RYBAKINA: Won in straight sets when they met at 2022 Indian Wells... Appearing in SF at Melbourne Park for the first time... Struck 35 aces in her five matches so far... Facing third former major champion in a row after beating Swiatek and Ostapenko... Last time two Slam winners met at this stage of Australian Open was Osaka versus S.Williams in 2021

AZARENKA: Is the last woman to defend this title after triumphing in 2012-13... Has now won 47 matches here, level with Graf in sixth place on the all-time list... Fourth-oldest woman to contest an Australian Open SF in Open Era... Owns 2-0 career record in SFs at Melbourne Park

Has won all nine matches this season in straight sets

# **SEMIFINAL QUICK-HITS**

- Two Grand Slam champions remain in the draw, Victoria Azarenka (2) and Elena Rybakina. Aryna Sabalenka has reached this stage three times before, while Magda Linette is appearing in her maiden major semifinal
- Azarenka is contesting her third semifinal at Melbourne Park, 11 years after her first. Only four women have had a longer gap between first and last Australian Open semifinals: Serena Williams (18), Venus Williams (16), Chris Evert (14) and Martina Navratilova (13)
- Sabalenka brings a nine-match, 18-set winning streak into the final four
- Games dropped en route to semifinals: Sabalenka (26), Azarenka (36), Rybakina (36), Linette (44)
- Time spent on court: Sabalenka (7h6m), Rybakina (7h14m), Linette (7h55m) and Azarenka (8h57m)
- Most aces struck among semifinalists: Rybakina (35), Sabalenka (23), Linette (20) and Azarenka (12). Rybakina
  has also hit the joint-fastest serve of the tournament (level with Coco Gauff), firing a 121mph delivery against
  Elisabetta Cocciaretto
- The youngest player remaining is Rybakina (23y, 226d), while Azarenka is the oldest (33y, 182d). Azarenka is the fourth-oldest woman in the Open Era to reach an Australian Open semifinal, behind only Serena Williams (2016, 2017, 2021) Venus Williams (2017) and Mirjana Lucic-Baroni (2017)
- Linette is the eighth woman in the Open Era to make her Grand Slam semifinal debut, following in the footsteps of Betty Stove (1977 Wimbledon), Gigi Fernandez (1994 Wimbledon), Nathalie Tauziat (1998 Wimbledon), Flavia Pennetta (2013 US Open), Roberta Vinci (2015 US Open), Barbora Strycova (2019 Wimbledon) and Tatjana Maria (2022 Wimbledon). Should she beat Sabalenka, she will become the fourth oldest first-time Slam finalist, after Stove at 1977 Wimbledon (32y, 9d) and Pennetta (33y, 199d) and Vinci (32y, 206d) at 2015 US Open

# **RANKING PROJECTIONS**

- Linette is projected to move to a career-best No.22 in the rankings, going as high as No.13 or No.14 by reaching the final and No.9 with the title
- Azarenka's progress ensures she will rise to either No.16 or No.17. By making the finals she will go to No.11 or No.9 should she lift the Daphne Akhurst Memorial Cup for a third time
- Sabalenka will move to No.4 if she falls in the semifinals or No.2 by reaching the championship match
- Rybakina can secure a Top-10 debut if she beats Azarenka and Linette fails to make the final. With victory in the final, she would move as high as No.8

#### **PLAYER NOTES**

- Making 15th appearance at Australian Open, where she is a two-time champion, lifting the title in 2012 (d. Sharapova in F) and 2013 (d. Li in F), marking the last time the title was successfully defended
- Has also reached QF on three occasions and R16 four times
- One of two Grand Slam champions remaining in the draw (also today's opponent Rybakina)
- Defeated 2020 champion Kenin in 1r, Podoroska in 2r, Keys in 3r, Zhu in R16 and Pegula in QF; upset of No.3 Pegula was only second Top-10 win at a Slam in the past eight years (overall record is now 11-28 and 6-7 at Australian Open)
- Results improve record to 47-12 at Australian Open; owns the most wins at Melbourne Park of any player in the draw, placing her level with Graf in sixth place on the all-time list
- Quick-fire win over Podoroska on Wednesday saw her become 14th woman in Open Era to score 150 main-draw Grand Slam victories. Overall Slam record is now 153-55, equalling Hingis in 13th place on the all-time list for maindraw wins at this level
- Faces No.25 Rybakina in SF today; record in WTA SF matches stands at 40-20 (5-3 at Slams)
- One of two thirtysomethings to reach SF (also Linette); the last woman over 30 to win a major was 35-year-old S.Williams here in 2017
- Has become the fourth-oldest woman in Open Era to reach a Australian Open SF, after S.Williams (2016-17, 2021), V.Williams (2017) and Lucic-Baroni (2017)
- Projected to move to No.16 or No.17 by reaching SF, No.11 should she advance to final and at No.9 with the title; was last ranked in Top 10 on September 11, 2016
- Twenty of her 21 career titles have come on hard courts, most recently at 2020 Cincinnati (NYC); owns second-most hard court titles amongst active players behind V.Williams

#### **PLAYER NOTES**

- Making fourth main-draw appearance at Australian Open (fifth overall)
- Best previous result was 3r run on debut in 2020 (l. Barty), also reached 2r in 2021 and 2022
- One of two Grand Slam champions remaining in the draw, having won Wimbledon in 2022 (d. Jabeur in F), along with today's opponent Azarenka
- Defeated Cocciaretto in 1r, Juvan in 2r, last year's finalist Collins in 3r, then upset No.1 Swiatek in R16, and Ostapenko in QF, firing a tournament-leading 35 aces across the five matches - followed by Ka.Pliskova (31)
- Since start of 2022, has hit a Tour-leading 115 aces in Grand Slam matches
- Victory over Swiatek in R16 was 10th Top-10 win of her career and third at a Slam, having previously beaten No.8 S.Williams (2021 Roland Garros) and No.2 Jabeur (at 2022 Wimbledon)
- Also first win over a reigning WTA World No.1, having previously lost to Barty at 2020 Australian Open and 2022 Adelaide
- Faces No.24 Azarenka in SF today; including victories over Swiatek and Ostapenko this fortnight, record against Slam champions stands at 5-2 in the majors
- Only previous Grand Slam SF was a 6-3 6-3 win over Halep at 2022 Wimbledon. Overall record in WTA SF matches stands at 10-6
- Is the first woman representing Kazakhstan to progress beyond 3r at Australian Open
- Currently ranked No.25 and seeded for the 12th time in 14 Slam outings; this time last year was No.12
- Will break into Top 10 should she win today and Linette loses. Can move as high as No.8 by winning the title
- Holds one career title on hard courts, which came on Australian soil at 2020 Hobart

### **CAREER MILESTONES**

- Standout result last season was SF in last tournament, at Guadalajara (l. eventual champion Pegula). Also reached QFs at Washington DC and Adelaide, while made R16 at Australian Open and US Open
- Best result in 2021 came in final event when she finished R-Up at Indian Wells (l. Badosa on third set tie-break). Also made SFs at Doha and Bad Homburg
- One of five players to reach three or more finals in 2020, lifting one trophy at the Western & Southern Open - her first title since 2016.
   Finished year ranked No.13 - her best seasonend ranking since 2013 (No.2)
- Advanced to her fifth career Grand Slam final at 2020 US Open, which helped her return to the Top 20 for the first time since March 2017
- Winner of the 2020 WTA Comeback Player of the Year Award, as voted on by members of the international media
- Last tournament of 2019 was the US Open, where she fell to Sabalenka in 1r; also reached the doubles final w/Barty (l. Mertens/Sabalenka)
- Highlight of 2019 was 37th singles final at Monterrey (l. Muguruza in F via ret. w/leg injury).
   On February 2, 2019 returned to Top 50 for first time following the birth of her child, Leo
- Made return to tennis in June 2017 following birth of first child in December 2016, reaching 2r of comeback event at Mallorca (d. Ozaki, l. Konjuh)
