





#### **PLAYER NOTES**

- Making 5th main-draw appearance at Miami (seventh overall), where herbest previous results are 3r showings in 2017 (l. Kerber) and 2022 (l.Kudermetova)
- Contesting a WTA 1000-level event for 29th time, with best result coming at 2021 Indian Wells when she reached the quarterfinals
- Opened 2023 Miami campaign with 6-4 3-6 6-2 win over compatriot Stephens in 1r - only won one more point overall than her compatriot (74 to 73)
- Faces No.2 Sabalenka in 2r today; owns seven wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently defeating No.3 Sakkari at 2022 San Jose
- Best win of career came over World No.1 Barty at 2021 US Open
- One of 10 women from US to reach 2r, of 16 that began the singles main draw. Most recent home champion here was Stephens in 2018
- Is currently ranked No.42; this time last year was No.48
- Has reached one WTA final on American soil in career, at 2022 San Jose (l. Kasatkina in F)



#### **PLAYER NOTES**

- Making 5th main draw appearance at Miami, where her best previous result was reaching QF in 2021 (l. Barty)
- Was seeded No.1 at Miami in 2022, losing to Begu in 2r - the earliest exit by the top seed in Miami history. Is top ranked player in the draw this year following Swiatek's withdrawal
- Former champion here in doubles, lifting the title in 2019 (w/Mertens) to complete the sunshine double
- Sitting at a career-high ranking of No.2, first achieved on August 23, 2021
- After 1r bye, faces No.42 Rogers in 2r; loss would be worst by ranking since falling to No.77 Vekic at 2022 San Diego
- Has won her last eight matches against US opposition, last tasting defeat against Gauff at 2022 Toronto
- Has not lost opening match at a tournament since 2022 Guadalajara (l. Samsonova), a run of five events entering 2023 Miami
- Coming off R-Up finish at Indian Wells (l. Rybakina) - last player to bounce back and win the Miami title after losing the Indian Wells final was Hingis in 2000
- Has won 12 singles titles in her career, 11 of which have come on hard court. Has lifted one on US soil, at 2018 New Haven
- Leads the Tour for main-draw wins this season with 17 (level with Garcia and Rybakina)



- Coming off R-Up finish at Indian Wells (Rybakina) - now owns a 12-9 record in WTA singles finals
- Advanced to QF at Dubai (l. eventual champion Krejcikova)
- Lifted maiden Grand Slam title and title No.12 at Australian Open (d. Rybakina in F)
- Won 11th career title at Adelaide 1 (d. Noskova in F)







### CAREER MILESTONES

- Last season finished R-Up at San Jose (l. Kasatkina). Also reached the SF at 's-Hertogenbosch (l. Sabalenka) and QF at Adelaide 1 (l. Rybakina)
- Enjoyed most consistent campaign of her career in 2021, reaching QFs at Yarra Valley Classic, Adelaide, Charleston [250] and Indian Wells. Also made R16 at Australian Open and US Open
- Broke into Top 50 for the first time on March 1, 2021, following QF showing at Adelaide
- In 2020 reached SF at Lexington (d. S.Williams in 2r, l. Teichmann) and QF at US Open (d. Kvitova, l. eventual champion Osaka) - marked second career Slam QF appearance (also 2016 Roland Garros)
- In 2019, made return from injury at Charleston where she reached 2r (l. Ostapenko). Also posted 2r showings at Roland Garros and Mallorca and fell 1r six occasions and reached one ITF Circuit final
- Fell 1r in only two tournaments played in 2018 at Australian Open and Indian Wells - injured left knee in loss to Dolehide at Indian Wells, requiring surgery in the summer
- Highlights of 2017 were QFs at Charleston, Hobart and Strasbourg. Also, played all three ties to help USA win its first Fed Cup in 17 years, winning decisive doubles rubber (w/Vandeweghe) in final against Belarus
- In 2017 US Open 2r, d. No.25 seed Gavrilova 7-6(6), 4-6, 7-6(5), in a match that took 3 hours, 33 minutes, setting a record for the longest women's match in US Open history
- Appeared in two WTA singles finals, at 2016 Rio de Janeiro (l. Schiavone) and at 2014 Bad Gastein (d. No.16 Suárez Navarro and No.14 Errani en route, l.Petkovic)
- One-time doubles runner-up, at 2015 Bogotá (w/Falconi)
- Participated in 2014 WTA Finals Rising Stars Invitational in Singapore (along with Diyas, Puig and Theng)
- Broke into Top 100 for first time on August 11, 2014
- Won first WTA level match at 2013 Strasbourg (d. Domachowska)
- Winner of five singles titles and two doubles titles on ITF Circuit, where she made professional debut in United States in 2009, aged 16

- Highlight of last season was R-Up finish at WTA Finals in Fort Worth (l. Garcia in F); upset No.1 Swiatek, No.2 Jabeur and No.3 Pegula en route to final - only the fourth woman in history to beat the No.1, No.2 and No.3 at the same tournament
- Lifted two titles during 2021 campaign, at Abu Dhabi and Madrid, while was R-Up at Stuttgart. Also reached a further three SFs, including at Wimbledon and US Open
- Rose to career-high No.2 in rankings on August 23, 2021
- In doubles, lifted second major at 2021 Australian Open (w/Mertens, d. Krejcikova/Siniakova in F)
- Won final nine matches of 2020 to end the year with back-to-back titles - at Ostrava (d. Azarenka in F) and Linz (d. Mertens in F) - and ranked at No.10
- Having also taken home the silverware at Doha (d. Kvitova in F), was one of two players (also Halep) to lift three singles titles during disrupted 2020 season
- Ended as World No.11 for the second straight year in 2019 after capturing three WTA singles titles at Shenzhen (d. Riske in F), Wuhan (d. Riske in F) and Zhuhai (d. Bertens in F)
- Made Top-10 debut on January 28, 2019 following 3r run at 2019 Australian Open
- Ended 2019 at No.2 in WTA doubles rankings after capturing first Grand Slam doubles trophy at US Open (w/Mertens, d. Azarenka/Barty in F). Earlier in the season, the pair claimed the 'Sunshine Double' by winning back-to-back titles at Indian Wells (d. Krejcikova/Siniakova in F) and Miami (d. Stosur/ Zhang in F)
- Qualified for WTA Finals Shenzhen in doubles (w/Mertens), going 1-2 in the round-robin stage
- Enjoyed breakthrough season in 2018, lifting two titles, at New Haven (d. Suárez Navarro in F) and Wuhan (d. Kontaveit in F), winning 46 matches and finishing at No.11 in the rankings
- Also in 2018, was R-Up at Lugano (l. Mertens) and Eastbourne (l. Wozniacki), made SF at Cincinnati, reached five QFs and produced a career-best Grand Slam run to R16 at US Open
- Entered Top 50 on April 16, 2018, after Lugano run, and Top 20 on August 27 of the same year, following New Haven title
- Broke into Top 100 at No.76 on October 16, 2017 after reaching first Tour-level final at Tianjin (l.

- Sharapova). Also in 2017 made SF at Tashkent (l. Babos) and lifting WTA 125k Series title at Mumbai (d. Jakupovic)
- Made Grand Slam main draw debut 2017 Wimbledon, falling in 2r (as qualifier, d. Khromacheva, l. Witthoeft)
- Fell 1r on main draw debut at 2017 Dubai (as qualifier, l. Ka.Bondarenko)
- Member of Belarus Billie Jean King Cup team that lost to USA in 2017 final - scored first Top-20 win of career with defeat of No.13 Stephens during final in Minsk
- WTA qualifying debut came at 2016 Rabat
- Lifted first three ITF Circuit titles in 2015, including a 13-match win streak towards the year's end, bringing back-to-back trophies in Antalya, Turkey
- Made debut on ITF Circuit in Minsk in 2012

- Coached by Piotr Sierzputowski
- Followed older sister Sabra into tennis
- Tennis idol growing up was Steffi Graf
- Would have been a hockey player if weren't a tennis player
- Favorite tournaments are Charleston, US Open
- Currently working with former hitting partner Anton Dubrov; previously coached by Dmitry Tursunov and Didi Kindlmann
- Started playing tennis when she was 6 by an accident when her father Sergey drove by the tennis courts and decided to give it a try
- Has a sweet tooth and considers something sweet as a perfect present; loves her grandmother's cooking, and looks forward to her pancakes when she is away from home
- Has a tiger tattoo on her left arm, which earned her the nickname "The Tiger"
- She spends her time off with family, catching up with friends, or reading; her favorite book is "The Count of Monte Cristo"
