Swiatek leads 2-1

Swiatek won their first two meetings, including their only prior clay-court clash at 2021 Rome... **Keys** beat **Swiatek** for the first time at 2022 Cincinnati, which was also Keys' first win over a reigning World No.1 in six attempts... **Swiatek** is aiming to make the Madrid final for the second straight year (finished as 2023 runner-up to Sabalenka)... **Swiatek** has reached the 15th WTA 1000 semifinal of her career this week, the most by a player younger than 23 years old... **Swiatek** is 41-7 against Americans in her career (4-0 this year)... **Keys'** previous career-best Madrid result was the 2016 Round of 16, and she went 0-5 at Madrid between 2016 and this year... **Keys** is seeking her 29th career Top 10 win and her third of this fortnight (defeated Coco Gauff and Ons Jabeur in her last two rounds)... **Keys** snapped 2022 champion Jabeur's nine-match Madrid winning streak in the quarterfinals... **Keys** could become the fourth American player to reach the Madrid final after Venus Williams, Serena Williams and Jessica Pegula

[4] Elena Rybakina (KAZ #4) vs. [2] Aryna Sabalenka (#2)

Sabalenka leads 5-3

Sabalenka has won five of their eight previous meetings, with Rybakina claiming most recent meeting at 2024 Brisbane; this is their first meeting on clay... Rybakina looking to reach sixth final of the year; also doing so at Brisbane, Abu Dhabi, Doha, Miami, and Stuttgart... Rybakina has now claimed 16 consecutive victories on clay, with last loss coming 2r of Madrid last year... Rybakina leads the Tour with 30 match wins ... First time a player from Kazakhstan has reached the Madrid SF... Defending champion Sabalenka is bidding to become second three-time Madrid champion after Petra Kvitova (2011, 2015, and 2018)... Sabalenka is playing her 46th WTA 1000 event; she is a five-time WTA 1000 titlist (Madrid 2021 and 2023, Wuhan 2018 and 2019, Doha 2020)... Sabalenka has the most forehand winners (81) and most aces (24) so far at Madrid 2024; Rybakina has the most aces of the 2024 season so far with 214 (Sabalenka has 127)

- Making third appearance at Madrid, where her previous and best result was reaching the final in 2023 (l. Sabalenka)
- After 1r bye, defeated Wang Xiyu, No.27 seed Sorana Cirstea, Sara Sorribes Tormo and No.11 seed Beatriz Haddad Maia so far this fortnight to make her 5th SF of the year
- Faces No.20 Madison Keys in SF today; owns 63 wins in career over Top 20 players, most recently No.14 Beatriz Haddad Maia in Tuesday's OF
- Owns 41-7 career record against players from the United States (4-0 in 2024)
- Record in WTA SF matches stands at 22-8
- Is a seven-time clay-court titlist: Roland Garros in 2020, 2022 and 2023; Stuttgart in 2022 and 2023; Rome in 2021 and 2022
- Is No. 1 seed this week; has been top seed at 33 tournaments in her career
- One of three players from Poland to contest the Madrid main draw, along with Magda Linette (lost 2r) and Magdalena Frech (lost 1r)
- Spending her 101st week ranked at World No.1 the 9th most in WTA history
- During last year's European clay swing, won titles at Stuttgart and Roland Garros, finished runner-up at Madrid and reached QF at Rome
- Has won 28 matches so far in 2024; she is ranked No.2 on tour for match-wins this year, trailing only Elena Rybakina
- Leads the tour this year in percentage of second-serve points won, percentage of overall service points won, percentage of service games won, and percentage of break points saved
- Playing in her 29th WTA 1000 event; has won eight WTA 1000 titles in her career, including two this year at Doha and Indian Wells
- Only Serena Williams (13), Victoria Azarenka (10), Petra Kvitova (9) and Simona Halep (9) have won more WTA 1000 titles
- Reached the 15th WTA 1000 SF of her career this week, the most by a player younger than 23 years old

- Making 10th appearance at Madrid, reaching the SF of the tournament for the first time
- Before this year, her career-best showing at Madrid was the 2016 Round of 16 (then went 0-5 at Madrid between 2016 and this year)
- After 1r bye, defeated last year's quarterfinalist Irina-Camelia Begu, No.15 seed Liudmila Samsonova, No.3 seed Coco Gauff and No.8 seed Ons Jabeur this fortnight, reaching her first SF since the 2023 US Open
- Notched her first three Top 20 wins of the year during this event; also snapped Jabeur's ninematch Madrid winning streak (Jabeur won the title in 2022 but missed the event last year due to injury)
- Faces No.1 Iga Swiatek in SF today; owns 28
 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently
 No.3 Coco Gauff and No.9 Ons Jabeur in her last
 two rounds in Madrid
- Seeking her 2nd career win over a reigning World No.1; she lost in her first five meetings with No.1 players before beating No.1 Swiatek in the 2022 Cincinnati R16
- Owns 7-7 career record against players from Poland; this will be her first match against a Polish player in 2024
- Record in WTA SF matches stands at 12-12
- 1 of her 7 career titles has come on clay (2019 Charleston); also reached a WTA 1000 final on clay at 2016 Rome (l. Serena Williams)
- Only woman from the United States to reach this week's quarterfinals and beyond
- Only one American has won the Madrid title: Serena Williams in 2012 and 2013
- Is currently ranked No.20; this time last year was ranked No.21; by reaching the SF is projected to climb to No.16 and could move to No.14 as R-Up and No.12 with title
- During last year's European clay swing, reached Rome 4r and Roland Garros 2r
- Playing in her 76th WTA 1000 event and has won one WTA 1000 title (2019 Cincinnati)

CAREER MILESTONES

- Won six titles across 2023, including winning fourth Grand Slam title at Roland-Garros (d. Muchova in F) and going undefeated at the WTA Finals in Cancun (d. Pegula in F). Finished season as WTA World No.1 player for second consecutive year.
- In 2022, lifted second and third Grand Slam titles, at Roland-Garros (d. Gauff in F) and US Open (d. Jabeur in F)
- Triumph in Paris was the last of six straight titles during 37-match winning streak - jointlongest unbeaten run on Tour since 1990
- Won two titles in 2021, at Adelaide and Rome.
 Other highlights included QF at Roland-Garros and SF at Ostrava and qualifying for WTA Finals Guadalajara (fell in group stage)
- Also finished doubles R-Up at 2021 Roland-Garros (w/Mattek-Sands, l. Krejcikova/Siniakova)
- Won her maiden Tour-level title at 2020 Roland-Garros without dropping a set, becoming the first player from Poland man or woman to win a Grand Slam singles title and first from her country to reach a major final since A.Radwanska at 2012 Wimbledon
- Ranked No.54, she became the lowest-ranked woman to win the Roland-Garros title in the Open Era and the lowest-ranked finalist since 1977 (No.56 Mihai). At 19y 132d, is the youngest champion in Paris since Monica Seles (18y 187d) in 1992
- Also became the first player to win her debut Tour-level title at a Grand Slam since Jelena Ostapenko at 2017 Roland-Garros
- Won WTA Most Improved Player of the Year for 2020, as voted on by members of the media. Also won the 2020 WTA Fan Favorite Award
- Ended 2019 season ranked No.61 after a campaign highlighted by R-Up finish at Lugano (l. Hercog) and R16 run at Roland-Garros (l. Halep). That year also reached 3r at Toronto (l. Osaka) and made 2r five times (incl. Australian and US Open)
- Broke into Top 100 at No.88 after R-Up finish at 2019 Lugano
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2019 Auckland
- Ended 2018 season ranked No.175 (up from No.690 in 2017), after posting 42-6 record and winning four titles on ITF Circuit
- Member of Poland's Billie Jean King Cup team, 2018-20, 2021-22
- On professional debut, came through qualifying to win title at \$10k ITF/Stockholm-SWE in 2016; owns seven singles titles at this level

- In 2023, won seventh career title at Eastbourne (d. Kasatkina in F), reached SF at US Open and reached four QFs including Wimbledon; also qualified for WTA Elite Trophy in Zhuhai (0-2 in group play)
- At 2022 Adelaide, won first title in over two years (d. Riske in F), followed by SF run at Australian Open - best Slam showing since 2018
- Other highlights in 2022 were SF at Cincinnati and two further QF runs, including at Indian Wells
- In Grand Slam play, 2021 season was highlighted by R16 run at Wimbledon (l. Golubic). Finished campaign inside Top 100 for ninth successive year, but outside Top 20 for first time since 2014
- Ended 2020 ranked No.16, with best result being R-Up finish at Brisbane (l. Ka. Pliskova)
- Lifted biggest title of career during 2019 season at WTA 1000 Cincinnati (d. Kuznetsova in F); afterwards returned to Top 10 for first time since week of June 25, 2018
- Also won title at Charleston (d. Wozniacki) and reached QF at 2019 Roland Garros (l. Barty), one of three Americans to make last eight (also Anisimova and Stephens) - the first time since 2004 (Capriati, S.Williams and V.Williams) Reached three SFs in 2018 at Charleston, Roland Garros and US Open
- Reached first Grand Slam final in 2017 at US Open, losing to Sloane Stephens in 10th all-American final in the Open Era. At 22, became the youngest Flushing Meadows finalist since 19-year-old Caroline Wozniacki lost to Kim Clijsters in 2009 Also in 2017, won third WTA title at Stanford (d. Vandeweghe)
- Enjoyed first Top-10 year-end finish in 2016 (at No.8), was youngest player in Top 20; won second title at Birmingham (d. Strycova) and reached final at Rome (l. S.Williams) and Montreal (l. Halep)
- Broke into Top 10 on June 20 as first American to make Top-10 debut since S.Williams in 1999
- Made WTA Finals debut at Singapore in 2016, going 1-2 in round-robin play
- Represented USA at 2016 Rio Olympics, reaching SF (l. Bronze medal match to Petra Kvitova)
- Qualified for WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai in 2015, 2018-19; went 1-1 in round-robin stage on all three appearances, with best result SF run in 2018 (withdrew before match vs. Muguruza w/left knee injury)
- Advanced to maiden major SF at 2015 Australian Open (l. eventual champion S.Williams); broke

- Enjoyed stellar junior career, including winning girls' singles at 2018 Wimbledon (d. Küng in F) and leading Poland to Junior Fed Cup in 2016
- into Top 20 following conclusion of tournament, on February 2
- Also in 2015, reached second career title at Charleston (l. Kerber) and reached QF at Wimbledon
- Won first career title at 2014 Eastbourne (d. No.9 Kerber in F); was second-youngest player to win a WTA title in 2014, (after Vekic at Kuala Lumpur); also, youngest American to win a title since Vania King in October 2006 (17y 254d at Bangkok)
- Broke into Top 100 at beginning of 2013 season and finished the year No.39; highlights were SF at Osaka, QFs at Sydney, Charleston and Birmingham and 3r at Australian Open and Wimbledon
- Earned first Top 20 win over No.17 Lucie Safarova while ranked No.135 at 2013 Sydney; then earned first Top 10 win over No.5 Na Li as LL at Madrid
- In 2012, reached 2r at Miami and played main draw at Australian Open, Memphis and Cincinnati; also won two titles on ITF circuit
- Earned first Grand Slam win at 2011 US Open (d. Craybas, l. Safarova in 2r), also played main draw at Miami and contested qualifying at Indian Wells
- Won first title on ITF circuit at 2010 \$10k/ITF Cleveland, OH, USA; also contested qualifying at US Open in 2010 Member of USA's Billie Jean King Cup team in 2014, 2016, 2018-19, 2022
- Made professional debut in 2009 and Tour-level debut at 2009 Ponte Vedra Beach (as WC, d. Kudryavtseva, l. No.10 Nadia Petrova); was seventh youngest player to win a WTA main draw match at 14y 48d and youngest since Hingis in 1994

- Father is former Olympic rower Tomasz Swiatek, who competed in the men's quadruple sculls event at the 1988 Summer Olympics in Seoul
- In summer 2022 organised 'Iga Swiatek and friends for Ukraine' event in Krakow, which featured a mixed doubles match between Agnieszka Radwanska, Sergiy Stakhovsky, Polish junior Martyn Pawelski and herself, and was attended by Poland's First Lady, Agata Kornhauser-Duda, Elina Svitolina and Andriy Shevchenko. The occasion was watched by almost 15,000 people live and a further one million on television, raising more than half a million Euros for Ukrainian children and teenagers affected by the war
- Started playing tennis because her older sister was playing and wanted to beat her
- Enjoys rock music, including AC/DC and Pink Floyd
- Includes PZU, On, Tecnifibre, Rolex and Xiaomi in her endorsement portfolio
