MATCH NOTES - DAY 6 - SUNDAY, APRIL 28, 2024

[WC] Robin Montgomery (USA #183) vs. [2] Aryna Sabalenka (#2)

First meeting

Montgomery is making her Madrid debut... By reaching the 3r, Montgomery has achieved her best WTA 1000; this is her 7th WTA 1000 main draw... Mongomery has faced a Top 10 player only once before when she lost to Coco Gauff at San Diego 2022... Montgomery is the only wildcard to reach Madrid 3r with the best Madrid result by a wildcard achieved by Paula Badosa with SF in 2021... Sabalenka is a two-time and defending Madrid champion (2021, 2023) and is making her 6th appearance... Sabalenka is bidding to become second three-time Madrid champion after Petra Kvitova (2011, 2015, 2018)... The last time Sabalenka was defeated by a player outside the Top 100 was on clay by No.134 Sofia Kenin at Rome last season... Sabalenka has owned the No.2 ranking spot since January 30, 2023; she will need to reach the final to have a chance of staying at No.2, otherwise, Coco Gauff will move to No.2

Mayar Sherif (EGY #72) vs. [4] Elena Rybakina (KAZ #4)

Rybakina leads 1-0

Sherif is making her 2nd appearance at Madrid; this is Sherif's 16th WTA 1000 appearance; her best result at a WTA 1000 came here in 2023 reaching QF (I. eventual champion Sabalenka), her only WTA 1000 reaching the R16... Sherif owns two career wins over Top 10 players, most recently No.5 Caroline Garcia at Madrid 2023... Sherif's sole career title came on clay at 2022 Parma... Sherif's only two match wins of 2024 have been here in Madrid... Rybakina is playing her 9th tournament of the season and has lost before the quarterfinal stage just once this year (Australian Open 2r, I. Blinkova); she has made the final or better at 4 of last 5 tournaments: Stuttgart (Win), Miami (I. Collins), Doha (I. Swiatek), Abu Dhabi (Win)... Rybakina leads the Tour in singles titles (3), finals (5), match wins (27) and aces (213)... Rybakina owns 3 career clay-court titles – Stuttgart 2024, Rome 2023 and Bucharest 2019... The last time Rybakina was defeated by a player ranked outside the Top 70 was No.82 Katerina Siniakova in the final of 2022 Portoroz

[7] Marketa Vondrousova (CZE #7) vs. Mirra Andreeva (#43)

First meeting

By reaching 3r, Vondrousova has reached her career-best Madrid result; her best result at a WTA 1000 came at 2020 Rome (SF)... Vondrousova's is a two-time runner-up on clay at 2019 Roland Garros and 2019 Istanbul... The best result by player from Czech Republic at Madrid was title runs by Petra Kvitova in 2018, 2015, 2011... Andreeva reached R16 last year here on her debut as a wildcard ranked No.194 and beating Top 20 players No.14 Beatriz Haddad Maia and No.19 Magda Linette before falling to eventual champion Aryna Sabalenka... Since then Andreeva has jumped over 150 ranking spots and made her Top 50 debut in October... Andreeva is coming off her first career clay court QF appearance last week in Rouen... Andreeva owns one career Top 10 win which she achieved at 2024 Australian Open over No.6 Ons Jabeur

[20] Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova (#22) vs. [10] Daria Kasatkina (#11) Kasatkina leads 4-2

Kasatkina and Pavlyuchenkova have identical 17-9 win-loss records at tour level this season... Kasatkina has won four of their six previous meetings... Pavlyuchenkova won their only meeting this year, on hard court in Doha... Kasatkina won their only prior clay-court meeting in straight sets, here in Madrid last year... Pavlyuchenkova is playing in the 109th WTA 1000 event of her career, the most of any player since the WTA 1000 tier began in 2009... Kasatkina fought back from 7-5, 5-2 down in her first match of the week against Cristina Bucsa

[21] Caroline Garcia (FRA #24) vs. [12] Jasmine Paolini (ITA #13) Garcia leads 5-1

Garcia has defeated Paolini in five of their six career meetings (including both previous matches on clay); Garcia only has more wins over Aliaksandra Sasnovich (6-0)... Garcia is 21-7 against Italians (2-0 this year)... Garcia ranks No.3 in total aces this year with 159... Garcia is 10-18 on clay vs. Top 20 ranked opponents... Paolini defeated Victoria Jimenez Kasintseva in the second round in under an hour, which was her first-ever win at Madrid... Paolini ranks inside the Top 2 this year in percentage of break points converted...Paolini won her first WTA 1000 title this year in Dubai and is currently ranked a career-high No.13

- After 1r bye, has beaten Magda Linette so far this week to reach 3r
- Faces No.183 Robin Montgomery in 3r today; her last defeat to a player outside the Top 100 was No.134 Sofia Kenin at Rome last season
- Owns 47-16 career record against players from United States, with record in 2024 standing at 3-1 (victories came over Stearns, Gauff and Anisimova with the one defeat by Navarro)
- Owns 17-6 career record against wildcards, with a record in 2024 standing at 1-0 (over Raducanu at Indian Wells)
- Achieved her best career results here in Madrid, winning the tournament in 2021 and 2023
- Is currently ranked No.2; has held the No.2 ranking since January 30, 2023; needs to reach the final to have a chance of staying at No.2
- During last year's European clay swing reached SF at Roland Garros, 2r at Rome, won at Madrid and R-Up at Stuttgart

CAREER MILESTONES

- Highlights of 2023 were making 2r at Miami (l. Keys) and making WTA semifinals at Gaiba (l. Kruger) and Montevideo (l. Parry).
- In 2022, played 1r main draw at Indian Wells (l. Kanepi) and Miami (l. Linette) and also at San Jose as a qualifier (l. Gauff)
- Won girls' titles at US Open in both singles (d. Dmitruk in F) and doubles (w/Krueger)
- Lifted first ITF Circuit singles title in 2021, at W25 Las Vegas
- Ended 2020 ranked No.491 with a runner-up finish at \$25k ITF/Orlando-FL,USA
- Made WTA main draw debut as a wildcard at 2020 US Open falling to No.35 Putintseva in 1r
- Contested first WTA qualifying event at the 2020 Western & Southern Open (l. Cirstea)
- Won first title of any kind at \$25k ITF/Las Vegas-NV, USA in March 2020
- Made professional debut on ITF circuit in Carson, CA in March 2019 - as qualifier, reached QF

- Outstanding 2023 saw her win debut Grand Slam title at Australian Open (d. Rybakina in F), reach second Major final at US Open (l. Gauff in F) and become the WTA World No.1 player for the first time in career (after US Open). In addition won titles at Adelaide and Madrid.
- Highlight of 2022 season was R-Up finish at WTA Finals in Fort Worth (l. Garcia in F); upset No.1 Swiatek, No.2 Jabeur and No.3 Pegula en route to final - only the fourth woman in history to beat the No.1, No.2 and No.3 at the same tournament
- Lifted two titles during 2021 campaign, at Abu Dhabi and Madrid, while was R-Up at Stuttgart. Also reached a further three SFs, including at Wimbledon and US Open
- Rose to career-high No.2 in rankings on August 23, 2021
- In doubles, lifted second major at 2021 Australian Open (w/Mertens, d. Krejcikova/Siniakova in F)
- Won final nine matches of 2020 to end the year with back-to-back titles - at Ostrava (d. Azarenka in F) and Linz (d. Mertens in F) - and ranked at No.10
- Having also taken home the silverware at Doha (d. Kvitova in F), was one of two players (also Halep) to lift three singles titles during disrupted 2020 season
- Ended as World No.11 for the second straight year in 2019 after capturing three WTA singles titles at Shenzhen (d. Riske in F), Wuhan (d. Riske in F) and Zhuhai (d. Bertens in F)
- Made Top-10 debut on January 28, 2019 following 3r run at 2019 Australian Open
- Ended 2019 at No.2 in WTA doubles rankings after capturing first Grand Slam doubles trophy at US Open (w/Mertens, d. Azarenka/Barty in F). Earlier in the season, the pair claimed the 'Sunshine Double' by winning back-to-back titles at Indian Wells (d. Krejcikova/Siniakova in F) and Miami (d. Stosur/ Zhang in F)
- Qualified for WTA Finals Shenzhen in doubles (w/Mertens), going 1-2 in the round-robin stage
- Enjoyed breakthrough season in 2018, lifting two titles, at New Haven (d. Suárez Navarro in F) and Wuhan (d. Kontaveit in F), winning 46 matches and finishing at No.11 in the rankings
- Also in 2018, was R-Up at Lugano (l. Mertens) and Eastbourne (l. Wozniacki), made SF at Cincinnati, reached five QFs and produced a career-best Grand Slam run to R16 at US Open
- Entered Top 50 on April 16, 2018, after Lugano run, and Top 20 on August 27 of the same year,

- following New Haven title
- Broke into Top 100 at No.76 on October 16, 2017 after reaching first Tour-level final at Tianjin (l. Sharapova). Also in 2017 made SF at Tashkent (l. Babos) and lifting WTA 125k Series title at Mumbai (d. Jakupovic)
- Made Grand Slam main draw debut 2017 Wimbledon, falling in 2r (as qualifier, d. Khromacheva, l. Witthoeft)
- Fell 1r on main draw debut at 2017 Dubai (as qualifier, l. Ka.Bondarenko)
- Member of Belarus Billie Jean King Cup team that lost to USA in 2017 final - scored first Top-20 win of career with defeat of No.13 Stephens during final in Minsk
- WTA qualifying debut came at 2016 Rabat
- Lifted first three ITF Circuit titles in 2015, including a 13-match win streak towards the year's end, bringing back-to-back trophies in Antalya, Turkey
- Made debut on ITF Circuit in Minsk in 2012

- Began playing tennis at the Junior Tennis Champions' Center in College Park, Md., and still trains there
- Currently working with former hitting partner Anton Dubrov; previously coached by Dmitry Tursunov and Didi Kindlmann
- Started playing tennis when she was 6 by an accident when her father Sergey drove by the tennis courts and decided to give it a try
- Has a sweet tooth and considers something sweet as a perfect present; loves her grandmother's cooking, and looks forward to her pancakes when she is away from home
- Has a tiger tattoo on her left arm, which earned her the nickname "The Tiger"
- She spends her time off with family, catching up with friends, or reading; her favorite book is "The Count of Monte Cristo"
