first time since March 2017
- Winner of the 2020 WTA Comeback Player of the Year Award, as voted on by members of the international media
- Last tournament of 2019 was the US Open, where she fell to Sabalenka in 1r; also reached the doubles final w/Barty (I. Mertens/Sabalenka)

- Ended 2016 ranked No.13, despite missing second half of season after going on maternity leave (announced pregnancy mid-July). Lifted three titles, at Brisbane and 'Sunshine Double' of Indian Wells and Miami third woman to achieve feat after Graf in 1994 and 1996 and Clijsters in 2005
- Posted 26-3 record for first six months of 2016 with losses coming at the Australian Open (QF, I. Kerber), Rome (2r, I. Begu) and Roland Garros (ret. vs. Knapp w/right knee injury)
- Limited to total of 23 events over 2014-15 seasons due to variety of injuries
- Posted five consecutive Top-10 finishes between 2009 and 2013, qualifying for the WTA Finals on each occasion (I. Kvitova in 2011 final in Istanbul)
- Ascended to World No.1 after 2012 Australian Open and held top spot for a total of 51 weeks
- Began 2012 with 26-match win streak best start since Hingis went 37-0 in 1997. Went on to win Tour-leading 69 matches in 2012, season highlighted by six titles, finishing as WTA's year-end No.1
- Belarusian Fed Cup Team, 2005, 2007, 2009-11, 2015-16, 2019; Belarusian Olympic Team, 2008, 2012
- Won two medals for Belarus at 2012 Olympics bronze in singles and mixed doubles gold (w/Mirnyi)
- Made her Top 100 debut on July 10, 2006 (No.99) and Top 50 debut on May 14, 2007 (No.49)
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2005 Kolkata
- ITF Junior World Champion for 2005 reached first tour-level semifinal at Guangzhou the same year
