This is third meeting this year with **Sabalenka** winning at Indian Wells and **Krejcikova** winning in Dubai in QF en route to title – both decided in three-sets... **Sabalenka** is defending 10 points this week from 2022 Miami... **Krejcikova** has won 10 matches at WTA 1000 level this year; she had won 14 matches at this level between 2018 and 2022... Rybakina (7) has the most Top 20 wins this year, followed by **Sabalenka** (6) and **Krejcikova** (5)

Since the start of 2020, **Pegula** has reached made more QF appearances at WTA 1000 tournaments than any player on Tour (11) ... **Linette's** previous four Top 10 wins came at the Grand Slams, including a win over No.4 Caroline Garcia at 2023 Australian Open... **Pegula** has 17 wins; only Sabalenka (19) and Rybakina (18) have more wins this season

Making her 10th appearance at WTA 1000 tournaments, **Trevisan** is trying to make the quarterfinal stage for first time and is trying to become the first Italian to reach the QF in Miami since 2013 (Errani and Vinci)... A quarterfinalist at 2023 Australian Open, **Ostapenko** is bidding for her second QF appearance of the season... **Ostapenko** has reached the R16 stage at Miami one other time, when she went on to be runner-up in 2018

R16 QUICK HITS

- Only two of the final 16 have ever advanced to a final in Miami Bianca Andreescu (2021, R-Up) and Jelena Ostapenko (2018, R-Up). A new Miami champion will be crowned this year
- Three Czech woman are through to the R16 **Barbora Krejcikova**, **Petra Kvitova** and **Marketa Vondrousova** equaling the most Czechs through to the R16 in Miami (also 2017, 2019)
- **Kvitova** has reached the QF stage at WTA 1000 tournaments 35 times, behind only Agnieszka Radwanska (42), Simona Halep (39) and Caroline Wozniacki (36)
- **Jessica Pegula** is the only American to reach the R16 at Miami; at least one American has reached the R16 here in 36 of 37 editions of the tournament (2011 was the only year with no Americans in the R16).
- Since the start of 2020, **Pegula** has reached the quarterfinals 11 times at WTA 1000 tournaments, the most on Tour, ahead of **Sabalenka** (10) and Coco Gauff (8)
- Three of the Top 10 seeds remain in the draw, the fewest to advance to the R16 in Miami; across WTA 1000 tournaments, only at 2009 Tokyo and 2022 Madrid have there been three or fewer seeds in the R16
- Varvara Gracheva and Martina Trevisan are making their Miami main draw debut.



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

PLAYER NOTES

- Making 2nd main-draw appearance at Miami (3rd overall), where she fell 2r on previous visit in 2021 (l. Swiatek); also contested qualifying in 2018; withdrew from last year's tournament (arm injury)
- Finished doubles R-Up at Miami in 2018 (w/Siniakova, l. Barty/Vandeweghe)
- Has beaten Aliaksandra Sasnovich and Madison Keys so far this week to reach 4r at Indian Wells
- Krejcikova now holds a 10-1 win-loss record at WTA 1000 level in 2023. Before this year, Krejcikova had only won 14 main draw matches since 2018 at WTA 1000 level.
- Excluding walkovers, is one of only two players to have won 10 matches at WTA 1000 level in 2023, along with Elena Rybakina.
- Faces No.2 Aryna Sabalenka in 4r today;
 Sabalenka holds a 3-1 record against Krejcikova.
 They have met twice in 2023, both at WTA 1000 level, with the two sharing a win each –
 Sabalenka in Indian Wells, Krejcikova in Dubai
- Owns 6-9 record vs Top 5 ranked opponents with five of six wins coming on hardcourts
- Owns 29-34 career record against seeded players, with a record in 2023 standing at 6-5
- Winner of four hard-court titles in her career, at 2021 Prague (outdoor), 2022 Tallinn (indoor), 2022 Ostrava (indoor) and 2023 Dubai (outdoor)
- One of 3 players from Czech Republic to reach 4r (along with Kvitova and Vondrousova)
- Best result by Czech Republic at Miami was Runner-Up run by Karolina Pliskova in 2019
- Is currently ranked No.13; this time last year was ranked No.4
- At WTA 1000 events, best career results are title runat 2023 Dubai, R-Up finish at 2021 Dubai and OF at 2021 Cincinnati
- Has won 16 matches so far in 2023; only four players in the WTA have won more matches in 2023 – Aryna Sabalenka, Caroline Garcia, Elena Rybakina and Iga Swiatek



PLAYER NOTES

- Making 5th main-draw appearance at Miami, where her best result was reaching QF in 2021 (1. Barty)
- Was seeded No.1 at Miami in 2022, losing to Begu in 2r - the earliest exit by the top seed in Miami history. Is top-ranked player in the draw this year following Swiatek's withdrawal
- Former champion here in doubles, lifting the title in 2019 (w/Mertens) to complete the Sunshine Double, having also won Indian Wells
- After 1r bye, beat Rogers and Bouzkova in 2r and 3r; now has 19 wins this season
- Faces No.13 Barbora Krejcikova in 4r today; owns 6-1 record in 2023 vs. Top 20 opponents (only Rybakina has more Top 20 wins, 7)
- Sabalenka is 55-8 after winning the opening set at WTA 1000 level. The last match she lost after taking the opening set in such a match was against today's opponent – Barbora Krejcikova (Dubai 2023).
- Owns 17-8 career record against players from Czech Republic, with record in 2023 standing at 5-1
- Career record against seeded opponents stands at 69-43 (8-1 in 2023)
- Aryna Sabalenka is one of only five players to hit over 200 winners at WTA 1000 level in 2023. Out of those five players – Aryna Sabalenka, Elena Rybakina, Karolina Muchova, Barbora Krejcikova and Petra Kvitova – only Sabalenka and Rybakina have positive winner-unforced error differentials.
- Has won 12 singles titles in her career, 11 of which have come on hard court. One of these came on US soil - her maiden WTA tournament win at 2018 New Haven
- Sitting at a career-high ranking of No.2, first achieved on August 23, 2021
- Coming off R-Up finish at Indian Wells (1. Rybakina) - last player to bounce back and win the Miami title after losing the Indian Wells final was Hingis in 2000







CAREER MILESTONES

- Ended last season in fine form, lifting back-toback titles at Tallinn (d. Kontaveit) and Ostrava (d. Swiatek). Also completed career doubles Slam by winning US Open w/Siniakova
- Made strong start to 2022, finishing R-Up at Sydney (l. Badosa) and reaching QF at Australian Open (l. Keys) before missing several months w/arm injury
- Lifted maiden WTA title at 2021 Strasbourg, followed by sweep of singles and doubles titles at Roland-Garros. Roland Garros was just her fifth Slam main draw in singles; only two women have won a major with fewer main draw appearances to their name
- Also won Prague title (d. Martincova in F), reached final at Dubai (l. Muguruza) and qualified for WTA Finals in singles for the first time. Recorded best results at US Open (QF) and Wimbledon (R16) last year
- Posted another record-breaking year in doubles across 2021 - in addition to singles title at Roland Garros, won doubles title too in Paris, along with Madrid, Gippsland Trophy, WTA Finals and the gold medal at Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games (all w/Siniakova)
- Enjoyed breakout year in singles in 2020, posting career-high ranking of No.65 (November 16) and making R16 at Roland Garros and reaching second WTA SF at Linz
- Also reached two doubles finals last year, finishing R-Up at Dubai (w/Zheng) and winning Shenzhen (w/Siniakova)
- In Mixed Doubles, defended Australian Open title (w/Pavic), having triumphed in Melbourne a year earlier with w/Ram
- In 2019, advanced to QF at Bucharest in addition to winning four ITF Circuit singles titles on clay in North America and Europe, winning 20 of her 21 matches during this stretch
- Also in 2019, posted second Top 20 doubles season highlighted by titles at Toronto and Linz, and R-Up finish at Indian Wells (all w/Siniakova).
 Won Australian Open mixed doubles title w/Ram
- In 2018, won first two Grand Slam trophies at Roland Garros (d. Hozumi/ Ninomiya in F) and Wimbledon (d. Melichar/Peschke in F) both w/Siniakova, the first pairing to complete the Roland Garros-Wimbledon double since Kim Clijsters and Ai Sugiyama in 2003; also became the first team ever to win the girls' (2013) and ladies' doubles title at SW19

- Highlight of last season was R-Up finish at WTA Finals in Fort Worth (l. Garcia in F); upset No.1 Swiatek, No.2 Jabeur and No.3 Pegula en route to final - only the fourth woman in history to beat the No.1, No.2 and No.3 at the same tournament
- Lifted two titles during 2021 campaign, at Abu Dhabi and Madrid, while was R-Up at Stuttgart. Also reached a further three SFs, including at Wimbledon and US Open
- Rose to career-high No.2 in rankings on August 23, 2021
- In doubles, lifted second major at 2021 Australian Open (w/Mertens, d. Krejcikova/Siniakova in F)
- Won final nine matches of 2020 to end the year with back-to-back titles - at Ostrava (d. Azarenka in F) and Linz (d. Mertens in F) - and ranked at No.10
- Having also taken home the silverware at Doha (d. Kvitova in F), was one of two players (also Halep) to lift three singles titles during disrupted 2020 season
- Ended as World No.11 for the second straight year in 2019 after capturing three WTA singles titles at Shenzhen (d. Riske in F), Wuhan (d. Riske in F) and Zhuhai (d. Bertens in F)
- Made Top-10 debut on January 28, 2019 following 3r run at 2019 Australian Open
- Ended 2019 at No.2 in WTA doubles rankings after capturing first Grand Slam doubles trophy at US Open (w/Mertens, d. Azarenka/Barty in F). Earlier in the season, the pair claimed the 'Sunshine Double' by winning back-to-back titles at Indian Wells (d. Krejcikova/Siniakova in F) and Miami (d. Stosur/ Zhang in F)
- Qualified for WTA Finals Shenzhen in doubles (w/Mertens), going 1-2 in the round-robin stage
