

## **MATCH NOTES – THURSDAY, 3 OCTOBER 2024**

### [WC] Shuai Zhang (CHN #595) vs. [15] Paula Badosa (ESP #19)

First meeting

### Zhang:

- Has tied best result at Beijing by reaching quarterfinals also doing so in 2016 and 2018
- With first round win over McCartney Kessler, broke a 24-match losing streak second longest in the Open Era
- With second round win over No.6 seed Emma Navarro, earned her first Top 10 win since 2022 Tokyo and posted back-to-back wins for the first time since 2023 Australian Open
- Looking to tie best result at Beijing by a Chinese player and by a wildcard by reaching the semifinals
- Currently ranked No.595 on PIF WTA Rankings, is the lowest-ranked player to reach the China Open quarterfinals (record previously held by No.154 Lindsay Davenport in 2007)

### Badosa:

- Making main draw debut at Beijing; contested qualifying in 2019
- Owns one WTA 1000 career title at 2021 Indian Wells and has reached a further three WTA 1000 semifinals
- Has now reached the guarterfinals or better at last three events also doing so at Cincinnati (SF) and US Open (QF)
- Looking to reach third semifinal of the year after title run at Washington DC and final four at Cincinnati
- Is the first Spanish player to reach the quarterfinals here since Garbiñe Muguruza's title run in 2015
- Second on Tour in Break Points Saved at 64.1% behind only World No.1 Iga Swiatek (66.7%)

First meeting

#### Starodubsteva:

- Is into quarterfinals in first career WT0 1000 main draw appearance through qualifying and main draw, has yet to drop a set through six matches
- Earned first Top 50 wins in career in past three matches including first Top 20 win over No.14 Anna Kalinksaya in last round
- Hold 0-1 record against Top 10 opponents after falling to No.6 Ons Jabeur at Australian Open earlier this year in her WTA main draw debut
- Looking to be second qualifier to reach the semifinals here after Monica Niculescu in 2011 and second Ukrainian player after Elina Svitolina in 2016
- Reached first quarterfinal last month at Monastir (I. eventual champion Kartal), would be first career semifinal should she win today

### Gauff:

- Making second China Open appearance after reaching semifinals here last year
- Owns 11-1 record against qualifiers this year with only loss to Anna Kalinskaya at Dubai who today's opponent just beat in the previous round
- Has won 23 of her last 24 matches against players outside the Top 100 including all eight matches this year; only loss came to No.128 Sofia Kenin at 2023 Wimbledon
- Holds 6-2 record in quarterfinal matches this year
- Leads tour in Return Games Won (45.8%) and Return Points Won (48.3%); with a win would tie Emma Navarro for third most match wins this year (45) behind Iga Swiatek (57) and Sabalenka (49)
- Enters Beijing at No.6 on PIF Race to the WTA Finals behind Jessica Pegula and ahead of Emma Navarro; bidding to qualify for third consecutive WTA Finals

### **PLAYER NOTES**

- Making 13th appearance at Beijing where she is into the QF for a third time: advanced to final eight in 2016 (l. Konta) and 2018 (l. Osaka)
- Has beaten Mccartney Kessler, Emma Navarro, Greet Minnen and Magdalena Frech reach her first QF since Tokyo 2022 (en route to SF)
- Snapped a 24-match losing streak with this 4match winning streak, her first time winning four consecutive matches since finishing R-Up at 2022 Birmingham
- Faces No.19 Paula Badosa today; with a win would notch first SF across all WTA 1000 events
- Before win over No.6 Emma Navarro in 2r, had lost previous five matches against Top 20 players last defeating No.10 Caroline Garcia at 2022 Tokyo
- Owns 6-8 career record against players from Spain (0-0 in 2024); playing today's opponent for the first time
- Owns 39-99 career record against seeded opponents (2-1 in 2024)
- Record in WTA QF matches stands at 17-17 looking to reach 18th career SF and 14th on hard courts
- All three WTA titles have come on hard court: Lyon in 2022 and Guangzhou in 2013 and 2017
- With Qinwen Zheng, one of two players from China to reach QF - the last time two players from China reached QF at Beijing was 2018
- Best result by a player from China at Beijing were SF runs by Wang Qiang in 2018, Li Na in 2012 and 2010, Zheng Jie in 2008, Peng Shuai in 2007 and 2006
- · Only wildcard still competing in main draw
- Best result by a wildcard at Beijing was SF run by Qiang Wang in 2018 and Shuai Peng in 2006
- Previous lowest ranked player (No.154) to reach QF at Beijing was Lindsay Davenport in 2007
- Is currently ranked No.595 has become the lowest ranked player to reach QF at Beijing; this time last year was ranked No.187

- Owns one WTA 1000 title at Indian Wells 2021 (d. Azarenka in F); outside of that has reached three other WTA 1000 SFs at 2021 Madrid, 2022 Indian Wells and 2024 Cincinnati
- After 1r bye, has beaten Viktoriya Tomova, Rebecca Sramkova and Jessica Pegula reach QF without dropping a set - has now reached QF or better at last three events, also Cincinnati (SF) and US Open (QF)
- Faces No.595 Shuai Zhang in QF today looking to reach third SF of the year after Washington DC (WON) and Cincinnati (SF)
- A loss today would be worst by ranking at Tourlevel and worst on any level since faling to No.841 Ines Ibbou at ITF W25 Las Palmas de Gran Canaria in 2019
- Owns 2-3 career record against players from China, with record in 2024 standing at 1-0, having defeated Yafan Wang at US Open 2024
- Owns 8-6 career record against wildcards (4-1 in 2024)
- Record in WTA QF matches stands at 14-13
- Three of her four career singles titles have come on hard court - Washington DC in 2024; Sydney 2022; Indian Wells in 2021
- Only player from Spain to reach QF and first since 2015
- Best result by Spain at Beijing was title run by Garbiñe Muguruza in 2015
- Is currently ranked No.19; this time last year was ranked No.56
- Second on Tour in break points saved at 64.1% behind only World No.1 Iga Swiatek (66.7%)

## **CAREER MILESTONES**

- Reached R16 at 2023 Australian Open (l. Pliskova) taking her ranking to a high of No. 22.
   Zhang failed to win a singles match after Lyon in January and ended her season early after Montreal (l. Blinkova).
- In doubles, won the 2023 title at Abu Dhabi (w/Stefani) and reached semifinals at Doha (w/Olmos) and Wimbledon (w/Dolehide).
  - Won third career singles title at Lyon (d. Yastremska in F) and 12th doubles title in Nottingham (w/Haddad Maia) in 2022
- Finished the season at No. 24, very close to previous best career ranking of No. 23 (Nov 14, 2016); in doubles climbed as high as No. 2 on July 11, 2022
- Reached fourth singles final of career in 2021, finishing R-Up at Nottingham (l. Konta). Also advanced to SF at Palermo and QF at San Jose
- Enjoyed strong campaign in doubles in 2021 winning three tiles, at Cincinnati and US Open (w/Stosur) and Ostrava (w/Mirza). Qualified for WTA Finals for first time (w/Stosur) however failed to progress from group stage
- Season highlight in 2020 was reaching third career WTA singles final (l. Rybakina in F) and finished R-Up in doubles at Hobart (w/Peng), which marks the first time she made it through to the championship match in both singles and doubles at the same tour-level event
- Also in 2020, made R16 at Roland Garros for the first time; now has advanced to second week in three Grand Slams across hard, grass and clay
- Standout results of 2019 season were reaching second Grand Slam singles QF of career at Wimbledon (l. eventual champion Halep), finishing R-Up at WTA125K Series event in Anning, China (l. S.Zheng) and closing out season by winning \$100k ITF/Tokyo-JPN (d.Paolini in F)
- Registered first Top 10 doubles season in 2019finished at No.10 while posted career-high ranking at No.9 on May 20
- Won first Grand Slam title in doubles at 2019
   Australian Open (w/Stosur; d. Babos/Mladenovic
   in F); also reached final at Miami w/Stosur (l.
   Mertens/Sabalenka). Team qualified for WTA
   Finals in Shenzhen (Zhang's debut at the season
   finale) where they advanced to SF (l. eventual
   champions Babos/Mladenovic)
- First Top 30 season in 2016, posted career-high ranking of No.23 on November 14
- Enjoyed Grand Slam breakthrough at 2016
   Australian Open, where she advanced to QF as

- 2023 was a difficult season for Badosa; while she made the SF at Adelaide #2, reached backto-back QF at Charleston and Stuttgart and an additional QF at Rome, she withdrew from Roland Garros with a back injury. Her last match of the year was at Wimbledon, where she fell in the R64. She ended her season afterwards due to continuing injury
- In 2022, Badosa rose to career-high ranking of No.2 (April 25), won one title, at Sydney and advanced to SF at Indian Wells, Stuttgart and San Jose
- Captured the first two WTA singles titles of her career in 2021 at Belgrade (d. Konjuh in F) and Indian Wells (d. Azarenka in F
- Qualified for AKRON WTA Finals Guadalajara, where she advanced to the SF stage
- Broke into the WTA Top 20 on October 18, 2021 after winning the Indian Wells title and reached the Top 10 on November 8, 2021
- Nominated for 2021 WTA Most Improved Player of the Year (won by Krejcikova), as voted on by members of the media
- In 2021 also advanced to SF at Madrid, Charleston and Lyon and QFs at Roland-Garros, Cincinnati and Olympics
- At 2020 Roland Garros, upset former finalist Stephens and 2017 champion Ostapenko en route to reaching R16 for the first time at a major. That year also reached SF at Istanbul (l. Bouchard)
- Campaign in 2019 highlighted by SF run at Palermo (l. Bertens) and QF showing at Seoul (l. Y.Wang); also fell 1r on Grand Slam main draw debut at Australian Open (as qualifier, l. Birrell)
- Finished 2018 inside Top 200 for the first time (at No.143); picked up three ITF titles at \$25k ITF/Glasgow-UK, ITF/\$25k Les Franqueses del Valles - FRA and ITF/\$60k Valencia-ESP
- Fell in qualifying at 2018 Wimbledon, Madrid and US Open
- Claimed third title on ITF Circuit in 2017 at ITF/\$25k El Espinar; Fell 1r at Miami and in qualifying at Madrid
- In 2016, fell 1r at Miami, Madrid and Mallorca and in qualifying at Rio de Janeiro
- As wildcard, made breakthrough on WTA Tour with 3r run at 2015 Miami Open (l. Ka.Pliskova)
- Came through qualifying at 2015 Madrid, fell 1r to Errani via ret. w/left leg injury
- Continued at ITF Circuit level during 2013-2014 before playing second WTA qualifying draw at 2015 Antwerp, where she advanced to 2r (l. Bodarenko)

- qualifier (d. No.2 Halep and No.17 Key en route, l. Konta). Run also marked first time winning back-to-back main draw matches since semifinal run at 2014 Birmingham
- As a qualifier during 2016 Melbourne run, defeated No.2 Halep and No.17 Keys (l. Konta). Ranked No.133, became lowest-ranked player to advance to last eight in Melbourne since unranked Henin reached final in 2010, and first qualifier to do so since Gavaldon in 1990
- Contemplated retirement after ending 2015 ranked No.186, her lowest year-end finish since 2008 (No.212) and down from No.62 in 2014
- Winner of two WTA singles titles, at 2013
   Guangzhou (d. King in F) and 2017 Guangzhou (d. Krunic in F); also won WTA 125K Series events at Nanjing in 2013 and Honolulu in 2017
- Scored first Top 10 win over then top ranked Safina in 1r at 2009 Beijing; at No.226, was the lowest-ranked player ever to beat a World No.1
- First broke into Top 100 on August 9, 2010 and Top 50 on February 3, 2014
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2006 Beijing; made WTA main draw debut at 2006 Guangzhou
- Winner of 21 singles titles and eight doubles titles on ITF Circuit
- Member of Chinese Fed Cup team in 2007, 2009-10, 2012, 2014-15, 2019-20. Chinese Olympic Team, 2012, 2016
- In mixed doubles, reached SF at 2018 US Open (w/Peers)

- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2013 Palermo, winning one match via retirement before falling in 2r (l.Gatto-Monticone) Won first title on ITF Circuit at \$10k ITF/Sant Jordi-ESP in 2012; now owns seven singles titles at this level
- Played first professional tournament of career at \$10k ITF/Gexto-ESP in 2012 (l. in 1r)
- Won girls' singles title at 2015 Roland Garros (d. Kalinskaya in F) and reached QF at Roland Garros and Wimbledon in 2014; finished 2015 as No.8 in ITF World Junior rankings
