- Making fourth main-draw appearance at Miamibest result came with SF run in 2022 (l. eventual champion Swiatek)
- Also made R16 in 2021 (l. Sakkari) and fell 1r in 2019 (as qualifier, l. Konta)
- Teaming up with Gauff in doubles this fortnight - team face the Fruhvirtova sisters in 1r
- Following 1r bye, opens 2023 Miami campaign with match today against No.172 and qualifier Sebov - loss would be worst-by-ranking for two and a half years, since falling to No.302 Bellis at 2020 Lexington
- Last loss to a qualifier came at 2022 August, against eventual champion Garcia in Cincinnati
- Owns 5-0 career record against players from Canada; first time facing a Canadian this season
- Both career titles came on hard courts, at 2019 Washington DC and 2022 Guadalajara
- Last US woman to win the Miami title was Stephens in 2018
- Is currently ranked No.3 (her career-high); this time last year was No.21
- Has won 15 matches so far in 2023; only Sabalenka (17), Garcia (17), Rybakina (16) and Swiatek (16) have more



PLAYER NOTES

- Making debut appearance at Miami, in either in main draw or qualifying
- Contesting main draw having successfully navigated qualifying, defeating Rakhimova and Burrage; trailed Burrage 6-7 2-4
- This fortnight marks fifth Tour-level main-draw appearance, and now owns two wins at this level - defeating Xinyu Wang at 2022 Granby and L.Fruhvirtova here in Miami on Tuesday
- Defeat of No.50 L.Fruhvirtova is best win of career and first over a Top-50 opponent, bettering previous best win wins over No.58 ranked player in the world - Lin Zhu at 2022 WTA 125 Midland and Noskova in 2023 Australian Open qualifying
- Faces No.3 Pegula in 2r prior to today, highestranked opponent faced was No.4 Garcia at 2023 Australian Open (l. 6-3 6-0)
- Owns 0-3 career record against seed, with a record in 2023 standing at 0-1 (lost to No.4 seed Garcia at Australian Open)
- Progression to 2r matches her best result on the Hologic WTA Tour, having also made this stage 2022 Granby (d. Xinyu Wang, l. Saville)
- One of four players from Canada to start the main draw at 2023 Miami, the most since 2000.
 Best result by a Candian woman at Miami was Andreescu's R-Up finish in 2021
- Last time multiple women from Canada reached 2r at Miami was 1994
- Best result by a qualifier at Miami was Collins' SF run in 2018
- Is currently ranked at career-high No.172 (posted on March 20, 2023); this time last year was



- Coming off R16 run at Indian Wells (l. Kvitova in 3s having held MPs)
- Finished R-Up in singles (l. Swiatek) and doubles champion (w/Gauff) at Doha (l. Swiatek), then reached SF at Dubai (l. eventual champion Krejcikova)
- Advanced to QF at Australian Open (l. Azarenka)
- Helped United States win inaugural United Cup in opening week of 2023; upset World No.1 Swiatek during Final Four singles match-up
- Opened 2023 season by falling at first hurdle ofAuckland qualifying
- Made Grand Slam main draw debut at 2023
 Australian Open. Upset No.2 seed Noskova in first round of qualifying en route to main draw, however fell to No.4 Garcia in 1r
- Coming off winning second ITF singles title of career at \$25k Toronto (d. Sakatsume in F)



CAREER MILESTONES

- Achieved career-high No. 3 in October 2022 after defeating four Grand Slam champions at Guadalajara, en route to ending three-year wait for second WTA title (d. Sakkari in F)
- Qualified for WTA Finals Fort Worth in both singles and doubles (w/Gauff), thus becoming the first Americans to debut in singles and doubles at the season-ending showpiece since Davenport in 1994
- Reached QF at three of the four majors in 2022, breaking into Top 10 after doing so at Roland Garros (June 6, 2022)
- One of seven players to win 40 or more matches last season, alongside Swiatek, Jabeur, Garcia, Sakkari, Kasatkina and Bencic
- In 2021, reached the QF or better on seven occasions, including at the Australian Open
- Broke into Top 20 on November 1, 2021
- Began 2020 with runner-up finish at Auckland (l. S.Williams), other standout results were a QF at Western & Southern Open (as qualifier, l. Mertens) and a 3r showing at US Open (l. Kvitova)
- On the doubles court in 2020, reached QFs of Roland-Garros (w/Muhammad) and Cincinnati (w/Rogers)
- Won her first WTA title at 2019 Washington DC (d. Giorgi in F)
- Also in 2019, fell 1r on main draw debut at Roland-Garros (l. eventual champion Barty) and Wimbledon (l. Buzarnescu) and Miami (as a qualifier, l. Konta)
- Broke into Top 100 for the first time on February 4, 2019 following back-to-back R-Up finishes at WTA 125K Series event at Newport Beach and W100 ITF Circuit tournament in Midland-MI, USA
- Highlights of 2018 included finishing R-up as a qualifier at Quebec City (l. Parmentier in F), recording SF finish at Houston WTA 125K Series tournament (l. S.Peng) and reaching QF or better at 10 ITF events
- Did not play between January and August 2017 after undergoing hip surgery. Primarily played at ITF Circuit events for the rest of the year, winning two doubles titles with Townsend
- Played a mixture of WTA and ITF Circuit events in 2016 with highlight coming at Washington DC, where she defeated No.14 Stosur for first Top-20 win of career on her way to a SF finish (l. Davis)
- Reached 2r on Grand Slam main draw debut at 2015 US Open (as qualifier, d. Van Uytvanck, l.

- Ended 2022 just outside Top 200 after winning 13 of last 15 matches, including a title run at \$25k ITF Circuit tournament in Tauranga and QF at WTA125 Midland
- Last season, made 2r at Granby (as WC, l.Saville) and fell 1r at Toronto (as WC, l.Putintseva)
- Best result in 2021 was QF run at W25 ITFCircuit event in Boca Raton
- Fell 1r on WTA main-draw debut at 2021 Chicago[250] (as WC, l. Kostyuk)
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2015 TorontoOwns two titles in singles and one in doubles onITF Circuit

- Sidelined from tennis for a year and a half between 2013 and 2015 due to a right knee injury
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2009 Ponte Vedra Beach and WTA main draw debut at 2012 Indian Wells



- Made 2r at Monterrey (l. Zhu); Suffered 1r exits at Abu Dhabi (as qualifier, l. Q.Zheng) and Doha (as qualifier, l. Kasatkina). Also contested qualifying at Dubai
- Made 2r at Auckland (l. Bonaventure), then fell 1r at both Hobart (l. Kalinina) and Australian Open (l. Zhu)

CAREER MILESTONES

- Finished 2022 ranked No.29 in singles, her sixth consecutive Top 50 finish; also finished No.5 in doubles for her fourth consecutive Top 10 finish in doubles and second consecutive Top 5 finish
- Former doubles No.1, having first climbed to the top on May 10, 2021; has spent 23 weeks atop the WTA Doubles Rankings
- Last season lifted seventh WTA title, at 2022 Monastir (d. Cornet in F), while in doubles alongside partner Kudermetova won Dubai and WTA Finals, as well as finished R-Up at Wimbledon
- · Enjoyed a productive start to 2021 season in Melbourne, triumphing at the Gippsland Trophy (d. Kanepi in F) to lift sixth WTA singles title, then teamed up w/Sabalenka at Australian Open to claim second Grand Slam doubles title (d. Kreicikova/Siniakova in F). Later in the year, won third career Grand Slam doubles title, at Wimbledon w/Hsieh
- Won the most matches on Tour in 2020, going 34-13 across the season and finishing as R-Up at both Prague (l. Halep) and Linz (l. Sabalenka)
- Earned her milestone 200th career main draw win with victory over Kalinina in 1r at 2020 Linz
- Singles highlights in 2019 were winning biggest title of career at Doha (d. No.3 Halep in final) and advancing to QF at US Open for the first time (l. eventual champion Andreescu in 3s)
- Enjoyed standout season in doubles in 2019 won maiden major doubles title at US Open w/Sabalenka (d. Azarenka/Barty in F). Also Completed 'Sunshine Double' in doubles (w/Sabalenka), lifting the back-to-back titles at Indian Wells (d. Krejcikova/Siniakova) and Miami (d. - Finished 2017 season at No.35, up from No.120 in 2016 - first Top 50 and Top 100 year-end finish. Season highlighted by first career singles title at Hobart (as a qualifier, d. Niculescu in F)

- In 2022, reached maiden Grand Slam SF at Roland-Garros (l. eventual champion Swiatek) and won titles at San Jose (d. Rogers in F) and Granby (d. Saville in F); returned to Top 10 on August 8, after San Jose run
