#### Swiatek leads 2-1

**Swiatek** has lost only 8 games in her first three matches this week... **Swiatek** was last year's Madrid runner-up (l. to Sabalenka)... **Swiatek** was defeated in her two most recent matches against Top 20 players (l. No.4 Rybakina at Stuttgart; l. No.16 Alexandrova at Miami)... **Swiatek** is the second player under 23 years old to reach the QF in Madrid twice... Since 2009, when the level was introduced, **Swiatek** has reached 16 quarterfinals at WTA 1000s; only Caroline Wozniacki (18) and Victoria Azarenka (17) have reached more QF at WTA 1000 level before turning 23... With a win, **Swiatek** would reach the SF at a WTA 1000 level for the 15th time in her career, the most by a player younger than 23 years old... The top seed has reached the final four times in Madrid winning the title twice – 2009 (Dinara Safina) and 2013 (Serena Williams)... **Haddad Maia** is facing the reigning WTA World No.1 for the fourth time (all vs. Swiatek), including one win at 2022 Toronto... **Haddad Maia** is through to the QF at a WTA 1000 for the third time; she is seeking her second WTA 1000 semifinal appearance (R-Up at 2022 Rome)... **Haddad Maia** has a career record of 10-11 in QF matches and features in her second QF of 2024 after reaching SF at Abu Dhabi (l. Kasatkina)... This is the first time a player from Brazil has made Madrid QF... With a win today, **Haddad Maia** would equal her best result on clay (also SF at 2023 Roland Garros and 2019 Bogota)

## [18] Madison Keys (USA #20) vs. [8] Ons Jabeur (TUN #9)

**Jabeur leads 2-0**

**Keys** defeated No.3 Gauff in R16 to reach the quarterfinals, the highest ranked opponent she has ever defeated on clay; it was her third career Top 5 win on clay and first since 2016 Rome (d. No.4 Muguruza); also defeated No.5 Li Na at 2013 Madrid... **Keys** is making her 10th tournament appearance and is through to the QF for the first time; she is the 10th American to make it to the QF stage... **Keys** has now reached the QF at eight different WTA 1000 tournaments... This is the first time **Keys** has won three consecutive matches since reaching the semifinal at the US Open last summer... **Jabeur** entered the tournament with a 3-7 record in 2024; by reaching the quarterfinals this week, she is now at 6-7... **Jabeur** is through to her 9th WTA 1000 quarterfinal; this is her third WTA 1000 quarterfinal appearance on clay – R-Up at 2022 Rome and Won 2022 Madrid... **Jabeur** was unable to compete in her Madrid title defense last year due to left calf injury

- After 1r bye has beaten Xiyu Wang, Sorana Cirstea and Sara Sorribes Tormo so far this week to reach QF, with a loss of only 8 games
- Faces No.14 Beatriz Haddad Maia in QF today; owns 62 wins in career over Top 20 players, most recently No.9 Maria Sakkari at Indian Wells 2024
- Was defeated in her two most recent meetings against at Top 20 players; No.4 Rybakina at Stuttgart SF and No.16 Alexandrova at Miami R16
- Owns 2-1 career record against players from Brazil, each time against Haddad Maia and winning the two most recent meetings
- Owns 88-32 career record against seeded players, with a record in 2024 standing at 13-2
- Record in WTA QF matches stands at 29-5 and is undefeated in QF matches so far in 2024
- Seven-time clay court champion: Roland Garros in 2020, 2022 and 2023; Stuttgart in 2022 and 2023; Rome in 2021 and 2022
- Is No. 1 seed this week; has been top seed at 33 tournaments in her career
- Has won eight WTA 1000 titles in her career including two this year at Doha and Indian Wells
- One of three players from Poland to contest the Madrid main draw, along with Magda Linette (lost 2r) and Magdalena Frech (lost 1r)
- Is currently ranked No.1; this time last year was ranked No.1
- Is spending her 100th and 101st week ranked at World No.1 - the 9th most in WTA history
- During last year's European clay swing, won titles at Stuttgart and Roland Garros, finished Runner-Up at Madrid and reached QF at Rome
- Has won 27 matches so far in 2024 and is ranked No.2 on tour for match-wins, trailing only Elena Rybakina

## CAREER MILESTONES

- Won six titles across 2023, including winning fourth Grand Slam title at Roland-Garros (d. Muchova in F) and going undefeated at the WTA Finals in Cancun (d. Pegula in F). Finished season as WTA World No.1 player for second consecutive year.
- In 2022, lifted second and third Grand Slam titles, at Roland-Garros (d. Gauff in F) and US Open (d. Jabeur in F)
- Triumph in Paris was the last of six straight titles during 37-match winning streak - joint-longest unbeaten run on Tour since 1990
- Won two titles in 2021, at Adelaide and Rome. Other highlights included QF at Roland-Garros and SF at Ostrava and qualifying for WTA Finals Guadalajara (fell in group stage)
- Also finished doubles R-Up at 2021 Roland-Garros (w/Mattek-Sands, L. Krejckova/Siniakova)
- Won her maiden Tour-level title at 2020 Roland-Garros without dropping a set, becoming the first player from Poland - man or woman - to win a Grand Slam singles title and first from her country to reach a major final since A.Radwanska at 2012 Wimbledon
- Ranked No.54, she became the lowest-ranked woman to win the Roland-Garros title in the Open Era and the lowest-ranked finalist since 1977 (No.56 Mihai). At 19y 132d, is the youngest champion in Paris since Monica Seles (18y 187d) in 1992
- Also became the first player to win her debut Tour-level title at a Grand Slam since Jelena Ostapenko at 2017 Roland-Garros
- Won WTA Most Improved Player of the Year for 2020, as voted on by members of the media. Also won the 2020 WTA Fan Favorite Award
- Ended 2019 season ranked No.61 after a campaign highlighted by R-Up finish at Lugano (l. Hercog) and R16 run at Roland-Garros (l. Halep). That year also reached 3r at Toronto (l. Osaka) and made 2r five times (incl. Australian and US Open)
- Broke into Top 100 at No.88 after R-Up finish at 2019 Lugano
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2019 Auckland
- Ended 2018 season ranked No.175 (up from No.690 in 2017), after posting 42-6 record and winning four titles on ITF Circuit
- Member of Poland's Billie Jean King Cup team, 2018-20, 2021-22
- On professional debut, came through qualifying to win title at \$10k ITF/Stockholm-SWE in 2016; owns seven singles titles at this level
- Broke into Top 10 in June 2023 after a strong clay season with SF at Roland Garros and QF at Rome and Stuttgart; ended year at No.11
- Also in 2023, won third career title at WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai (d. Q.Zheng) and reached SF at Abu Dhabi and QF at Adelaide 2, Doha and San Diego
- In doubles, won titles at Madrid w/Victoria Azarenka (d. Gauff/Pegula) and WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai w/Veronika Kudermetova (d. Kato/Sutjiadi)
- 2022 season highlighted by a stellar sequence of results on grass, when she became the first woman ever to win Nottingham and Birmingham back-to-back, her first career WTA titles
- Broke into the Top 20 following her run to the first WTA 1000 final at 2022 Toronto (l. Halep); also in 2022 advanced to SF at Monterrey and Eastbourne and three further QFs
- Also in 2022, won two titles at WTA 125K events in Saint Malo and Paris
- Won third doubles title at 2022 Nottingham w/Shuai Zhang (d. Dolehide/Niculescu), also reached final at Australian Open w/Anhelina Danilina (Krejckova/Siniakova) and Guadalajara 1000 w/Danilina (l. Hunter/Stefani); earned spot at WTA Finals Fort Worth in doubles with Danilina going 1-2 in group play
- In 2021, peaked at No.80 in rankings; highlights where R16 at Indian Wells and falling 1r at Chicago 500; also played qualifying at Wimbledon and US Open and won five ITF Circuit titles in 2021
- Posted best win-by-ranking of career in 2021, defeating No.3 Karolina Pliskova during run to R16 as LL at Indian Wells. Played only on ITF Circuit in 2020 winning four titles and reaching one other final
- Highlights of 2019 were SF at Bogota and QF at Acapulco (both as qualifier); earned first Top 10 win of career over No.4 Sloane Stephens at Acapulco
- Ended 2018 at No.184, with season highlight reaching 3r at Miami (l. Ostapenko). Also made 2r at Hobart, Australian Open and Acapulco.
- Posted first Top 100 season in 2017, finishing at No.65
- Broke into Top 100 following first Grand Slam main draw appearance at 2017 Roland Garros, earning spot as a qualifier Reached first WTA singles final at 2017 Seoul while ranked No.71 (l. No.10 Ostapenko)
- Other 2017 highlights include QF at Prague (as qualifier) and first Grand Slam main draw win at

- Enjoyed stellar junior career, including winning girls' singles at 2018 Wimbledon (d. Küng in F) and leading Poland to Junior Fed Cup in 2016

- Wimbledon; defeated No.19 Sam Stosur en route to Prague QF, the first Top 20 win of career
- In doubles, won second title at Bogota w/Nadia Podoroska (d. Cepede Royg/Linette)
- Played three WTA main draws in 2016 at Rio de Janeiro, Miami and Florianopolis falling in 1r in each appearance; also played qualifying at Roland Garros and US Open
- In 2015, reached first QF of career at Rio de Janeiro while ranked No.234 losing to No.16 Sara Errani, the first Top 20 match of career; result propelled her into Top 200 for first time in career
- Also in 2015, reached 2r at Bogota and played qualifying at Charleston, Roland Garros, Nottingham and Wimbledon
- Won first WTA doubles title at 2015 Bogota w/Paula Cristina Goncalves (d. Falconi/Rogers)
- In July 2015, suffered a shoulder injury at the Pan American Games in Toronto, was forced to have surgery and miss remainder of season
- Played two WTA events in 2014 at Rio de Janeiro and Florianopolis; falling in 1r at both events as a WC
- Won first WTA match at 2013 Florianopolis as WC (d. Hsu, I. Czink)
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2012 Québec City (I. El Tabakh)
- Owns 17 ITF Circuit singles titles; made professional debut on ITF circuit in 2010

## OTHER INFORMATION

- Coached by Tomasz Wiktorowski. previously worked with Piotr Sierzputowski
- Father is former Olympic rower Tomasz Swiatek, who competed in the men's quadruple sculls event at the 1988 Summer Olympics in Seoul
- In summer 2022 organised 'Iga Swiatek and friends for Ukraine' event in Krakow, which featured a mixed doubles match between Agnieszka Radwanska, Sergiy Stakhovsky, Polish junior Martyn Pawelski and herself, and was attended by Poland's First Lady, Agata Kornhauser-Duda, Elina Svitolina and Andriy Shevchenko. The occasion was watched by almost 15,000 people live and a further one million on television, raising more than half a million Euros for Ukrainian children and teenagers affected by the war
- Started playing tennis because her older sister was playing and wanted to beat her
- Enjoys rock music, including AC/DC and Pink Floyd
- Includes PZU, On, Tecnifibre, Rolex and Xiaomi in her endorsement portfolio
