

MATCH NOTES – TUESDAY, OCTOBER 1 2024

[15] P. Badosa (ESP) vs. [2] J. Pegula (USA)

Pegula leads 3-0

Badosa:

- Badosa is contesting the Beijing main draw for the first tie (fell in 2019 qualifying)
- Has now reached the R16 or better at last three events also Cincinnati (SF) and US Open (QF)
- Bidding for first Top 10 win since 2023 Rome (over No.7 Jabeur)

Pegula:

- Pegula is through to the R16 at Beijing for the second time (also 2023, I. Ostapenko)
- Owns a perfect 9-0 career record against players from Spain, with record in 2024 standing at 2-0 (defeating Bouzas Maneiro at US Open and Badosa at Cincinnati)
- Owns five hard court titles, most recently at 2024 Toronto and also owns one here in Asia, at 2023 Seoul

[WC] S. Zhang (CHN) vs. [23] M. Frech (POL)

Series tied 1-1

Zhang:

- Looking to make third quarterfinal appearance in Beijing also doing so in 2016 and 2018
- Has not yet dropped a set through three matches here
- Heading into this tournament, had lost previous 24 matches, the second longest losing streak in the Open Fra
- Win today would notch first quarterfinal spot since 2022 Tokyo and first WTA 1000 QF since 2022 Cincinnati

Frech:

- After winning first career singles title at Guadalajara 500, is currently on a seven-match winning streak, the longest of her career
- Won their most recent meeting at 2023 Roland Garros
- Lost only match against a Chinese player this year falling to Qinwen Zheng at Eastbourne
- Went to a third deciding set in both matches so far this tournament
- Could reach first career WTA 1000 guarterfinal with a win

N. Osaka (JPN) vs. [4] C. Gauff (USA)

Series tied 2-2

Osaka:

- Only former champion in the draw, having won the title in her last appearance in 2019 (d. Barty)
- Bidding for her 10th consecutive win in Beijing, a streak started with her title run in 2019
- Has won 3 consecutive matches for the 1st time since Rome; bidding to notch 4 consecutive wins for the 1st time since run to the Miami final in 2022
- Bidding to notch second Top 10 win since return to competition in January

SEP 25 - OCT 6, 2024 | WTA 1000

- Facing Coco Gauff for the 1st time since 2022 San Jose; all five meetings have been played on hard court
- Trying to make her 2nd WTA 1000 quarterfinal of the year after Doha
- Playing first tournament since splitting with Wim Fissette and hiring Patrick Mouratoglou, former coach of Serena Williams and Simona Halep

Gauff:

- Enters Beijing at No.6 on PIF Race to the WTA Finals behind Jessica Pegula and ahead of Emma Navarro; bidding to qualify for 3rd consecutive WTA Finals
- Made semifinals last year in tournament debut (I. eventual champion Iga Swiatek)
- Win over Boulter in 2r was her 47th win at a WTA 1000 on hard court, eclipsing Caroline Wozniacki for the most before turning 21
- Only 4 Americans have reached more WTA 1000 R16s than Coco Gauff (21) Serena Williams (36), Venus Williams (33), Sloane Stephens and Jessica Pegula (26 each). Madison Keys is also currently on 21.
- Along with Jessica Pegula, Madison Keys and Amanda Anisimova, first time 4 Americans have made the Round of 16 in Beijing
- Leads tour in Return Games Won percentage in 2024 (45.7%) and No.5 in First Serve Points Won percentage (71.5%)
- First faced Osaka as a 15-year-old at 2019 US Open
- Split with co-coach Brad Gilbert after US Open and added Matt Daly to coaching team with Jean-Christophe ('JC') Faurel

[Q] Y. Starodubtseva (UKR) vs. [10] A. Kalinskaya

First meeting

Starodubtseva:

- Has not lost a set through qualifying and main draw
- Owned just three WTA tour-level wins in her career before this week in Beijing, where she has won three matches, including her first two Top 50 wins (d. Siniakova, Avanesyan)
- Bidding for first Top 20 win today; previously 0-2
- Trying to become the first qualifier to reach the Beijing quarterfinals since Katerina Siniakova in 2018 and first to do so in her tournament debut since Monica Niculescu in 2011


Kalinskaya:

- Entered Beijing at a career-high No.14 on PIF WTA Rankings and No.13 on PIF Race to the WTA Finals behind Jelena Ostapenko
- Looking to reach multiple WTA-1000 quarterfinals in a single season for the first time in her career after reaching the QF of Dubai earlier this year; also made the quarterfinals of Guadalajara 2 in 2022
- Bidding to reach her fourth quarterfinal of 2024 after Australian Open, Dubai and Berlin
- Holds an 8-1 record against qualifiers during 2024, with her only loss coming to Sara Bejlek at Madrid
- Posted best win by ranking earlier this year by defeating No.1 Iga Swiatek in straight sets en route to the Dubai final
- Winner of today's match will face either Coco Gauff or Naomi Osaka next

CAREER MILESTONES

- 2023 was a difficult season for Badosa; while she made the SF at Adelaide #2, reached backto-back QF at Charleston and Stuttgart and an additional QF at Rome, she withdrew from Roland Garros with a back injury. Her last match of the year was at Wimbledon, where she fell in the R64. She ended her season afterwards due to continuing injury
- In 2022, Badosa rose to career-high ranking of No.2 (April 25), won one title, at Sydney and advanced to SF at Indian Wells, Stuttgart and San Jose
- Captured the first two WTA singles titles of her career in 2021 at Belgrade (d. Konjuh in F) and Indian Wells (d. Azarenka in F
- Qualified for AKRON WTA Finals Guadalajara, where she advanced to the SF stage
- Broke into the WTA Top 20 on October 18, 2021 after winning the Indian Wells title and reached the Top 10 on November 8, 2021
- Nominated for 2021 WTA Most Improved Player of the Year (won by Krejcikova), as voted on by members of the media
- In 2021 also advanced to SF at Madrid, Charleston and Lyon and QFs at Roland-Garros, Cincinnati and Olympics
- At 2020 Roland Garros, upset former finalist Stephens and 2017 champion Ostapenko en route to reaching R16 for the first time at a major. That year also reached SF at Istanbul (l. Bouchard)
- Campaign in 2019 highlighted by SF run at Palermo (l. Bertens) and QF showing at Seoul (l. Y.Wang); also fell 1r on Grand Slam main draw debut at Australian Open (as qualifier, l. Birrell)
- Finished 2018 inside Top 200 for the first time (at No.143); picked up three ITF titles at \$25k ITF/Glasgow-UK, ITF/\$25k Les Franqueses del Valles - FRA and ITF/\$60k Valencia-ESP
- Fell in qualifying at 2018 Wimbledon, Madrid and US Open
- Claimed third title on ITF Circuit in 2017 at ITF/\$25k El Espinar; Fell 1r at Miami and in qualifying at Madrid
- In 2016, fell 1r at Miami, Madrid and Mallorca and in qualifying at Rio de Janeiro
- As wildcard, made breakthrough on WTA Tour with 3r run at 2015 Miami Open (l. Ka.Pliskova)
- Came through qualifying at 2015 Madrid, fell 1r to Errani via ret. w/left leg injury
- Continued at ITF Circuit level during 2013-2014 before playing second WTA qualifying draw at 2015 Antwerp, where she advanced to 2r (l. Bodarenko)

- Won two titles in 2023, her second WTA 1000 tournament at Montreal and also WTA 250 Seoul. Also finished R-Up at Doha, Tokyo and at the WTA Finals in Cancun.
 - In doubles ascended to No.1 ranking (co-ranked with Coco Gauff) after 2023 US Open.
- Achieved career-high No. 3 in October 2022 after defeating four Grand Slam champions at Guadalajara, en route to ending three-year wait for second WTA title (d. Sakkari in F)
- Qualified for WTA Finals Fort Worth in both singles and doubles (w/Gauff), thus becoming the first Americans to debut in singles and doubles at the season-ending showpiece since Davenport in 1994
- Reached QF at three of the four majors in 2022, breaking into Top 10 after doing so at Roland Garros (June 6, 2022)
- One of seven players to win 40 or more matches in 2022, alongside Swiatek, Jabeur, Garcia, Sakkari, Kasatkina and Bencic
- In 2021, reached the QF or better on seven occasions, including at the Australian Open
- Broke into Top 20 on November 1, 2021
- Began 2020 with runner-up finish at Auckland (l. S.Williams), other standout results were a QF at Western & Southern Open (as qualifier, l. Mertens) and a 3r showing at US Open (l. Kvitova)
- On the doubles court in 2020, reached QFs of Roland-Garros (w/Muhammad) and Cincinnati (w/Rogers)
- Won her first WTA title at 2019 Washington DC (d. Giorgi in F)
- Also in 2019, fell 1r on main draw debut at Roland-Garros (l. eventual champion Barty) and Wimbledon (l. Buzarnescu) and Miami (as a qualifier, l. Konta)
- Broke into Top 100 for the first time on February 4, 2019 following back-to-back R-Up finishes at WTA 125K Series event at Newport Beach and W100 ITF Circuit tournament in Midland-MI, USA
- Highlights of 2018 included finishing R-up as a qualifier at Quebec City (l. Parmentier in F), recording SF finish at Houston WTA 125K Series tournament (l. S.Peng) and reaching QF or better at 10 ITF events
- Did not play between January and August 2017 after undergoing hip surgery. Primarily played at ITF Circuit events for the rest of the year, winning two doubles titles with Townsend
- Played a mixture of WTA and ITF Circuit events in 2016 with highlight coming at Washington DC,

- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2013 Palermo, winning one match via retirement before falling in 2r (l.Gatto-Monticone) Won first title on ITF Circuit at \$10k ITF/Sant Jordi-ESP in 2012; now owns seven singles titles at this level
- Played first professional tournament of career at \$10k ITF/Gexto-ESP in 2012 (l. in 1r)
- Won girls' singles title at 2015 Roland Garros (d. Kalinskaya in F) and reached QF at Roland Garros and Wimbledon in 2014; finished 2015 as No.8 in ITF World Junior rankings
- where she defeated No.14 Stosur for first Top-20 win of career on her way to a SF finish (l. Davis)
- Reached 2r on Grand Slam main draw debut at 2015 US Open (as qualifier, d. Van Uytvanck, l. Cibulkova)
- Sidelined from tennis for a year and a half between 2013 and 2015 due to a right knee injury
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2009 Ponte Vedra Beach and WTA main draw debut at 2012 Indian Wells

- Born in New York City, often trains in Barcelona, near her hometown Begur in the Costa Brava, but lives in Dubai
