**RYBAKINA:** *Appearing in QF at Melbourne Park for the first time... Struck 24 aces in her four matches so far... Upset Swiatek in previous round to score first career win over a reigning WTA World No.1... Last time two Slam champions met at this stage of Australian Open was S.Williams versus Halep in 2021*

**OSTAPENKO:** *Won their previous meetings in straight sets at 2019 Linz and 2021 Eastbourne... Is through to this stage at Australian Open for the first time in her career... Last Grand Slam QF came at 2018 Wimbledon... Has struck 118 winners this fortnight*

**PEGULA:** *Has advanced to Australian Open QF for third year in a row... Owns 0-4 career record in Grand Slam QF matches, losing eight consecutive sets... **AZARENKA:** *Is the last woman to defend this title after triumphing in 2012-13... Has now won 46 Australian Open matches, making it the most successful event of her career... Oldest of three thirtysomethings to reach QF... Owns 2-3 career record in QFs at Melbourne Park*

### QUARTERFINAL QUICK-HITS

- Three Grand Slam champions remain in the draw, **Victoria Azarenka** (2), **Jelena Ostapenko** and **Elena Rybakina**, while **Karolina Pliskova** is a multiple runner-up at this level and **Aryna Sabalenka** a three-time semifinalist
- Most Grand Slam appearances among remaining players: Azarenka (59), Pliskova (41) and **Donna Vekic** (37)
- **Magda Linette** is making her Grand Slam quarterfinal debut, while **Jessica Pegula** and Vekic are bidding to reach their maiden major semifinals
- Azarenka is contesting her sixth Australian Open quarterfinal, seven years after her most recent. Only Billie Jean King (1969 to 1982) has had a longer gap between quarterfinals at this tournament
- Azarenka's first quarterfinal at Melbourne Park came back in 2010. Four women have had a longer gap between first and last Australian Open quarterfinals: Serena Williams (20), Venus Williams (19), Martina Navratilova (14) and Chris Evert (14)
- Pegula and Sabalenka both bring eight-match winning streaks into the quarterfinals, while Vekic is unbeaten in her last seven matches on Tour
- Games dropped en route to quarterfinals: Pegula (18), Pliskova (19), Sabalenka (21), Ostapenko (30), Rybakina (30), Azarenka (31), Vekic (32), Linette (36)
- Time spent on court: Pliskova (4h33m), Pegula (5h16m), Sabalenka (5h17m), Rybakina (5h55m), Ostapenko (6h27m), Linette (6h30m), Vekic (7h11m) and Azarenka (7h20m)
- Most aces struck among quarterfinalists: Pliskova (28), Rybakina (24), Vekic (20). Rybakina has also hit the joint-fastest serve of the tournament (level with Coco Gauff), firing a 121mph delivery against Elisabetta Cocciaretto
- The youngest player remaining is Rybakina (23y, 226d), while Azarenka is the oldest (33y, 182d)

### PLAYER NOTES

- Making fourth main-draw appearance at Australian Open (fifth overall)
- Best previous result was 3r run on debut in 2020 (l. Barty), also reached 2r in 2021 and 2022
- One of three Grand Slam champions remaining in the draw, having won Wimbledon in 2022 (d. Jabeur in F); all three are in the top half of the draw (also Azarenka and today's opponent Ostapenko)
- Defeated Cocciaretto in 1r, Juvan in 2r, last year's finalist Collins in 3r, then upset No.1 Swiatek in R16, firing 24 aces across the four matches - only Ka.Pliskova (28) and Garcia (25) have more
- Victory over Swiatek in R16 today was 10th Top-10 win of her career and third at a Slam, having previously beaten No.8 S.Williams (2021 Roland Garros) and No.2 Jabeur (at 2022 Wimbledon)
- Also first win over a reigning WTA World No.1, having previously lost to Barty at 2020 Australian Open and 2022 Adelaide
- Faces No.17 Ostapenko in QF today; previous QF matches at Slams both went to three sets, in victory over Tomljanovic at 2022 Wimbledon and defeat to Pavlyuchenkova at 2021 Roland Garros
- Overall record in Tour-level QF matches stands at 15-10
- Is the first woman representing Kazakhstan to reach QF at Australian Open
- Currently ranked No.25 and seeded for the 12th time in 14 Slam outings; this time last year was No.12
- Holds one career title on hard courts, which came on Australian soil at 2020 Hobart

### PLAYER NOTES

- Making 8th appearance at Australian Open, where she is through to R16 for the first time
- Previous best results were 3r showings in 2017 (l. Ka.Pliskova), 2018 (l. Kontaveit) and 2022 (l. Krejckikova)
- Crowned Roland Garros champion in 2017; is one of three major champions left in the draw (also Azarenka and today's opponent Rybakina)
- In 1r beat Yastremska, then saw off Bondar in 2r, raced past Baidnl in 3r and upset Gauff in R16, striking 118 winners across the four matches
- Victory over No.7 Gauff was 17th over a Top-10 player in her career, and first since overcoming No.3 Krejckikova and No.9 Muguruza en route to 2022 Doha title
- Now has five Top-10 wins at majors, having previously defeated No.9 Suarez Navarro (2015 Wimbledon), No.4 Halep (2017 Roland Garros), No.5 Svitolina (2017 Wimbledon) and No.4 Ka.Pliskova (2020 Roland Garros)
- Faces No.25 Rybakina in QF today; won previous two meetings in straight sets, during run to final at 2019 Linz and title at 2021 Eastbourne
- Record in Tour-level QF matches stands at 22-11, winning the past eight
- Is 2-1 in Grand Slam QF matches, beating Wozniacki (2017 Roland Garros) and Cibulkova (2018 Wimbledon), while losing to V.Williams (2017 Wimbledon)
- Only player from Latvia in main draw and also in Top 200 of the WTA rankings. Also first Latvian woman to reach Australian Open singles QF
- Is currently ranked No.17 and seeded for the fifth major in a row; this time last year was No.27
- Has won three hard-court titles in her career, at 2017 Seoul (outdoor), 2019 Luxembourg (indoor) and 2022 Dubai (outdoor)

## CAREER MILESTONES

- Lifted maiden major at 2022 Wimbledon (d. Jabeur in F)
- Last season also finished R-Up at Adelaide (l. Barty) and Portoroz (l. Siniakova)
- Best result of 2021 were SFs at Eastbourne, Olympics and Chicago [500], and QFs at Abu Dhabi, Roland Garros, San Jose and Ostrava
- Opened 2020 season by reaching the championship match at four of her first five tournaments, including a title run at Hobart (d. Zhang in F)
- Made first final appearance at a Premier-level tournament with R-Up finish at St. Petersburg (l. Bertens); was rewarded with Top 20 debut at No.19 following run in Russia (February 17, 2020)
- First win over a Top-5 ranked opponent came over No.3 Ka.Pliskova during R-Up finish at 2020 Dubai
- Won back-to-back Slam matches for the first time during 3r showing at 2020 Australian Open (l. Barty)
- Won maiden WTA singles title at 2019 Bucharest (d. Tig in F), breaking into Top 100 for the first time in the following week's rankings at No.65 (July 22, 2019)
- Also in 2019, went on to make Top 50 debut on September 16, 2019, after reaching second career final at Nanchang (l. Peterson), produced SF appearances at Luxembourg and 's-Hertogenbosch, and made Grand Slam main draw debut at 2019 Roland Garros, falling 1r (as qualifier, l. Siniakova)
- Finished 2019 campaign with 57-21 win-loss record (across all levels) to end season at No.37, up from 2018's final ranking of No.191. On the ITF Circuit in 2019, lifted silverware on three occasions: back-to-back at \$25k Moscow-RUS and \$25k Kazan-RUS, and at \$60k ITF/Launceston-AUS
- Highlights of 2018 included reaching maiden WTA QF at St. Petersburg (l. Goerges) and clinching title at \$15k ITF/Kazan-RUS
- First Top 10 win came over No.7 Garcia at 2018 St. Petersburg
- Made WTA qualifying and main draw debut at 2017 Moscow (as qualifier, l. Begu in 1r)
- Professional debut came at \$10k ITF/Antalya-TUR in 2014

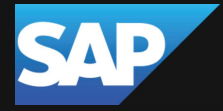

- Best result in 2021 came in final event when she finished R-Up at Indian Wells (l. Badosa on third set tie-break). Also made SFs at Doha and Bad Homburg
