##### Australian Open

- Making fifth main draw appearance at Australian Open; best result is 3r run in 2022 (l. Cornet); also reached 2r in 2019 (l. Osaka) and 2020 (l. S.Williams), fell 1r in 2021 (l. Diyas) and contested qualifying in 2017 and 2018
- Across all Slams, best result was SF run at 2021 Roland Garros where she defeated No.7 Bianca Andreescu en route (l. Pavlyuchenkova); win over Andreescu remains only Top 10 win in career
- Faces No.2 Ons Jabeur in 1r; has lost last two Grand Slam opening matches at 2022 Wimbledon (l. Udvardy) and 2022 US Open (l. Mandlik)
- Career record in Grand Slam 1r matches is 7-8
- One of two players from Slovenia in the draw, also Kaja Juvan
- So far in 2023, fell 1r at Auckland (l. Davis) and Hobart (as qualifier, l. Bonaventure)

### Career Milestones

- Reached career high ranking of No.22 on February 28, 2022
- Last year's highlights include SF at Adelaide 250 (withdrew prior to match), QF at Monastir (I. Cornet) and 3r at Australian Open (I. Cornet) and Roland Garros (I. Pegula)
- Ended 2021 campaign inside the Top 50 for the first time after compiling a career-best 24 main-draw match victories
- Last season, lifted maiden title at Lausanne (d. Burel in F), finished R-Up at Bogotá (I. Osorio) and enjoyed her Grand Slam breakthrough at Roland Garros, where she advanced to SF (I. Pavlyuchenkova)
- Broke into Top 50 following Roland Garros run, rising from No.85 to No.47 (June 14, 2021)
- Best singles result in 2020 was reaching QF at Acapulco (I. Zarazua)
- Earned a career high doubles ranking of No.57 on November 16, 2020 after winning third career Tour-level doubles title at Ostrava (w/Rus). Also lifted the doubles title at Palermo (w/Rus)
- Highlights of 2019 were reaching first WTA singles final, at Nurnberg (I. Putintseva in F), as well as defending WTA 125 Series title at Bol (d. Sorribes Tormo in F) and reaching SF at Hua Hin (I. Tomljanovic)
- Contested all the Slam main draws in 2019 for the first time - reached 2r twice, at 2019 Australian Open (I. Osaka) and 2019 Wimbledon (I. Wang Qiang)
- Highlights in 2018 included SF run at Moscow [River Cup] and title run at Bol WTA 125K Series event
- Broke into Top 100 (at No.95) following Bol title on June 11, 2018 - became the ninth Slovenian player in history to crack the Top 100
- In 2018, posted seven tour-level main draw wins and 40 on ITF Circuit; reached SF in just third WTA main draw, at Moscow [River Cup] (d. No.13 Kasatkina in 2r, I. Potapova)
- Made 2r on WTA main draw debut at Rabat in 2018 (as qualifier, d. Linette, I. Hsieh)
- WTA qualifying debut came at 2018 Brisbane
- Spent three months off tour with left knee injury in 2018
- Slovene Fed Cup Team, 2017-18, 2020
- Won first ITF Circuit title of career aged 16 at \$10k Velenje in 2014 - has won 16 more singles titles at this level

### **JABEUR:**

#### **Australian Open**

- Making sixth main draw appearance at Australian Open reaching maiden Grand Slam QF in 2020 (l. eventual champion Kenin); also reached 3r in 2021 (l. Osaka), fell 1r in 2015 (as qualifier, l. Zvonareva), 2018 (l. Vesnina) and 2019 (l. Babos) and contested qualifying in 2017
- Forced to withdraw from 2022 edition of the tournament due to a back injury
- Across all Slams, has reached two career major finals at 2022 Wimbledon (l. Rybakina) and 2022 US Open (l. Swiatek)
- Faces No.98 Tamara Zidansek in 1r; has not lost a Grand Slam main draw match to a player outside the Top 80 since 2015 Australian Open losing to No.203 Vera Zvonareva (Jabeur was ranked No.140 at the time)
- Has won 10 of her last 11 opening round matches at majors; only loss in this time frame came to No.52 Magda Linette at 2022 Roland Garros then reached the final of each Slam after that
- Opened season with SF run at Adelaide 1 (as No.1 seed, l. Noskova)

#### **Career Milestones**

- In 2022, created history by becoming first African and Arab woman in Open Era to reach a Grand Slam final, finishing R-Up at first Wimbledon (l. Rybakina) and then US Open (l. Swiatek)
- Lifted biggest career title at WTA 1000 Madrid during 2022 clay-court season (d. Pegula in F), also won title at Berlin
- Broke into Top 10 on October 18, 2021, following SF run at Indian Wells (l. eventual champion Badosa)
- At 2021 Birmingham, became first Arab woman to win a WTA title (d. Kasatkina in F). Followed this with QF at Wimbledon (l. Sabalenka)
- In 2021, also finished R-Up at Charleston [250] (l. Sharma) and Chicago [500] (l. Muguruza)
- Reached maiden Grand Slam QF at 2020 Australian Open to become the first Arab woman to reach that stage at a major (l. eventual champion Kenin); made Top 50 debut at No.45 after breakthrough performance in Melbourne
- Made further QFs in 2020 at Doha (d. No.3 Ka.Pliskova, l. Kvitova), Lexington (l. Gauff ), Western & Southern Open (l. eventual champion Azarenka) and Ostrava (l. Sakkari); posted career-high ranking of No.31 on August 31, 2020
- Season highlights in 2019 were 3r run at US Open and SF appearances at Eastbourne (l. eventual R-Up Kerber) and Tianjin (l. eventual champion Peterson)
- In 2018, defeated No.3 seed Stephens, No.8 seed Kontaveit and No.5 seed Sevastova en route to her first WTA final at 2018 Moscow, where she fell in three sets to No.6 seed Kasatkina. Was first Tunisian woman to advance beyond QF at a WTA tournament (Sfar was the only other Tunisian to reach a QF at this level)
- Scored first Top-10 win over No.7 Cibulkova at 2017 Roland Garros

- On ITF Circuit, has 11 singles and one doubles title
- Played first event of career at 2008 ITF/EI Menzah-TUN
- Became first North African woman to win a junior Slam at 2011 Roland Garros (d. Puig in F), having also reached the final in 2010 (l. Svitolina in F)

#### SEBOV:

##### Australian Open

- Making Grand Slam main-draw debut – one of 10 debutantes in draw this fortnight
- Upset No.2 seed Noskova in first round of qualifying last week, followed up with straight-sets wins over Hon and Waltert
- Previously Grand Slam experience comprised of qualifying outings at Australian Open and US Open in 2019
- Faces No.4 Garcia in 1r today; both previous matches against Top-50 players ended in defeat to No.37 Begu (2018 Billie Jean King Cup) and No.46 Putintseva (2022 Toronto)
- In terms of ranking, best of her five Top-100 career wins was over No.56 Noskova in qualifying last week
- Only previous Tour-level match win was over Wang Xinyu during 2r showing at 2022 Granby
- One of four Canadians in the draw (also Andreescu, Fernandez and Marino)
- Currently sitting at career-high ranking of No.190; by contrast, this time last year was No.349
- Opened 2023 season by falling at first hurdle of Auckland qualifying

### Career Milestones

- Ended 2022 just outside Top 200 after winning 13 of last 15 matches, including a title run at W25 ITF Circuit tournament in Tauranga and QF at WTA125 Midland
- Last season, made 2r at Granby (as WC, I. Saville) and fell 1r at Toronto (as WC, I. Putintseva)
- Best result in 2021 was QF run at W25 ITF Circuit event in Boca Raton, FL
- Fell 1r on WTA main-draw debut at 2021 Chicago [250] (as WC, I. Kostyuk)
- Rose to career-high No.190 on January 16, 2022
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2015 Toronto
- Owns one title in singles and one in doubles on ITF Circuit

### **GARCIA:**

#### Australian Open

- Making 12th appearance at Australian Open
- Reached R16 on her debut in 2018 (I. Keys)
- Also made doubles SF at Melbourne Park in 2017 (w/Mladenovic)
- Best Grand Slam singles result of her career was last year's SF run at US Open. Also made QF at 2017 Roland Garros
- Faces No.190 Sebov in 1r today; owns 28-14 win-loss record in Grand Slam 1r matches, with most recent defeat coming at hands of qualifier and No.165 Baptiste in 2022
- Also lost to qualifier Kudryavtseva in 1r at Melbourne Park in 2014
- One of six French women in the draw – only USA (18) and Czech Republic (11) are better represented
- Since last June, has won 37 WTA-level main-draw matches from, at least 12 more than any other player on Tour
- Struck 80 aces in Grand Slams last season; the only player to hit more was Q.Zheng (86)
- Opened 2023 campaign by winning all three matches in singles and mixed doubles at inaugural United Cup, although was unable to help France progress beyond group. Last week, made QF at Adelaide 2 (I. eventual champion Bencic)

### Career Milestones

- Return to form in second half of 2022, winning four tournaments, including a run through qualifying to Cincinnati title (d. Kvitova in F) and victory at WTA Finals in Fort Worth (d. Sabalenka in F)
- Only player to win titles on all three surfaces in 2022, having also triumphed on grass at Bad Homburg (d. Andreescu in F) and on clay at Warsaw (d. Bogdan in F). Summer form saw her return to Top 10 on September 12, following US Open SF
- Best win of her career came over No.1 Swiatek in QF at 2022 Warsaw
- At 2022 Roland-Garros, won first doubles title in almost six years (w/Mladenovic, d. Gauff/Pegula in F)
- Highlights in 2021 came on clay, with SF at Lausanne and QF at Parma
- Best results in 2020 were at Slams, reaching R16 at Roland-Garros (l. Svitolina) and 3r at US Open (l. Brady); defeated No.3 Ka.Pliskova in 2r at Flushing Meadows to record her first Top-10 win since late 2018
- Highlights of 2019 campaign include capturing her seventh career WTA singles title at Nottingham (d. Vekic in F) and finishing R-Up at Strasbourg (l. Yastremska)
- Member of French Billie Jean King Cup team that won the 2019 competition final vs. Australia, teaming up with Mladenovic to win the decisive doubles runner against Barty/Stosur. Also took part in the team that advanced to final vs. Czech Republic in 2016
- Fell out of the Top 20 on March 18, 2019 after holding her position there since August 14, 2017
- In 2018, won sixth career title at Tianjin; also made SF at Stuttgart and Madrid
- Broke into the Top 5 on August 13, 2018 and reached a career-high of No.4 on September 10, 2018
- Became first player to win Wuhan and Beijing back-to-back in 2017. As a result, qualified for WTA Finals. Was ranked No.30 on the Race to Singapore leaderboard in May 2017
- Made Top-10 debut on October 9, 2017, following completion of Wuhan-Beijing title double
- Won a career-best 48 main draw matches in 2017 (48-22 record, two titles), including reaching maiden major QF at Roland-Garros (l. Ka.Pliskova)
- Qualifying for WTA Finals in 2017, became the first Frenchwoman to compete at WTA Finals in singles since Mauresmo in 2006 (l. Henin in F)
- At 2016 Roland Garros w/Mladenovic, won first major doubles title. They were the first French pair to win in Paris since 1971, when Gail Chanfreau and Francoise Durr triumphed
- Represented France at 2016 Rio Olympics in singles and doubles
- Played 2015 WTA Finals Rising Stars Invitational in Singapore (l. Osaka in F)
- Made professional debut at 13 on ITF Circuit in France in 2007
- In juniors, singles runner-up at 2011 US Open (l. Min) and reached SF at the other three Slams
