The No.1 seed at Australian Open has lost before the second week in Melbourne only once – 1979, Virginia Ruzici, 1r

Pegula advanced to QF on past two visits to Melbourne Park... **Pegula** won their only previous meeting at the 2022 US Open in the second round in straight sets... **Pegula** was part of victorious US team at the United Cup two weeks ago... **Sasnovich** is 1-7 vs. Top 5 ranked opponents with only win against No.4 Svitolina (2019 Brisbane)... In previous seven Australian Open main draw appearances, **Sasnovich** has reached the R32 twice – 2018, 2019

- Making fifth consecutive main-draw appearance at Australian Open, where her best result is last year's SF run (l. Collins)
- Made 2r on Grand Slam debut here in 2019 (as qualifier, l. Giorgi)
- As a junior finished R-Up in 2017 Australian Open girls' doubles (w/Chwalinska)
- Is a three-time major winner, triumphing at Roland Garros in 2020 (d. Kenin in F)and 2022 (d. Gauff in F), and at US Open in 2022 (d. Jabeur in F)
- Beat Niemeier on Monday evening to improve record in Grand Slam 1r matches to 15-1 (.938 winning percentage is the highest among active players)
- Has won past 19 Grand Slam matches when she has claimed the first set
- Faces No.84 Camila Osorio in 2r today; last loss to a player outside Top 50 came against No.338 Konjuh at 2021 Miami
- Only Slam loss to a player outside Top 50 came against No.81 Golubic in 1r at 2019 Wimbledon
- Is top seed for the fourth Slam in a row; in the Open Era, the No.1 seed has only once failed to reach the second week (Ruzici l. Sawyer in 1979)
- Owns six hard-court titles and last year won 47 matches on the surface – the most since A.Radwanska notched up 52 in 2013
- One of two women representing Poland in singles field (also Linette); no Polish woman has ever reached Australian Open singles final
- Spending 42nd and 43rd weeks as WTA No.1, closing in on Azarenka (51 weeks) in 12th place on the all-time list

- Faces No.1 Swiatek in 1r today; only Top-10 win of her career came over No.6 Svitolina during run to the final at 2021 Tenerife
- Highest-ranked opponent faced before today was No.4 Sabalenka at 2021 Wimbledon (3r, l. 6-0.6-3)
- Owns 10-11 career record against seeds in Tourlevel matches
- Best career results on hard are R-Up finishes at 2021 Tenerife and 2022 Monterrey
- Only player from Colombia in the draw and also Top 300 of WTA rankings
- Best result by a Colombian woman at Australian Open was Fabiola Zuluaga's SF run in 2004
- Is currently ranked No.84; this time last year was No.50

CAREER MILESTONES

- In 2022, lifted second and third Grand Slam titles, at Roland-Garros (d. Gauff in F) and US Open (d. Jabeur in F)
- Triumph in Paris was the last of six straight titles during 37-match winning streak - jointlongest unbeaten run on Tour since 1990
- Won two titles in 2021, at Adelaide and Rome.
 Other highlights included QF at Roland-Garros and SF at Ostrava and qualifying for WTA Finals Guadalajara (fell in group stage)
- Also finished doubles R-Up at 2021 Roland-Garros (w/Mattek-Sands, l. Krejcikova/Siniakova)
- Won her maiden Tour-level title at 2020 Roland-Garros without dropping a set, becoming the first player from Poland - man or woman - to win a Grand Slam singles title and first from her country to reach a major final since A.Radwanska at 2012 Wimbledon
- Ranked No.54, she became the lowest-ranked woman to win the Roland-Garros title in the Open Era and the lowest-ranked finalist since 1977 (No.56 Mihai). At 19y 132d, is the youngest champion in Paris since Monica Seles (18y 187d) in 1992
- Also became the first player to win her debut Tour-level title at a Grand Slam since Jelena Ostapenko at 2017 Roland-Garros
- Won WTA Most Improved Player of the Year for 2020, as voted on by members of the media.
 Also won the 2020 WTA Fan Favorite Award
- Ended 2019 season ranked No.61 after a campaign highlighted by R-Up finish at Lugano (l. Hercog) and R16 run at Roland-Garros (l. Halep). That year also reached 3r at Toronto (l. Osaka) and made 2r five times (incl. Australian and US Open)
- Broke into Top 100 at No.88 after R-Up finish at 2019 Lugano
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2019 Auckland
- Ended 2018 season ranked No.175 (up from No.690 in 2017), after posting 42-6 record and winning four titles on ITF Circuit
- Member of Poland's Billie Jean King Cup team, 2018-20, 2021-22
- On professional debut, came through qualifying to win title at \$10k ITF/Stockholm-SWE in 2016; owns seven singles titles at this level
- Enjoyed stellar junior career, including winning girls' singles at 2018 Wimbledon (d. Küng in F) and leading Poland to Junior Fed Cup in 2016

- Had a solid start to the 2022 season but lost her way after clay swing
- During spring, made QF at Guadalajara 250 (l. Kalinskaya), R-Up run at Monterrey (l. Fernandez), and SF at Bogota (l. Pigossi) in title defense campaign
- Biggest win of the season came against No.19
 Ekaterina Alexandrova in 1r at Guadalajara late in the season
- Won maiden WTA title on home soil, at 2021 Bogotá (d. Zidansek in F); at No.180 was the lowest-ranked WTA title winner since No.299 Gasparyan triumphed at 2018 Tashkent
- Last season, also finished R-Up in final event at Tenerife (l. Li), reached SF at Charleston [250] and Belgrade, and battled through qualifying to reach 3r at Wimbledon
- Made Top-100 debut on May 24, 2021, following run through qualifying to SF at Belgrade
- Finished 2020 ranked at No.186 the same position she ended 2019 campaign, too. Best results were SF at \$25k ITF/Saint-Malo- FRA., while contested qualifying at Australian Open and Roland Garros
- In 2019 won second and third career ITF Circuit titles, both at \$25k Guayaquil-ECU
- Won first ITF Circuit singles title at \$15k Cucuta-COL
- Colombian Billie Jean King Cup Team 2016-17, 2019
- Fell 1r on WTA main draw debut at 2017 Bogotá (as WC, l. Blinkova)
- Made professional debut in qualifying at 2016 Bogotá (l. Perrin in 3s)
- On the ITF Junior Circuit rose to No.1 in September 2019, shortly after winning US Open girls' singles title (d. Yepifanova in F)

OTHER INFORMATION

- Coached by Tomasz Wiktorowski. previously worked with Piotr Sierzputowski
- Father is former Olympic rower Tomasz Swiatek, who competed in the men's quadruple sculls event at the 1988 Summer Olympics in Seoul
- This summer organised 'Iga Swiatek and friends for Ukraine' event in Krakow, which featured a mixed doubles match between Agnieszka Radwanska, Sergiy Stakhovsky, Polish junior Martyn Pawelski and herself, and was attended by Poland's First Lady, Agata Kornhauser-Duda, Elina Svitolina and Andriy Shevchenko. The occasion was watched by almost 15,000 people live and a further one million on television, raising more than half a million Euros for Ukrainian children and teenagers affected by the war
- Started playing tennis because her older sister was playing and wanted to beat her
- Enjoys rock music, including AC/DC and Pink Floyd
- Includes PZU, ASICS, Tecnifibre, Rolex and Xiaomi in her endorsement portfolio

- Coached by Ricardo Sanchez Rueda
- Left her hometown of Cúcuta for the Club Med academy in Florida aged 11
- Grandfather Rolando, father Carlos and brother Sebastián all played football professionally, while mother Adriana was a basketball player
- Family dogs are named Neymar and Messi

- Contesting milestone 30th major this fortnight; best results are R16 runs at 2018 Wimbledon and 2022 Roland Garros
- In 1r, beat the youngest player in the draw, 15year-old Brenda Fruhvirtova
- Faces No.3 Jessica Pegula in 2r today; owns six wins in career over Top-10 players, with two coming at Slams (No.8 S.Williams via ret. at 2021 Wimbledon and No.7 Kvitova at 2018 Wimbledon)
- In terms of ranking, best career win was over No.4 Elina Svitolina at 2018 Brisbane
- Across all levels, has lost five of last six matches against Americans, including defeat to Pegula in 2r at 2022 US Open
- Owns 38-57 career record against seeds at Tour-level events
- Has reached four hard-court finals, at 2015 Seoul, 2018 Brisbane, 2022 Melbourne Summer Set 2 and 2022 Cleveland


