### Putintseva leads 2-0

This will be the first meeting between two players representing Kazakhstan in the quarterfinals or beyond at a WTA 1000; 2024 Miami was just the first time two players from Kazakhstan have reached the final eight... **Putintseva** won their only two previous matches at 2020 Rome and 2021 Indian Wells... **Rybakina** looking to reach sixth semifinal of the year; has gone on to reach the final each time she's advanced to the final four this season... **Putintseva** looking to reach first semifinal of the year and first at a WTA 1000 event in career... **Rybakina** leads the Tour with 29 match wins

#### Mirra Andreeva (#43) vs. [2] Aryna Sabalenka (#2)

**Sabalenka** beat a then-ranked No.194 Andreeva en route to the title when the two met here last year in the Round of 16... **Andreeva** is 2-0 against Top 10 players this year including a win over No.7 Marketa Vondrousova this fortnight... **Sabalenka** has not lost to a player outside the Top 40 since falling to No.43 Karolina Muchova at 2023 Roland Garros; since then has gone 18-0 against players ranked outside the Top 40... **Andreeva** celebrated her 17<sup>th</sup> birthday on Monday (April 29); she is the youngest player to reach the quarterfinals at Madrid... At 17 years, 6 days (at end of tournament), she is the second youngest player to reach a WTA 1000 quarterfinal (behind only Coco Gauff, 2021 Dubai, QF); with a win, **Andreeva** would be the youngest ever to reach a WTA 1000 semifinal



- Has defeated Yue Yuan, No.6 seed Qinwen Zheng (via ret.), Caroline Dolehide and No.10 seed Daria Kasatkina this year to reach second WTA 1000 QF the season (also Miami)
- Faces countrywoman and World No.4 Elena Rybakina in QF today; owns 11 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.8 Qinwen Zheng in 2r here
- Win over Q.Zheng, snapped a seven-match losing streak against Top 10 players; last completed win against a Top 10 player was over No.3 Paula Badosa at 2022 Toronto
- A win today would be first win over a World No.4 having beaten a No.1 (Naomi Osaka, 2019 Birmingham), No.2 (Naomi Osaka, 2019 Wimbledon), No.3 (Paula Badosa, 2022 Toronto) and No.5 (Dominika Cibulkova, 2017 St. Petersburg; Sloane Stephens, 2019 Sydney)
- Owns 3-1 career record against players from Kazakhstan
- Record in WTA QF matches stands at 12-27; looking to reach first SF of the year and first at a WTA 1000
- Owns two clay titles: 2021 Budapest and 2019 Nurnberg
- Second consecutive WTA 1000 event (also Miami) with two women into the QF stage
- Previous best result by a Kazakhstan woman at Madrid was R16 run by Elena Rybakina in 2022, Yulia Putintseva in 2019, Yaroslava Shvedova in 2013
- Is currently ranked No.50; this time last year was ranked No.51. Reached career high ranking of No.27 on Feb.06, 2017
- During last year's spring clay swing reached 2r at both Madrid and Rome and 3r at Roland Garros

- Has two losses to players outside the Top 40 this year to No.57 Anna Blinkova at Australian Open and No.53 Danielle Collins in the Miami final

## **CAREER MILESTONES**

- 2023 saw Putintseva reach SF at Guangzhou (l. Linette) and QF at Rabat (l. Riera) and Hobart (l. Blinkova)
- Reached two SFs in 2022, at Istanbul (l. eventual champion Potapova) and Budapest (l. Krunic), while made QF at Toronto (l. Pegula)
- Highlight of 2021 campaign was lifting second career title, at Budapest (d. Kalinina in F)
- Also last season was R-Up at Nur-Sultan (l. Van Uytvanck), advanced to SF at Portoroz and made QFs at Charleston [500], Strasbourg and San Jose
- Recorded 300th career win (at all levels) with 1r triumph over Flipkens at 2020 Roland Garros
- Standout results of 2020 were QF runs at US Open (l. Brady) - first Kazakh woman to reach last eight in New York - and Rome (l. Halep)
- Owns one win over a reigning World No.1, upsetting Osaka on grass at 2019 Birmingham
- Won first career title at 2019 Nürnberg (d. Zidansek in F); afterwards rose to No.28 in rankings - one spot off career best No.27 (achieved February 6, 2017)
- Best result of 2018 was QF run at Roland Garros (l. Keys)
- Reached maiden WTA final in 2017 at St Petersburg (l. Mladenovic) after notching two Top 10 wins over No.8 Kuznetsova and No.5 Cibulkova - first over a Top 5 player - (l. Mladenovic in F); first woman from Kazakhstan to reach a WTA final since Shvedova at 2015 Bogotá (l. Pereira)
- Rose to new career-high ranking of No.27 on February 6, 2017 following St Petersburg
- In 2016 became first Kazakh to reach the quarterfinals at Roland Garros - or at any major
   since Shvedova in 2012, eventually losing to S.Williams in 3s
- Defeated No.14 V.Williams en route to first Premier-level quarterfinal of career at 2016 Charleston
- First Top 10 win came over No.10 Petkovic at 2015 Nürnberg (via ret.)
- Progressed to maiden WTA SF at 2015 Bastad (l. eventual champion Larsson)
- In 2014, reached first two WTA QFs, first on clay at Bastad (as qualifier, l. Cepelova) and then on hard at Osaka (l. eventual champion Stosur). Between these two results, scored first Top 20 win - over No.14 Pennetta - during run through qualifying to 2r at Montréal
- Made it through to 2r on Grand Slam main draw debut at 2013 Australian Open (d. McHale, l. Suárez Navarro)

- Reached second Grand Slam final at 2023 Australian Open (l. Sabalenka in 3s); made Top-10 debut following tournament (January 30, 2023). Also in 2023 won first two WTA 1000 title at Indian Wells and Rome and finished R-Up at Miami. Qualified for first WTA Finals, going 1-2 in Group Stage.
- Lifted maiden major at 2022 Wimbledon (d. Jabeur in F)
- In 2022 also finished R-Up at Adelaide (l. Barty) and Portoroz (l. Siniakova)
- Best result of 2021 were SFs at Eastbourne, Olympics and Chicago [500], and QFs at Abu Dhabi, Roland Garros, San Jose and Ostrava
- Opened 2020 season by reaching the championship match at four of her first five tournaments, including a title run at Hobart (d. Zhang in F)
- Made first final appearance at a Premier-level tournament with R-Up finish at St. Petersburg (l. Bertens); was rewarded with Top 20 debut at No.19 following run in Russia (February 17, 2020)
- First win over a Top-5 ranked opponent came over No.3 Ka.Pliskova during R-Up finish at 2020 Dubai
- Won back-to-back Slam matches for the first time during 3r showing at 2020 Australian Open (l. Barty)
- Won maiden WTA singles title at 2019 Bucharest (d. Tig in F), breaking into Top 100 for the first time in the following week's rankings at No.65 (July 22, 2019)
- Also in 2019, went on to make Top 50 debut on September 16, 2019, after reaching second career final at Nanchang (l. Peterson), produced SF appearances at Luxembourg and 's-Hertogenbosch, and made Grand Slam main draw debut at 2019 Roland Garros, falling 1r (as qualifier, l. Siniakova)
- Finished 2019 campaign with 57-21 win-loss record (across all levels) to end season at No.37, up from 2018's final ranking of No.191. On the ITF Circuit in 2019, lifted silverware on three occasions: back-to-back at \$25k Moscow-RUS and \$25k Kazan-RUS, and at \$60k ITF/Launceston-AUS
- Highlights of 2018 included reaching maiden WTA QF at St. Petersburg (l. Goerges) and clinching title at \$15k ITF/Kazan-RUS
- First Top 10 win came over No.7 Garcia at 2018 St. Petersburg
- Made WTA qualifying and main draw debut at 2017 Moscow (as qualifier, l. Begu in 1r)

- Advanced to 2r on WTA main draw debut at 2012 Copenhagen (as WC, d. Barbat, l. Jankovic)
- On ITF Circuit, winner of six singles titles and six doubles titles
- Kazakhstan Billie Jean King Cup Team, 2014-19, 2021-22
- Professional debut at 2009 Luxembourg ended with defeat to Flipkens in final round of qualifying
- Professional debut came at \$10k ITF/Antalya-TUR in 2014


