[1] IGA SWIATEK (POL #1)

Head-to-Head

[22] ELENA RYBAKINA (KAZ #25)

<u>SWIATEK</u>: Won their only previous meeting in straight sets at 2021 Ostrava... Dropped just one game and did not face a break point during 55-minute third-round win over Bucsa... Has recovered from a set down to win past three matches at this juncture of a Grand Slam tournament

<u>RYBAKINA</u>: Appearing in last 16 at Melbourne Park for the first time... Struck 18 aces in her three matches so far... Two previous matches against WTA World No.1s ended in straight-sets defeats to Barty in Australia... Owns nine Top-10 wins in her career, with two coming at majors

PEGULA: Advanced to QF on past two visits to Melbourne Park... Owns 4-0 career record in Grand Slam fourth-round matches... Dropped just 11 games en route to this stage... Seventeen of her 29 Grand Slam match wins have come since the start of 2022

<u>KREJCIKOVA</u>: Bidding to reach second consecutive Australian Open QF... Since last September has won two titles and posted a 13-2 win-loss record... One of three Czechs to reach this stage... Won doubles title here in 2022 and is a three-time champion in mixed

<u>OSTAPENKO</u>: Is through to this stage at Melbourne Park for the first time in her career... Is one of five major champions remaining in the tournament... Last Grand Slam QF came at 2018 Wimbledon... Is 0-3 against Top-10 opponents at Australian Open

<u>GAUFF</u>: Beat Ostapenko lift her maiden title as a 15-year-old lucky loser at 2019 Linz... Bidding to become the first American woman to reach an Australian Open QF before turning 19 since V.Williams in 1999... Is one of two teenagers left in the tournament along with Fruhvirtova



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[24] VICTORIA AZARENKA (#24) <u>**0-0**</u> ZHU LIN (CHN #87)

AZARENKA: Is the last woman to defend this title after triumphing in 2012-13... Has won 45 matches at Melbourne Park, more than any other woman in the draw... Only player over 30 remaining in top half of the draw... Contesting 59th Grand Slam main draw and has now passed the 150-win milestone

<u>ZHU</u>: Upset Sakkari on Friday to score first career Top-10 win... Entering this fortnight had never been beyond second round at a major... Along with Zhang is one of two Chinese players left in the draw, the first time this has happened at Australian Open since 2012... Bidding to win four Tour-level matches in a row for the first time

FOURTH ROUND QUICK-HITS

- Five Grand Slam champions remain in the draw: Iga Swiatek (3), Victoria Azarenka (2), Barbora Krejcikova, Jelena Ostapenko and Elena Rybakina
- An additional two women have reached a Grand Slam final: Karolina Pliskova (2) and Coco Gauff
- Most Grand Slam appearances among remaining players: Azarenka (59), **Caroline Garcia** (43), **Zhang Shaui** (42), Pliskova (41) and Donna Vekic (37)
- Three players are through to the fourth round at a major for the first time Linda Fruhvirtova, Magda Linette and Zhu Lin
- Youngest players remaining: Fruhvirtova (17y, 273d), Gauff (18 y, 322d), Swiatek (21y, 243d) and Rybakina (23y, 226d)
- Fruhvirtova is the fifth woman aged 17 or younger to advance to the fourth round at the Australian Open since 2007, joining Gauff (15 in 2020), Amanda Anisimova (17 in 2019), Caroline Wozniacki (17 in 2008) and Nicole Vaidisova (17 in 2007). Fruhvirtova is bidding to be the youngest to reach the quarterfinals at Melbourne Park since Hingis in 1998 (17y 124d)
- Should Gauff and Fruhvirtova both win, it would be the first time two or more women aged 18 or younger reached last eight at the Australian Open since 1999 (Venus Williams, Anna Kournikova and Hingis)

- Making fourth main-draw appearance at Australian Open (fifth overall)
- Best result was 3r run on debut in 2020 (l. Barty), also reached 2r in 2021 and 2022
- One of five Grand Slam champions remaining in the draw, having won Wimbledon in 2022 (d. Jabeur in F); all five are in the top half of the draw (also Azarenka, Krejcikova, Ostapenko and today's opponent Swiatek)
- Defeated Cocciaretto in 1r, Juvan in 2r and then battled past last year's finalist Collins in 3r, firing at Tournament-leading 18 aces across the three matches (not including Saturday's matches)
- Faces No.1 Swiatek in R16 today; lost both previous encounters with World No.1s 6-3 6-2, falling to Barty at both 2020 Australian Open and 2022 Adelaide
- Owns nine Top-10 wins in her career, including two at majors: No.8 S.Williams (2021 Roland Garros) and No.2 Jabeur (both at 2022 Wimbledon)
- Is the first woman representing Kazakhstan to reach R16 at Australian Open
- Is currently ranked No.25 and seeded for the 12th time in 14 Slam outings; this time last year was No.12
- Holds one career title on hard courts, which came on Australian soil at 2020 Hobart

- Making fifth consecutive main-draw appearance at Australian Open, where her best result is last year's SF run (l. Collins)
- Made 2r on Grand Slam debut here in 2019 (as qualifier, l. Giorgi)
- As a junior finished R-Up in 2017 Australian Open girls' doubles (w/Chwalinska)
- Is a three-time major winner, triumphing at Roland Garros in 2020 (d. Kenin in F) and 2022 (d. Gauff in F), and at US Open in 2022 (d. Jabeur in F)
- This week, has beaten Niemeier in 1r, Osorio in 2r and Bucsa in 3r; since the start of 2021, has won 104 matches more than any other woman on Tour
- Faces No.25 Rybakina in R16 today; owns 5-5 record in Grand Slam matches at this stage, winnin gthe past three (all in three sets)
- One of two women representing Poland in singles field (also Linette, who faces Alexandrova in 3r on Saturday); no Polish woman has ever reached Australian Open singles final
- Is top seed for the fourth Slam in a row; in the Open Era, the No.1 seed has only once failed to reach the second week at the Australian Open (Ruzici l. Sawyer in 1979)
- Spending 42nd and 43rd weeks as WTA No.1, closing in on Azarenka (51 weeks) in 12th place on the all-time list
- Owns six hard-court titles and last year won 47 matches on the surface the most since A.Radwanska notched up 52 in 2013

CAREER MILESTONES

- Lifted maiden major at 2022 Wimbledon (d. Jabeur in F)
- Last season also finished R-Up at Adelaide (l. Barty) and Portoroz (l. Siniakova)
- Best result of 2021 were SFs at Eastbourne, Olympics and Chicago [500], and QFs at Abu Dhabi, Roland Garros, San Jose and Ostrava
- Opened 2020 season by reaching the championship match at four of her first five tournaments, including a title run at Hobart (d. Zhang in F)
- Made first final appearance at a Premier-level tournament with R-Up finish at St. Petersburg (l. Bertens); was rewarded with Top 20 debut at No.19 following run in Russia (February 17, 2020)
- First win over a Top-5 ranked opponent came over No.3 Ka.Pliskova during R-Up finish at 2020 Dubai
- Won back-to-back Slam matches for the first time during 3r showing at 2020 Australian Open (l. Barty)
- Won maiden WTA singles title at 2019 Bucharest (d. Tig in F), breaking into Top 100 for the first time in the following week's rankings at No.65 (July 22, 2019)
- Also in 2019, went on to make Top 50 debut on September 16, 2019, after reaching second career final at Nanchang (l. Peterson), produced SF appearances at Luxembourg and 's-Hertogenbosch, and made Grand Slam main draw debut at 2019 Roland Garros, falling 1r (as qualifier, l. Siniakova)
- Finished 2019 campaign with 57-21 win-loss record (across all levels) to end season at No.37, up from 2018's final ranking of No.191. On the ITF Circuit in 2019, lifted silverware on three occasions: back-to-back at \$25k Moscow-RUS and \$25k Kazan-RUS, and at \$60k ITF/Launceston-AUS
- Highlights of 2018 included reaching maiden WTA QF at St. Petersburg (l. Goerges) and clinching title at \$15k ITF/Kazan-RUS
- First Top 10 win came over No.7 Garcia at 2018 St. Petersburg
- Made WTA qualifying and main draw debut at 2017 Moscow (as qualifier, l. Begu in 1r)
- Professional debut came at \$10k ITF/Antalya-TUR in 2014

- In 2022, lifted second and third Grand Slam titles, at Roland-Garros (d. Gauff in F) and US Open (d. Jabeur in F)
- Triumph in Paris was the last of six straight titles during 37-match winning streak - jointlongest unbeaten run on Tour since 1990
- Won two titles in 2021, at Adelaide and Rome. Other highlights included QF at Roland-Garros and SF at Ostrava and qualifying for WTA Finals Guadalajara (fell in group stage)
- Also finished doubles R-Up at 2021 Roland-Garros (w/Mattek-Sands, l. Krejcikova/Siniakova)
- Won her maiden Tour-level title at 2020 Roland-Garros without dropping a set, becoming the first player from Poland - man or woman - to win a Grand Slam singles title and first from her country to reach a major final since A.Radwanska at 2012 Wimbledon
- Ranked No.54, she became the lowest-ranked woman to win the Roland-Garros title in the Open Era and the lowest-ranked finalist since 1977 (No.56 Mihai). At 19y 132d, is the youngest champion in Paris since Monica Seles (18y 187d) in 1992
- Also became the first player to win her debut Tour-level title at a Grand Slam since Jelena Ostapenko at 2017 Roland-Garros
- Won WTA Most Improved Player of the Year for 2020, as voted on by members of the media. Also won the 2020 WTA Fan Favorite Award
- Ended 2019 season ranked No.61 after a campaign highlighted by R-Up finish at Lugano (l. Hercog) and R16 run at Roland-Garros (l. Halep). That year also reached 3r at Toronto (l. Osaka) and made 2r five times (incl. Australian and US Open)
- Broke into Top 100 at No.88 after R-Up finish at 2019 Lugano
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2019 Auckland
- Ended 2018 season ranked No.175 (up from No.690 in 2017), after posting 42-6 record and winning four titles on ITF Circuit
- Member of Poland's Billie Jean King Cup team, 2018-20, 2021-22
- On professional debut, came through qualifying to win title at \$10k ITF/Stockholm-SWE in 2016; owns seven singles titles at this level
- Enjoyed stellar junior career, including winning girls' singles at 2018 Wimbledon (d. Küng in F) and leading Poland to Junior Fed Cup in 2016

- Coached by Stefano Vukov
- Trained at Spartak Club in Moscow as a junior; previous coaches included Andrei Cheshnokov (Elena Vesnina's former coach) and Evgenia Kulikovskaya
- Nominated for 2019 WTA Newcomer of the Year Award
- Started playing tennis aged five and favorite surface is hard
- Coached by Tomasz Wiktorowski. previously worked with Piotr Sierzputowski
- Father is former Olympic rower Tomasz Swiatek, who competed in the men's quadruple sculls event at the 1988 Summer Olympics in Seoul
- This summer organised 'Iga Swiatek and friends for Ukraine' event in Krakow, which featured a mixed doubles match between Agnieszka Radwanska, Sergiy Stakhovsky, Polish junior Martyn Pawelski and herself, and was attended by Poland's First Lady, Agata Kornhauser-Duda, Elina Svitolina and Andriy Shevchenko. The occasion was watched by almost 15,000 people live and a further one million on television, raising more than half a million Euros for Ukrainian children and teenagers affected by the war
- Started playing tennis because her older sister was playing and wanted to beat her
- Enjoys rock music, including AC/DC and Pink Floyd
- Includes PZU, ASICS, Tecnifibre, Rolex and Xiaomi in her endorsement portfolio

- Making 4th main draw appearance at Australian Open, where her best result is reaching QF in 2022 (l. Keys)
- Also made 2r in both 2020 (as qualifier, l.Alexandrova) and 2021 (l. Alexandrova)
- In doubles, won Australian Open title in 2022 (w/Siniakova, d. Danilina/Haddad Maia in F) and finished R-Up in 2021 (w/Siniakova, l. Mertens/Sabalenka). Is top seed alongside Siniakova at this year's tournament, and they are through to the 3r
- Also won mixed title in 2019 and 2021 (both w/Ram) and 2020 (w/Mektic)
- Overall this is her 12th Grand Slam main draw appearance, and progression to the R16 this week moves her to a 29-10 record across the majors
- Has beaten Sara Bejlek, Clara Burel and Anhelina Kalinina so far this week without dropping a set
 one of four players in top half yet to concede one (also Gauff, Pegula and Swiatek)
- Faces No.3 Jessica Pegula in R16 today; owns seven wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently defeating World No.1 Swiatek in the final at 2022 Ostrava
- One of the 11 women representing the Czech Republic to begin the singles draw, with three making the R16 (also Fruhvirtova and Ka.Pliskova). Best result by a Czech at Australian Open were Mandlikova's title runs in 1980 and 1987
- Today's winner will face either Zhu or Azarenka in the QF
- Is currently ranked No.23 and seeded for the seventh major in a row; this time last year was No.4
- Owns three WTA titles on hard courts, back-toback at Ostrava and Tallinn in 2022, and Prague in 2021

- Reached maiden Slam QF here at Melbourne Park in 2021 (l. Brady), before repeating feat in 2022 (l. eventual champion Barty)
- Fell 1r in 2020 (l. Townsend) and competed in qualifying in 2013 and 2016
