MATCH NOTES – DAY 5 – SATURDAY, APRIL 27, 2024

[1] Iga Swiatek (POL #1) vs. [27] Sorana Cirstea (ROU #30)

Swiatek leads 3-0

Swiatek reached the final in Madrid last year before falling to Aryna Sabalenka in the title match... **Cirstea** has reached the quarterfinals twice in Madrid and is into the third round for the first time since 2017... **Swiatek** has lost to a player outside the Top 20 just twice this year... **Cirstea** looking for first career win over a World No.1 with 0-4 record... **Swiatek** has won two WTA 1000 titles already this year at Doha and Indian Wells; beat today's opponent in straight sets en route to Doha title

[3] Coco Gauff (USA #3) vs. [31] Dayana Yastremska (UKR #34)

First career meeting

Gauff looking to tie best result in Madrid by reaching the Round of 16 while **Yastremska** is into the third round for the first time... **Gauff** has won 28 of her last 30 matches against players outside the Top 30... **Yastremska** owns four career Top 10 wins including one over No.7 Marketa Vondrousova earlier this year at Australian Open... **Gauff** has a chance to climb to a career-high ranking of No.2 this week depending on Aryna Sabalenka and Elena Rybakina's results.

Sloane Stephens (USA #33) vs. [5] Maria Sakkari (GRE #6)

Sakkari leads 1-0

Stephens is into the third round of Madrid for the first time since reaching the semifinals in 2019... **Sakkari** advanced to the final four last year in best career result in Madrid... **Stephens** is on a seven-match win streak after title run in Rouen last week, one win away from tying her career longest win streak... **Sakkari** has won 17 of her last 18 matches against players outside the Top 30... **Stephens** lost her only Top 10 match so far this year to No.1 Iga Swiatek at Dubai; last Top 10 win came against No.6 Caroline Garcia at 2023 Cincinnati... **Sakkari** won the pair's only previous meeting at 2022 Toronto

[32] Leylah Fernandez (CAN #35) vs. [8] Ons Jabeur (TUN #9)

Jabeur leads 2-0

Jabeur won their two previous meetings but both matches have gone to a third set; this is their first meeting on clay... **Fernandez** owns one Top 10 win already this year beating No.7 Qinwen Zheng at 2024 Doha... **Jabeur** is one of two Madrid champions remaining in the draw winning the title in 2022... **Fernandez** is into the third round of Madrid for the first time in her career... **Jabeur** looking for just her fifth WTA main draw win of the year

[18] Madison Keys (USA #20) vs. [15] Liudmila Samsonova (#17)

Keys leads 2-1

Keys looking for first Top 20 win of the year... After a first round bye, **Samsonova** beat Naomi Osaka in the second round snapping a four-match losing streak dating back to Dubai... **Keys**' win over Irina Camelia Begu in opening match here was first win in Madrid since 2016, had gone 0-5 at Madrid since then... **Samsonova** looking to tie career best in Madrid after reaching Round of 16 here last year... **Keys** won their most recent encounter at 2023 US Open but all three matches have gone to a third deciding set; this is their first meeting on clay

PLAYER NOTES

- Making third appearance at Madrid, where her previous and best result was reaching the final in 2023 (l. Sabalenka), which is also Poland's best result at Madrid
- After 1r bye, beat Xiyu Wang in straight sets
- Faces No.30 Sorana Cirstea in 3r today; has won 18 out of her 20 meetings against opponents outside Top 20 in 2024 season, with the only two losses to No.40 Anna Kalinskaya in SF at Dubai and No.50 Linda Noskova in 3r at Australian Open
- Owns 9-2 career record against players from Romania, having defeated today's opponent Cirstea in all three of their previous meetings at Australian Open 2022, Indian Wells 2023 and Doha 2024
- Owns 88-32 career record against seeded opponents (12-2 in 2024)
- Seven-time clay court champion: Roland Garros in 2023, 2022 & 2020; Stuttgart in 2023 & 2022; Rome in 2022 & 2021
- Also owns eight WTA 1000 titles including two this year at Doha and Indian Wells
- Is No. 1 seed this week; has been top seed at 33 tournaments in her career
- One of three players from Poland to make the Madrid main draw along with Magda Linette (2r) and Magdalena Frech (1r)
- Is spending her 100th and 101st week ranked at No.1 - the 9th most in WTA history
- During last year's clay swing, won titles at Stuttgart and Roland Garros, finished R-Up at Roland Madrid and reached QF at Rome
- Has won 25 matches so far in 2024 and is ranked No.2 on tour for match wins behind Rybakina (27)

PLAYER NOTES

- Making 13th appearance at Madrid, where her previous best result was QF runs in 2016 (l. Cibulkova) and 2017 (l. Mladenovic); most recently fell 2r here last year falling to eventual champion Aryna Sabalenka
- This is her first time into the 3r since QF run in 2017
- After 1r bye this week, defeated WC Alexandra Eala in opening round coming back from 1-3 down in the third set
- Faces No.1 Iga Swiatek in 3r today; owns 21 wins in career over Top 10 players, with two of them coming in 2024 season, defeating No.8 Marketa Vondrousova at Dubai and No.9 Maria Sakkari at Abu Dhabi
- With a win would be her first career win over world No.1, having lost all of her previous four meetings against world No.1 opponents - to Serena Williams at Toronto 2013 (in champion match) and Roland Garros 2013 and to today's opponent Iga Swiatek at Indian Wells 2023 and Doha 2024
- Best career win by-ranking was defeating No.2 Aryna Sabalenka in 2023 Miami QFs
- Best result at a WTA 1000 was R-Up run at 2013 Toronto (l. S.Williams); has reached SFs two more times at 2023 Miami and this year at 2024 Dubai
- Owns 5-12 career record against players from Poland, with record in 2024 standing at 0-1, defeated by today's opponent Swiatek at Doha
- Owns 83-144 career record against seeded opponents (4-4 in 2024)
- One of her two career singles titles have come on clay at Istanbul 2021
- One of the four players from Romania in main draw (along with Bogdan, Begu, Cristian)
- Best result by Romania at Madrid was title run by Simona Halep in 2016 and 2017
- Is currently ranked No.30 (career high at No. 21 in 2013); this time last year was ranked No.44
- Has won 10 matches so far in 2024

CAREER MILESTONES

- Won six titles across 2023, including winning fourth Grand Slam title at Roland-Garros (d. Muchova in F) and going undefeated at the WTA Finals in Cancun (d. Pegula in F). Finished season as WTA World No.1 player for second consecutive year.
- In 2022, lifted second and third Grand Slam titles, at Roland-Garros (d. Gauff in F) and US Open (d. Jabeur in F)
- Triumph in Paris was the last of six straight titles during 37-match winning streak - joint-longest unbeaten run on Tour since 1990
- Won two titles in 2021, at Adelaide and Rome. Other highlights included QF at Roland-Garros and SF at Ostrava and qualifying for WTA Finals Guadalajara (fell in group stage)
- Also finished doubles R-Up at 2021 Roland-Garros (w/Mattek-Sands, l. Krejčíková/Siniakova)
- Won her maiden Tour-level title at 2020 Roland-Garros without dropping a set, becoming the first player from Poland - man or woman - to win a Grand Slam singles title and first from her country to reach a major final since A.Radwanska at 2012 Wimbledon
- Ranked No.54, she became the lowest-ranked woman to win the Roland-Garros title in the Open Era and the lowest-ranked finalist since 1977 (No.56 Mihai). At 19y 132d, is the youngest champion in Paris since Monica Seles (18y 187d) in 1992
- Also became the first player to win her debut Tour-level title at a Grand Slam since Jelena Ostapenko at 2017 Roland-Garros
- Won WTA Most Improved Player of the Year for 2020, as voted on by members of the media. Also won the 2020 WTA Fan Favorite Award
- Ended 2019 season ranked No.61 after a campaign highlighted by R-Up finish at Lugano (l. Hercog) and R16 run at Roland-Garros (l. Halep). That year also reached 3r at Toronto (l. Osaka) and made 2r five times (incl. Australian and US Open)
- Broke into Top 100 at No.88 after R-Up finish at 2019 Lugano
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2019 Auckland
- Ended 2018 season ranked No.175 (up from No.690 in 2017), after posting 42-6 record and winning four titles on ITF Circuit
- Member of Poland's Billie Jean King Cup team, 2018-20, 2021-22
- On professional debut, came through qualifying to win title at \$10k ITF/Stockholm-SWE in 2016; owns seven singles titles at this level
- 2023 saw her best results achieved in the US. Advanced to Indian Wells QF for first time (l. Swiatek), then made SF at Miami (l. eventual champion Kvitova) and QF at US Open (l. Muchova)
- In 2022, reached SF on all three surfaces: hard court at Lyon (l. Yastremska), clay at Istanbul (l. Kudermetova), and grass at Birmingham (l. Zhang). Also enjoyed success at the Australian Open, where she fell in R16 (l. Swiatek)
- Highlight of 2021 was ending near-13-year wait for second WTA singles title, triumphing at Istanbul (d. Mertens in F)
- Also in 2021, finished R-Up at Strasbourg (l. Krejčíková), reached QFs at Grampians Trophy and Portoroz and R16 at Roland Garros
- Ended 2020 on a high, winning singles title at ITF/\$100k Dubai-UAE in December (d. Siniakova in F). Also in 2020, reached 3r at US Open and advanced to 2r at Australian Open
- Advanced to fourth career singles final in 2019 at Tashkent (l. Van Uytvanck) as a former champion in 2008
- Captured fifth career doubles title at 2019 Lugano (w/Mitu, d. Kudermetova/Voskoboeva in F)
- Other season highlights in 2019 were SF run at Nürnberg; previous appearance in last four at a WTA-level event came at the same tournament two years earlier. Also reached 3r at 2019 US Open (l. Townsend)
- Ended 2018 season at No.86, after a year highlighted by clay court QF runs at Nürnberg and Bucharest
- Reached R16 at 2017 Australian Open - first time advancing to that stage at a Slam since 2009 Roland Garros (QF, l. Stosur), her best Slam singles result
- In 2016 played a mix of WTA and ITF events, improving ranking by 163 ranking places to No.81 in 2016 on comeback from shoulder injury, with highlights being a SF run at Rio de Janeiro (l. Rogers) and making QF at Premier Mandatory Madrid (as wildcard, l. eventual R-Up Cibulkova) and Mallorca (as qualifier, l. Jankovic)
- Reached biggest singles final of career at 2013 Toronto - posted three Top 10 wins en route to final (No.10 Wozniacki, No.7 Kvitova and No.5 Li) before falling to No.1 S.Williams
- Following Toronto run, posted career-high ranking of No.21 on August 21, 2013
- Won only WTA singles title at 2008 Tashkent (d. Lisicki in F) having previously been R-Up at 2007 Budapest (l. Dulko)

- Enjoyed stellar junior career, including winning girls' singles at 2018 Wimbledon (d. Küng in F) and leading Poland to Junior Fed Cup in 2016

- Owns four Top 5 victories: No.5 Jankovic (2009 Roland Garros), No.5 Stosur (2012 Australian Open), No.5 Li Na (2013 Toronto) and No.4 Ka.Pliskova (2017 Beijing)
- Member of Romania's Fed Cup team 2006, 2008-09, 2013-14 and 2017-18; also part of Romanian Olympic Team 2008 and 2012
- Fell 1r on Grand Slam main draw debut at 2008 Australian Open (l. No.4 seed Ivanovic)
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2006 Stockholm (l. Kanepi in 1r)
- On ITF Circuit owns eight singles and nine doubles titles
- Played first events of career on ITF Circuit in 2004

OTHER INFORMATION

- Coached by Tomasz Wiktorowski. previously worked with Piotr Sierzputowski
- Father is former Olympic rower Tomasz Swiatek, who competed in the men's quadruple sculls event at the 1988 Summer Olympics in Seoul
- In summer 2022 organised 'Iga Swiatek and friends for Ukraine' event in Krakow, which featured a mixed doubles match between Agnieszka Radwanska, Sergiy Stakhovsky, Polish junior Martyn Pawelski and herself, and was attended by Poland's First Lady, Agata Kornhauser-Duda, Elina Svitolina and Andriy Shevchenko. The occasion was watched by almost 15,000 people live and a further one million on television, raising more than half a million Euros for Ukrainian children and teenagers affected by the war
- Started playing tennis because her older sister was playing and wanted to beat her
- Enjoys rock music, including AC/DC and Pink Floyd
- Includes PZU, On, Tecnifibre, Rolex and Xiaomi in her endorsement portfolio

- Recently parted ways with coach Thomas Johansson
- Introduced to tennis at age 4 by mother, Liliana; father's name is Mihai; younger brother's name is Mihnea; full name is Sorana Mihaela Cirstea
- Speaks Romanian, English and Spanish and is studying French
- Likes all surfaces; favorite shot is forehand; most admires Steffi Graf
- Enjoys playing all ball sports, going shopping, watching movies, reading and doing crosswords
