MATCH NOTES - DAY 7 - MONDAY, APRIL 29, 2024

[9] Jelena Ostapenko (LAT #10) vs. [8] Ons Jabeur (TUN #9)

Tied 2-2

Ostapenko and Jabeur have split their four previous meetings and are tied 1-1 on clay as well... Both Ostapenko and Jabeur will be facing a Top 10 player for the first time this year... Ostapenko is into the Madrid Round of 16 for the first time, in her 7th tournament appearance... Ostapenko has won 19 matches this year, tied for 6th-best on Tour... This week, Jabeur has posted back-to-back wins for the first time this year... The 2022 Madrid champion, Jabeur was unable to compete in her title defense last year due to injury

[1] Iga Swiatek (POL #1) vs. Sara Sorribes Tormo (ESP #55)

Swiatek leads 3-0

Swiatek has an undefeated 3-0 record against **Sorribes Tormo**, including a win at United Cup this year... **Swiatek** has lost only seven games in her first two matches this week...**Swiatek** was last year's Madrid runner-up (I. to Sabalenka)... **Swiatek** is 19-2 this year against players ranked outside the Top 20...**Sorribes Tormo** is playing on home soil as the current Spanish No.1...**Sorribes Tormo** has reached three WTA 1000 quarterfinals including at Madrid in 2022...**Sorribes Tormo** is seeking her second win over a reigning World No.1, having beaten top seed Ashleigh Barty at the Tokyo Olympics... With a win, **Swiatek** would be the second player under 23 years old to reach the QF in Madrid twice.

[15] Danielle Collins (USA #13) vs. [2] Aryna Sabalenka (#2)

Sabalenka leads 4-0

Collins is making 4th appearance at Madrid... Has reached her first 4r at Madrid... Owns 15 wins in career over Top 10 players, having won all the most recent three meetings against Top 10 opponents, en route to her back-to-back champions at Charleston and Miami - No.6 Jabeur and No.7 Sakkari at Charleston, No.3 Rybakina in Miami final... Collins owns two singles titles on clay at Charleston 2024 and Palermo 2021... Collins is currently on a 15-match winning streak, after winning Charleston and Miami which is her longest winning streak of career to date... Collins has won 24 matches so far in 2024 and is ranked No.3 on tour for match wins, behind Elena Rybakina (28), Iga Swiatek (26)... Two-time and defending champion (2021,2023) Sabalenka making her 6th appearance at Madrid... Sabalenka has won 18 out of her 21 matches against opponents outside Top 10 in 2024 season, with the only 3 losses coming by No.36 Kalinina at Miami, No.23 Navarro at Indian Wells and No.31 Vekic... Sabalenka has held the WTA World No.2 ranking since January 30, 2023; she needs to reach the final to have a chance of staying at No.2... Sabalenka enters Madrid sitting at No.3 on the Race to the WTA Finals Leaderboard behind Swiatek and Rybakina.

[3] Coco Gauff (USA #3) vs. [18] Madison Keys (USA #20)

Tied 2-2

Gauff and **Keys** have split their four previous meetings and this will be their first showdown on clay... **Gauff** has won 21 matches so far in 2024, the fifth-most on tour... **Gauff** is aiming for the 32nd Top 20 win of her career... **Gauff** is 5-0 against her fellow Americans so far this season... **Keys** has matched her career-best Madrid result by reaching the Round of 16 for the first time since 2016... **Keys** seeks her 27th career Top 10 win and first of the year... **Keys**' second-round win over Liudmila Samsonova was her first Top 20 win of this season...

[Q] Sara Bejlek (CZE #136) vs. [4] Elena Rybakina (KAZ #4)

First meeting

Bejlek is making tournament debut at Madrid 2024, which is also her main draw debut across WTA 1000 events, having previously played qualifying at Rome 2023... A.s qualifier, has won 5 matches in a row to reach her first career 4r at Madrid 2024... **Bejlek** is facing a Top 10 opponent in her career... With a win, **Bejlek** would become the lowest ranked quarterfinalist in tournament history (currently No.134 Patricia Maria Tig, 2016, QF); with a win, would also become the 8th qualifier to reach the QF at Madrid

No.4 seed **Rybakina** is making 4th appearance at Madrid... **Rybakina** has won three of her eight career titles came on clay court, most recently last week at Stuttgart. Also won Rome 2023 and Bucharest 2019... **Rybakina** has won 28 matches so far in 2024; she is ranked No.1 on tour for match wins... Leads the Tour in Titles (3) and Finals (5) this season... Has made Final or better at 4 of last 5 tournaments: Stuttgart (win), Miami (I. Collins), Doha (I. Swiatek), Abu Dhabi (win)... Playing 9th tournament of the season. Has lost before QF stage just once this year (Australian Open 2r, I. Blinkova)... **Rybakina** is the only player this year to tally wins over World No.1 Swiatek (Stuttgart) and World No.2 Sabalenka (Brisbane)

CAREER MILESTONES

- Won sixth career title at 2023 Birmingham (d. Krejcikova in F) and reached SF at Rome; in doubles achieved R-Up at Doha (w/L.Kichenok)
- At 2022 Dubai, lifted fifth career singles title (d. Kudermetova in F); finished R-Up at Eastbourne (l. Kvitova) and Seoul (l. Alexandrova) as well as SF at St. Petersburg and Doha
- Won two doubles titles in 2022 at Birmingham and Cincinnati (both w/L.Kichenok); qualified for WTA Finals reaching SF Lifted first grass court title at 2021 Eastbourne (as WC, d. Kontaveit in F)
- In 2021, also finished R-Up at Luxembourg (l. Tauson), made SF at Indian Wells (l. Azarenka), reached QF at Rome and represented Latvia at the Tokyo Olympics (l. Vesnina in 1r)
- Won doubles title at 2021 Moscow (w/Siniakova)
- Highlights of 2020 season included three Top 10 wins and reaching QF at Strasbourg
- Finished R-Up in doubles w/Dabrowski at 2020 Doha (l. Hsieh/Strycova)
- 2019 season saw her capture third career title at Luxembourg (d. Goerges in F) right after finishing R-Up at Linz (l. Gauff)
- Also R-Up in mixed doubles at 2019 Wimbledon w/Lindstedt
- 2018 campaign highlighted by finishing R-Up at Miami (l. Stephens); beat No.9 Petra Kvitova and No.4 Elina Svitolina to register multiple Top 10 wins in the same tournament for the first time
- Reached SF at 2018 Wimbledon (l. eventual champion Kerber) to become first Latvian woman to reach final four at All England Club
- Achieved career-high ranking of No.5 on March 19, 2018
- In doubles won title at 2018 Doha (w/Dabrowski)
- Enjoyed career-best season in 2017, finishing the year in the Top 10 for the first time (at No.7); was No.44 at end of 2016 (first Top 50 finish) and No.79 at end of 2015 (first Top 100 finish)
- Champion at 2017 Roland Garros (d. Halep in F) becoming first woman to win first tour-level title at a Grand Slam since Barbara Jordan at 1979 Australian Open. Also became the first unseeded player to lift the trophy in the Open Era and the first Latvian player to reach the championship match at a Grand Slam
- Followed up title run with QF appearance at 2017 Wimbledon; also won title at Seoul (d. Haddad Maia in F) and reached final at Charleston (l. Kasatkina)
- Qualified for debut WTA Finals in 2017 went 1-2 in group stage

- Reached third Grand Slam final and second Wimbledon final in 2023 (l. Vondrousova). Also qualified for WTA Finals for second consecutive year to close out the season.
- In 2022, created history by becoming first African and Arab woman in Open Era to reach a Grand Slam final, finishing R-Up at first Wimbledon (l. Rybakina) and then US Open (l. Swiatek)
- Lifted biggest career title at WTA 1000 Madrid during 2022 clay-court season (d. Pegula in F)
- Broke into Top 10 on October 18, 2021, following SF run at Indian Wells (l. eventual champion Badosa)
- At 2021 Birmingham, became first Arab woman to win a WTA title (d. Kasatkina in F). Followed this with QF at Wimbledon (l. Sabalenka)
- In 2021, also finished R-Up at Charleston [250] (l. Sharma) and Chicago [500] (l. Muguruza)
- Reached maiden Grand Slam QF at 2020
 Australian Open to become the first Arab woman to reach that stage at a major (l. eventual champion Kenin); made Top 50 debut at No.45 after breakthrough performance in Melbourne
- Made further QFs in 2020 at Doha (d. No.3 Ka.Pliskova, l. Kvitova), Lexington (l. Gauff), Western & Southern Open (l. eventual champion Azarenka) and Ostrava (l. Sakkari); posted career-high ranking of No.31 on August 31, 2020
- Season highlights in 2019 were 3r run at US Open and SF appearances at Eastbourne (l. eventual R-Up Kerber) and Tianjin (l. eventual champion Peterson)
- In 2018, defeated No.3 seed Stephens, No.8 seed Kontaveit and No.5 seed Sevastova en route to her first WTA final at 2018 Moscow, where she fell in three sets to No.6 seed Kasatkina. Was first Tunisian woman to advance beyond QF at a WTA tournament (Sfar was the only other Tunisian to reach a QF at this level)
- Scored first Top-10 win over No.7 Cibulkova at 2017 Roland Garros
- Reached maiden WTA QF at 2013 Baku. Also advanced to that stage at 2017 Taipei City and 2018 Bucharest
- Three-time member of Tunisian Olympic Team, first doing so at London games in 2012
- Contested first two WTA main draws in 2012, at Doha (as WC) and Olympics
- On ITF Circuit, has 11 singles and one doubles title
- Played first event of career at 2008 ITF/El Menzah-TUN

- Made Top 10 debut at No.10 on September 11, 2017
- In doubles, won first and second career titles in 2017, at St. Petersburg (w/Rosolska) and Stuttgart (w/Atawo) Breakthrough result of 2016 season was reaching final at Doha launching her into Top 50 at No.40 (l. Suárez Navarro); also in 2016 reached SF at Katowice and QF at Birmingham and Florianopolis ending year at No.44
- Ended 2015 at No.79 for first Top 100 finish (up from No.308 in 2014). Having leapt 229 spots, was second highest year-end rankings jump, after Kasatkina who went from No.370 to No.72 (298 spots)
- Highlights of 2014 were reaching first career WTA final at Quebec City (l. Beck) and 2r at Wimbledon and US Open
- Scored first Top 10 win over No.9 Carla Suárez Navarro in 1r at 2015 Wimbledon
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2014 Tashkent as WC advancing to 2r (l. Pervak)
- Played qualifying at Moscow in 2012
- Member of Latvian Billie Jean King Cup team in 2013-2022
- Began professional career playing ITF in 2012 winning first career title at \$10k/ITF Stockholm, SWE; owns seven career ITF titles

 Became first North African woman to win a junior Slam at 2011 Roland Garros (d. Puig in F), having also reached the final in 2010 (l. Svitolina in F)
