<u>TREVISAN:</u> Making her 10th appearance at WTA 1000 tournaments, **Trevisan** is the first woman to reach the QF at Miami on her main draw debut since 2018 (Danielle Collins)... First Italian to make the quarterfinal stage in Miami since 2013 (Errani and Vinci)...**Trevisan** is sixth Italian woman to reach the quarterfinals at WTA 1000 since 2009... Playing in 50th main draw of career, has reached QF stage five times; this is her first QF on hardcourts... With a win, would become first Italian woman to reach SF in Miami... Has three Top 10 wins in career, including win over No.6 Sakkari at United Cup earlier this year

RYBAKINA: On an 11-match win streak... Leads the Tour in aces (191) and is the first player to serve 10+ aces in three consecutive matches this year... Has served 36 aces in first three Miami matches... First woman from Kazakhstan to reach the QF in Miami... 12 of 17 semifinal appearances in career have come on hardcourts... Only four women have won Indian Wells and Miami in the same year



<u>PEGULA:</u> Has won all three previous meetings, including a three-set win earlier this month at Indian Wells; also won at 2021 US Open and in qualifying at 2021 Doha... Fifth American to reach the QF stage at Miami in back-to-back years... Since the start of 2020, **Pegula** has reached made more QF appearances at WTA 1000 tournaments than any player on Tour (12)... **Pegula** has 18 wins; only Sabalenka (20) and Rybakina (19) have more wins this season... Has reached the semifinals six times at WTA 1000s... Has converted 112 breakpoints in 2023, only player to convert more than 100 breakpoints this year... With a win, would become first American to reach back-to-back semifinals at Miami since Serena Williams (2014, 2015)

<u>POTAPOVA:</u> Defeated No.6 Coco Gauff in 3r, her third career Top 10 win... Best win came over World No.2 Kontaveit at 2022 Prague, dropping only two games... Has won 13 matches this year already, equaling her second highest season win total; last year she won a career-high 24 matches across entirety of 2022... Has won two titles in the past year and is playing on career-high ranking of No.26... Has won a Tour-leading eight matches in 3-sets... Through to quarterfinals for second time at a WTA 1000 (also 2021 Dubai)

QF QUICK HITS

- Among the final eight players remaining, none have previously reached the final in Miami. A new Miami champion will be crowned this year
- **Petra Kvitova** is making her 99th appearance at a WTA 1000 tournament, second most since the level was introduced in 2009
- This is **Kvitova's** 36th quarterfinal appearance at WTA 1000 tournaments, behind only Agnieszka Radwanska (42) and Simona Halep (39) have reached more, while Caroline Wozniacki also has reached 36
- **Kvitova** has won eight titles at the WTA 1000 level trailing only Serena Williams (13), Victoria Azarenka (10) and Siona Halep (9); also equal to Maria Sharapova (8)
- Since the start of 2020, **Pegula** has reached the quarterfinals 12 times at WTA 1000 tournaments, the most on Tour, ahead of **Sabalenka** (11) and Coco Gauff (8)
- In 2023, **Rybakina** (11-0) has won a Tour-leading 11 matches at WTA 1000 level followed by **Krejcikova** (10-2), **Cirstea** (9-2), **Muchova** (9-2) and **Sabalenka** (9-2)





PLAYER NOTES

- Making Miami main-draw debut; fell in qualifying in 2021 and 2022
- After 1r bye, defeated Hibino in 2r, Liu in 3r, and Ostapenko in R16 to reach her first QF since 2022 Budapest
- Playing in 10th WTA 1000; entering 2023 Miami, best results at this level were 3r showings at 2022 Guadalajara and 2023 Indian Wells
- Faces No.7 Rybakina in QF today; owns three wins in career over Top-10 players, upsetting No. Bertens (2020 Roland Garros), No.10 Muguruza (2022 Rabat) and No.6 Sakkari (2023 United Cup)
- Across all levels is 2-3 against players from Kazakhstan
- Owns 5-18 career record against seeds (1-1 in 2023)
- Record in WTA QF matches stands at 2-2; previous four all came at clay-court tournaments
- Only player from Italy to reach QF, from five in starting field
- Looking to become first Italian women to reach Miami SF; Raffaella Reggi (1989), Silvia Farina Elia (1998), Tathiana Garbin (2007), Roberta Vinci and Sara Errani (both 2013) all made OF
- Is currently ranked No.24; this time last year was No.88; recently achieved career-high ranking of No.21 (January 21, 2023)
- Projected to break into Top 20 by reaching SF

PLAYER NOTES

- Making third appearance at Miami, where she reached 3r in 2021 (l. Sorribes Tormo) and 2022 (l. Pegula)
- After 1r bye, beat Kalinskaya in 2r, Badosa in 3r, and Mertens in R16, stretching her career-best Tour-level winning streak to 11 matches - also won six at Indian Wells and two in Dubai (withdrew before 3r match w/low back injury)
- Has struck a tournament-leading 36 aces this fortnight, taking season total to 191 - the most on Tour
- Faces No.24 Trevisan in QF today; career record against Italian women is 6-0 (including qualifying and ITFCircuit matches), dropping just one set; this season, beat Cocciaretto7-5 6-3 during run to Australian Open final
- Owns 31-34 career record against seeds (9-3 in 2023)
- Record in WTA QF matches is 17-11 (12-9 on hard)
- Has two hard-court titles, at 2023 Indian Wells and 2020 Hobart; also finished R-Up seven times, including this year's Australian Open
- Only Kazakhstan player to reach QF (Putintseva l. Marino in 1r). Prior to her run this fortnight, best results by a woman representing Kazakhstan were R16 showings from Shevedova (2010), Diyas (2018) and Putintseva (2019)
- Is currently ranked at a career-high No.7; broke into Top 10 following Australian Open R-Up finish (January 30, 2023)
- Has posted 19 match wins so far in 2023; only Sabalenka (20) has more to her name
- In her Indian Wells triumph earlier this month, defeated World No.1 Swiatek in SF and No.2 Sabalenka in final; bidding to become fifth woman to sweep Indian Wells and Miami in same year, joining Graf (1994, 1996), Clijsters (2005), Azarenka (2016) and Swiatek (2022)




- Reached 3r at Indian Wells (l. Muchova)
- Suffered 1r exits at Abu Dhabi (l. Mertens), Doha (l. Muchova) and Dubai (l. Kvitova)
- Fell 1r at Australian Open (l. Schmiedlova)
- Helped Italy finish R-Up at inaugural United Cup; won two of her singles matches
- Won fourth career title at Indian Wells (d. No.2 Sabalenka in F); also upset No.1 Swiatek in SF
- Advanced to QF at Abu Dhabi (I. Haddad Maia) and 3r at Dubai (withdrew before match vs. Gauff w/low back injury)
- Finished R-Up at Australian Open (l. Sabalenka); upset No.1 Swiatek, Ostapenko and Azarenka en route to become first woman to beat three Slam champions at Australian Open since Capriati in 2001
- Made 2r at Adelaide 1 (l. Kostyuk) and fell 1r at Adelaide 2 (l. Kvitova)



CAREER MILESTONES

- Enjoyed memorable 2022 clay-court season, lifting maiden WTA title at Rabat (d. Liu in F) and then reaching SF at Roland Garros (l. Gauff)
- Reached 2r four times in 2021 (including at Roland Garros and US Open). Also finished R-Up at WTA 125K Series event at Karlsruhe and reached two further finals on ITF Circuit
- During the 2020 season, cracked the Top 100 for the first time and reached a career-high ranking of No.83 on October 12, 2020. Also posted career-best year-end ranking of No.85 - up from last year's No.153 finish
- Enjoyed breakthrough QF run at 2020 Roland Garros, where she overcame three rounds of qualifying and defeated Gauff, Sakkari and Bertens before falling to the eventual champion Swiatek
- Paris run marked first Tour-level QF of her career and her win over Bertens marked her career first Top-10 victory
- Kicked off the 2020 season with her Grand Slam main draw debut at the Australian Open, as a qualifier, falling to the eventual champion Kenin in the opening round
- Lifted ninth ITF singles title in 2019 at \$25K
 ITF/Santa Margherita di Pula/ITA and reached an additional final in the same city two weeks later
- Competed in the main draw of a Premier-level event for the first time at 2019 Charleston (as qualifier, d. N.Kichenok in 1r, l. Bertens in 2r)
- Season highlights in 2018 were R-Up finishes on ITF Circuit at \$60k Brescia-ITA and \$25k Santa Margherita Di Pula-ITA. Also fell 1r at WTA tournaments at Gstaad (as qualifier, l. Kuzmova) and Moscow [River Cup] (as qualifier, l. Kozlova) and in qualifying at Roland Garros, Wimbledon and US Open
- In 2017, qualified for first WTA main draws at Gstaad and Bastad, falling 1r on both occasions. Also won eighth and most recent ITF Circuit title at \$25k Warsaw-POL
- Part of Italian Billie Jean King Cup team in 2017 and 2019
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2009 Rome
- Owns nine singles and two doubles title on ITF Circuit
- Played first professional tournaments on the ITF Circuit in Italy and Spain in 2008
- As a junior reached semifinals at Roland Garros and Wimbledon in 2009

- Lifted maiden major at 2022 Wimbledon (d. Jabeur in F)
- Last season also finished R-Up at Adelaide (l. Barty) and Portoroz (l. Siniakova)
- Best result of 2021 were SFs at Eastbourne, Olympics and Chicago [500], and QFs at Abu Dhabi, Roland Garros, San Jose and Ostrava
- Opened 2020 season by reaching the championship match at four of her first five tournaments, including a title run at Hobart (d. Zhang in F)
- Made first final appearance at a Premier-level tournament with R-Up finish at St. Petersburg (l. Bertens); was rewarded with Top 20 debut at No.19 following run in Russia (February 17, 2020)
- First win over a Top-5 ranked opponent came over No.3 Ka.Pliskova during R-Up finish at 2020 Dubai
- Won back-to-back Slam matches for the first time during 3r showing at 2020 Australian Open (l. Barty)
- Won maiden WTA singles title at 2019 Bucharest (d. Tig in F), breaking into Top 100 for the first time in the following week's rankings at No.65 (July 22, 2019)
- Also in 2019, went on to make Top 50 debut on September 16, 2019, after reaching second career final at Nanchang (l. Peterson), produced SF appearances at Luxembourg and 's-Hertogenbosch, and made Grand Slam main draw debut at 2019 Roland Garros, falling 1r (as qualifier, l. Siniakova)
- Finished 2019 campaign with 57-21 win-loss record (across all levels) to end season at No.37, up from 2018's final ranking of No.191. On the ITF Circuit in 2019, lifted silverware on three occasions: back-to-back at \$25k Moscow-RUS and \$25k Kazan-RUS, and at \$60k ITF/Launceston-AUS
- Highlights of 2018 included reaching maiden WTA QF at St. Petersburg (l. Goerges) and clinching title at \$15k ITF/Kazan-RUS
- First Top 10 win came over No.7 Garcia at 2018
 St. Petersburg
- Made WTA qualifying and main draw debut at 2017 Moscow (as qualifier, l. Begu in 1r)
- Professional debut came at \$10k ITF/Antalya-TUR in 2014



- Achieved career-high No. 3 in October 2022 after defeating four Grand Slam champions at Guadalajara, en route to ending three-year wait for second WTA title (d. Sakkari in F)
