Swiatek leads 6-3

- This is the tenth match between Swiatek and Sabalenka, with all matches occurring since 2021; neither player has faced another opponent on more occasions (Swiatek also faced Gauff ten times: Sabalenka also faced Sakkari ten times)
- The final is a repeat of Madrid 2023 when Sabalenka defeated Swiatek to lift the title; that was their most recent match-up on clay with Swiatek leading their overall head-to-heads on clay 3-1
- Defending champion Sabalenka also won the Madrid title in 2021 and is bidding to become the second three-time Madrid champion after Petra Kvitova (2011, 2015, and 2018)
- Sabalenka is playing in her 7th WTA 1000 final (5 titles, 1 runner-up) while Swiatek is playing in her 11th WTA 1000 final (8 titles, 2 runner-up)
- Swiatek won her last seven finals: the last time she lost at this stage was in Madrid last year against Sabalenka
- Swiatek (37.9%, 11/29) has surpassed Serena Williams (36.7%, 18/49) for the highest percentage of finals reached from WTA 1000 main draws entered, since the format's introduction in 2009
- Swiatek has become the first player born this century to reach 10 WTA finals on clay
- Swiatek has dropped just 20 games in Madrid to reach the final
- Sabalenka has dropped 60 games to reach the Madrid final, the most games dropped to reach the women's singles final of this event since its inception
- At 22 years old, Swiatek could become the youngest player to secure 20 WTA titles since Caroline Wozniacki in 2012



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- Sabalenka has defeated the World No.1 in both of her previous Madrid finals (Barty in 2021, Swiatek in 2023)
- Sabalenka is the third player after Serena Williams and Simona Halep to win 11 consecutive matches at the Madrid Open
- Sabalenka has won 17 of her first 20 matches at the Madrid Open, only Serena Williams with 18 wins has won more from her first 20 matches at this tournament
- Sabalenka is playing her 46th WTA 1000 event; she is a five-time WTA 1000 titlist (Madrid 2021 and 2023, Wuhan 2018 and 2019, Doha 2020)
- Swiatek and Sabalenka face each other in the final of back to-back editions of the same WTA 1000 tournament for the second time since the format was introduced after Elina Svitolina and Simona Halep at Rome 2017-18
- In the last 40 years, only Martina Navratilova and Chris Evert faced each other more often as World No.1 and No.2 on clay court than Iga Swiatek and Aryna Sabalenka (three in the final)

NO.1 vs. NO.2 SEEDS

This is the fifth singles final this year that will feature the No.1 seed vs. the No.2 seed – also Auckland, Brisbane, Hobart and Linz. Last year there were five finals featuring the Top 2 seeds throughout the entire season.

Since the WTA 1000 level was introduced, the No.1 seed has faced the No.2 seed in the championship match 10 times, including 2024 Madrid. This is the third time it has happened in Madrid (also 2013 and 2023)

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NO.1 SEEDS IN MADRID

The top seed has reached the final six times in Madrid winning the title twice – 2009 (Dinara Safina) and 2013 (Serena Williams). Iga Swiatek has won two of the last four WTA 1000 titles – both as the No.1 seed. At WTA 1000 tournaments the No.1 seed has won the title in 3 of last 22 editions.

- Nine different players have won the singles title at Madrid.
- Simona Halep (2016-17), Petra Kvitova (2011, 2015, 2018), Aryna Sabalenka (2021, 2023) and Serena Williams (2012-13) have each won multiple Madrid titles.



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- The title has been won twice by the current WTA No.1 (Dinara Safina in 2009 and Serena Williams in 2013).
- The final has featured the Top 2 seeds twice – in 2013 No.1 seed Serena Williams defeated No.2 seed Maria Sharapova and in 2023 No.2 seed Sabalenka defeated No.1 seed Swiatek

- Making third appearance at Madrid, where her best result was reaching the final in 2023 (l. to her opponent today, Sabalenka)
- Has beaten Xiyu Wang, Sorana Cirstea, Sara Sorribes Tormo, Beatriz Haddad Maia and Madison Keys so far this week to reach her fourth final of 2024 (won Doha and Indian Wells; lost at the United Cup final)
- Faces No.2 Aryna Sabalenka in final today; owns 36 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.9 Maria Sakkari at Indian Wells 2024
- Her tenth meeting with Sabalenka, equals her most meetings with any opponent (also played ten matches against Gauff)
- Was defeated in her most recent Top 10 match-up in the SF at Stuttgart against eventual champion No.4 Rybakina
- Owns 88-32 career record against seeds, with a record in 2024 standing at 15-2
- Record in WTA final matches stands at 19-5 (including United Cup)
- This is her 11th WTA 1000 final (8 titles, 2 R-Up)
- Has won seven clay court titles: Roland Garros in 2023, 2022, 2020; Stuttgart in 2023 and 2022; Rome in 2022 and 2021
- Madrid is the only major clay tournament (Slam or 1000) Swiatek has never won; has won Roland Garros thrice and Rome twice
- Is No. 1 seed this week; has been top seed at 33 tournaments in her career
- Best result by Poland at Madrid was Runner-Up run by herself in 2023
- Is currently ranked No.1; this time last year was ranked No.1. This week reached 101 weeks at the No.1 ranking
- During last year's European clay swing she won Roland Garros and Stuttgart, reached runner-up at Madrid, and QF at Rome
- Has won 29 matches so far in 2024; she is ranked No.2 on tour for match wins, behind Elena Rybakina (30)

- Making sixth appearance at Madrid, where she is a two-time champion (2023 - d. Swiatek in final; 2021 - d. Barty in final)
- Has beaten Magda Linette, Robin Montgomery, Danielle Collins, Mirra Andreeva and Elena Rybakina so far this week to reach her third final of 2024 and her first since she won the Australian Open (d. Zheng in final)
- Faces No.1 Iga Swiatek in the final today, a rematch of last year's final; owns 31 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.4 Elena Rybakina in the previous round
- Has beaten Swiatek three times in her career and always in 3 sets
- Her tenth meeting with Swiatek, equals her most meetings with any opponent (also played ten matches against Sakkari)
- Owns 8-6 career record against players from Poland, with record in 2024 standing at 1-0 (d. Linette in her opening Madrid match)
- Owns 88-54 career record against seeds, with a record in 2024 standing at 9-4
- Record in WTA final matches stands at 14-12; record in WTA 1000-level final matches stands at 5-1
- Her two titles at Madrid in 2023 and 2021 are her only two titles on clay surface
- Saved her World No.2 ranking by reaching the final at Madrid
- During last year's European clay swing she won Madrid and reached final at Stuttgart, SF at Roland Garros, and 2r at Rome
- Has won 20 matches so far in 2024
- Dropped 60 games en route to the Madrid final, the most games ever dropped by a finalist
- Will celebrate her 26th birthday on Sunday

CAREER MILESTONES

- Won six titles across 2023, including winning fourth Grand Slam title at Roland-Garros (d. Muchova in F) and going undefeated at the WTA Finals in Cancun (d. Pegula in F). Finished season as WTA World No.1 player for second consecutive year.
- In 2022, lifted second and third Grand Slam titles, at Roland-Garros (d. Gauff in F) and US Open (d. Jabeur in F)
- Triumph in Paris was the last of six straight titles during 37-match winning streak - joint-longest unbeaten run on Tour since 1990
- Won two titles in 2021, at Adelaide and Rome. Other highlights included QF at Roland-Garros and SF at Ostrava and qualifying for WTA Finals Guadalajara (fell in group stage)
- Also finished doubles R-Up at 2021 Roland-Garros (w/Mattek-Sands, I. Krejčíková/Siniakova)
- Won her maiden Tour-level title at 2020 Roland-Garros without dropping a set, becoming the first player from Poland - man or woman - to win a Grand Slam singles title and first from her country to reach a major final since A.Radwanska at 2012 Wimbledon
- Ranked No.54, she became the lowest-ranked woman to win the Roland-Garros title in the Open Era and the lowest-ranked finalist since 1977 (No.56 Mihai). At 19y 132d, is the youngest champion in Paris since Monica Seles (18y 187d) in 1992
- Also became the first player to win her debut Tour-level title at a Grand Slam since Jelena Ostapenko at 2017 Roland-Garros
- Won WTA Most Improved Player of the Year for 2020, as voted on by members of the media. Also won the 2020 WTA Fan Favorite Award
- Ended 2019 season ranked No.61 after a campaign highlighted by R-Up finish at Lugano (I. Hercog) and R16 run at Roland-Garros (I. Halep). That year also reached 3r at Toronto (I. Osaka) and made 2r five times (incl. Australian and US Open)
- Broke into Top 100 at No.88 after R-Up finish at 2019 Lugano
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2019 Auckland
- Ended 2018 season ranked No.175 (up from No.690 in 2017), after posting 42-6 record and winning four titles on ITF Circuit
- Member of Poland's Billie Jean King Cup team, 2018-20, 2021-22
- On professional debut, came through qualifying to win title at \$10k ITF/Stockholm-SWE in 2016; owns seven singles titles at this level
- Outstanding 2023 saw her win debut Grand Slam title at Australian Open (d. Rybakina in F), reach second Major final at US Open (I. Gauff in F) and become the WTA World No.1 player for the first time in career (after US Open). In addition won titles at Adelaide and Madrid.
- Highlight of 2022 season was R-Up finish at WTA Finals in Fort Worth (I. Garcia in F); upset No.1 Swiatek, No.2 Jabeur and No.3 Pegula en route to final - only the fourth woman in history to beat the No.1, No.2 and No.3 at the same tournament
- Lifted two titles during 2021 campaign, at Abu Dhabi and Madrid, while was R-Up at Stuttgart. Also reached a further three SFs, including at Wimbledon and US Open
- Rose to career-high No.2 in rankings on August 23, 2021
- In doubles, lifted second major at 2021 Australian Open (w/Mertens, d. Krejčíková/Siniakova in F)
- Won final nine matches of 2020 to end the year with back-to-back titles - at Ostrava (d. Azarenka in F) and Linz (d. Mertens in F) - and ranked at No.10
- Having also taken home the silverware at Doha (d. Kvitová in F), was one of two players (also Halep) to lift three singles titles during disrupted 2020 season
- Ended as World No.11 for the second straight year in 2019 after capturing three WTA singles titles at Shenzhen (d. Riske in F), Wuhan (d. Riske in F) and Zhuhai (d. Bertens in F)
- Made Top-10 debut on January 28, 2019 following 3r run at 2019 Australian Open
- Ended 2019 at No.2 in WTA doubles rankings after capturing first Grand Slam doubles trophy at US Open (w/Mertens, d. Azarenka/Barty in F). Earlier in the season, the pair claimed the 'Sunshine Double' by winning back-to-back titles at Indian Wells (d. Krejčíková/Siniakova in F) and Miami (d. Stosur/ Zhang in F)
- Qualified for WTA Finals Shenzhen in doubles (w/Mertens), going 1-2 in the round-robin stage
- Enjoyed breakthrough season in 2018, lifting two titles, at New Haven (d. Suárez Navarro in F) and Wuhan (d. Kontaveit in F), winning 46 matches and finishing at No.11 in the rankings
- Also in 2018, was R-Up at Lugano (I. Mertens) and Eastbourne (I. Wozniacki), made SF at Cincinnati, reached five QFs and produced a career-best Grand Slam run to R16 at US Open
- Entered Top 50 on April 16, 2018, after Lugano run, and Top 20 on August 27 of the same year,

- Enjoyed stellar junior career, including winning girls' singles at 2018 Wimbledon (d. Küng in F) and leading Poland to Junior Fed Cup in 2016

- Lifted first three ITF Circuit titles in 2015, including a 13-match win streak towards the year's end, bringing back-to-back trophies in Antalya, Turkey
- Made debut on ITF Circuit in Minsk in 2012
